From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

Last autumn I was on a period of Extended Study Leave from the parish. I wrote some reflections on the Christian Photographic Retreat that I went on in the December $\exists he \ Link$ magazine. The bulk of the time would have been spent on my study area concerning faith and the transgender community. I had set myself a question as to what impact someone's Christian identity has upon their gender identity, and upon the decision to transition or not. What I learned was that my question was wrong.

Within my study I read two Grove booklets on transgender issues, and I read a book on men's identity by Grayson Perry. I also read a book about, and written by, transgender Christians and I read a book about transgender issues from a conservation Christian perspective. Prior to my study I had already met a trans-woman priest in London a couple of times, and once again during my study. At the same time I joined the Open Table worship service in Cambridge for members of the LGBTQ+ community. During my study I worshipped at Open Table in Liverpool a couple of times, and I was fortunate enough to meet and talk with four transgender Christians, one of whom was also a priest.

What struck me first of all was the welcome that I received from every person I met, and how open and honest they were with me about their life experiences. The irony of this welcome did not escape me and many had not been welcomed by parts of society including the church. On one occasion I was in a meeting for 3 hours, such was the openness of the trans-woman that I met and she wanted to share so much.

My study arose out of statement from a friend, in which they stated that they did not believe in transgender issues, as God did not make mistakes, and you were the gender you were born into. One of the books I read came from a similar perspective, and it is the only book I recall getting angry about as I read it. Having spoken to several people, I would not wish to go through the mental and emotional anguish that they have endured. I could tell that there had been real pain there, which was only exacerbated when they then had the pain of rejection once they came out as transgender. Everything appears to hinge upon whether you believe people are born that way – from a Christian perspective created by God – or develop that way through life's experiences and make a choice. I fall firmly within the former, as I do not believe this is a choice. The pain I saw was real and not something they had chosen, and it began at a very early age in some cases. I don't know why people are created with those issues, in the same way as I don't know why people are born with disabilities. What I do know is that God loves each one of us.

With regard to my question I learnt that our identity is not a series of characteristics that can work for or against each other. Our identity is the whole person, so if you have faith, that is an intrinsic part of your identity. If you identify as LGBTQ+ then that is part of the same identity. If you identify as male, female, non-binary, etc. then that is part of your whole identity. I believe that you cannot switch off or suppress one part of your identity – it is who you are meant to be, and discovering who you are meant to be – or created to be – is one of life's struggles.

Yet the people I met have mostly come out of the other side of those struggles, some of which may still be ongoing, much happier and much more contented. I met a trans-woman who still shared a home with her wife, having been married before she transitioned. When I spoke with the wife she turned and said to her partner, "You're much happier now that you are a woman." Isn't that happiness in life what we should wish for everyone?

News from the parish council meeting

After the first meeting of 2020 the exciting news is that you will soon be (if not already) confronted by cute woolly animals in the fields around the village. Yes, sheep. We had a very interesting presentation from the shepherd at the meeting explaining that there will be several flocks gambolling around the fields. This will allow lots of jokes about Shaun the Sheep, and people being fleeced by spam operators. And if you're having trouble sleeping you can always... Well, I think you know where that's going.

Members of the public in attendance seemed to be very happy so far with the service from Gigaclear. Been a long time coming but apparently well worth the wait.

There is talk of solar lighting along parts of the B1383, which is a slightly controversial topic. Some want it, others don't. A former councillor has kindly agreed to look into the implications of lighting in a conservation area and will report back.

The precept was agreed at £12,500, which is the same as last year. So not everything goes up.

Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves

Local Plan

The letter from the Inspectors from the hearings in July 2019 has finally arrived and was released to press and public on January 14th 2020. The letter is critical of many aspects of the draft Plan. The previous attempt was stopped by the Inspector in December 2014, primarily because he considered it unviable to keep adding more estates onto existing towns and villages. He advised that new settlements should be built instead, plus building the sites already in the draft, which is what the revised plan seeks to do. The new inspectors now reject some of that principle. I draw your attention to two of their issues:

We are concerned that the Council's chosen strategy (the new settlements) would mean that other sites in the district would not be developed or permitted for a significant period of time in the future. This would be likely to adversely affect the vitality and viability of services in existing towns and villages and result in a lack of housing choice in the market. (My emphasis).

