From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Fellow Villagers!

Obviously this month the first item we have to talk about is that the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) has decided to take control of major planning application decisions away from UDC. This means that instead of any planning applications of 10 houses or over going to UDC for consideration, developers can go directly to the The Planning Inspectorate (PINS), ie, the Government, instead, although developers may still go to UDC if they so wish, but PINS then make the final decision whether approval is given. In effect, our MP's department gets to decide what gets built in Uttlesford and where, rather than locally elected representatives. The reason for this is that UDC refused too many planning applications which ended up being overturned on appeal so DLUHC decided that UDC were not adequately performing their function. The only good news about this is if PINS turn down an application there is no opportunity for an appeal by the landowner/developer. We have sent an email to our local MP, Kemi Badenoch, outlining our grave concerns that this designation notice has been issued and asking for reassurance that PINS will take into consideration the views of the local residents and that we are given a voice and are properly listened to by the authorities before any development is approved. We have received a response from her assuring us that "if any applications are made to the Inspectorate, the community will have the opportunity to comment on proposals in the usual way and that local hearings will be held, as needed, to consider the arguments in public." Any applications, though, under 10 houses are still being dealt with by UDC and just to confirm that the Local Plan and Call for Sites are still going ahead as expected with the first indication of sites possibly next month.

We believe the more people who lobby, the more our voices will be heard!

You will be pleased to hear though that we now have a Planning Consultant on standby; hopefully we will not need to call on them.

By the time you read this, the Parish Council would have hosted an extraordinary meeting in the school hall for Pegasi, so we will all know what their "vision" is for large scale development in the village. Hopefully you will all have had an opportunity to ask your questions and leave your comments in the Comments Box.

One of our Parish Councillors, Carrie Williams, stepped down at February's meeting as she is expecting a new addition to her family, so we would like to thank her for all the hard work she has done, especially when wearing her lawyer's "hat"! She has been a huge asset to the PC and the villages and we will miss her very much indeed! Carrie will still be part of the Events Team, fortunately, so we are not losing her completely! We wish her, Patrick and "Boy Blue" all the very best and look forward to meeting him very soon!

So now we are looking for two councillors. We keep putting requests in $\mathcal{T}he \ Link$ and on FB but to no avail. If no one comes forward, we will be reduced to concentrating purely on the most important issues in the villages, and the smaller ones will just have to look after themselves; so you will just have to bear with us and remember that we are doing the best we can to the best of our ability! When there is no one left on the council......!

As we write, the footbridge over the stream leading into Broom Wood by the pond is still in a state of disrepair and is very dangerous to walk over, so please beware. This has been reported to PROW's/Highways and we will do so again but we are at the mercy of ECC, so we will just have to keep persevering! We have informed the landowner as well, but they insist it is purely the responsibility of ECC.

We have managed to organise a meeting with a PROW (Public Rights of Way) officer to discover exactly where we stand regarding footpaths and the responsibilities of land owners, since Pegasi have informed us that, as from now, ECC is purely responsible for footpaths not them.

We believe we are slowly getting closer to work being started on the traffic calming scheme, Phase 1, through After nearly four weeks of waiting for Ouendon. confirmation following the meeting in January, our County Councillor, Ray Gooding, has been in touch to confirm that the design of the bollards which are being placed in North Quendon, are not going to be cast iron as we would like, but apparently Highways want us to have some lovely plastic reflective ones, which surely completely defeats the object of a conservation area! We are not happy with this at all and are determined to put up a fight! The design of the delineation between pavement and the parking areas at Waterbutt Row is currently being resolved with the contractor. There is some concern about the detail of how the "cobbles" will be laid and that they do not cause a trip hazard. The residents along Cambridge Road will be informed, by Highways, when Phase 1 work is due to commence.

From the Parish Council Chair (cont.)

You may have noticed whilst driving through Coney Acre there is a speed survey in progress. This was due in March 2020, but obviously Covid managed to get in the way, but hopefully this will begin the process to make a difference to the speeds of vehicles going through Rickling Green. We also requested one on the B1383 through Quendon so we see the difference before and after Phase 1 of the traffic calming scheme and we believe that this is due to be set up soon.

Brian Blackwell has stepped down from maintaining the "green side" of the village so we would like to thank him and his son-in-law, Mark, very much for all their hard work. On this note, we have employed a new green maintenance contractor, James Penrose, who was brought up in the village, so he knows it very well indeed.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, Sunday, 5 June, on the village green, are coming along very nicely.

The Events Team are in the process of booking various entertainment, so please do keep an eye open for more information. There will be no Quickling this year as obviously it would be too close to the Jubilee celebrations and rather a lot of extra work for the Team.

