



# From the Vicarage Study Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.



As we enter the season of Advent which reminds us of the great promises of God to rescue creation and bring its restoration to its fulfilment, we are at the same time being prepared to celebrate the birth of Christ without whom God's rescue plan would not have been possible. For many of us, we are quite happy to dive into and enjoy the traditions and magic of Advent and Christmas - but as far as the

substance of the promises and events upon which they are based, we hear them being sung or read about but perhaps, because we feel uncertain as to their reality, don't let them linger in us long enough to discover their power. The mystery and otherworldliness that seem to be contained in the Advent promises of God and that are within much of the Christmas story can be a stumbling block to our modern analytical thinking - we feel we must be able to explain everything. Yet just because we can't fully understand something does that mean we must automatically discount it as unreal or just a fable? Isn't it quite probable that a God who created such a mind-blowing universe and beautifully delicate planet Earth within it, might be beyond the capacity of our limited minds to fully understand?

I'm so glad that Mary the mother of Jesus accepted that an unexplainable mystery could be a real possibility for her, despite her inability to fully understand how it might happen. A few words from Luke 1:29-38 leave us in no doubt Mary had questions about the pronouncements of the messenger angel that she would become the bearer of the promised Christ by the work of the Spirit of God within her:



Mary was deeply troubled by the angel's message, Mary said to the angel, 'I am a virgin. How, then, can this be?"

"I am the Lord's servant," said Mary; "may it happen to me as you have said."

Mary isn't hiding her thoughts as she struggles to understand the 'how' of what is being said but this doesn't stop her accepting that what is being said is real and possible. Mary realises that she has limited ability to know and understand all things, yet she is willing to accept there is mystery around God and the ways in which he works out his plans. The Christmas story reveals to us that Mary's trust was well

founded as she did become mother to the Christ child and a blessing to the whole world.

My hope is that we might find the inspiration and encouragement from Mary that better help us to get the most out of Advent and Christmas and the mystery that in Christ God is revealed in human form. Further to this, might Mary's honesty, vulnerability, hope, and faith give us confidence to be truly ourselves before God and truly ourselves to ourselves. If the incarnation shows us anything, it shows us that our humanity in all its complex and sometimes perplexed and flawed condition is precious to and cherished by God.

#### From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers,

Welcome to late autumn - it doesn't quite feel like winter has arrived yet (no doubt the blast will come soon though!)

The main news of November has centred around the Draft Local Plan from Uttlesford. This is a first version of the Local Plan for the district, covering many subjects on quality of life and planning for the next fifteen years here in Uttlesford. Central, though, to the plan is the decision on where UDC would like to site new housing developments in the district. It's a hefty document but worth a read.

UDC have decided to plump for expanding the main towns of the district - Saffron Walden, Great Dunmow and Stansted Mountfitchet - with significant expansion in the larger villages too, but have decided not to plan for any development in smaller villages like ours.

The result from a parochial point of view is:

Development on the football field (Belchams Lane) is not recommended

- Neither is development at Coney Acre nor around the church
- 400+ houses over 15 years to be added at Newport
- About 400 houses at Stansted Mountfitchet

So although our villages are not identified as a development location at all we will of course be affected by significant development both north and south.

A point to stress is that this is the Draft Plan. The consultation period extends to the middle of December, and if you have opinions on the plan whether in favour or against it's worth putting in a consultation response. I should also stress though that the plans for development put forward by Pegasi still may be progressed, and Pegasi are likely to continue to propose them for development, irrespective of whether they are selected in the Local Plan as approved sites. Pegasi will, I am sure, submit a response to the consultation emphasising the benefits to the community of their proposal - and to be fair there are some real benefits in the proposed provision of amenities for the village - although from what I read in the plan the decision not to recommend expansion in smaller villagers appears to have been made already.

It's likely that Pegasi will want to show their revised plans to the village community so keep an eye out for a presentation invitation from them - on noticeboards, Facebook or in The Link.

On the same subject of Pegasi, the manager Rob Timmins has left for a new job in Norfolk. It's not decided, I understand, whether Pegasi will appoint a new person to the same role, or leave the estate to be managed from Maces Farm on the agricultural side and London centrally on the business side. Rob put a lot of energy into his job and has started a number of initiatives to engage more closely with the village - good luck for the future, Rob!

