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

Letter from Peter

November always heralds Armistice Day and Remembrance Sunday, a time of year when I'm reminded of George who served in the Army during the Second World War and who once vividly recounted to me an horrific experience he had which had etched itself indelibly upon his memory. The raw and painful emotion displayed by George as he retold his story wasn't easy to witness and seemed especially sad as it was being displayed by a man who by this time was aged eighty years and not given to displays of this nature.

George's story, which I heard some years ago now made me acutely aware that as we quite rightly remember the fallen whose names are written upon war memorials all across the United Kingdom, there are those for whom the experiences of conflict don't come into focus on one day each year only. Sadly not long after hearing George's story he had a fall coming out of the local community centre and he never recovered from his injuries; he died not long after. It seemed to me an undeserved way to leave this life for a man who in his younger life gave so much, saw so much, and then carried so much.



As the years continue to pass and the men and women of George's generation become smaller in number, remembering the cost of conflict is as important and relevant as ever. The scars that George carried speak also of the scars the world continues to carry not only because of the two world wars of twentieth century, but also from every conflict in every place at any time, including in our own day. Our remembering shines a light on any and all conflicts, in which many, whether service personnel or civilians are losing their lives and many

more Georges are being created. If our hearts feel any compassion and pain as we watch ongoing conflicts on our television screens, how much more does God's. I know for many war and conflict call into question the whole idea of a loving, caring God or whether there is a God at all.



Yet for others it is only the belief of there being a loving, caring, and just God that keeps hope alive that 🕅 God's good desire for all his creation will win out over our the worst the dark side of humanity continually expresses into the world.

Further to this hope, Christianity is a faith which understands God to be present in some way within the suffering of the world, which in the end comes down to the suffering of real people, innocent people, vulnerable people. That this is so is most clearly seen in the person of Christ, who is mysteriously fully divine, yet fully human, who himself was plunged into some of the worst pain humans can inflict on other humans. In Christ we see God on the receiving end and sharing in the suffering of the world, and from within its unspeakable pain and degradation bringing hope that the kind of pain humans inflict on each other will not be the final state of humankind. The resurrection of Christ illustrates and points to a future resurrection of humankind to a life that will not be plagued with such conflicts, pain, injustice, and tragedy. Basically God in Christ has shown us the end he has planned for humankind, where justice, love, mercy, and peace, will be the victors, and he calls us to follow Christ in living now with this vision of hope in view and working with God's Spirit towards this end in our own lifetime.

May we all remember this Remembrance Day with sober reflection on the cost to so many and discover in Christ the God who shows us a better way, calls us to work for peace, and who keeps hope alive in our hearts.

From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers,

Welcome to autumn – season of changing leaves, cosiness and complaining about the nights drawing in...

We had a productive **Autumn Daze** event back at the start of October with the now – almost – traditional pumpkin competition being augmented significantly by several local craft stalls, food trucks, and apple pressing. A whopping 18kg specimen saw Jo Kitcat carry away the Pumpkin Cup – what's your secret, Jo? We and a gang of burly youths also pressed about forty litres of apple juice. Many thanks to all who came along to take part, set up and run stalls and cleared away afterwards.

A reminder to all who are walking dogs to keep them under control especially around other dogs. Keep your **dogs** close to you and on a lead if they get particularly excited – it's hard to estimate the effect of your dog on others! Oh – and do dispose of their excretions properly, as a reminder you can use standard litter bins for disposal of it, if a dog waste bin isn't close by. Better still: take it home and dispose of it yourself.

We were expecting to begin consultation on the development sites (**Call for Sites**) for the Local Plan this month. It was pushed back to December, but now that date has been significantly delayed itself. We understand that the planning and local plan teams at UDC have lost a number of people, and it'll take time to build the team up again. As mentioned before, it's worth a delay to get this stage right. The overall timeline of the Local Plan will be pushed out as a result, I'm afraid, probably to the end of 2023 or even the start of 2024.

That delay brings to the fore the state of our own **Neighbourhood Plan** (NhP). This has stood us in good stead as a bulwark against speculative development since it was adopted over a year ago. However the sites identified in the NhP have largely been developed, so the Steering Committee is beginning a process of reviewing the Plan, with an additional aim being to include additional sections where appropriate. Needless to say this will take some effort and if spread around becomes bearable. If anyone would like to get involved with this review (and learn about the significance of the Plan and contribute to making it as effective as possible), then do please get in touch through our Parish Clerk (details on page 4 and on the noticeboards).