The Tulip tree, to commemorate the Jubilee, is being planted imminently. It will be protected by a black tree guard so it stays safe from cricketers and cricket balls during the summer months and any little wandering muntjacs at other times of the year!

The England Cricket Day on the green has been announced, which is very exciting as it has been sorely missed over the last couple of years, so please put Sunday, 3 July in your diaries and keep your fingers crossed for a lovely sunny day!

Finally, here is to dancing with daffodils!

District Councillor's Report

There is a lot going on at the council, including climate change work and revamping the Planning Dept. As well as an interim head of planning we have a lead officer running the improvement processes. A new permanent head of the department is being sought and I'm on the interview panel. At the lower levels we are seeing some new excellent planning officers in place, and although our conservation officer function still relies on an outsourcing, the officer who generally covers our area has produced a very high quality of assessments in response to applications, and indeed very prompt advice concerning the proposed use of plastic bollards in the work to be done by Waterbutt Row.

Council tax and budget for 2022/23

I will be presenting the annual budget and five-year financial forecast to council members on 22 February, following its review by the Scrutiny Committee and the Cabinet. There will be a balanced budget, which means that incomes and expenditures are balanced within the year. The proposal is for council tax to rise by £5 a year on band D properties. UDC collects the tax for five preceptors, of which Essex County Council is much the largest share. For comparison the UDC £5 rise is 3.09%, the Police and Fire increase £10 a year (4.79%) and Essex £60 a year (4.49%).

Council house rents are proposed to increase by 4.9%, which is in line with government policy of Consumer Price Index + 1%, and this has been agreed by the Tenants Forum. It will take the average rent to £107 a week. Council house finances are kept entirely separate from the rest of the council General Fund, and are required to be self-financing. The total rental income is forecast at £16.8m and expenditure at £13.4m, which, with a small draw on reserves, leaves £3.6m going to the capital budget for new houses.

The collection rates on council house rents are very high, which implies most people are able to pay. But otherwise, Housing Benefit can be applied for. The application also covers the Local Council Tax Support scheme, which for people on low incomes gives a reduction of 87.5%, and this is on top of other discounts such as for single occupancy.

Effect of changes in accounting rules on UDC

UDC has an external funding requirement of about £16.8m a year, but Council Tx is only £6.4m. We retain a small percentage of the business rates, and for the coming year there is a one-year settlement of New Homes Bonus and some other government finance. However, the second largest component of council income, comes from our highly successful commercial investment portfolio. This is now worth about £40 million more than the properties cost, and in 2022/23 it is forecast to bring in, net of interest and the new impositions noted below, income to support services of £5.7m.

However, changes to accounting rules recently imposed on local authorities by the Government, and the accounting body CIPFA, now significantly restrict local authorities' use of this commercial investment income to support council services, and perversely prevent us from running the portfolio in the most efficient manner. Most of the Council's properties are new build, state of the art, with new tenants on long term leases, with automatic upward rent increases, and all are freehold land. The intention was to sell them before any repair or upgrade work was required and while there are years left on the tenancies. The new rules in most cases prevent sale and reinvestment, and now mean holding them in perpetuity, and a separate requirement to build up huge unusable and unnecessary reserves to pay off 100% of the borrowing for assets we had no intention of holding for 50 years.

District Councillor's Report (cont.)

This means that in decades to come the Council will have large capital gains, which, as other perverse government rules prevent use of capital gains on council running costs, is the last thing wanted. The need is for income, not capital gains. The strategy was to recycle each of our properties at the optimal timings and market positions, to further enhance income by reinvesting, and without building up unusable capital gains. Unfortunately, it appears the Government has no understanding of commercial property investment.

In 2017 it said it would put local government finance on a long-term sustainable system, but year after year it has kept promising but has failed to implement anything apart from reducing council funding. This is why many councils have taken similar action to UDC. Councils are required to plan finances on a five-year forecast, but the Government itself is not, and announces (provisional!) annual piecemeal amounts in December of each year.

Councils also have a legal duty to present balanced budgets, but the last time any government did this was in 2000. Strict rules for you, but no rules for us?

Good news

Following December the announcements from government and CIPFA, UDC senior finance staff worked through the Christmas break, including cancelling booked holiday, to calculate as many different financial options to make the best of the new rules as could be devised. The consensus was that we could keep the finance reduction to £4m a year after four years. However, the five-year Medium Term Financial Strategy, just published as part of the budget papers has an updated commercial strategy option which, if it goes ahead, will cut the required reduction to £2.6m pa in 26/27. This is still a challenge but as noted in an earlier press release "In the past we've shown we are good at finding solutions and we will adapt and continue to innovate so that we can continue to meet the needs of our residents".