The Neighbourhood Plan refresh continues to be developed. It's affected by the Draft Local Plan and following a bit of a delay it is likely that it too will go out for consultation locally in Newport and here in January or February. Phil and Brandon continue to steer the project from a village perspective.

Another project suffering a delay is the Pond maintenance program. We still have allocated funding from Uttlesford's Zero Carbon grant, but an important step of preparation needs to be inserted to confirm there's no trace of Great-Crested newts in either of the ponds before work commences, as disturbing a site with these amphibians in is illegal. Projected dates for the clearance of the project is now January-February 2024.


On a wintry note we'll make sure we get the salt bins filled up before the cold winter weather arrives. As a reminder they're situated by the side of the pub, at Coney Acre and on Thistley Crescent. They are available for all residents to use, to make any slippery pavements safer.

Finally I'd like to mention the Christmas Lights switch-on event at The Cricketers Arms on Friday 1st December from 5:30pm. Father Christmas will be arriving by horse-drawn "sleigh" and with the help of local brass-band musicians we'll sing some carols and welcome in the Christmas season! Maybe after that I'll be feeling Christmassy - I expect so!

Best wishes for festive fun, a suitably peaceful Christmastide, and whilst I'm happy for winter to bite, let's hope it doesn't bite too hard!

#### **District Councillors' Report**

#### **North Essex Economic Board**

My cabinet responsibilities include business support. Some of this is delivered through Uttlesford's membership of the North Essex Economic Board (NEEB). NEEB is made up of Braintree, Maldon, Tendring, Uttlesford and Epping Forest district councils, Colchester and Chelmsford city councils, and Essex County Council. All the councils contribute funding and this goes to three main areas of work: improving residents IT and work skills, supporting businesses, and we are now developing an economic strategy to promote inward investment to the sub region. UDCs current

funding for this comes partly from our £1m of funding for post covid recovery, originating from our commercial investment income, and other finance is from the government UK Shared Prosperity Fund allocated from NEEB's District and City Council partners. North Essex Economic Board (neeb.org.uk)

Here are two examples of the work: 'Over the last 12 months, Let's Do Business Group, through the Backing Essex Business service, has provided tailored support to a wealth of businesses, on topics such as accessing finance, marketing and promotion, improving productivity, business planning, staffing (including recruitment and



retention), digital skills and decarbonisation.'

'Run by Shaw Trust, the Skills Path provides dedicated training and skills, mentoring and support, to help you into employment. If you became unemployed in the last three months, were made redundant due to Covid, or are a refugee, you could qualify. There is general support back into work, and training in specific key sectors such as construction, customer service, health and social care and warehousing.'

#### **Uttlesford Business Awards 2024**

UDC also does its own schemes and highlights business innovation and success in the district in annual awards. Applications are open – **closing date Friday 14 January 2024.** Shortlisted entries will be announced on Wednesday 31 January and winners will be announced at an award ceremony at the end of February.

The categories are Best for innovation and customer focus, Uttlesford rising star, Marketing champion, Community impact, Sustainability award, Made in Uttlesford, Taste of Uttlesford, Retailer of the year, Health and wellbeing, Hospitality business of the year, Tourism business of the year, Services business of the year. And all applications are automatically entered into the final category: Uttlesford Business of the Year.

Last year's winners seem to include a fair number of alcohol related businesses – Dead Time Beers in Walden. The Railway Arms in Walden and Meadow Oak Distillery at

If you want to try before you buy it is available by the glass at the Cricketers at Clavering, and no doubt elsewhere in the district.

Many of our local attractions are promoted via UDCs website Discover Uttlesford. These are categorised into Where to stay, What to do and Where to eat and drink Discover Uttlesford - Historic market towns and rural charm (https://www.discoveruttlesford.co.uk/)

Going back to the awards here is just one example of the innovation going on locally: 'Radio Data Networks, based in Little Hallingbury. This microbusiness design and manufacture high tech electronics here in Uttlesford. They deliver innovative solutions focused on making the planet greener and safer. Their innovations include sewer monitoring to reduce pollution; river gauging and flood prevention. This award is given for their innovative hybrid of smart sensors and satellite technology, adopted by Network Rail and Transport for Wales. It helps to improve safety and reduce delays caused by track flooding and the blocking of trash screens in culverts.'

