From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

E arlier this month I went to see 'Rocketman' at the Empire Cinema in Bishops Stortford. I thought it was a fantastic movie; indeed it might even be the best film of the year I have seen so far. Given that it is the year Avengers Endgame was released, that's a bold thing to day for a geek like myself. Yet I thought the performances were excellent, and the way in which Elton John's music was weaved into the film was very good. Whilst some songs were used just in performance, many were used to make a statement about an event or a time in his life. In this way it was much more of a musical than Bohemian Rhapsody which I also liked. By the way, I think 'Rocketman' is the better film.

For those of you unfamiliar with the film it is the account of Elton John growing up from childhood, and his emergence as a major pop star. It also tells in some detail his addiction to drugs and his struggle with his own sexuality. His brief marriage to Renata is covered. I have read somewhere that Elton John, who is one of the film's producers, did not want to shy away from the darker times in his life. So the film is about who he was and who he became, the good bits and the not so good bits. I'm not giving the ending away, as he is a real person and his life is well documented; in saying that he comes through the tough times and in the end finds happiness both within himself and with David Furnish.

It is a story of redemption. In that is can many parallels with the Christian faith for Christianity is also about redemption. It is no surprise that we sing, 'There is a Redeemer' when singing of Jesus's sacrifice for us upon the cross. It is no surprise that the ultimate redemption of resurrection to eternity in heaven was opened for us in Jesus's own resurrection from his death.

The point I'd like to make is that both Jesus's sacrifice and the promise of resurrection were both made for us even though we are not perfect; even though we go wrong. In the film there are a number of people who give up on Elton John as his world and behaviour sinks ever lower. The one person who doesn't judge is his friend Bernie Taupin but he too needs to get away for his own protection. The one person who is never going to give up on us is God himself. There is a hymn called, "Just as I am" that we sometimes sing in church. It is about how God loves us just as we are with faults, with dark spaces, with problems, etc. It is from that love that our redemption story begins in knowing that we can turn to Jesus for forgiveness and acceptance.

'Rocketman' may just be the best film I have seen so far this year, but it is the story of one man. How amazing would it be to part of a church where we're involved in the redemption stories of so many different people? I invite you to be a part of that church. I invite you to take your steps on your redemption journey.

Getting help with Dementia through Uttlesford Frontline



Alzheimer's Society research shows that many people worry about "saying the wrong" thing to people living with dementia. And despite almost all of us knowing someone affected, two thirds of people living with dementia report feeling isolated and lonely.

That's why the primary aim of Dementia Action Week in May was to encourage everyone to take action - by starting a conversation with someone we know who's living with dementia. It could be a relative, a friend or a neighbour. But whoever it is, it's definitely time to start talking. Even a chat about the weather could make a difference.

Getting out and about is also beneficial: whether to a dementia café, special cinema screenings, a pub lunch or taking part in an exercise programme. But if you're involved with someone living with dementia just how can you track down what help is available in the community? Who can provide the right advice and information? And, importantly, who can you trust?

Help is at hand, thankfully, through a simple-to-use website developed by Uttlesford Citizens Advice www.uttlesfordfrontline.org.uk. Just enter 'dementia' in the search box to browse through some 40 services available locally, descriptions of what they do and how to get in touch. You can also access a resource sheet compiled by Saffron Walden Dementia Action Alliance.

www.uttlesfordfrontline.org.uk enables one-stop access to more than 130 organisations in Uttlesford who can provide help, support and information - with full contact details. Information is listed under: Advice; Family; Older People; Mental Health; Transport; Disability; Addiction; Well-Being. Frontline is also available as an app for mobile devices.





(NOT) From the Chairman of the Parish Council

Dear Villagers,

With Sally unavailable at time of submission, it falls to me to write our update to villagers in The Link. I've been pleased to be a member of the Parish Council for just over two years and live with my husband, daughter and a number of relatively disobedient animals just off the Green...

Last month's report advised of the appointment of three new councillors and this month we also co-opted Paul Wilsher back onto the Council. This means that the Q&R PC is 'fully staffed' and we are grateful to all our Councillor volunteers for the time, commitment and enthusiasm they bring to the village.

