Quickling Festival Saturday 10th August

The first annual Quickling Festival, run by Quendon and Rickling Parish Council to raise funds for the Quendon and Rickling Community Football Pitch, took place towards the end of summer and was a great success by all accounts with some 300 people attending from the village and further afield. After some extensive last minute changes of plan the festival went ahead in spite of the 50mph winds predicted on the day, raising a total of £857.

The day was centred around Winstanley's Dragon Treasure Quest, which explored the history, notable residents and landmarks of Quendon and Rickling; villagers were invited to enter "treasures" to be found along the walking route and 24 were received, including

There were food and drink offerings from parked-up converted horseboxes, camper-vans and tuktuks with options of gourmet waffles, jacket potatoes and cocktails, and The Cricketer's Arms, who'd only one week prior reopened, put on a BBQ. We also had seasonal plants and a bake sale with jam and pickle swap in the cricket pavilion.

The organisers of the day would like to sincerely thank our many generous sponsors of the day, everyone who took part - be it the army of helpers who volunteered their time, the makers and bakers and those who joined in by entering treasures and art work, as well as the judge of our competition, all of whom contributed to the success of the day.

The funds raised have been used to purchase muchneed equipment for the football pitch (including a line marking machine and paint), which is already being rented out to local teams - villagers are welcome and encouraged to use the pitch for family kickabouts, etc.

Quendon & Rickling Parish Council News

Normal service resumes

Seems like a long time since last submitting an entry for The Link. There was no $\neg he Link$ in August and due to the September parish meeting being put back a week, the meeting took place after the copy deadline for September.

What's been happening. Well there was Summer (allegedly) plus the very successful Quickling Festival. More recently the Apple Pressing Day. And of course The Cricketers Arms re-opened. Parish councillors have been allowed to take holidays. All in all not really a great deal.

Speeding

Always a sensitive issue. The Speedwatch team still require further volunteers. Our County Councillor Ray Gooding will try to arrange a speed survey for the village.

Broadband

Here there is some progress. Some parts of the village now actually have fast broadband. There's a sentence I never thought I would be writing. The service will roll out to other parts of the village in due course. I am told that 50% of residents who have "pots" installed can expect to receive the upgrade. (I have no idea what these "pots" are – but if you have one then I guess you do).

Other news from the Parish Council meeting

The Parish Council has been looking into the possibility of providing a pedestrian crossing at Waterbutt Row but as you will see from the minutes of the September meeting, just a survey to investigate the logistics is likely to cost £10,000. So don't watch this space. There is also talk of a bus stop at the village boundary, opposite Boundary Cottage. No further information at the time of writing.

The skip will be returning to the village, it is hoped some time in November. The actual date will be announced shortly. The grit bins have been renovated (with thanks to gritty Ted Crow).

It is apparently deer rutting season (and you thought that only happened in Scottish wildlife programmes), and there is a danger to motorists from deer dashing out into the road. The parish council is endeavouring to get some signs erected to warn motorists.

The football pitch goes from strength to strength. It was

fully used in September and into October. And Ted has had an enquiry from another team.

You may have noticed that some of the horse chestnut trees outside Rickling House are in a bit of a sorry state. An inspection has confirmed that canker is in evidence, together with that leaf virus which is affecting so many of the horse chestnut trees in England. An aboriculturist has made a report and recommends that, in the long term, the trees will need to be replaced. But not with horse chestnut trees. Which seems sensible.

Dear Fellow Villagers!!

Autumn is here, the pub is open, village events have been taking place, the football pitch is back in business and Gigaclear has arrived!!!!

The Cricketers has been open for three months now and I'm hoping that you have all been in for a tipple of whatever takes your fancy! The food is delicious and well worth sampling. They have started up a Midweek Set Lunch Menu and a Wednesday Supper Club and are now doing takeaway burgers on Thursdays and takeaway Fish and Chips on Fridays. They are currently serving Full English breakfast whilst the Rugby World Cup matches are on and I am hoping that I will be there on Saturday, 2 November watching England regain the cup!!

Carrie and Katherine have been very busy organising Quickling Festival and along with Tom Duncan, Autumn Daze, both very successful - please see separate articles on these. There are more events planned so keep an eye out and hopefully there will be something for everyone in the villages.

Ted Crow has also been very busy preparing the pitches for the arrival of the senior and junior teams and it is lovely to hear the jubilant cheers coming over the hedges again! Unfortunately, there is a downside to this as various empty packages of illegal substances have been found around the changing rooms and cars have been spotted "hanging" around the various parking areas in the villages. The police have been informed and have begun patrols of the village. There have also been "deposits" found on the actual pitch so PLEASE could people pick up their dogs poo as it would be particularly unpleasant to kick one of these piles whilst playing!!! Was that a Bus?

