From the Vicarage Study

Rev. Neil McLeod,

Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

I am writing this article on 17th December, so Christmas hasn't happened as yet. Today I managed to get into the school to conduct a Christmas assembly and I am busy prepping our Christmas services, but the actual event is still one week away. Yet, as you read this, I hope that you had a good Christmas. It was probably different from any other Christmas that you may have had! Maybe you didn't see as many friends, or maybe you couldn't see family that you'd normally be spending time with. Maybe you didn't head out to celebrate as much with either a meal in a restaurant or a few drinks in the pub. At the end of this terrible year I hope that you got some joy at Christmas.

So now we look forward to 2021 and whilst the first few months may still be under the same restrictions as we are now, we do have the vaccine that is being rolled out across the country. There is a light at the end of this very dark tunnel that we have been journeying through. It is the hope that we have all been looking for, and the hope that we in the church have been praying for. I give thanks to God for the scientists who have developed it, and for all those who took part in the trials.

As I write, Uttlesford has just been spared from going into Tier 3! Ironically, this time last year we were all wondering what the 2020s would bring to Quendon and Rickling, now we all know!!! I hope you had the best Christmas that you could have, in the circumstances and enjoyed the even more precious time spent with family and friends!

Firstly, I have a few thank yous!

I would like to thank the Events Team who organised an amazing Christmas light display at The Fountain, complete with Puff the Dragon! It is the same team who co-ordinated the Remembrance Day display so now that such a high standard has been set!! Also thanks to The Grabowskis who supplied the electricity that enabled Puff to glow green and thanks to Jonathan Webb for being the fabulous William Winstanley who saved Christmas!! So many of the houses along Green Road had also contributed with their own light displays which were seen on the procession, led by William Winstanley, up to the Pavilion for the lighting of the Christmas Tree! Here I would like to thank Tom's Trees for providing the tree by the Pavilion and making sure it remained upright in windy conditions and The Cricketers for providing some delicious mulled wine and mince pies! Thank you all so much for making such an effort in helping the village start to feel Christmassy! It was a lovely start to the festive season and to be able to see at least some of our neighbours, even from a distance!!!

The football pitch has been somewhat quieter of late due to Covid lock downs and the amount of rain we have had,



but we would like to say a big thank you to Ted Crow, our Vice Chair, who co-ordinates and runs the pitch and his two side kicks, Paul Bentfield and Jo Kitcat. The three of them volunteer many hours to maintain the pitch and keep it at a standard that has many local teams desperate to use it for their matches. It is also a credit to them that all pitch income covers the expenses incurred although this year's income is obviously down somewhat but hopefully next season will be hugely successful again!

The Highways Survey for Quendon is progressing nicely. You can see the latest from Essex Highways in the December's minutes on the website. It looks as though there may be some light at the end of the tunnel although the tunnel does look rather long at this stage!!!!

The VAS sign is now working - apparently the control board, which was brand new, had a fault but this has now been replaced, again, and is shining brightly for all to see! The 30mph half size pole at the southern end of Quendon is due to be replaced with a full size pole and will be moved back in line with its opposing number when the building is complete.

Remember the Parish Council is here to answer any questions and you are very welcome to join the Zoom monthly meetings we host online instead of in the village hall. Let's hope that these face to face meetings will begin again in the not too distant future, it will be good to see you all again!

Finally, the Parish Council would like to wish everyone all the very best for 2021 - may it be a far better year than 2020!

Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves

Thank you to the Uttlesford District Council staff

Normally it is us councillors who take the credit for things, based on work done by the officers. The cabinet has regular meetings with senior officers to plan work and forthcoming meetings, and whatever needs to be discussed. It is called JET, the Joint Executive Team. We've been very impressed by the way that staff have delivered so many extra functions, while keeping council services running and almost entirely achieved working at home – there are only about 20 staff in the council offices.

