From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

In the United States we recently heard of two mass shootings. One of these was in El Paso, Texas and the other was in Dayton, Ohio. Someone spoke to me about a headline that they saw on the BBC which stated, "I forgive El Paso gunman for killing my son." They wondered a) how somebody can forgive when there seems to be no expression of remorse from the assailant and b) what is value of forgiveness where there is no apology? Forgiveness is one of the central teachings of the Christian church so how does it all fit together?

I do not know about the parent who spoke after the El Paso shootings, but I have in the past spoken of the parents of Jimmy Mizen. He was a young lad who was killed aged 16 back in 2008. His parents are Christian and they too spoke of the need to forgive the man who killed Jimmy, even though it is unlikely they will ever meet him to discuss it. In 2018 they held a service in Southwark Cathedral to mark the 10th anniversary of Jimmy's death, in which they repeated the need to forgive. His mum said this, "I feel it was absolutely right in my heart to forgive him because by forgiving him I'm able to do all the things I want to do, it allows me to look out the window and see the sun shining and the flowers blossoming. If I didn't it would fill me with so much hate that I wouldn't be able to do these thing."

There are two types of forgiveness: where we forgive others who have wronged us, and where we forgive ourselves for things that we have done wrong. I believe that Jesus died on the cross so that all sins could be forgiven. Personally I do not believe in unforgivable sin as it would diminish Jesus's death. When something is done against us, as in the case of Jimmy Mizen or the son killed in El Paso, we can be left with anger, with hatred or with bitterness. When we do something wrong ourselves we may be left with guilt or shame. These are all negative emotions and I do not believe that they do us any good whatsoever. We can have righteous anger where we are angry about certain things such as sex trafficking, etc., which will motivate us to work against such things, but anger at something done to us personally is different. It is worse.

Jesus said, "I have come that they may have life and life in all its fullness". (John 10) I believe that a full life is not one that can be achieved through anger, hatred, guilt, shame, etc. Being able to forgive, which Jesus's death makes possible, brings us healing and release from the negative emotions that can take over if we are not careful. Jimmy Mizen's mum said that she can enjoy looking out of the window to see the sun shining and the flowers blossom, which she believes she would not be able to do if she hadn't forgiven her son's killer.

We forgive to free ourselves from the hatred. We forgive to free ourselves from the guilt. We forgive to free ourselves from the shame. We forgive so that we can go on to live a full life in Jesus as he would want us to.

Hundred Parishes has a church of great antiquity.

Each one is different. The most notable external feature

is often the tower, erected originally to house a bell or set

Walden (193 feet) and Thaxted (181 feet).

A few churches have a bellcote, where one or two bells

hang in a small frame above one end of the roof. Several of these were erected to replace a collapsed bell tower. Wimbish seems to be our only parish church with no tower, spire or bellcote, following the demolition of its tower in 1883.

А few churches have unusual towers or spires including Little Dunmow's separate thin turret, Wareside's octagonal bell tower and High Wych's thin circular spire. The spires of two churches in adjacent

each have a 'sanctus' bell, high up on the outside of the spire - an uncommon design feature.

Some parishes have more than one sign: for example, Much Hadham has its own plus others in the hamlets of Perry Green and Green Tye. Some signs, such as Finchingfield, have different images on front and back. Most are at the entrance to the village or in a

prominent place, whilst a few are somewhat off the beaten track, for example in Broxted and Thaxted.

I would be interested to hear of any signs older than those in Stansted Mountfitchet or



newer than the one erected in Albury in May 2019. I would also like to hear if any have been listed.

styles are often referred to as 'Hertfordshire spikes' although they are not confined to The tallest local steeples are at Saffron Hertfordshire.



Tillage Signs. The tradition of village signs is believed to have started around 100 years ago on the Sandringham Estate in Norfolk. The idea has spread and is particularly popular in the Hundred Parishes. Around two-thirds of the parishes have a welcoming sign that usually tells us something about the place and its history.

The installation of a village sign has often been prompted by a significant event or anniversary. The Queen's Silver Jubilee inspired the erection of Stansted Mountfitchet's knight signs at either end of the village in 1977. The arrival of the new millennium (was it really 20 years ago?) saw a rush of signs, followed by the Queen's Golden Jubilee in 2002. The 800th anniversary of Magna

Carta inspired the installation in Little Dunmow in 2015.



