From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

I am an avid cinemagoer, and love to see a wide spectrum of movies. Quite a few years ago I was working in Glasgow and I went to the cinema once a week, as it filled up one of my evenings. I saw blockbuster movies, independent movies and even a foreign language film which I found myself laughing out loud too. Recently I have seen two films which sit at opposite ends of the spectrum: 'Silence' and 'La La Land'.

'Silence' is about two Jesuits priests travelling to feudal Japan to seek out their mentor who has gone missing. Japan at the time persecuted Christians and in the course of the film the two priests find themselves the target of persecution as well. I didn't find it an easy film to watch, but I found it fascinating. Throughout the film I questioned whether the film-maker was pro-Christianity or against it – for the silence of the silence was the silence of God at certain times. I have to say that at the end I did find it for Christianity but someone else seeing it may take a different view. It was not an uplifting film but after a week's reflection I find that it is an affirming film. Affirming of the Christian faith that is. There is a scene in the film where Japanese Christians receive communion for the first time in ages and they do so with such joy and rejoicing. Sometimes I think we have lost that joy in our own Christian journey.

Well 'La La Land' brought me that joy. Oh, what a completely uplifting and life-affirming movie that is. I would recommend anyone try to get to see it – maybe at Saffron Screen. The music is fantastic and I came straight home to order the soundtrack on CD. Joy and love overflowed from the screen and in my very being. If you're feeling down then go and see it. If you're feeling happy go and see it. I could quite happily see it again and again.

Movies tell us stories, and sometimes the movies can tell us our stories. Sometimes the movies enable us to connect to the story of our own lives. Whether it be something that we find difficult to think about or whether it is something joyous. At the very end of Matthew's gospel before he ascends into heaven Jesus tells the disciples that he will be with them until the end of the age, and I believe that he walks with each one us. He walks with us in our struggles, our sadness and our joy. I pray that he walks with you, and that you walk with him, throughout not just 2017 but in all of the years to come.

A Village Shop

I moved to Quendon five years ago and have gradually got to know good neighbours and friends. As a newcomer I have always been keen to find out more about Rickling and Quendon, along with many of you in our village I am very interested in local history.

I am often struck by being told that there were once a variety of shops in the village, because when I moved here there were none to be seen. The two pubs on the main road (Coach and Horses/Quendon Arms and the King's Head) were already private dwellings, leaving only the Cricketer's at Rickling Green that is probably more of a restaurant now than a traditional pub, although thankfully still popular. Let's hope it will remain as an important part of the future of the village with its idyllic setting overlooking the cricket green (a cricket green that in itself is an important part of the history of the village). I was told by a local resident (who grew up in the village during the 1930's/40's) that most children in the village played cricket on Rickling Green because cricket was a game that many children and villagers watched there on a regular basis.

There is an interesting old photo on the Rickling and Quendon website showing a General Store/Draper's shop with women's gowns in the window. I believe that this group of shops was known at one time as 'Mumford's corner', there being a bakers and general store at the junction between Rickling and Quendon. I read in a village memoir of the late 19th and early 20th century, that the bakery delivered fresh bread and rolls to the village houses, and on one memorable

occasion (Queen Victoria's jubilee) buns were delivered for a children's party in the grounds of Rickling House that was opened up of for children in the village by a retired Admiral who lived there at that time (a tradition to be revived perhaps?). It certainly seems that Mumford's corner was at the heart of the village for a good number of years, within living memory of many in the village who grew up here.

I have also been informed that there were two garages, a café, and more recently an artist's pottery studio in the village. There was also a Post Office and sweet shop that sadly closed down. I'm sure that many villagers will have memories of other shops and businesses previously important to the village that I have not been made aware of.

We all know that at least one village shop, a pub and a school bring life to an area. Thankfully there is still currently a pub and a thriving primary school. We are also fortunate to have two beautiful churches and a very well run village hall (thanks to the dedication and hard work from a small group of village residents, whose tireless work cannot be taken for granted). However the village does not have a shop.

I like to walk whenever I can, and I am often struck by how few people are out and about in the village to just say 'hello' to. We all know that the busy main road through Quendon is a deterrent for pedestrians, the noise and speed of the traffic is not a pleasant experience when walking through the village. The busy road also serves as a deterrent for neighbours to chat together outside. A quick wave is all that can be managed because crossing the road to talk is a dangerous exercise, and neighbourly conversations cannot be carried out above the traffic noise.

However there is another reason why villagers are not seen out and about in the village, there is simply nowhere to walk to. Therefore apart from joggers, country walkers and/or dog owners there is no proper reason to take a daily walk in the village.

A village shop has always provided a reason for people to take a short walk, often daily, within the area that they live, and even more importantly to communicate with their neighbours and fellow villagers on a regular basis. We all know that the decline of small village shops came about because of improvements to transport and the attraction of supermarkets in nearby towns. However many small villages regret not having a focal point, such as a shop, at the heart of the community. In recent years there has been a drive within many of these villages to support an established village shop at threat of closure (usually due to the retirement of the shop owners) because it has been recognized that a village shop is such a loss to the whole community. In Villages such as Rickling and Quendon, where this opportunity has been missed, there are excellent examples of community shops being set up, or investment from interested entrepreneurs to set up a commercially viable village shop.