At the JET meetings the Chief Executive was reluctant to be publicising herself and team, so in a change to normal we insisted that we would do it. Here is a synopsis of some of that outstanding work, from a letter circulated by Council Leader John Lodge:

- **The Finance team** have had an essential role in tracking income and expenditure and making our claims from government for support towards lost income in what has been a very unstable situation compared to the approved council budget.
- **The revenues and benefits team** has shouldered the tasks of distributing the mandatory financial support for businesses affected by national and local restrictions and applying the additional business rates relief for qualifying businesses and dealing with requests to re-profile payments for non-qualifying businesses. There have been many requests for benefit adjustments relating to residents' change in financial circumstances as they have lost their jobs or had their hours reduced, and payments to individuals required to self-isolate where they qualify.
- **The economic development team** of two have been stretched dispensing advice and guidance to businesses and signposting to business advice portals, while at the same time putting in place the £1million Economic Recovery Plan approved at Full Council on 8 December and, in the interim working with the Saffron Walden BID and Town Teams on re-opening the high streets following the national lockdown imposed in March.
- **The Environmental Health teams**, which are carrying vacant posts because of a national shortage of qualified staff, have been involved with advising the hospitality sector on safe ways of operating to ensure compliance with the Coronavirus regulations, for which they have been thanked by Essex Police. At the same time, they have had to prepare for the end of the Transition Period following EU Exit and the implications for the way that the Border Inspection Post at Stansted Airport for food imports will need to operate, whether or not a trade deal is secured.
- **The Housing Options and Homelessness Team**, which is always busy helping people in housing need, has been busier than normal with the additional demand created by restrictions on household sharing and relationship breakdown. The Communities team has been working hard with partner organisations on the community response helpline to put those who need assistance in touch with services. Our sheltered housing officers have been maintaining contact with our more vulnerable tenants making sure they are safe.
- **The IT Section** enabled us to move to home working over a relatively short period of time and helped us remotely to continue to do so, fixing glitches as they arise. This has meant that through our customer contact centre we have maintained access for residents and handled greater numbers of contacts than normal as demand has presented. The Scanning team has been crucial to enable home working, enabling access to documents that have arrived by post. **The Media Team** has been busy communicating information and advice to residents and businesses and helping to put in place arrangements for the Stansted Airport Appeal Inquiry to be held safely with remote access being enabled, particularly for the public.
- **The Corporate Management Team** have been engaged in joint work with other organisations including the police, fire and rescue, health partners, other councils through the Essex Resilience Forum at both a strategic and tactical level on a range of issues including testing and tracing and safe working practices for taxis and private hire vehicles.
- For other services, the challenge has been maintaining service while working in new ways. Good governance has had to be maintained. **Democratic Services** have had to coach us about Zoom meetings. Preparations have had to be made for next May's scheduled elections. Contracts have had to be let and renewed. Over time, Planning has not seen a reduction in applications, and Building Control still needs to inspect sites and be able to deal with dangerous structures. The programme for the new Local Plan had to be got underway. We have had to maintain health and safety plans and address new risks. We continued to empty bins reliably, and the garden waste collection that had to be suspended temporarily was restored as soon as possible. Garden waste service subscribers will not lose out from that suspension.
- We have been able to continue to progress our **commercial investment programme** to generate the income that we need to run essential services, not only in future years but also in the current financial year in most cases. We have successfully purchased the Canfield Business Park site to relocate our

environmental services depots and create training, meeting and hot desking facilities for staff in all other services who will continue predominantly to work from home, enabling us to generate additional commercial income from renting out space that we do not now need, both at Canfield and in the London Road offices in Saffron Walden.

- While the new activity related to the pandemic has displaced some existing service plan actions, cover has been maintained in all areas.

'I am sure you will all join me in thanking our officers for their marvellous work in 2020 and would ask Dawn to pass this on her whole team.'

Neighbourhood Plan

I said I would do a full report on the Neighbourhood Plan, but I have been busy with planning applications and flooding. To see the plan please go to the plan website <https://nqrplan.org> rather than the UDC one, which is pretty confusing.