How to find out about transport options in our area

There's no doubt that living in this part of the UK has many advantages. We are surrounded by beautiful countryside and picturesque villages, have London within easy reach, Cambridge on our doorstep, and all number of stately homes and interesting places to visit.

However, life being what it is, rural living comes with its own set of issues. One of which is transport. Cuts to local services mean buses are few and far between. So for most of us a car is essential - whether to get to the station for the daily commute, to medical appointments or the nearest town. But what happens when driving is no longer an option?

Fortunately, there are alternatives, though tracking them down can be time-consuming and frustrating. And what's available largely depends on where you live.

For the over 60's who find public transport too difficult, Uttlesford Community Travel can be a godsend as can the Social Car Schemes which some villages offer to ferry residents to medical appointments. While for those who have been assessed as in medical need there's the non emergency transport service for hospital appointments.

For a comprehensive over-view of all local transport options Uttlesford Frontline offers a free fact sheet "Getting Places" - via www. uttlesfordfrontline.org.uk.

This includes: Social car schemes; bus travel - with access to route planning and timetables; DaRT (on demand) services - villages covered and booking details plus how to check whether a particular bus is accessible for anyone with mobility problems; rail travel and how to gain assistance by Greater Anglia, as well as at Stansted Airport. Details about concessionary bus passes, the Blue Badge Scheme and help available to pay travel costs for medical appointments are included together with full contact details, links and telephone numbers.

www.uttlesfordfrontline.org.uk is an initiative of Uttlesford Citizens Advice enabling one-stop access to more than 170 organisations locally who can provide help, support and information - with full contact details. Also available as an app for mobile devices.

Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves

Neighbourhood Plan

At the time of writing (18th October) the 'Regulation 16' consultation is about to end and the examination begin. The Plan policies have already passed their first big test in relation to the large Countryside Properties application for 150 houses on a site going out to the west of Newport. This was not a site supported by the Plan and contrary to a number of Plan policies. That was strongly refused at appeal by the Inspector. Earlier this month another application appeal inquiry finished, this time for 74 houses on the other side of the same road – Wicken Road. Similar Plan policies apply and we are hoping that the Inspector will also reject it, despite the District only having a 3 year housing supply when we are required to have 5 years' worth of sites allocated. If it is rejected the Inspector's report will add significant weight to our Plan.

The next test is then immediately upon us with on 22nd October yet another appeal, this time by developer Hill

for 24 houses hemming in the cricket ground at the Joyce Frankland Academy. One of the problems is that the drainage plan is to put a new flood sewer directly into the worst flood zone in the village. It would empty into Wicken Water directly onto the house in the photo:



Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves (cont.)

The photo is 7th February 2014. One of the Plan policies is to ensure some weight is given to locally provided evidence of flood risk. This resulted from our experience at an earlier appeal for 95 houses at the south side of Newport. These were permitted but have not yet been built. Flooding was also an issue but at the appeal our local evidence on flood matters got swept away by the appellant's barrister on the grounds that we were not Flood Engineers. Common sense was ignored and two years on there is still no agreed drainage plan and the site has gone to seed with only archaeological trenching done. Quite a few of the Plan policies are to deal with planning issues we have witnessed not being well handled.

The Parish Council and concerned residents are however suffering fatigue from constant appeals and all the preparation work. The Parish Council has spent over £100,000 on fighting these appeals. I know these are not of immediate relevance to Quendon & Rickling but I thought you may nevertheless be interested to know what is happening nearby

Foxley 2

The Parish Council and myself have been in discussion with the developer and Essex Highways and the UDC case officer. The application is for 9 three- and fourbedroom houses filling in the space to the south of Hallfield. We have been trying to negotiate the best deal for the village, including funding of a road safety and parking review as requested in the Neighbourhood Plan. Matters are still fluid so there is not much to say at this point.

Implementing manifesto promises

In the last report I covered the improvements to the procedures at the Planning Committee to give residents and parish councils more involvement.