So, they are telling us to go back to the rejected strategy and carry on putting estates around our towns and villages. And for the 'North Uttlesford Garden Village' (NUGV) they put very significant weight on archaeology. They include fourteen paragraphs but here are some selections:

The HIA (Heritage Impact Assessment) finds that North Uttlesford is situated within a sensitive landscape with significant highly sensitive areas and contains extensive heritage assets, comprising built heritage as well as, known and unknown archaeology. It identifies as highly sensitive the immediate setting of the Roman Temple Scheduled Monument which is within the site allocation and the visual and historic relationship to the Roman Fort Scheduled Monument at nearby Great Chesterford.

Reading this you would think there is something Roman there to see. There is actually nothing visible at all. The fort part of it is under, and just immediately north of, the village and not part of any building plan, or close to one. The temple site is a section of ploughed field about 100m wide on the right when travelling north from Walden to Stump Cross, roughly opposite the housing estates. It is on the very edge the proposed site and again would not be built on, and a large area would need to be left round it in case there is more of it. It has been excavated several

times from 1847 to 1988 so there is a reasonable prospect that we know what there is to know.

And: The Roman Temple complex consists of below ground archaeological remains and is a Scheduled Monument. It is set away from the Roman Town, but is significantly associated with it, both by function and by physical links in the form of Roman roads. The HIA finds that views between the Roman Town and the Roman Temple and the Great Chesterton Conservation Area make a major positive contribution to its significance.

Setting aside that the inspectors have paid so little attention that they got the name wrong, this is fantasy stuff in that significant weight is being given to views from and to a 'town', and a 'temple' and of 'roads' which ceased to exist a very long time ago, apart from the A11. This is also just wrong – there is no public view from the Conservation area of the temple site.

The rest of the archaeological reports say that the site is very likely to have a high level of interesting material. However, what is not noted is that the very same argument applies to the whole of East Anglia. I attended a lecture by Maria Medleycott, who is an archaeologist for Essex County Council. She seemed to have dug up most of the county, and said that anywhere you dig around here you will find things. From their perspective they like development because it gives funding and opportunity to excavate.

Looking at other locations, the old A120 is Stane Street, which is a Roman Road, going through Stortford, Takeley and Dunmow. There will be Roman and other archaeology all along there. There was plenty at Stansted Airport. The recent building in Newport produced evidence of prehistoric settlement (we are still looking for the site of Newport castle which is shown on Victorian maps!)

The reason I highlight these two issues in the report (protection of underground heritage and adding more building to existing settlements) is to question the planning balance being applied. Planning is all about balancing benefits against disadvantages. I suggest that protecting and enhancing the visible and functioning 'heritage' ie. our towns and villages, and all that implies, far outweighs what is underground and long since abandoned. The inspectors' argument would logically extend to, for example not upgrading the A11 because the Romans built it, or leaving the whole of the Square Mile of the City of London as a ploughed field! There are other good arguments against NUGV, but archaeology is being over emphasised.

Concerning continuing to attach estates onto our villages, the inspectors argue it maintains 'vitality and viability of services'. This reads as a copy and paste from every planning application from one house up to 500 and is a standard argument which developers present when they want to tag large estates on the outside of our communities. However, looking at Newport, expanding by over 50%, there is no evidence at all that this vast scale of housing adds to vitality or viability. No infrastructure of note has been added. Commercial sites have continued to close since the building boom started, and have been converted to residential, or stand empty. Our water supplies, sewerage system and roads have become more overloaded and failing, and there is no expansion of the doctors' surgery (the partners declined an opportunity to have a new health centre as part of one of the developments) or sports or recreational facilities. I think the same argument would apply to all our 'key' settlements. Adding houses to settlements without any other benefits is **reducing** their viability not improving The designations of 'key' (Newport) and 'A' it. settlements (Quendon) as suitable for development were done ten years ago, and the Neighbourhood Plan says this is, in the absence of any new infrastructure and continued loss of services, now out of date. The 'viability' has been used up.