As regards the grassy **wildlife areas** around the village. Now is the right time to cut back the grass to ensure that wildflowers have set their seed for next year, so we have commissioned a firm to come and cut and cart away the grass which will be done in the next few weeks.

We have also got the green light to do some work to improve the health of the pond on the Green and the one on Brick Kiln Lane. Earlier in the year we commissioned a survey on the state of these ponds, which is available on the website (https://www.quendonandrickling.co.uk/ local-information/village-ponds/) and we are looking for volunteers to come forward and lend a hand with getting some of the reed out and cutting down excess vegetation. Please contact me (tddqrpc@gmail.com) or Paul Wilsher if you can help out.

On the same subject of trimming – we have been told that Highways have a plan to cut back the vegetation on the footway along the B1383 Cambridge Road before the end of the year – finally! No exact dates set yet but we will keep on pushing on this project, rest assured.

On the subject of frustrating activity against immoveable organisations ... mobile phone coverage. We've been in contact with our MP to highlight the coverage holes throughout our village. Of course this isn't a problem solely for us, but I think as a rural MP she has the bit between her teeth to highlight the issues of coverage in villages such as hers (Clavering when in the constituency) and ours. More on this issue elsewhere in this issue!

As we roll up towards the end of the year I saw on Facebook a pertinent post – our recent spate of Chancellors lined up with the month they were in charge – July=Sunak, August=Javid, September=Kwarteng, October=Hunt ... I'm excited: only two more chancellors till Christmas!

And finally ... we are always looking for more willing hands and minds to join our merry crew! Well, life on the PC as a councillor is not quite so cringingly jolly but it's interesting and rewarding. Come along and lend a hand! District Councillors' Report

Update on the Local Plan

You may have seen the announcement that the Local Plan has been paused to allow further work to be done to ensure that the evidence base for the plan is as robust as possible. Over recent months a new Director of Planning has been recruited (Dean Hermitage, whose last post was with the Department for Levelling up, Housing and Communities in Westminster) and a new interim manager for the local plan team (John Clements, who has substantial experience in developing local plans, particularly for rural areas). The requirement from national government is for us to build 14,000+ additional

houses in the district in the next 20 years. This is not an easy task in a district with minimal nationally significant infrastructure to support such growth, particularly on top of that already experienced in the last decade. We must be innovative to deliver the quantum of housing that the government requires in this district.

Update on Neighbourhood Plan

The Newport Quendon and Rickling Neighbourhood Plan is a very useful document that has proved its worth in the course of many planning applications and several appeals already in each of the villages. When considering the benefits, harms and policies associated with a planning application, the planning officer or inspector will determine the weight associated with each element. The Neighbourhood Plan carries most weight within the first two years following adoption; following this the plan policies will continue to have full weight, but the spatial policies (which determine where development is acceptable) will begin to lose weight and will eventually be deemed out of date.

We want the plan to carry the maximum weight possible for as long as possible, so have begun the review process by discussing the next steps with a planning consultant to gain a better understanding of how we can refine and improve the plan. If anyone would like to join the steering committee to be part of the review please contact either Neil or Judy.

Following on from a busy harvest and drilling campaign (see cover picture), on behalf of all of us at Maces Farms we would like to say thank you to everyone for their

understanding and awareness of our movements. Amidst a record breaking heatwave, harvest was a success and we are truly grateful that we avoided any fire outbreaks which unfortunately some neighbouring landowners encountered. Thank you for your help and cooperation with mitigating such risk.

After recent meetings with Parish Council representatives, we wish to share more information associated with our

agricultural operations forming Maces Farms. One way we are doing this is through commissioning a number of information boards to be located at various public

footpaths, bridleways and byways across the Quendon Estate. Each information board will have a QR code for passers-by to scan to obtain up to date information about the crops planted in the surrounding fields, husbandry operations performed to date and the end markets the crops will go towards. Rare plant returns

Few-flowered fumitory was identified in a museum flower bed back in June during a botanical survey of the Museum and Castle site.



This plant is classed as 'vulnerable' by the conservation charity Plantlife and is a chalksoil specialist restricted to suitable areas of eastern and southern England.

The feathery leaves in the photo show a new seedling of the plant which we hope will survive the winter or have a very sudden growth spurt to flower and set seed again before winter.