Signs are generally made from wood or steel and their designs often show great imagination and artistic skill to depict aspects of life or history that are important to that parish. Several include a plane, recognising the part played by their local airfield in the





Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

Neighbourhood Plan

The headline news is that the Neighbourhood Plan has moved on to the next stage, which is the 'regulation 16' consultation. This runs from 17th September to 29th October and this time it is run by UDC not by the Steering Group. We have selected an examiner, who will be appointed by UDC and he will receive the consultation responses. Moving to this stage means that a number of legal compliance matters have been satisfied to the satisfaction of UDC and statutory consultees. There was some delay while English Nature wanted the Plan to include detail of how it would remediate the impact of the 'Foxley 2' site on Hatfield Forest! Fortunately, UDC dealt with this one.

The examination process will start after the 29th October and how long it will take is not in our control. If say it is two months then we may have the Plan at referendum in January

The Plan and supporting evidence are on the UDC website at https://www.uttlesford.gov.uk/nqrnp (information at time of going to press).

Implementing manifesto promises

Some changes have been made to the procedures at the Planning Committee to give residents and parish councils more involvement. These include allowing:

- one parish council member to speak for 5 minutes, previously three minutes
- other speakers for 4 minutes, also previously it was three minutes
- up to two parish council representatives to be allowed to attend committee site visits



And for some refused applications agreement of the full refusal reasons is now being deferred to the following meeting. Previously it was done on the spot, which meant that the officer who had just put an application forward for approval had to immediately codify refusal reasons. Having robust and comprehensive reasons is important should applicants take refusals to appeal. It may also dissuade them.

A recent example is of developer Cala in Newport. They have been required to reduce a 10-foot-high bund in front of houses on the new Wicken Lea development back to the height they originally got permission for. This was the outcome of combined action by local residents, parish and district councillors, the new Planning Committee and the UDC Enforcement team.

Cala presented no valid reason for raising the bund but carried on despite knowing they had no permission and they ignored a warning from UDC. They applied for retrospective permission and the committee refused it unanimously. Raising the bund was pretty clearly to avoid the expense of shifting the spoil which they had excavated to build a large flood attenuation pond. It is understood that they considered appealing but, possibly for fear of bad publicity, issued a graceless acknowledgment that they would comply, which they have done. The photos show the removal team at work.



At the committee meeting at which permission was refused, both myself and parish councillor Judy Emanuel were brought into discussion with the officers and the chair and it was agreed that we would draft the reasons for the officer to consider. This was at the first meeting under R4U and I felt that the committee was for the first time functioning as an inclusive body. The refusal and prompt enforcement action by UDC is good news for all as it has put down a marker that the new regime will be rigorous in its dealings with developers. The word will get around and let's hope this creates a virtuous circle where applicants stop trying it on. Thus, saving work for all.

Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves (*Cont.***)**

UDC finances

While work continues on the big items such as the airport application and the Local Plan, we are also putting together a revised process for new council commercial investments. These are needed because the government has slashed council income from central government and also prevents us raising council tax, currently about £5m pa, by more than £5 a year on band D, which would bring in very little extra cash. One of the council's largest income sources used to be the rate support grant. This was dropped and replaced by the New Homes Bonus (NHB), which was £8,000 per completed house and intended as a bribe to encourage house building. It was worth about £4m a year to UDC. The previous administration, flush with cash from all new the housing, then did not take the opportunity to raise council tax and even reduced it. The government then withdrew the NHB with no replacement. (It was somewhat odd as houses are mostly built by developers not councils.) The government did make a grand announcement at a party conference that councils would receive 100% of business rates. This has also been reneged on. Although the starting point is a business rates share of 40% to UDC,

which would be about £17m, UDC only receives just over £2m after government deductions. The result of these funding cuts is that the council will have an annual deficit of about £3m pa. In order to fill this gap the council will be doing more commercial investments. Some of these may be within Chesterford Research Park (we have already bought the land so the return would be higher than our current investment there) and some elsewhere in the district, surrounding counties or other locations in the UK.

We are available every Thursday morning from 10.30 to 11.30 in Dorrington's in Newport and we take turns to attend the parish council meetings in the Village Hall. We are also active on the village Facebook group.

