From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

If I was the sort of person who has regrets, which I'm not, then one of the regrets that I might have is that I never married. COMMUNITY SKIP

There is little doubt that at various times of the year the Community Skip is of great benefit to those who are unable to take garden and household waste to the Recycling Centres. However, whilst the vast majority of people use this facility with care and consideration, others do not.

On the past few occasions that skips have been delivered to the village they have been filled fairly quickly and, despite notices 'politely' asking people neither to overfill the skip nor to leave items on the ground, these have been ignored, incurring an added cost and great inconvenience in disposing of these items in a legal manner. Another problem has been large quantities of building materials and a considerable amount of electrical waste being left: clearly commercial and not household waste.

The Parish Council has reviewed the situation and considers it necessary to change the arrangements for providing a Community Skip.

- In future, the skip will be available for a shorter period of time and not for a whole weekend as in the past.
- A reminder to residents that primarily, the skip is provided for those with a small amount of waste, but particularly for those people who are unable to get to the Recycling Centre.

If you need to fill your vehicle to get to the skip, then please take your rubbish directly to the Recycling Centres.

Thank you to the majority of the village who are not abusing this facility. To those who are not acting responsibly and expect others to clear up after them, then you are risking the withdrawal of this useful facility to the community.

N.B. At the time of going to print a date for the next Community Skip is not available. It is hoped that one can be arranged for delivery to the Village Hall Car Park during the second week of May. Keep an eye on the Village Notice Boards, the Village Website and Parish Clerk's emails for precise details.

1. Community Policing Team (CPT)

Essex Police has also subscribed to the national 'knowledge bank' Ask The Police, also accessible at www.essex.police.uk/doitonline. Ask The Police contains answers to hundreds of often-asked questions about policing from abandoned vehicles to youth issues. Your burning question may already have an answer waiting for you!

It has been sometime since we sent a news article to The Link and we can only apologise for that – however on a positive note here is our news of late! Hope you all had a fantastic Easter Break!

I cannot believe that it is the Summer Term already. I do not know where the time has gone. It has been a very busy couple of terms with many great events.

The children are working very well in class and enjoying their topics. In the Spring Term the children took part in Science Week, this started with Maple and Beech listening to a talk from Dr Snelling on Forces, which they really enjoyed. Later in the week, they had a visit from a Planetarium - it was a fantastic opportunity for the children to 'look' into space and explore the planets and the stars!

Class News... Talk 4 Writing...

We would like to celebrate what all the classes have been focusing on as a school. We have launched out new Talk 4 Writing initiative. This is an exciting concept for the children where they learn signs and actions for a story through role-play and drama before even putting pen to paper. The children have all been learning the story of 'Peter and the Wolf'. They have drawn story maps, learnt to tell the story orally and written their own versions of the story. It has been fantastic to hear them share their imaginative oral story telling before putting it into writing. Well done children!

Bird Watching

The children celebrated National Bird Watching in support of the RSPBA. The children all went to the woods to carry out a bird survey. It was a lovely opportunity to explore our local environment and see just how many different species of birds live in the local area.

Spring has sprung – what crime does it bring?

Well spring has sprung and the migration into the garden has commenced with all the extra jobs that it brings. Unfortunately with the spring season also comes seasonal crimes too and we need give it a little consideration to prevent it and help others from becoming victims too.

New tools and lawn mowers: be mindful of how you dispose of the packaging to your new purchases; don't advertise it to the thieves and burglars with your empty boxes on display outside for roadside collection. Fold boxes inside out or break them up and put them in bag for collection.

Property marking: it's a good deterrent if your property is visibly security marked with your house number and post code such as www.creproducts.co.uk or labelled if a forensic property marking system is used such as www.smartwater.com or www.selectadna.co.uk. You can also record the serial numbers of any property free of charge at www.immobilise.com. If your property does get stolen with property marking and/or recording on Immobilise there is a greater chance of you getting it back.

Working in the garden: it is easy to get engrossed in what you are doing when working in the garden, if the house is empty it is wise to close and lock the door (don't forget the key though!). Put tools away after use, "it add insult to injury" if your tools are used to break into your house.

Shed security: with sheds coach-bolt and plate the padlock hasp sections to the frame and door, use a good quality "Close Shackle" padlock or a key operated mortice lock; don't forget the hinges ensure they cannot be unscrewed. Protect windows with a wire mesh and fit a curtain or white wash the windows to prevent prying eyes. Products that are fit for purpose can found by looking for the "Secured by Design" or "Sold Secure" logos, or on their websites www.securedbydesign.com or www.soldsecure.com.

New plants: larger plants etc. can be secured to land or rootball anchors or plant through chicken wire covering the area with soil. Cement or bolt down containers to the ground. Your local garden centre or DIY store should be able to help.

Rogue Traders: the rogue trader also takes advantage of the fine weather to con the unsuspecting. Although you may think you would never be taken in by them they can be very convincing especially to the elderly or vulnerable "I am laying some gravel up the road and see you need some....." "I notice your trees or shrubs need a prune..." so many stories. Look after the elderly or vulnerable near you and step in should you need to with a little advice, also another face sometime puts the rogue trader off. Need a trader and have no personal recommendations, look at www.buywithconfidence for traders checked out by Trading Standards.