The minutes from June's meeting are available on the village website, but these were some of the main points raised:

• We welcomed Les Hawkins (Specials Supported Policing Coordinator from Essex Police) to the meeting to provide the PC with information about the Community Special Constables scheme. Special Constables are volunteer police officers, holding the same office and the same powers as regular officers. They wear the same uniform, carry the same equipment and are deployed to the same incidents. They are not paid, but can claim mileage and duty allowances – and this is what the Parish would become responsible for if we were to support one in Q&R. The proposal is to consider the possibility of 'employing' a Community Special Constable (CSC) for Quendon and Rickling whereby a uniformed Police Officer would patrol Quendon and Rickling for a minimum of 16 hours per week. We have already had interest from someone in the village who might wish to take on this volunteer role. The PC will consider it again at the next meeting and welcome feedback from the village about the proposal.

- The planning application for 'Foxley 2' has now been submitted. Residents will have received, by post, details about the proposal. The planners are very keen to present to the village, but as yet we haven't confirmed this meeting. As/when this happens, we will be sure to let villagers know so that all opinions can be heard.
- The potholes on the road leading to the school and the pub are much improved thanks to repair work from parents of pupils at the school.
- Councillor Ray Gooding was at the meeting and we asked him to pursue the change in speed limit to 40mph just south of Ventnor Lodge later this year.

(NOT) From the Chairman of the Parish Council (cont.)

This should therefore be in place shortly and, though not the 30mph limit we're ultimately striving for, is progress. He's also looking further into speed calming measures for the main B1383. We are pleased that the speed signs the PC were left to repair and hold up with gaffer tape at the North end of the village have finally been replaced. We are awaiting permission from Essex for a sign to be put up on the bridleway to the back entrance of Quendon Hall but hope this shouldn't take much longer.

Much work has been done by one of our Councillors, Ted Crow, on the football field – do find his update in this month's *The Link*. This is set to become an excellent facility for the village and we are incredibly grateful to all the time and energy he is putting into this initiative. Thank you, Ted!

We'd like to congratulate all those involved in Rickling Runfest 2019. We hope you have been able to raise lots of money and reached (if not surpassed) your target!

We have been doing our best to keep our ear to the ground on what's happening with the pub. We've been advised that the lease for The Cricketers is nearing completion of signing and (fingers crossed!) they are looking at re-opening again in July.

Therefore, I remain optimistic and look forward to seeing you for a drink in the pub soon!

Quendon & Rickling Parish Council News

And then there were 7...

At the June parish council meeting Paul Wilsher was coopted onto the parish councillor to fill the vacant slot from the recent parish elections. In fact, Paul has been a parish councillor for a few years now so will be bringing a lot of experience to future meetings.

Community Special Constables

We had a visit from Les Hawkins who is the head honcho for this scheme. He gave an in-depth address on what the scheme entails, which basically boils down to parishes paying to have an additional (some might say the only) police presence in their village. This is a scheme which the parish council will be considering. Although costings are understandably vague at this stage, it is estimated that for a CSC to attend Quendon and Rickling for 16 hours a month the cost will be in the region of £1,000 pa.

District Council elections

Neil Hargreaves and Anthony Gerard have been reelected and their party, Residents4Uttlesford, has by far the largest number of district councillors. They will therefore be forming the next administration.

<u>Football Field</u>

Concrete footings have now been installed in which to attach the goal posts, which have been fully refurbished. Already a team from Elsenham is in the process of signing up and a group from Saffron Walden has also shown considerable interest.

Other news from the parish council meeting

As you may well know by now, Brandon Chapman and Tony Jones have stepped down as councillors after many years of loyal service. I would like to thank them both for all their efforts on behalf of Quendon and Rickling, and also their help in my early days as parish clerk. They have been great assets to the village.

The annual audit has now been completed and the full return has been posted to the website.

The potholes near the school have been repaired. Hallelujah!

The re-opening of The Cricketers Arms is looking more and more likely. Maybe July?

It is hoped to have a 40mph buffer zone between the 50mph and 30mph but it is very unlikely that this would be reduced to 30mph

Football Pitch

A few months ago, the Parish Council took over the lease for the football pitch for the next 20 years. The pitch has been in existence since approximately 1974 and was last used regularly over 18 months ago.

Nature has been trying to reclaim the once pristine cut grass and turn it back into meadow. It became my responsibility to turn the meadow back into a quality, well cared-for playing field for the use of football teams, school and villagers alike.

The goal posts have been removed, refurbished and will soon be installed again to await the coming season. Concrete goal post foundations and galvanised sockets have been installed to Football Association guidelines in order that we may remove them easily at season end whilst not offering a safety hazard. Even a trusty old gang mower has been obtained and supplied by a private individual to reduce the many hours of grass cutting to just hours!

A smaller football pitch is being created at the North end of the main playing field which will accommodate five-a-side (5 v 5) matches for children of ages under 7 and under 8.

