From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers,

It's nice to see the daffs snowdrops and aconites up and heralding spring's imminent arrival. It feels like it's been quite a long winter with those two cold snaps doing a lot of damage in the garden to anything exposed and not completely hardy. Lovely to have a brief change to white landscapes but I'm content generally with green, myself!

The **Bradley's Barn** development proposal from Pegasi was not refused by UDC. There were no specific grounds for refusing prior approval to the application as the legislative requirements were all met. We shall see what happens next on this one. It's still, in my view, a project that is misguided in its location so far from the facilities of the village.

On a happier note: **Coronation Event** plans. We have pencilled in a village event on the Green on **Monday 8th May** - the bank holiday of the Coronation weekend. In concert with the Cricketers Arms we plan to have a family-friendly event, where people can bring their picnics onto the Green and/or enjoy food and drink from the pub. More detail to come in future editions of *The Link*, on noticeboards and on facebook.

On the same subject - how about pitting your

horticultural wits against the mighty gardeners of the village and joining the **Pumpkin-growing competition**? This annual pillar of the PC events calendar is open to application now, with judging to be held at the Autumn Daze event in October. For more information please contact Katherine at knqrpc@gmail.com or look for the advert in *The Link*.

As a PC we have signed up to the "Wilder Towns, Wilder Villages" initiative from Essex Wildlife Trust. This project aims to focus conservation efforts on **enhancing biodiversity** in towns and villages in the county; whilst much of the effort is directed at brownfield urban spaces, there is a lot of good advice and onward links for villages as well, and more can be found on the PC website under "Local Information \rightarrow Village Wildlife Initiatives." https://www.quendonandrickling.co.uk/assets/ documents/wildertownswildervillages-pdf

There's a plan afoot to install **WiFi in the Village Hall**. This will enable users of the Hall to get a reliable phone signal (via WiFi-Calling), and for groups using the Hall to connect to the Internet for music, streamed video and suchlike. There's no initial cost to the Hall for the first year, and the provider - Gigaclear - is supplying WiFi for free to a number of halls in nearby villages.

I went down to get up to speed with the latest developments at the **Football Field** this week. In the sunshine it looks really lovely, reflecting the amount of care and attention that Ted Crow and his team lavish on it. Several local teams use it as their home ground, and take pride in associating with our village. After a lull during the winter weather the pitch has been in use constantly by a number of teams on Sundays: come on down and watch!

We are still in contact with Highways regarding the state of impassability along Cambridge Road footpath. The Council lead on Highways came down to see for himself, and we are hopeful of some imminent action on the subject, as the initial blocker - funding for such a project - is being resolved, according to our County Councillor. Let me end with two pleas, please.

Firstly the **Village Hall** Committee is looking for volunteers to join as trustees of the charity which runs the Hall. The responsibilities are not onerous. The current committee has been running for decades and if there are no trustees to run the charity then the Hall will have to close, which would be a very serious loss to the village. Having a village hall is a great, sometimes underappreciated, asset to the village, you only know what you had when you lose it - witness the endless angst enveloping Debden to see how important a hall is!

Secondly - let me repeat our frequent plea for more volunteers to join as a **parish councillor**. We still have the two vacancies, and the same situation stands for the PC as for the Village Hall: if there's no-one to run it the Council itself will stop functioning and will no longer be addressing local issues. Come on out and join us! Next meeting on March 8th in the Village Hall, 7:30pm

Meantime, here's to (imminent) springtime - cheers, all!

District Councillors' Report

<u>Refreshment of the Newport Quendon and Rickling</u> <u>Neighbourhood Plan</u>

The plan will be 2 years old in June and has proved most useful. For example, it supported a Multi-Use Games Area about to be installed at the Newport Recreation ground, and was quoted in the funding bid to UDC. It was also used in getting funding for Quendon re the traffic calming and Waterbutt Row parking project done last year. In Newport the last six planning appeals have all been refused, with the NhP given weight and it has been quoted in a number of applications in Quendon.

After 2 years the spatial policies of Neighbourhood Plans have less weight, ie. where houses should or should not be built. Also, some policies need a tidying-up to the wordings following experience in use. Although the government say they intend to increase the full weight life of Neighbourhood Plans, this is only at consultation stage and it is unlikely that Plans already beyond the two years will be upgraded.

Therefore, the parish councils are doing a light touch upgrade to our Neighbourhood Plan.