The Government 'designation' of planning applications

This has been imposed because UDC has not quite met the government target of winning 90% of appeals. The Council 'only' won 86.5% of them. Considering that all the decisions are subjective, for example balancing landscape damage against housing need, I think winning 86.5% is amazingly good. The Government has only fairly recently tightened the target from 80% to 90%.

The change is that applicants for 10 or more houses may apply direct to the Inspectorate. How many will do so is uncertain as if the Inspectorate refuse the application there is no appeal. And the evidence of the 86% is that unsuitable applications will still be refused. Residents, parish councils and UDC will still be able to submit evidence to the Inspectorate, but we will only have 21 days to do this, which for a major application where the developer has had months to prepare means we will need to be sharp.

The Society has now sold all 800 copies of its first hardback book The Hundred Parishes: An Introduction. There will be no reprint, although we have open minds on the possibility of a second book. Preparation of our first book took several years and was only possible because of the vast resource of what had already been written, in far more detail, about individual places, people and events. The Society holds more than 300 local books and pamphlets.



The Society's website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has recently been updated to ensure, amongst other things, that individual parish introductions include references to their share of available literature. A good number of local books are available, in person or online, from the four excellent outlets that each sold many copies of the Hundred Parishes book: Harts and the Tourist Information Centre in Saffron Walden, the TIC in Bishop's Stortford and Between The Lines bookshop in Great Bardfield.

A few parishes, as yet, have no book of their own, or perhaps just a pamphlet available in the church, whilst other places have extensive coverage. One of the Society's trustees, Peter Sanders, conducted research for 30 years before compiling a definitive history of Stansted Mountfitchet. Another easy-to-read classic, Littlebury: a Parish History, was produced by a team of authors. I have recently been absorbed by a largely pictorial history of Sewards End and by the 4th edition of Around Cold Christmas, not least because the latter has frequent references to my wife's distant relatives. Clavering's Jacqueline Cooper always seems to be working on yet another book about Clavering or Saffron Walden. Several local history societies have generated books or booklets, or have work in progress. So rich is our local history that there is no shortage of reading material or potential subject matter.

Current Exhibition - Fossilisation: a slice of the Anthropocene_____

Runs until 20 Mar 2022

Fossilisation features original bronze and mixed media sculpture by acclaimed artist Kabir Hussain.

Drawing on the concepts of fossilisation and preservation and accompanied by objects from across the museum collection, Fossilisation: a slice of the Anthropocene questions what traces of modern society might remain in the fossil and geological record thousands of years from now.

We are very pleased that Kabir's original sculptures are for sale throughout the exhibition period, with pieces available for collection once the exhibition has closed.



Kabir has exhibited at the Sainsbury Centre, Norwich, and completed various residencies across London and

the East of England. He is based near Woodbridge, Suffolk, where he combines his art with a career as a professional bronze caster, and educational work for students and emerging artists.

Bronze & Bubbles

The Bronze and Bubbles workshops proved very popular, with both sessions sold out several weeks in advance. 16 people joined us over two workshop sessions for a tour of our special exhibition, Fossilisation: a slice of the Anthropocene, with drinks and snacks available.



The main event was an introduction to the 'lost wax' method of casting, followed by sketching, then modelling clay maquettes to plan the participants' final wax model. Each wax model will be cast in bronze at Walnut Works foundry in Suffolk by Kabir Hussain, the sculptor behind Fossilisation, with the attendees

looking forward to receiving their very own bronze sculptures in the next few weeks.

Heating Breakdown

Mould forms in cold and damp conditions and this was due to the rise in relative humidity linked to the drop in temperature caused by the loss of heating. We installed extra equipment to improve the environment and the heating system is working again.

Several glass domes containing bird specimens had

mould on their wooden bases. This has been treated and



removed with alcohol. The domes are being moved very carefully to a different store that has more equipment to control temperature and the amount of moisture in the air. This is Sarah, one of the Natural Sciences Officers, starting to transport a collection of hummingbirds from South America mounted inside a Victorian glass dome

that was also known as a shade.

Object of the Month

The Museum's 'Object of the Month' provides an opportunity to explore interesting and unusual objects from our stores.

February's object of the month showed gemstones which are associated with love and romance, to celebrate Valentine's Day.

It was chosen by James Lumbard, one of the museum's Natural Sciences Officers.