And a bit closer to home, the fuel tanks for Formula 1 racing cars are made by the business next to Newport Station, and also in the village is where the scripts for Death in Paradise are written.

#### Clown mad house award

UDC bid for and was awarded £800k for rural economy grants from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, which is a replacement for EU funding, to be spent over two years. Applications fitting the criteria included additions of solar panels on a high energy use commercial building in Thaxted, an extension building for a business restoring classic Land Rovers also including solar at Debden, and a farm diversification at Takeley involving building a clown mad house as an addition to other successful tourist attractions at the farm.

The grants also cover culture and heritage improvements, and applications are on a rolling basis, with meetings held regularly to avoid delay – government schemes are typically short term and require spending by financial year end, which may be unrealistic unless a project is at an advanced stage.

#### **Local Plan consultation**

With Quendon & Rickling not being marked for major site allocations residents may not be hugely interested. However, there are implications for the whole district. For example, you may wish to look at the further building proposed to the east of Saffron Walden and what it would do to the traffic congestion. Land for a bypass is 'secured'

but I'm not sure the building of a road itself is included and people may wish to look through the detail and comment about it. Similarly, Newport where the traffic assessment says peak queues of 28 minutes would form on Wicken Road, and proposes a mitigation reducing it to 26 minutes. The report 'solves' this by claiming the traffic would just go elsewhere but does not say where. Residents may wish to put in some comments about this.

#### THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

Two brothers born in north Wales in the 16th century have significant links with The

Hundred Parishes. Thomas and Hugh Myddelton were younger sons of Richard, governor of Denbigh Castle. Both came to London to seek their fortune.

Thomas Myddelton was born in 1550, the fourth son. He did indeed make his fortune in trade and became Lord Mayor of London in 1613.

In 1615, Thomas bought the manor of Stansted Mountfitchet as his country seat and began the erection of a new Stansted Hall. He

died in 1631 and was buried at St Mary's Church. His funeral was lavish; the family even paid for the mourners to be suitably dressed. There is a fine memorial inside the church with a life-size effigy under a decorated arch.

Hugh Myddelton was born in 1560, the sixth son. In London, he was apprenticed to a goldsmith and later became Royal Jeweller to King James I.

Hugh became a self-taught engineer. He was largely responsible for construction of



The New River which ran for some 20 miles, taking fresh water from springs near Great Amwell into London. He helped fund the project and also secured financial help from the king.

The New River was opened in 1613, following the land contours so that gravity carried the water all the way to the Clerkenwell area of London. In 1620 a half mile extension

was dug to supplement the supply by taking water from the nearby River Lea. After 400 years, the man-made New River still takes fresh water to the citizens of London; it is now operated by Thames Water.

Hugh Myddelton died in London in 1631. A memorial stone was erected on an island in the river at Great Amwell and various roads and properties along the route bear his name.

#### **Maces Farms**

October/November has gone in a flash, but we finally got most of our winter crops in the ground by the 18th October. It was the first time in my career that we worked through the night to get the job done ahead of the rain. Beau took the evening/night shift, and I took over from 4am. Not something I liked doing but the ever-changing weather made it very difficult not to.



After having nearly 5 inches of rain (114mm) in October it was remarkable how well we did, not all fellow farmers were quite so lucky, and most crops look well despite what's been thrown at them. Autumn crop spraying is under way, concentrating on health and nutrition preparing them for a potentially long winter.


As you can imagine getting harvest in and putting the new crop in the ground is very costly, so we tend to shift some grain this time of year to ease cashflow. Last month in November we had over 500t of assured wheat go into Weetabix, this always pleases my 8 year old son George, as he polishes off 3 Weetabix every morning!

As sugar beet growers we were lucky enough to get a tour of the British Sugar factory in Bury St Edmunds. We learnt that once the beet is received at the factory it takes less than 12 hours to be turned into granulated sugar or the liquid equivalent. As growers it really makes you understand seeing where your produce goes and eventually back

onto your kitchen table.

For those that don't know, Silver Spoon sugar is made from British sugar beet whereas Tate and Lyle sugar is made abroad from sugar cane and imported in. So, you can support the British sugar industry by buying Silver Spoon. One thing I learnt from the tour that I didn't know, was that Nestlé only use British sugar from UK farmers, a big plus for British farmers!

We have had one of the busiest seasons for