The old football changing rooms and shower blocks are now sadly, dangerous structures and as such have been fenced off until their removal. The landlord's agents, Strutt and Parker have kindly agreed to remove these buildings; however, a timescale has not yet been agreed until a cost-effective contractor has been sourced. The Parish council are costing a Portaloo facility (which will be placed out of sight) for the benefit of children on matchdays.

We are now part of the Uttlesford District Council Playing Pitch Strategy and may feature in a report which will be published shortly for which I attended meetings at UDC with KKP Consultants and the Essex Football Association. We are also undergoing regular pitch quality inspections from the Essex F.A Regional Pitch Advisor.

Quendon and Rickling Football Pitch will be available for any F.A. affiliated teams to use, subject to Parish Council agreement and we will actively encourage other groups such as Walking Football etc.

Elsenham Youth F.C U18 will hopefully be our first visitors in September 2019 on the large pitch and will be joined by the U7 and U8 teams if I am able to convert the smaller pitch into a playing surface of quality.

You must all remember, the whole area, the pitch and grass surroundings are for all the villagers to enjoy. Out of the football season, I positively encourage you all to have picnics, walk, and play in the areas which I am keeping clean and cared-for. Should you be walking dogs, please try to keep them off the actual playing surfaces as we really want to keep these spotless for families and children alike.

The Parish Council will be approaching our school to offer use of the area for school sports and any other lesson time activities they may require.

Should you be in a position to offer any advice or more importantly, assistance in maintaining the pitches and surroundings this would be greatly appreciated. For vehicular access for everyone (there is a car park area) please contact myself ted@cpsuk.com or any of the Parish Council.



Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

Neighbourhood Plan

The Steering Group is now on the final stages with the Neighbourhood Plan. UDC has been given our Consultation Statement. Effective publicity and consolation is a requirement for the plan to be found sound and the Statement details all the various events, publicity and consultation activities, and the contacts with the many statutory consultees – a bit like you see on a planning application, except more of them. The Steering Group responses and adjustments to the Plan are also noted. The Consultation Statement, and the rest of the evidence base, is on the Plan website https://ngrplan.org/ evidence-documents.

UDC has also been given the latest draft of the Plan and asked to consider if it needs an Environmental Impact Assessment. This is another statutory consideration. We think the answer is No, but it is UDC who must decide The next stage will be another six week this. consultation. Then UDC will appoint an appropriately qualified and experienced person to carry out the independent examination of the neighbourhood plan, known as the 'independent examiner'. This appointment has to be agreed with the Steering Group. In practice it seems we can choose who will examine the Plan, so we are now checking out with neighbouring areas which have been through this to see what they thought of their examiner!

The consultation version of the Plan will be published shortly. Superficially it looks similar to the previous consultation version. However, there is a great deal of detailed change, and removal of some parts which we have been unable to achieve or facilitate, such as a new Health Centre, and a major site allocation at the quarry south of Newport. We have also hardened up the wordings of policies to make them clearer and more robust, and easily used by planning officers in decision

making.

Local Plan

The Inspectors have written to UDC, prior to the start of their hearings, to require confirmation of whether the new R4U administration is supporting the submitted Plan. The options at this point are carrying on or withdraw. Although, if the Inspectors find fault, UDC can invite them to recommend alterations. My main objection was that the 14,000 house requirement is overstated by about 2,000. However we cannot at this stage withdraw and resubmit because new rules now apply and the number would be forced up by the government to just under 16,000. So rather than cutting out one of the new settlements we would have to find more sites, which could well be in our area.

There would also be a serious implication for the Neighbourhood Plan. To carry weight in decision making, a Local Plan area must have a five year supply of permissions, otherwise the balance is tilted towards building pretty much anywhere. Currently UDC has a 3.46 year supply. But a Neighbourhood Plan carries weight in its first two years so long as the district supply is at least 3 years worth. But if the housing requirement goes up to 16,000 then we would not even have a 3 year supply and so would have protection from neither the Local nor the Neighbourhood Plan. The decision on the future of the Emerging Local Plan must be taken before the end of June.

Councillors Surgeries

We are available every Thursday morning from 10.30 to 11.30 in Dorrington's in Newport and we take turns to attend the parish council meetings in the Village Hall. We are also active on the village Facebook group.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The buildings of the Hundred Parishes display a range of traditional construction methods and

materials, some dating back many centuries. A notable feature, rarely found outside East Anglia, is pargeting. Pargeting is decorative render applied to the face of a building, either "incised", where a pattern has been cut or pressed into plasterwork, or "raised", where an image has been attached to the wall. Either type may have been crafted by hand in situ or created first using a mould or template. The incised forms were basic and not expensive, unlike the elaborate raised forms. There are several fine and varied examples across the Hundred Parishes.