Pargetting Researcher

Anna Kettle has begun a joint placement here at the



A a joint placement here at the Museum and with SPAB (the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings). She is documenting and researching all the instances of pargeting on buildings in the town.

Pargeting is the ornamentation of plastered and rendered building facades that would otherwise be smooth, linedout or roughcast.

Wooden stamps and combs were often used to render the designs in the wet plaster. The finished effect is very distinctive and still regularly seen in Saffron Walden and the surrounding villages.

We expect that small displays and activities relating to this researcher project will be held at the museum and in the town early next year as the project progresses. Stay tuned to find out more about these and more about Anna's project over the coming months.

Project Update: Greater in Spirit, Larger in Outlook

Epping Forest District Museum in Waltham Abbey and Saffron Walden Museum have received an Arts Council National Lottery project grant of £100,000 to work in partnership on their world culture collections.

The aim of the project is to ensure the museums and their collections reflect their diverse communities by working directly with cultural groups to research different objects and tell their stories.

The project's title, 'Greater in Spirit, Larger in Outlook' is inspired by Haile Selassie, Emperor of Ethiopia from 1930 to 1974. Museum staff will work with relevant community groups including the Ethiopian History Society, to explore, explain and exhibit the collection leading to a new permanent display at Epping Forest District Museum, due to be completed by the end of 2022.

The project has begun to work with relevant community and cultural groups linked to the world cultures collections in preparation for the major temporary exhibition in 2023 at Epping Forest Museum for this project.

Alice Lodge, has now been employed in the role of Collections Connector on the project and is splitting her time between both museums. On Fridays, you will see her researching in the World Cultures gallery here.

Collections on the Move

On Monday 26 September removal company Eezeemovers, helped us to move our costume and textile collection stored at the museum to our external store on the Shire Hill industrial estate.

The museum costume store was essentially an overgrown walk-in cupboard, but you can see from this image of all the boxes once they'd been moved to Shire Hill (pictured left), it must have been a bit of a tardis and actually fitted in quite a few boxes!



It took 4 hours to move everything out of the museum's costume store and a further 2 hours to unpack it out of the van and get it all onto the racks at Shire Hill!

This is the start of work to improve the storage conditions for these collections. They will gradually be repacked, re-organised, researched and documented. We hope to be able to hang the long garments on padded hangers in calico bags eventually, so they will no longer have to be folded in boxes, which can over time cause damage to them.

If you or anyone you know is skilled at sewing by hand or at using a sewing machine and could spare us some time. It would be great if we could get some volunteers to help make up calico bags with velcro fastenings and sew padding onto wooden hangers for this project.

Object of the Month

The Museum's 'Object of the Month' provides an opportunity to explore interesting and unusual objects from our store.



During October we celebrated the Lost Language of Nature project, with repair work to this alpine swift. This bird has been cleaned and had its base refreshed to help preserve it for future exhibitions, and will be on temporary display in the Museum throughout October.

Alpine swifts spend the warmer months around the Mediterranean Sea and further east, or in southern Africa, and spend the cooler months in parts of east and west

Africa. They are related to the common swifts we see in Britain but are noticeably bigger.

Old beliefs about swifts said that they had no feet, and the scientific name of the common swift and related birds including the alpine swift and hummingbirds, even comes from the Ancient Greek for 'without feet'.

Mobile Phone coverage in the parish

I've had a look at the OfCom coverage maps and generally the Indoors coverage map is, in my experience, a reasonable predictor of Outdoors coverage. Mobile network maps are estimated by computer and do not generally take sufficient notice of obstacles such as woods when predicting coverage; as a result they are always optimistic in rolling countryside like ours.

What the maps tell me is for 4G/Data:

- EE is best for the southern edge along Cambridge Road and best of a bad bunch for most of Rickling Green
- O2 is best for Brick Kiln Lane/Coney Acre
- Vodafone is best for the north end of Quendon
- Three is pretty useless

For Voice/Text:

- Vodafone is best for the north end of Quendon
- O2 is best across the whole parish but
- Virtually everywhere is poor
- Three is useless

It's really the mast location which controls how good our coverage is. There are no masts from which we get a signal

from any operator less than three kilometres away from the village. The closest EE mast is at Cherry Green (past Henham), for instance - that's quite a long way away and there are woods in between which will disrupt the signal.

However, from a mobile operator's map though it looks like mast density is excellent - because there's a slew of masts along the M11. Those are generally aligned north-south and provide no coverage to villages east-west of the motorway.