<u>Heating Oil</u>

Before it gets to autumn you may be thinking about topping up your heating oil tank for winter; with the value of fuel it is worth considering its security.

In the more isolated parts of the countryside it is primarily domestic properties that have been targeted by the heating oil thieves, but we have also seen such thefts at farms and other businesses.

There are a number of security devices available that will help protect your fuel supplies - details of which can be found via your fuel supplier or local plumber's merchant. One such system is Tank Commander from http:// www.scrabosecurity.com/ which has "Secured by Design" accreditation. Others can be found by searching the member companies at www.securedbydesign.com. These products will detect a dramatic drop in fuel and call you on the telephone. There are also other systems that will add on to an existing intruder alarm system, whilst others protect the filler cap and there are of course the conventional locks.

Another consideration would be defensive planting, gates or fencing around the tank concealing and restricting access it, where possible locate the tank under lighting in view of lived in rooms within the house.

Naturally we also ask locals to report any unusual activity to police *in an emergency* on **999** or *after the event* on **101** or to Crimestoppers anonymously on **0800 555 111**.

RHS Hyde Hall Summer Flower Show 2019

As part of partnership working between Essex Police, the RHS, and Secured by Design we were privileged to have had a show garden designed and built for us at the RHS Hyde Hall Summer Flower Show. We added security measures to the shed and garden whilst the RHS included nature's own security in the form of defensive planting. Defensive planting being that of a spiky and or dense nature that will deter intruders. The show attracted a record 33,000 visitors and I think most of them came through the show garden and spoke to us. A big thank you to all of you that dropped by for a chat, some very interesting conversations and I learnt from one that defensive planting goes back to Anglo Saxon times with farmers defending their crops.

It is proving to be a most rewarding partnership for all with each of us gaining from each other's expertise enabling us to provide a better standard of advice to yourselves, as can be seen in the new RHS Hyde Hall's garden security leaflet, which also lists some defensive plants and where to find mature examples of them at Hyde Hall. <u>Autumn and winter nights – create the illusion of</u> <u>occupancy</u>

Upon walking down the road and with the darker nights now it is easy to spot that empty house; there is a line of houses, lights within and signs of occupancy. In the middle of these houses is a similar house but this one is in darkness with no signs of occupancy; easy to spot the empty house and chances are the burglar will too. At this time of year an increased number of house burglaries occur between dusk and when you get home. You don't have to be a magician to create the illusion of occupancy and it may help protect your house.

Become an illusionist and make your home appear occupied even when you are out. Simple things like lights on timers in rooms that you would normally occupy whilst in and a TV simulator for the evenings, you can now even get a timer that fits over your light switches (search on the internet for light switch timer) and door bells you can monitor and answer remotely via your mobile phone. During the day leave a radio on, boots outside the back door, vacuum cleaner out with the lead going out of sight (not plugged in though), newspaper over the arm of the chair with a drink on the table and a pair of spectacles, the list goes on. Don't leave garden tools out in the garden though or you may find the burglar uses them. Lock tools securely away in a secure shed or garage; use a shed alarm these can also be remotely monitored too.

Personal Safety

The most important thing to remember in personal safety is to be aware of your surroundings, "keep your wits about you" and plan your journey, have a plan in mind should things go wrong. You are very unlikely to become a victim of crime and these tips are intended to help safe guard you.

<u>Mobile phones and personal music players</u>. Before you answer a text or a call check it is safe to do so, they can take your attention away from your surroundings and reduce one of your important senses —your hearing. Remember your illuminated screen lights up your face, reduces your vision around you at night and shows someone your desirable mobile phone.

Trust your instincts. Our instincts have developed over

years, if something does not feel right or feel safe go with the feelings, avoid the location. Try to use well lit, busy streets and use the route you know best. Walk facing the traffic so you can see cars that approach you and the people within. If you feel threatened raise the alarm, head for a crowded place, make a noise, knock on a door! When it's safe to do so dial **999**; it's an emergency after all.

<u>Plan.</u> Have plan in your mind, if......happens I will do what? Plan your journey give yourself time so that you don't need to take the short cut you would not normally use, let someone know where you are going and what time you are likely to be back, know the times of buses and trains, take the number of a reliable taxi company with you. Make sure your mobile phone is fully charged and you have sufficient cash for your journey. Clothing hoodies reduce your peripheral vision; wear something you can move easily in.