Perhaps best known are the 17thcentury raised images on the former Sun Inn in Saffron Walden. They depict two giant figures (whose identity is a matter

of debate) and also

various birds and plants – even a little dog. Also dating from the 1600s is the raised decoration on The Crown House, Newport where legend (albeit without



evidence) suggests that King Charles II may have visited his mistress, Nell Gwynn.

A fine example of incised patterns can be seen in Braughing, where panels of different patterns cover the face of The Old Forge.





In Linton High Street, Chandlers has a mixture of small, ancient raised panels and extensive, more modern incised patterns.

The art of creating and conserving pargeting is now pursued by only a few craftsmen.



Local MP welcomes new police officers

Kemi Badenoch, the Member of Parliament for the Saffron Walden constituency, has welcomed the nine new officers that have taken up their places on streets across Uttlesford.

"When I was elected I promised constituents to deliver more officers for our local area. The effort put-in to achieve this is paying off and I can announce that the local policing team in Braintree and Uttlesford now have nine more officers, with another 12 to come.

"It is vital that neighbourhoods and businesses across our constituency can feel safe and protected and this is undoubtedly encouraging news and a move in the right direction. traveller sites in the area, so I am also glad that there will be an additional seven officers to help tackle rural crime across Essex.

"I commend Roger Hirst, the Police, Fire, and Crime Commissioner, Chief Constable Ben-Julian Harrington and Essex Police on their work and I look forward to building on this positive news."

In the last year, Essex Police has grown and now has a strength of 3,062 full-time equivalent officers – 59 more than originally planned.

Further investment means there are plans to grow Essex Police and bring officer numbers up to 3,218, an increase of 368 in total over 2018/2019 and 2019/2020.

Tricycle Association

The Tricycle Association was formed at the end of 1928, and held its first official run in February 1929. This year marks the 90th Anniversary of the T.A., which we are celebrating with some special events. The T.A. is a national organisation with around 500 members, in seven geographical regions. Each Region organises a programme of racing, touring and social events during the year. There are also a few nationally organised events, such as the National Dinner, Prize Presentation and AGM.

The T.A. did not have a national newsletter until July 1944. In the first issue of 'The Tricycle Association Bulletin', it was announced that a Mid Summer Run would take place after the T.A. 50 mile (Tricycle Trophy) event that was being held early on Sunday 16th July 1944 on the 32nd Course, north of Bishops Stortford. Overnight accommodation and the event headquarters were at Ventnor Lodge, Quendon. These premises, along with other local houses and club huts, provided accommodation for cyclists racing on this course over many years. The 1944 Mid Summer Run departed from Ventnor Lodge, and took a lanes route to Hoddesdon for lunch and Hatfield for tea. This route would almost certainly have passed through Manuden and Much Hadham.

For one of our 90th Anniversary Events, we will be riding round a 25 mile circuit, which starts and finishes at Hopley's Cafe at Much Hadham on Sunday 14th July 2019. Our circuit will pass through Little Hadham, Furneux Pelham, Stocking Pelham, Rickling Green, Manuden (lunch), Farnham and back through the Hadhams. There will also be an extra 8 mile loop from Furneux Pelham, Little Hormead, Braughing and back to Furneaux Pelham for those who want to ride a longer route! We hope that you will enjoy watching our tricycles and tandem tricycles passing through your very pretty lanes and villages.

News from the Police and Fire Commissioner's Office

Essex Police officers can now be more visible in their communities thanks to their colleagues at Essex County Fire and Rescue Service.

Community Policing Teams now have access to a number of fire stations across the county and can use them as drop in locations for when they are deployed to certain areas on duty. It means that police officers, PCSOs and Special Constables can spend more time being visible to the public instead of travelling to and from police stations – a real benefit especially in the more rural areas of Essex.

• Chelmsford and Maldon Community Policing Team now have access to Burnham Fire Station.