Looking at Quendon, should the criticism of the Local Plan by the inspectors trigger a major housing application, does anyone think that new employment or shops will come with it?

Overall we now have an impossible task. The south of the district is Green Belt, Hatfield Forest and the airport. Most of the district is too remote from transport to build anything big. The scale of building required of us is just too vast to be slotted in to the M11 corridor or the A120 without severe consequences of all sorts. Suggestions please?

One thing we can do is to enact the non-site related policies in the draft plan. Currently developers can claim that the wordings of our policies are out of date and not compliant with current planning rules. The draft policies have been worked over several times and we can implement without requiring the rest of the Plan to be agreed. We have incorporated some of the wordings in our Neighbourhood Plan to do a little bit of this (and were told we should not duplicate!) Some work on this was already being done. I hope this can now be accelerated.

Hello, Fellow Villagers!

I do hope you have survived the dreariness of January, with the wind and the rain seemingly endless! Lets hope February shows us a few more blue skies!

A couple of dates to cheer us all up, which have just been confirmed, are the England Cricket Day, on Sunday, 5 July and Quickling Festival on Saturday, 8 August.

As I am sure most of you have seen, we have new occupants in the fields surrounding the villages! The sheep, I think, were a surprise to most of us but are settling in well and it is lovely to see livestock in our midst. The shepherd, Wayne Parker, attended our last Parish Council meeting to give us a little information.

These sheep and the electric fences will come and go in the three fields and from mid February the ewes will start to deliver lambs. We will try our best to keep you informed of their movements via Facebook. I appreciate many of you do not have this technology so just be aware that the sheep plan to be around for some time yet!

There is no need to inform the shepherd every time you see one escaped sheep. There is one regular escapee, who was bottle fed from birth, who likes to investigate walkers but he always returns to his "friends"! The only time you need to call is if there is a mass escape plan in action or the sheep are dangerously close to the main road. There have been a few occasions where a report has been made of a sheep with a broken leg, this is very rare and it is currently because of the rain soaked fields, which causes compacted mud to be pushed up between their cleats causing lameness.

Please be aware all dog walkers that dogs should be kept on a lead while walking near to the sheep or walking through the sheep field. The sheep are used to dogs and traffic but do become stressed if hassled by dogs and can abort their lambs. Also be aware that dogs that attack loose sheep on the public footpaths can be prosecuted for attacking livestock.

You will also have seen that work has started on Foxley 2! We will keep a close eye on developments on the site and will definitely be making sure that Forsters Footpath's greenery is reinstated afterwards.

The precept, the contribution to the parish on your Council Tax bill, was discussed at the last Parish Council meeting and you will be pleased to hear that it will not be increased this year.

Finally we would like to thank the person who mended Dick's plaque. Dick died 10 years ago on 5 March so it seems only fitting to remember him and to keep his memory alive.


Our Christmas dinner (with crackers provided by the PTA – thank you!) was included in January's *The Link*, but here's a picture of how it was enjoyed!

Tool theft from vans

Vans are often targeted by thieves for the tools stored inside. If you have to leave tools in a van overnight, mark them clearly with your name or company name and address using paint pens and seal with a clear lacquer spray. Alternatively, you can use a variety of other property marking systems. Items that are clearly marked are less desirable and more difficult to sell on.

Consider using a lockable cabinet within your van to store tools. Small cameras are also available and designed to record inside vehicles. Some will also alert your phone.

Take photographs of items of value, make a note of the serial numbers and consider registering them online at immobilise.com.

Take your documents with you

Having a vehicle's registration and insurance documents could let a thief pretend to be the owner. Which means they could sell it on quite easily.

Number plates

Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws. The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates.

Emergency Life-saving

Should someone suffer a cardiac arrest or show symptoms of a heart attack e.g. pains in the chest, then your first action should always be to phone the ambulance service on 999. The service will refer you to our Automated External Defibrillator which is at the front entrance to Quendon & Rickling Village Hall. Anyone can save a life by using it until an ambulance arrives. In addition you can seek help from any of the volunteers listed below.