Amethyst is the birthstone for February, but as a symbol

of love, St Valentine is said to have worn an amethyst ring so Christian couples in Ancient Rome could identify him. Valentine was a priest who carried out forbidden Christian marriages and married young



couples, when the Roman empire persecuted Christians and preferred their soldiers to be unmarried men.

Lapis lazuli can represent truth and friendship, and in Christianity represents the Virgin Mary. With the blue of the sky and gold of the sun, it represents success in Jewish traditions, while beads found in the ancient town of Bhirrana from 7500 BCE are its oldest known use by people. The remains of Bhirrana are in the Indian state of Haryana.

Sapphires are popular for engagement rings, as used for Lady Diana's engagement ring from Prince Charles.

Sapphire is the traditional gift in the UK for a 45th wedding anniversary and can symbolise truth and faithfulness.

In Ancient Greece and Rome, the word sapphire was used

for lapis lazuli, as sapphire was only widely known from the Roman Empire onwards.

Computer/smartphone security is a frequent are yet topic in these pages but the number of spam

e-mails your Editor receives is evidence that the address book of at least one of his correspondents is not secure! Don't think "Oh I don't visit naughty sites so I don't need anti-virus software", nor "Why pay for security when I can install it free from the internet". Why is it free - what are you really getting?



• Use strong passwords to keep your

data and emails safe, for example use three random words such as "Click-Sand-Drum". Do not use your email password for any other account. To add extra security use two-factor authentication (a type of "double check" system). • Use up to date and recognised anti-virus software on all of your devices to keep you safe from known viruses. Install software and device updates as they become available to keep your phone, tablet or computer well protected.

• Information stored on your devices may be irreplaceable, so back up your data and create a copy should it get compromised or stolen. Back it up using a 'cloud' service, such as Google Drive (free), or to a USB device that you keep somewhere safe.

Don't click on links or downloads in emails

unless you are 100% of the person or company who has sent the email to you. Links in emails are the biggest threat to downloading malware (malicious software) onto your computer.

• Fraudsters often use the names of well-known companies to commit their crime. Reputable companies will never phone you to ask for access to your computer; if you receive such a phone call just hang up.

News from APOPO

Last year, APOPO planned to release 5 million square metres of dangerous land in Cambodia for further development and thanks to our animal teams and rats like Magawa, we managed to surpass this target significantly! The programme released a total of 7,035,966 m2 of safe land back to local communities.

Our HeroRATs have continued their lifesaving work

around the world, and as you may have seen in the news, in January, our much beloved Magawa passed away peacefully in his sleep. Magawa, holder of a Guinness World Record for



the most landmines detected by an African giant pouched rat, was also the recipient of the PDSA Gold medal for life-saving work. It was very sad, especially for the handlers and trainers who worked so closely with him, but he did live to a grand old age of eight and in his memory, our supporters raised over \$10,000 to help support future HeroRATs.

At our Tanzanian Training Center, we have just had a new litter of HeroPUPs born - they are still nestled up with mum and will begin the process of socialization at 4 - 5 weeks of age. Socialization means that APOPO trainers gently carry them around, introducing them to sights, sounds, smells, and noises, to adapt them to the training environment and their human trainers. It is this crucial part of the training, which makes our HeroRATs always so friendly and adaptable with people.

The 24th of March, is World Tuberculosis Day, which is where we join the thousands of other health agencies to raise awareness and promote donations to those helping in the fight against tuberculosis. Fighting tuberculosis in countries such as Ethiopia, Mozambique, and Tanzania, is

more important than ever with the emergence of COVID19, adding another severe acute respiratory illness into the mix. It is more important than ever that our work detecting missed tuberculosis samples continues.	volunteer healthcare workers who provide much-needed outreach to underserved communities and rural areas where there is a high gap from diagnosis, to linkage, to care.	
The fight to eradicate tuberculosis (TB) involves the combined efforts of clinics, programs, and volunteers working together to address the diagnosis and treatment shortfalls. APOPO's TB detection HeroRATs do their part by helping find undiagnosed cases of TB. After a positive sample has been confirmed, the partner clinic is notified so that patients can start treatment and begin feeling better. Once the clinic receives the notice of a positive diagnosis, APOPO's community partner steps in to help provide additional education and support and ensure that medications are completed. APOPO has	Many of these volunteer healthcare workers have themselves suffered tuberculosis or provided care to families afflicted with the debilitating disease. Knowing the hardship tuberculosis imposes, they now help those in need. Our HeroRATs detect 40% more cases of tuberculosis than microscopy alone, meaning donations not only save lives from the horrors of war, but also from the horrendous symptoms associated with tuberculosis. https://www.apopo.org/en