You may have heard there is a project afoot called the Shared Rural Network (SRN) which is intended to remove notspots (where there is no mobile coverage at all) and partial not-spots (where there is coverage from some but not all operators. Alas in communication with the SRN team it's apparent there are no plans for any improvement for us from that source; we're not sufficiently "not" a spot.

I am in conversation with and have expressed the concerns regarding lack of coverage to our MP who has promised she will look into the issues and push our case with the SRN in particular.

I live in Stansted Mountfitchet. The

name is an interesting one: Stansted derives from Saxon language meaning stony place; Mountfitchet is a corruption of Montfiguet, a village in Normandy. A man from there fought with William the Conqueror and was rewarded with land in Stansted.





Several of the Hundred Parishes have names ending in the Saxon STED, STEAD or TED. THAXted refers to the thatch that could be obtained there: BROXted seems to come from BROCK, the old name for badger.

Many of our towns and

villages were recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086. Duxford appears as Duchesuuorde, or Duc's Enclosure. Duxford has a number of locations where ancient travellers could FORD the River Cam. There are several more FORDs.

Domesday includes the manor of Pelham, possibly the home or farm of a man called Peola. The Norman family



De Furneux added its name to establish Furneux Pelham, while part of the manor was destroyed by fire in the twelfth century and became 'burnt' or Brent Pelham. Stocking Pelham, seems to have adopted an Old English word meaning 'made of logs', perhaps referring to the parish church.

HAM appears at the end of more parish names, suggesting that they also arose from someone's home or farm.

The parish of Quendon and Rickling was created in the 1940s, bringing together two settlements whose names related to an ancient queen. Quendon is recorded as

and may come from Old English words meaning a valley owned by the gueen. Rickling was recorded as Richelinga and may be derived from Ricula who was the wife of Sledd, a 6thcentury ruler of Essex.

Ten parish names end in ING, a Norse word for meadow or enclosure

More origins are discussed in the parish introductions on our website.

What can you do to avoid nuisance marketing calls?



If you or a person you know has received a nuisance marketing call, make sure you report it to the Information Commissioner's Office.

There are two types of nuisance marketing call that the ICO covers - live and automated. Live calls are from a real person, which you haven't consented to receive.

Automated calls are pre-recorded marketing messages played when you answer the phone.

There are a few things you can do to avoid receiving these calls:

- 1 Register your landline or mobile phone number with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS) https:// www.tpsonline.org.uk/register. Companies should check against this list before they make marketing calls.
- 2 Check privacy statements when you provide your phone number.
- 3 Be careful when ticking boxes so that you do not give consent for companies to contact you or use your personal information.
- 4 Ask the company to stop calling you. If they don't, report them to the ICO https://ico.org.uk/make-a-complaint/.

The ICO does take action.

Catalogue retailer Easylife fined £1.48 million for breaking data protection and electronic marketing laws

We've fined Easylife, a catalogue retailer, £1.35 million for using the personal information of 145,400 customers to predict their medical condition and target them with health-related products without their consent.

Our investigation found that Easylife made assumptions about people's health and profiled them based on their purchase history without their knowledge. Easylife would then market a health product to them without their consent.

For example, if a person bought a jar opener or a dinner tray, Easylife would use this information to presume the person had arthritis. They would then target the person with marketing calls to sell glucosamine joint patches. This is against the law.

We have also fined Easylife £130,000 for making 1,345,732 predatory direct marketing calls to people registered with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS).

Four firms fined for targeting people with home improvement predatory marketing calls

We've fined four companies a total of £370,000 for making over 820,000 home improvement predatory marketing calls to people registered with the TPS. Many of the complainants were vulnerable or elderly, with some having ongoing health conditions.

The four firms are:

Eco Spray Insulations Ltd - based in Eastleigh, Hampshire. They made 178,190 calls to people registered with the TPS. We fined them £100,000.

Euroseal Windows Ltd - based in Newcastle-under-Lyme. They made 169,830 calls to people registered with the TPS. We fined them £80,000 and issued them with an enforcement notice.

Green Logic UK Ltd - based in Derby. They made 11,825 calls to people using lists sourced from a number of companies. They did not check this data against the TPS and used different trading names when making calls. We fined them £40,000 and issued them with an enforcement notice.

Posh Windows UK Ltd - based in Stoke-on-Trent. They made 461,062 calls using details sourced from a data marketing company. We fined them £150,000.

Don't let the pests get away with it! Report them!