We have now moved on to the commercial investment process, necessary to fill the increasing gap in the Council's finances resulting from cuts in government

funding. This is, or was, not a normal part of a local council's activities. Very considerable sums are involved. Processes to assess potential opportunities in an independent way didn't form part of the existing structures. To resolve this, earlier this month the Council approved the setting up of an Investment Board. It consists of a mix of councillors from all the political parties at UDC plus two external members who will be recruited by advertising for the positions. I am on the Board. It will be advised by senior UDC finance officers and will review potential investments in detail against a set of criteria including level of risk, level of return, location, and type and quality of asset. The Board will make recommendations to the Cabinet, and full Council gets final say on releasing funds.

The Green Party

Most people will have seen in the papers that Anthony Gerard, and two other councillors have left R4U and joined the Green Party. There was a joint press release from the two parties. Anthony is therefore no longer a Cabinet member but remains a District Councillor. Seats on committees such as Planning or the Audit committee are allocated according to the number of seats each party holds. As a party of three the Greens will be able to secure some seats, but for example their membership of Planning, currently two, will fall to one.

Councillors Surgeries

We are available every Thursday morning from 10.30 to 11.30 in Dorrington's in Newport and we take turns to attend the Parish Council meetings in the Village Hall. We are also active on the village Facebook group.

Keeping your vehicle safe at home

Your garage is the most secure place to keep your vehicle, so if you have it, use it. Make sure your garage is secure by fitting extra garage locks such as up and over or rolling deadlocking door handles. Consider extending your home alarm system to cover your garage or if you do not have one you can purchase a separate garage alarm.

Add extra security to your vehicle by fitting a Sold Secure steering wheel, gear lever or clutch pedal. This will add to the existing security already on your vehicle and could also put off a potential thieves.

Keep vehicle doors locked and windows shut. It may sound obvious but unlocked doors and open windows are invitations to thieves so make sure your vehicle is secure even if you are only popping into a shop, paying for petrol or getting car park ticket.

If your vehicle has remote locking, please check that the doors have locked before you leave it. Thieves in the area may use a device to block the remote locking signal so check your vehicle is locked by pulling the door handle before leaving it.

Place car keys somewhere safe, out of sight and away from the front door to avoid "fishing" through the letterbox. Put them in a drawer (preferably one that is noisy to open) or some other secure place, but to avoid any confrontation, don't take the keys to the bedroom with you.

Car thieves are identifying vehicles that do not use a traditional key (keyless vehicles), by creating a signal that tricks the car into thinking the key is nearby, allowing Paul Harris, Essex Police Staff No 42077939 them to drive off with no interference. To stop this from

happening, make sure your front door is double locked and place your keys (including the spare) in a Faraday Bag. This will act as a blocker to the signal, meaning the thieves are unable to trick your vehicle.

Don't leave anything on display: Thefts from vehicles greatly outnumber thefts of vehicles so never leave your property on display on the dashboard or front or back seats. Removing valuables like dash cams, sat navs, mobile phones and laptops helps remove temptation.

Don't forget to wipe away the marks left by the suction pad on your dash cam, sat nav or phone holder as they may lead thieves to believe it's in your car somewhere. Keep an eye out for devices on the market that can hold devices in place without using sucker pads. Consider leaving a card in your car. "All valuables removed from this vehicle"

If you are unable to remove your property from the vehicle, lock it out of sight in the boot or a vehicle safe.

Look at past crime stats for your area and the types of vehicles targeted, then consider other crime prevention measures such as tracking devices for high value and frequently stolen car types, and anti-theft devices for catalytic convertors on some makes and models and of course as anti-tamper screws to secure your vehicle's number plates. Whilst a new set of plates won't cost the earth, think of all the hassle you may get such as trying to quash parking fines for infractions you haven't committed.

Neighbourhood Watch Advice

Phone Scams that try to trick people via a phone call are on the rise, and are often targeted at older people. Here are a few general tips to protect yourself:

<u>Do</u>

- hang up on cold callers and ignore cold texts
- sign up with the Telephone Preference Service to opt out of receiving unwanted sales and marketing calls (0345 070 0707, tpsonline.org.uk)
- contact your phone provider to see if they have the option to block unwanted calls or texts
- remember, if you have a smartphone, it acts like a mini computer, so keep its operating system up-todate and install antivirus software. Only download apps from official app stores, as apps can infect your phone with viruses. As with emails, don't click on links in unsolicited text messages.

<u>Don't</u>

- ever give out bank details such as your PIN or online banking login details, including by keying your PIN into the phone
- assume a call is safe just because the number matches the number on your bank card or statement. Callers can modify the caller ID so that your phone displays a fake number
- · make a decision about an investment based on what

someone has told you over the phone. Always seek independent financial advice

- ring a number the caller gives you to check the legitimacy of a call. Use a source you trust to find the number – for example, the company's website or the phone book.
- Agree to a visit from the caller or his/her company without making checks first that they are genuine.