County Council News

When parents who have this year made applications for their children to start school in reception classes read this article they will already know the outcome and whilst most will be happy and their children will be going to their preferred school (this year more than 87% received their first preference) inevitably some people will be disappointed. Distributing the places when some schools are very popular and hugely oversubscribed is no mean task and this year more than 16,500 children across the county are making their first steps into their school career. Choosing the right school for our children is one of the most important decisions we make on their behalf and for anyone who is dissatisfied with the school they have been offered they do have the opportunity to appeal but I urge them not to despair because, very often, places work through on the second pass when some people do not take the offer that has been made.

Notwithstanding the above, it is evident that we do have a growing population and at Essex County Council we are taking this very seriously. We have a school building programme that is greater than we have seen in very many years and in the 15/16 school year we provided more than 3000 new primary school places across Essex, 900 of which were in Uttlesford and we are doing the same this year with more than 2500 places coming on line in September. We cannot be complacent and we are assured that every child will have a school place.

I am particularly pleased that within the school building programme Essex County Council are making a huge effort to build new special school places across the county. In the past some of our most challenged children have either had to travel a long way to get the specialist education to meet their needs and in some extreme cases have needed to be placed out of the county. We are spending almost £50million pounds over the next few years to ensure that these children get the very best.

On other matters, the repair and maintenance of our highways is always uppermost in most people's minds. This year Essex is changing the emphasis from working on the priority routes and will be focussing its efforts on dealing with local roads and footpaths. To this end the budget for the Local Highway Panels was reduced to ensure that resources were available to carry out the maintenance work. However, I am pleased to say that Uttlesford District Council has agreed to match Essex Funding so we now have the same budget for the LHP as last year.

Everyone asks me when the B1383 by the Old Bell and Pines Hill in Stansted will be repaired and I can confirm that, subject to having no more applications from Utility Companies to dig holes, it is scheduled for this year. I just hope they don't come and dig it up again after it is resurfaced!

Here is the map from the Call for Sites for possible inclusion in the Local Plan. Sites for an approximate total of 96 houses were put forward. However, the initial review by UDC rejected all but sites 2 and 3. Site 2 is the one currently under construction and the other is the Ventor House site, marked as suitable for 12 houses. Although supposedly only for the Local Plan, developers use such UDC assessments in support of planning applications.

At the recent consultation event for this site by Cala Homes criticism of the sewerage infrastructure in the village appeared to be directed at them. In defence of developers (!) the sewerage system is entirely the responsibility of the utility company. The developers just ask to be connected, for which they pay, and may be required to contribute more if the network needs an upgrade. But all upgrade cost at the sewage

works is down to the utility company (mostly Anglian Water for this district) and our experience is that operators have been saying Yes to every new house, despite some of the district's system being identified in a water consultant's report for UDC in 2010 as overloaded (the euphemism is 'at capacity') or at the limits of river discharge consents, or not fit to take major developments. We intend to raise with UDC's new chief executive whether UDC should be asking Anglian Water to explain what they have been doing to deal with the existing issues and the new developments (apart from rebranding their sewage works as Water Recycling Centres).

The Local Highways Panel has just agreed a substantial project involving replacing or altering diversion and warning signs at 17 locations relating to the railway bridge in Newport. It is hit about three times a year and there are many more near misses where trucks have to reverse out causing disruption and damage. As well as blocking the road, the strikes also stop the railway, and one cost 531 minutes of train delay and an £18,000 payment by Network Rail to train operators. The current signage is weak, and some is misleading, and inconsistent around the diversions, so in July 2015 I made an application to Essex Highways for improvements, which was supported by the Newport PC and the County Councillor. The signs will be reworded, changed from advisory triangles to compulsory round signs and the black lorry route symbol will be used. The current diversion signs say Alternative route...to Saffron Walden, when of course the drivers are not going to Walden, so they carry straight on thinking they have made the right decision. The project should be implemented this financial year so let's hope it works!

The Highways Panel also agreed to a feasibility study to address concerns about visibility at the Belchams Lane junction with the main road.

If you would like to raise council matters with us directly we attend the PC meetings in the Village Hall, on a rota basis so one of us is always there.

The Hundred Parishes Society

The first Hundred Parishes Society talk this year will be on Monday, May 9th at 7:30pm in Stansted Mountfitchet's Crafton Green Community Centre, when geologist Gerald Lucy will talk about "The Hundred Parishes - the last Hundred Million Years". Non-members of the Society will be most welcome. A £5 entry fee will also cover tea/coffee and biscuits.

The underlying geology of an area gives the backbone to its landscape and the soils influence what grows here. The local calcareous soils suit Ash trees which are a major component of our woods, coppices, hedges and waysides. Ash produces a useful wood which burns readily and makes excellent handles for tools. It is a host to a number of creatures, some of which are specific to this tree species.

Sadly, Ash trees are under attack from a virulent disease called Ash Dieback. This was first noted in the UK on imported trees and is now widespread. The disease is caused by a fungus which spreads throughout the tissues of the tree interfering with the transport of water, causing stress and death. Its symptoms are more readily observed in younger trees as the foliage withers and turns black as it dies; beneath the bark the infected tissue is black. In mature trees the annual growth rate is minimal as the trees struggle to combat the damaging effect of the fungus. At the moment, all we can do is wait as we do not know how quickly these trees may die, but the potential loss of so many Ash trees will have a major impact on the appearance of our landscape.