<u>Personal safety alarm.</u> Consider carrying a personal safety alarm, or with the modern "smart phones" there are also app's such www.panicguard.com; if you have it don't hesitate to use it if you feel the need.

<u>In a car.</u> Always use good well lit car parks such as a "Parkmark" approved car park www.parkmark.co.uk. Again look around, if you feel unsafe, lock yourself in sound the horn. And use your mobile phone; drive to a crowded place.

CRIME PREVENTION

There have been a number of thefts of cabling including telecoms cabling from under street conduits. Copper is worth money, which means cable theft is a constant threat. And when cable gets stolen, it can cause problems with phone, broadband and TV services.

Thieves are lifting covers and using vehicles to drag the cables out of the ground. If you see "work" being carried out by unmarked or inappropriate vehicles during the evening or night and believe that a theft may be in progress call **999**. No one will mind a call made in good faith.

As well as using anti-theft technology to help track stolen cable and help convict criminals, since 2011 BT has teamed up with the charity Crimestoppers, and offers a cash reward of up to £1,000 for any information that leads to a prosecution. Crimestoppers doesn't take people's names or personal details, and the information it gathers can't be traced or recorded.

How to contact Crimestoppers

If you think you can help us in the fight against metal theft, please contact Crimestoppers anonymously on **0800 555 111** - or you can go to their website.

BT are also working with other organisations like the National Crime Agency, British Transport Police and Network Rail, to tackle the problem together.

Can you spot the signs of organised crime involving drugs i.e. "County Lines"?

- An increase in visitors and cars to a house or flat
- New and regularly changing residents (e.g. different accents to local accents)
- Substance misuse and or drug paraphernalia
- Unexplained, sometimes unaffordable new things (e.g. clothes, jewellery, cars etc)
- · Residents or young people you know going missing, may be for long periods of time
- · Young people seen in different cars/taxis driven by unknown adults
- · Young people seeming unfamiliar with your community or where they are

Trust your instincts. It's always worth speaking out.

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Consumer Guidance for Smart Devices in the Home

Smart or internet-connected devices, such as smart TVs, music speakers, connected toys or smart kitchen appliances can bring great benefits to your daily life. However, without taking steps to secure all of your internet-connected products, you and your data could be at risk from someone getting unauthorised access to your device or account. Developed by the UK government and industry experts, this guidance will help you manage the security of your devices and help protect your privacy.





- Hand and follow the set-op instructions for the device. These are aften found in an app downloaded onto your smartphone, tablet or from a paper manual and guide that comes with the product.
- Check device instructions to see if you need to create an account on the manufacturer's website, or download any other recommended apps.
- If yoe are prompted to enter a password during the set-up protest that is easy to guess, (rach as 'admin' or '00000'), you should change it. Guidance on onating a strong password can be found on the Cyber Aware website.



MANAGING YOUR ACCOUNT

- manufacturer's website. This account may allow you to add a new device or link your smartphone to your devices. You should ensure that your account has a strong pasaword. • For added security, if the device or app offers Two
- Factor Authentication which provides a second layer of security, (such as a text message to your phone) you should enable it. This is particularly important if the account contains your personal data or sensitive information or is locked to some thing that may impact your or another persons physical safety.
- Some products allow you to accessor control them when you are away from your home's Wi-Fi network; such as, to view security camera footage. Consider whether you need to make use of this feature, as products may allow you to disable it either in the app settings or within your account.

KEEP UPDATING YOUR SOFTWARE AND APPS

Much like your laptop and smartphone, software and app updates help keep your devices secone. You should:

- Check whether you can set-up and enable automatic updates (on the app eron your online account).
- Install the latest soft ware and app updates. These updates should download and install automatically on your device. If not, then you should install them straight away so you have the latest security protections. You should be prompted when a new update is ready to install, usually via a pop-up message or in the settings menu in the app or device menu.

IF YOU BECOME AWARE OF AN INCIDENT AND THINK IT AFFECTS YOUR DEVICE

- Visit the manufacturer's website to see if there is information evaluate on what you should do next.
- Check the National Cyber Security Centre and the information Commissioner's Office websites to see any published guidance.