New site allocation(s) will be needed to refresh its weight. A firm of consultants have been hired to assist. They will review what we have against current legislation and their experience of working on other NhPs, and then assist with the rest of the process, which should be significantly quicker than last time. The project plan they have done forecasts completion by March 2024. This will still be before the District Council Local Plan and will ensure that the villages have the benefit of a full weight valid plan.

The Steering Group has been re-formed with new and previous members. From Quendon it is Brandon Chapman (former chair of the Parish Council and steering group member) and Phil Sowter who is a current member of the PC. Judy and Neil are on the group and five other residents of Newport, including one from Shortgrove. We also have some assistance from one of the UDC planning officers who covers this area. We can add new policies within reason e.g., where circumstances have changed, or for things we didn't cover first time. A policy on solar farms maybe? Suggestions welcome! And we ignored Shortgrove Park and Quendon Park in the current Plan as already having a level of protection, but which has not proved fully effective. There will be both informal and formal consultations.

Shortgrove is a Capability Brown landscape with much still in place, plus Victorian additional planting. As most readers won't have been there we thought some photos would be of interest.

Annual budget

The budget, five year financial forecast, and strategies for council housing, capital spend, commercial investments and Treasury strategy will be at full council for decision making the day after this was being written. They have been assembled by the finance officers, and follow two workshops for councillors, scrutiny by the Scrutiny Committee, and the Cabinet.

The documents extend to over 200 pages, but key points most will be interested in is the UDC council tax. This is set to rise by £5 a year on band D properties, which is 3% and that takes it to £171.61 pa, but note that most of the council tax UDC collects is for Essex, and the Police and Fire and for parishes. Council house rents are to rise by

7%. This has been agreed by the Tenants Forum and by the Housing Board, and the average rent is $\pounds106.94$ a week.

As well as providing the most generous council tax support scheme in Essex, which reduces the total tax by 87.5% for people on low incomes or in vulnerable categories, we are also allocating all of the extra tax from the 3% increase, £195,000, into a Cost of Living Support Fund which anyone can apply for.

Quendon Estate & Maces Farms

As Spring starts to arrive, we are gearing up for a busy period of drilling our Spring Barley whilst tending to our autumn sown crops.

Following our last article, we have successfully completed the planting of new hedges across various areas of the Estate and Farm. We aim to continue planting new hedging in the autumn and we have scheduled to plant 6,500 tree saplings around the Estate to replace trees previously thinned. This work is part of our ongoing woodland management programme.



Further to submitting our proposal to Uttlesford District Council to convert Bradleys Barn into five terraced residential dwellings to offer two/three-bedroom accommodation which will be retained and rented out, this was approved on the 25th January 2023. Thank you to everyone who submitted their feedback and comments to Uttlesford District Council. We will circulate a follow up note to answer points raised.

Thank you to everyone who registered for the community surgery on the 15th February. We hope you found it interesting and found the farm tour insightful. Object of the Month

The Museum's 'Object of the Month' provides an opportunity to explore interesting and unusual objects from our stores.

In February we celebrated the Lost Language of Nature project, putting the finishing touches to this common



eider. James and Charlotte have cleaned its plumage, repainted its beak and feet, and refreshed its base. Eider ducks are famous for their soft downy feathers which help keep them warm in freezing conditions. 'Down' comes from the Old Norse word 'dúnn', the word

for the fluffy feathers of young birds and the same feathers which insulate adult birds. The wild ducks can be 'farmed' sustainably for their down feathers, which are taken from the nests once chicks have fledged. This down is used to make traditional eiderdown pillows and quilts. In the UK, eider ducks are sometimes called St

Cuthbert's duck or Cuddy duck, according to the belief that St Cuthbert's holiness protected Farne island and its population of eider ducks. Saffron Walden Museum wants to hear your stories about wildlife and nature in your life, or that you know from parents and grandparents, to help create more interesting, relevant and diverse displays in the future.s Fill in a postcard in the Museum to join in or search online for 'Lost Language Saffron Walden Museum'.

Discoveries from the store

As work continues moving archaeological finds to better low-humidity storage, we rediscover the contents of boxes! These finds - a glossy red Samian dinner plate, the base of a square blue glass flagon and a set of bronze mounts from a casket - all furnished the burial of



someone from a small settlement at Little Walden in the early Roman period (later 1st or 2nd century AD).

These objects were found in the early 19th century and we don't have many details, but we do know that they were buried with a precious casket decorated with bronze mounts in the form of

lion's heads. The wooden casket had long since rotted away but the distinctive metal mounts and fittings had survived.