• Braintree & Uttlesford Community Policing Team can now use Halstead and Coggeshall fire stations, and Dunmow, Leaden Roding and Newport

• Brentwood & Epping Forest Community Policing Team can use Ingatestone Fire Station

However, these fire stations are not open to the public to report crime. If people need to contact Essex Police, they should do so in the usual way, either by calling 101 or 999 in an emergency or online https://www.essex.police.uk/do-it-online/

CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE

Recently I have noticed quite a few burglaries where access has been gained by kicking the front or back door in. Many were wooden doors fitted with only one lock, or a rim night latch positioned either centrally or higher up the door. Neither of these positions supply much protection to the bottom of the door which is susceptible to sustained kicking. Best practice is to locate a rim night latch about one third down from the top of the entrance door and a mortice deadlock about one third up from the bottom. This provides far better protection to the door. However before you go and fit an extra lock to your door, the position of the locks may be dictated by door's construction; fitting a lock at a wooden joint will reduce the door's strength. If you are unsure get some advice first (see below).

Modern PVC or composite doors (and some modern wooden doors) are usually fitted with multiple locking points BUT they are only functional if they are properly used: remember to lift the handle to engage them and then lock the door. Locking the door but failing to lift the handle, frequently relies only on a thin central latch which could leave the door prone to levering open or being kicked in. Burglars often try door handles and if they can be pressed all the way down they know the door is not properly locked and is a potential target.

The Crime prevention website gives lots of advice and suggestions for improving door security. If you want someone to fit extra locks, ensure you use a locksmith registered with the Master Locksmiths Association. Go to https://www.essex.police.uk/advice/home-security/ or https://thecrimepreventionwebsite.com/ for more information.

There appears to be an upsurge in the theft of vehicle parts. Thieves are gaining entry by various means into fairly new vehicles such as BMWs and Mercedes and stealing parts from within especially steering wheels, but also including parts of the dashboard and sound systems. Apparently some BMW steering wheels can be worth anywhere from £500 to £1,500!

CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE (cont.)

All of this takes time so anything that can warn you or increase the time that they will need will help put them off.

• If you have a suitable garage please use it. If they are unaware of what car you own, they are more likely to move on to one they want and can see.

• A steering wheel lock such as those designed to deter the theft of the vehicle itself is a good idea, especially if it serves a dual purpose by covering access to the centre of the steering wheel there by making it difficult to remove it from the steering column.

• Also consider upgrading your car alarm or fitting a retrofit alarm system, and don't forget to apply the warning sticker!

• Not all car theft devices are good or have been properly tested. We advise the use of Secure by Design or Thatcham approved devices which have been tested to meet or surpass minimum standards.

Shed and garden crime (spring/summer)

As spring disappears into summer and we find ourselves spending more time keeping the garden tidy so we also see an increased number of shed and outbuilding thefts.

Working in the garden: it is easy to get engrossed in what you are doing when working in the garden; if the house is empty it is wise to close and lock the door (don't forget the key though!). Remember when you finish working in the garden or stop for a break put your tools away, "it adds insult to injury" if your tools are used to break into your house.

New tools and lawn mowers: be mindful of how you dispose of the packaging to your new purchases; don't advertise it to the thieves and burglars with your empty boxes on display outside for roadside collection. Fold boxes inside out or break them up and put them in bag for collection.

Property marking: it's a good deterrent if your property is visibly security marked with your house number and post code such as www.creproducts.co.uk or labelled if a forensic (hidden) property marking system is used such as www.smartwater.com or www.selectadna.co.uk. You can also record the serial numbers of any property free of charge at www.immobilise.com. If your property does get stolen with property marking and/or recording on Immobilise there is a greater chance of you getting it back.

Shed security: with sheds coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door; use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock or a key operated mortice lock; don't forget the hinges ensure they cannot be unscrewed. Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or white wash the windows to prevent prying eyes. Consider a shed alarm if you do not have one. There are shed alarms available that contact you on the phone when activated and this is a clever device with many applications www.uwatch.co.uk. Products that are fit for purpose can found by looking for the "Secured by Design" or "Sold Secure" logos, or on their websites www.securedbydesign.com or www.soldsecure.com.

<u>New plants</u>: larger plants etc. can be secured to land or rootball anchors or plant through chicken wire covering the area with soil. Cement or bolt down containers to the ground. Your local garden centre or DIY store should be able to help.

Rogue Traders: the rogue trader also takes advantage of the fine weather to con the unsuspecting. Although you may think you would never be taken in by them, they can be very convincing, especially to the elderly or vulnerable; "I am laying some gravel up the road and see you need some....."; "I notice your trees or shrubs need a prune..."; so many stories. Look after the elderly or vulnerable near you and step in should you need to with a little advice; also another face sometime puts the rogue trader off. If you need a trader and have no personal recommendations, look at www.buywithconfidence for traders checked out by Trading Standards.