In a recent Zoom church service there were prayers for our councils, which I think is a first. And a specific one for the Uttlesford Planning Department officers 'that they may have wisdom to balance housing need versus over-development'. The good news is the government have shown wisdom and are now proposing to significantly reduce the housing demand on areas like Uttlesford, back

to a version of the previous formula. We are down from 740 houses a year to 706. This is much better than the threat of 1232 a year under the last proposals. Rather than divine intervention I think this is more likely because they got a very severe kicking from their own MPs, as well as every responsible organisation.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The local pub has long been a focal point of the community. Samuel Pepys in his diary described the pub as “the heart of England”. Beer was once much safer to drink than contaminated water.

Many of our local pubs are centuries old, built when most of the population were illiterate. They had distinctive names and simple signs to identify them. As early as 1393 Richard II required landlords to erect signs so that ale houses were clearly visible to his inspectors, who judged the quality of the ale. Nowadays, not all have signs but there are many interesting names.



The Saracen's Head

The Saracen's Head in Great Dunmow, opposite the market place, is a 16th-century coaching inn. A Saracen was an Arab Muslim who in the Middle Ages fought against Christians for control of The Holy Land.

The Blind Fiddler in Anstey takes its name from a tale of George the blind fiddler who for a bet entered a tunnel said to run from a pit to the castle mound a mile away. He was accompanied by his dog. A scream was heard,

also feature on the village sign.

The Sword in Hand in Westmill takes its name from the coat of arms of the Greg family who once lived in the parish and were generous benefactors. It has an unusual

the dog reappeared singed from head to tail, but George was never seen again!

In Bartlow, The Three Hills dates from around 1800 AD and is named after the parish's giant Roman burial mounds which

Vaccination Scams - Fake Text Messages & Calls

With the gradual rollout of the Covid-19 vaccine, residents are warned of criminals seeking to exploit the pandemic further.

Essex Trading Standards have warned that the messages ask residents to click a link in order to book their vaccination, before proceeding to take personal details and payment requests.

The Covid-19 vaccination is free and you will never be asked for payment.

In other parts of the country, people have also received phone calls to book non-existent 'vaccine appointments'. They are asked to confirm their booking by pressing a number on their phone which results in them being billed by their provider.

'VIP' vaccine tickets

Phishing scams continue to circulate, many now claiming

to offer 'VIP' vaccination tickets that will allegedly put people at the head of the vaccination queue—for a price. Similar to the scams that have been seen throughout the pandemic, they will often ask you to click on a link or provide personal/banking details to pay for the ticket.

If it seems too good to be true, it probably is!

The vaccine is first being offered to those most at risk, particularly the elderly.

Please pass this information on to anyone you think may be vulnerable to these scams.

HMRC Self Assessment Scams

Self assessment customers are being warned to be vigilant following reports of a number of HMRC scams ahead of the return deadline on 31st January 2021. Scams use the deadline to panic customers into sharing personal or financial details.

Criminals contact customer via SMS text message, email

or phone calls pretending to be HMRC offering financial help, tax rebates or refunds.

Customers are also warned to be aware of fake websites charging for government services.

Ways to spot a tax scam

It could be a scam if it:

- is unexpected
- offers a refund, tax rebate or grant
- asks for personal information like bank details
- is threatening
- tells you to transfer money.

You can report suspicious activity to HMRC at phishing@hmrc.gov.uk and texts to 60599.

Fake BT Calls

Residents have received calls claiming to be from BT and stating that there is either an issue with the broadband in the area, or that the resident's internet access is due to be cut off unless they follow the caller's instructions.

The criminals request that the resident downloads a

program that will allow them access to the computer - this will allow them to remotely control the computer, meaning they are able to change passwords and view banking information.

When dealing with companies over the phone remember:

Take a moment to stop and think before parting with your money or information could keep you safe.

Could it be fake? It's ok to reject, refuse or ignore any requests. Only criminals will try to rush or panic you.

Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud

To check whether the call is genuine, call back after five minutes or, if possible, on a different phone. Always use a trusted number, and not a number provided by the caller. A number of reports have stated that the caller has provided another fake number to continue the scam.

If you believe criminals have accessed your computer, take it to a trusted computer expert and explain the situation.