Caskets like these are known from Romano-British burials across the east of England. Lion's head mounts were clearly popular and one was recently uncovered in excavations of a Roman settlement at Bishop's Stortford (featured on BBC TV's Digging for Britain series).



Another set of lion's head casket mounts from Little Canfield is on display in the Museum. It was found and kindly loaned by a local metal detectorist.

Documenting the archaeology collections

Work has recently started on a new project to transfer data from a very large collection of metal detected finds spanning 20 years of work by a local enthusiast. This hugely varied collection is fully identified by the original collector including ages and images of the items, which range from Bronze Age heads through medieval pottery to 17th-century coins.

The project will transfer the collector's information and images to Modes, the Museum's digital database, and ensure that each item in the collection is assigned a unique 'accession number' to help identify it from other

similar items. The current focus is on coins collected from farmland near High Easter in the south of Uttlesford District, including this halfpenny



dating from 1251–1272 during the reign of Henry III.

American mystery object

We have started receiving requests from the USA to



identify mystery objects found by people when they are out and about. The latest was this mystery bone, which was similar to one brought into the Museum for identification in 2020, which turned out to be a cattle hock bone (calcaneus), which is the same bone as our heel bone. This bone from Mississippi is likely to have come from a white-tailed

deer. The ends are more rounded than a fresh bone, which would have had points and sharper edges, but the shape and approximate size suggest a deer, and only white-tailed deer have a native range that includes Mississippi.

Security News and Advice from Stephen Armson-Smith

A Heritage of Crime Prevention for the Future

Back in 1829, Sir Robert Peel (the "*Father of Modern Policing*") decreed that there are nine basic principles of Policing. The first principle and mission for Police Constables is to prevent crime and disorder, and that police effectiveness is not measured on the number of arrests, but on the lack of crime!

These principles still ring true today. Reducing and preventing crime is not only better for the economy, but more importantly our health and wellbeing. Dealing with the aftermath of crime and ASB can leave a lasting impact on victim of crime and the wider community.

Every day within Essex Police, our Officers and Staff

from our Community Policing Teams, Community Safety and Engagement Officers, Rural Crime, Business Crime Teams and Fraud Coordinators deliver crime prevention advice to help the public in reducing the opportunities for crime and ASB.

For specialist crime prevention advice, the force has a small number of Crime Prevention and Designing out Crime Officers (DOCOs), who provide tactical support for all officers and staff. Designing out Crime Officers look at mitigating crime and ASB risk not just for the present, but for the future. A carefully designed building and wider environment with security at the heart of it is better than retrofitting measures later to fix a problem

that could have been foreseen.

Additionally, as part of the planning process, the Designing out Crime Officers comment on new planning applications to ensure that the opportunities for crime and disorder to be 'designed out' at the earliest opportunity. They review various planning applications from new housing estates, hospitals, schools and town centre regenerations to name but a few.

The Designing out Crime Officers promote **'Secured by Design'** (www.securedbydesign.com) to ensure that new planning applications have considered the impact of crime in their design.

Secured by Design (SBD) is the official police security

initiative that aims at reducing the opportunities for crime and ASB. Developers around the UK can achieve SBD awards for incorporating crime prevention measures and techniques into their developments in all kinds of building sectors. SBD has also developed and maintains a product-based police accreditation scheme - the Police Preferred Specification, where independently tested security products and building material can be found.

In conclusion crime prevention is not just reactive and concerned with just the here and now, its core is around creating safer and exclusive places for everyone at all times.

The observers

These include people loitering in public places who appear to be checking out passers-by, paying particular interest to their handbags, shopping bags and where they might place their wallet or purse.

This also is a tactic used near cashpoints, or your car when loading your shopping, where one person will stand close and distract you while another is watching you input your PIN or placing your handbag or wallet into your car.

The opportunists

Pickpockets also operate in shops and department stores, where people are more likely to be standing still, distracted and so paying less attention to their belongings, making them an easier target.

Be more aware of your surroundings in busy shops and

shopping centres because they're ideal places for pickpockets, as it's easier for them to brush past people, take items and blend into the crowd.

Team tactics

Pickpockets don't always operate alone; they may work in teams to distract the target while someone unseen removes the items and blends back into the crowd. Another member might step in as an enforcer in the event of an altercation.

Crowding in

Thieves vary their tactics based on the location and the density of the crowd. One tactic is where a group of them push up against a victim in a crowded shop or street then quickly reach into the victim's pocket and steal their wallet, phone or purse.