Following the publication of the Village Plan and the setting up of the Village Plan Action Group, a small number of villagers have been looking at the possibilities of setting up a community/village shop for Quendon and Rickling. Initial research has been carried out to find out what is happening in some other local villages:

An excellent example of a viable, newly set up, village shop is to be found in Great Chesterford. This shop offers villagers an attractive range of local produce, and essentials, whilst also providing a hub for people to meet over tea/coffee and good quality snacks. Due to the quality of produce (and the café aspect) the shop attracts custom from wider afield, including employees from some of the local businesses.

A good example of a community shop is to be found at Debden. This shop is run by volunteers with a manager who oversees the overall organisation. The shop offers day to day essentials, including being a newsagent. It is well frequented by local people.

At Great Easton a local Pub owner has decided to set up a local service for villagers by offering local produce, and depending on demand, will develop this to offer essential food products (from his own perspective this will obviously bring local people into the pub, thereby retaining another vital aspect of the village).

Looking nationally there are many examples of thriving village shops, brought about because there is an obvious need to retain the essence of village life. The Plunkett Foundation that was set up to improve rural lives has been successful in supporting rural communities to set up co-operatives, including village shops (see plunkett.co.uk). Looking at this website shows what could be possible for Quendon and Rickling.

If Quendon & Rickling decide that a village shop would be of benefit there are a number of important aspects (and hurdles) to consider, the main hurdle being the lack of premises. If suitable premises could be identified, then there would be a viable way forward. We have looked a number of possible sites and are talking to the owners. If anyone in the village owns a site that they think would be suitable, please do contact us.

Another aspect which needs careful consideration at this point and will decide on the success or otherwise of the setting up of a shop, is to have volunteers to run and manage it. If you would like to be involved at this very early stage and have experience in such a venture please, again, contact us and we can talk it through.

We will let you know how things develop. The thought of a Community Shop with perhaps a place to stop for a coffee and a chat is very exciting but it will only happen if we, the village, want it...to please get involved!!



The above Editorial is taken from the first edition of Rickling and Quendon Magazine, January 1911.

Some village people are fortunate enough to own some of these bound copies of the first Rickling and Quendon magazine, and they are a source of much interesting material about village life in the early part of this century.

I congratulate those responsible for the "Village Forum" and encourage people to contribute so that current events are recorded and remain for future generations to enjoy.

Maureen Hawkins writing in the Village Forum, Spring 1993

Quendon Church has just received, from Mr and Mrs Forman, a gift of fair linen, beautifully worked with cross and I.H.S. in relief.

Quendon Choir Excursion: The strike of railway servants delayed the annual Choir Outing until Wednesday, August 30, when the members of Quendon Choir with a few other villagers, making a number of 23 in all, journeyed to Yarmouth by the 7.20 train from Newport. The weather was perfect, and the various members of the party sampled most of Yarmouth's attractions. The latter part of the journey home was somewhat protracted, owing to the excursion train having to be shunted into sidings for expresses to pass, but, so far as we could judge, none found the day too long, although home was not reached till 11 p.m. - indeed, we understand that some of the party were quite lively on their return.

Rickling Choir Excursion: This took place on Monday, September 11, when, by way of a change, the members of Rickling Choir, with a few friends, bringing the total to 25, journeyed to Hunstanton. For this also the weather was perfect, and a most enjoyable day was spent. Among various other amusements paddling on the beautiful sandy shore was freely indulged in - in the course of which (we have heard a rumour) one member of the Choir took an involuntary bath with all his clothes on, thus saving 6d., the usual charge for bathing.

Fake Amazon Emails

Action Fraud has received several reports from victims who have been sent convincing looking emails claiming to be from Amazon. The spoofed emails from "service@amazon.co.uk" claim recipients have made an order online and mimic an automatic customer email notification.

The scam email claims recipients have ordered an expensive vintage chandelier. Other reported examples include: Bose stereos, iPhones and luxury watches.

The emails cleverly state that if recipients haven't authorised the transaction they can click on the help centre link to receive a full refund. The link leads to an authentic-looking website, which asks victims to confirm their name, address, and bank card information.

Amazon says that suspicious e-mails will often contain:

Links to websites that look like Amazon.co.uk, but aren't Amazon.co.uk.

Attachments or prompts to install software on your computer.

Typos or grammatical errors.

Forged (or spoofed) e-mail addresses to make it look like the e-mail is coming from Amazon.co.uk.

Amazon will never ask for personal information to be supplied by e-mail.

Essex Community Messaging (ECM) is a messaging system that allows Essex Police, the Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) and Neighbourhood Watch (NHW) to send targeted crime prevention advice and community safety information quickly and efficiently to specific communities. Messages can be sent by email, or received on a Smartphone App, and for matters of emergency via text and voice messages.

ECM can be widely used to assist in the investigation of policing incidents such as critical incidents; searching for highrisk missing people; to advise regarding road closures as a result of road traffic collisions; information regarding stolen vehicles or burglaries in local areas. It can also be used to update people with good news/results and much more.

In addition to 500 Police and staff, 60 Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinators across the county have also been trained to send out local Messages on ECM to their local communities and NHW members.