It's important to report scams to make sure the police are aware of what has happened and can try to stop the scammers acting again.

If you've been the victim of a scam – i.e. if you've lost money or exposed your personal details – contact Action Fraud, the national fraud and cyber crime reporting centre (0300 123 2040, www.actionfraud.police.uk/ report_fraud).

To report a scam email that you were targeted by but didn't fall victim to, use their separate reporting tool (www.actionfraud.police.uk/scam-emails).

If a crime is in progress and you need immediate assistance, call the police on **999**.

Twelve Christmas Tips from Stephen Armson-Smith, Braintree & Uttlesford Crime Prevention Officer - 090819

- 1. If you must store Christmas food and drink, presents and other goodies within garages and outbuildings, ensure that they are out of sight and that it's securely locked with good quality well fitted locks. Treat your shed to a shed alarm.
- 2. Avoid tempting window shopping burglars; don't leave presents and valuables on full view in front of a window.
- 3. Ensure that your windows and doors are closed and locked before leaving the house. Don't attract burglars to your home by leaving it in darkness; leave lights on timers, perhaps treat yourself to a TV simulator too.
- 4. Lock gates to keep unwanted visitors from getting to the rear of your home.
- 5. Whether an evening out or Christmas shopping keep your bags, handbags, wallets and mobile safe. Busy places make it easier for the sneak thief, so be alert at all times.
- 6. Park safely; look for a Parkmark accredited car park www.parkmark.co.uk/car-park-finder. Check that your car is locked before you leave it and don't leave valuables and gifts on display in your car.
- 7. When you go to leave the house and find that your car is all iced up, don't leave it unattended with the engine running to de-ice it. It only takes a second to steal your car and it would invalidate any insurance claim.
- 8. Attending a Christmas party make sure that you have considered how you are getting home in advance and avoid using unlicensed taxis. Ensure you drink responsibly and are aware of your surroundings, whilst keeping your drink and belongings safe. www.suzylamplugh.org/Pages/FAQs/Category/personal-safety
- 9. Watch what you put on social media; check your settings to ensure that you are not broadcasting when you are not at home and the lovely gifts you have received.
- 10. After Christmas don't advertise your nice gifts to the thieves by putting the empty boxes out for collection; disguise them, fold them up inside out or put them inside other non-descript box.
- 11. Record your new property free on www.immobilise.com, install tracking and security apps on relevant electrical and computer products.

Recently a fraud device was found attached to a Lloyds bank ATM in Saffron Walden and caused £1,500 of damage. It is not yet known if any fraudulent withdrawals were successful.

If possible use internal ATMs as they are less likely to have been tampered with. If you can't, pay extra attention to the visible part of the machine: does part of the fascia look new but other parts older? Does the section where you place your card in look as if it is a separate piece? Does it move or feel less solid if you try to give it a little wiggle? If it feels flimsy or does not look right, or work in the normal way then don't use it and don't enter your PIN code but cancel the transaction. Let the ATM owner know of your concerns as soon as possible.

This year our farmers celebrated the season of mellow fruitfulness with good crops of wheat while the hedgerows have been well-stocked with crab apples, sloes, rose hips and hawthorn berries. Folklore hints that masses of fruits foretell a harsh winter to come; in reality the favourable conditions last spring enabled the flower buds formed the previous summer to blossom.

Each year has its own unique pattern of weather with records of notable events. The spire of Finchingfield Church blew down during the great storm of February 1661. The inhabitants of Finchingfield suffered again as 16 barns were destroyed in the great storm of November 1703. The freezing conditions of the very cold winter of 1895 allowed the people of Saffron Walden to enjoy tobogganing by moonlight, while folk in Dunmow held an ice carnival. There are many accounts of hot summers when wells ran dry or hail ruined crops.

Those who study long-term trends are concerned about the warming of the atmosphere, hotter summers and an increase in the frequency of storms which can cause serious flooding, damage to trees and property and loss of power.

In May the UK Government declared a Climate Emergency with ambitious plans to plant 50 million trees per year across the country to help soak up carbon. Current tree cover in the Hundred Parishes is about 6% and any new trees will bring significant visual changes to its landscape. Trees produce timber, habitats for wildlife and reduce flooding risk. Groups of trees can modify the local climate by providing shade, cooling the air and making urban areas more attractive.

To ensure that this project is successful, consideration must be given to the location of plantings and the most appropriate species, with maintenance plans so that these new trees thrive.