Dirty tricks

Remember, pickpockets are very skilled at what they do. They know all the tricks and are extremely light-fingered with most of their thefts only taking a second or two. One of their tactics is 'hugger mugging' where a thief will appear to be over-friendly for no particular reason and hug you while pickpocketing you. Another ploy is for the thief to stumble into you and place their hands on you to steady themselves, whilst removing your wallet or phone!

The point of distraction

Pickpocket teams are adept at creating distractions. This could be anything from a game to a loud shout, all designed to avert your attention while an unseen accomplice steals your valuables. So do try not to be easily distracted. Waving a sheet of paper in your face while asking directions means they can use the other hand to steal your stuff.

Do...

- Do keep purses and bags closed and secure at all times.
- Do carry bags in front of you or diagonally across your chest.
- Do return cards to your purse or wallet quickly and zip it up or button it.
- Do use a purse that's difficult to open. One that zips or snaps shut is best, and keep it closed. Invest in some purse bells as well.
- Do use a money belt if you're carrying a significant quantity of cash.
- Do conceal your wallet in a buttoned or zipped pocket where it doesn't bulge.
- Do keep a list, separate from your wallet and phone, of emergency contact numbers (inc. bank card providers) in case your wallet, purse or phone is stolen.
- Do keep a photocopy of your airline tickets, passport, credit cards and any other documents that would be impossible or inconvenient to replace if stolen.
- Do be aware of your personal space and what may be happening around you.

Do Not...

- Don't hang stuff on the back of a chair.
- Don't leave anything on the back of a pushchair.
- Don't place your belongings out of sight on the table • or floor.
- Don't get distracted from what you are doing.

Remember, having a zipped bag doesn't mean you're totally safe. Thieves have been known to walk behind victims while slowly unzipping bags. Yes, they can be that bold. So, never underestimate a pickpocket.

through your 'Extra Eyes' on the road will be invaluable

The increasing availability of mass market 'on the go' cameras means more irresponsible, dangerous and illegal road behaviour is being recorded in video form than ever before. Through 'Extra Eyes', this footage can be sent to us for review by an investigator within Road Policing at Essex Police.

In appropriate cases we will have no hesitation in taking positive action against offenders, using the evidence that you supply, providing it meets the criteria.

It is important that the points below are followed otherwise the matter cannot be progressed:

You and any other witness must be willing to attend

court to give evidence

Footage must be unedited, clear and in focus

Vehicles must be identifiable

Submissions must be made within 48 hours of the event

Footage must show instances of driving behaviour which amounts to careless driving or leaving a vehicle in a dangerous position

Where the alleged driving amounts to an offence and there is no footage, an independent witness, not within your vehicle, is required.

If the evidence submitted has been posted on any social media sites or YouTube then unfortunately we will be unable to process your submission as it may undermine the possibility of a fair trial if the case goes to court.

Where appropriate, offenders will be offered a driver improvement course at their expense in order to educate them and ultimately improve their attitude towards driving. Where the criteria for one of these courses is not met, a fixed penalty notice or escalation to court proceedings may follow. Remember we are not just talking about dash cams in cars, hence the picture of a motorcyclist above; footage from cyclists' cameras or even horse rider helmet cams can also be used... The Office for National Statistics (ONS) recently published analysis of the 2021 Census. Nationally, this showed that the population of England grew by 6% in the last 10 years and 14% over the last 20 years. Locally, the increase has been much faster. The population of The Hundred Parishes in 2021 was around 156,000, up 12% since 2011 and 24% since 2001. If roads seem busier, these extra 30,000 people are a major factor.

Half of the increase is accounted for by 6 parishes close to Stansted Airport. Elsenham, Flitch Green, Great Dunmow, Little Canfield, Stansted Mountfitchet and Takeley have each expanded by more than 50% in the last 20 years. Another big growth was seen in Buntingford: from 4,300 in 2001 to 7,900 in 2021.

The Census is the modern equivalent of the Domesday Book produced in 1086 AD when the national population was less than 2 million, compared to 60 million today. outside the UK (compared to 17% in the whole of England and Wales); 10% of homes are flats (v 22%); 36% of houses have 4 or more bedrooms (v 21%); 27% of homes are rented (v 37%); 40% of adults work at home (v 31%); 55% are in professional or managerial jobs (v 46%); 56% of households have 2 or more vehicles (v 35%). We have a different age mix from the UK average, with a shortfall of around 5,000 people in their 20s and 30s offset by around 5,000 extra people aged over 40.

While the previous paragraph highlights contrasts, some statistics are closely aligned with the national picture: 99% of households have central heating; 5% of households have a second home; 51% of the population is female and 49% male.
