From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

'We plough the fields and scatter the good seed on the land.'

Yes, it is time again for us to be celebrating the harvest that God has given us, and to give thanks for all of the people who work on the land. It is probably something that we are in danger of taking for granted, as the blessings of the harvest are just always there. However, just stop and consider an average weekly shop and what it might contain. Here is a example of what is in my shopping trolley on an average week:

- Fruit: Bananas are part of my staple diet as I chop them up on my cereal along with blueberries. But I also have apples, pears or satsumas as well. Plenty of fruits from the harvest here.
- Vegetables: I know they're carbs but I love potatoes, and I generally stock up on large baking potatoes because I often have a jacket spud for lunch or dinner, and they are good for making chips with (the Slimming World variety I hasten to add). I love mushrooms in a chilli or bolognaise, and risotto. But I also get baby sweetcorn & carrots, and staple frozen veg such as peas, sweetcorn, green beans & broccoli.
- Salad: I am trying to eat more salad, so I get lettuce, tomatoes, cucumber, peppers & beetroot. I love pickled beetroot on a salad.

So that's the fresh stuff that is easy to see how it relates to the harvest, but there are other items as well:

- Cereals: My favourites are Fruit & Fibre, Wheatabix or Shredded Wheat Bitesize.
- Bread or Rolls: Not good for me, but great to have especially toasted with cheese.
- Jam: A nice fruity jam that can be spread on toast.
- Pasta or Rice: Another staple from my shopping basket but uses the crops from fields.
- Herbs & Spices: All of them grown and so versatile. I love cooking with pepper & chilli flakes.

So even if we didn't eat fresh food there are still plenty of areas of our diet that come from the harvest, and that's not included all of the different plant or fruit extracts that get used in cosmetics, shampoos, soap, etc. So, there is quite a lot of items that we use regularly that is dependent on a good harvest.

So I invite you to come and celebrate the harvest with us at Quendon Church on Sunday 9th October at 9.30am. Please bring something along (a tin or dried good) to offer for our harvest offering. Many thanks and hope to see you there.

This month's message from the Chairman of the Parish Council

I'm sure we are all happy to see The Link back in circulation after the summer break, and I hope you all enjoyed the weather once it finally arrived. All in all, it turned out to be a good 'un.

Unfortunately I have to begin with some rather bad news. Both our Clerk, Sue Joannou and one of our newer PCs, Lindy McDermott, have resigned from the PC. Sue has found herself with other, time consuming commitments, and Lindy has been asked to take on the role of Co-Chair of the Governing Body at her daughter's school. They will both be a great loss to the PC, both having settled in very quickly and having proved to be highly valuable members. I wish them the very best and, who knows, sometime in the future they just might come back. In the meantime, if you would like to consider joining us, either as Clerk or as a Parish Councillor, please give me a call, 542527.

Four topics seem to be staple PC business;

Planning is one, and you will probably have heard by now, that the application at Ventnor Lodge has been approved. As usual, this was despite PC objections. We did at least manage to negotiate a cash donation to the village hall, of £20,000 to help with the urgent renovation works. While we were somewhat disappointed with the amount, we have no control over it, and at least it will help.

Another is traffic. I've received a number of expressions of concern regarding the speed and volume of traffic through the village. You may remember that, some time ago I asked for volunteers to revitalize the Community Speedwatch Team, and the good news is that, just about, enough people came forward to restart the team. The only problem is that I am not allowed to provide the training for the new team, it has to be done by the police. I've been in touch, but I know from experience that it may be some time before they are able to give us a date. As soon as they do we'll be out with the speed gun again.

Then there is the awkward matter of parking, especially in Green Road and south of Waterbutt Row. I would ask all residents to simply be careful and considerate in where and how you park your cars. Principally, please do not block the footpath. As a yardstick, no pedestrian, especially with a pushchair, should have to go into the road to get past your car. We are looking at various means of ensuring this, in conjunction with Essex Highways but, as with most things, nothing is likely to happen quickly!

....and dog fouling. A lot has been said on the subject, so all I'll add for now is that the District Council has advised that 'poo bags' may be deposited in any waste bins, not just in dog specific ones, and that includes your own black, non-recycling bin. There is absolutely no excuse for leaving your dogs mess on the ground, or in a bag tied to a tree! Please, dog owners, help to keep our beautiful villages, just that.

Finally, the Village Plan Action Committee have made a little progress towards a Neighbourhood Watch scheme, in that a couple of people have volunteered to help out around Rickling. But more are needed. Very little needs to be involved and it would be great to see more people taking an interest in 'running' the villages. If you think you might be interested plase call Annette – 543518.

Report from District Councillors Neil Hargreaves and Joanna Parry

School transport costs and bus changes

A big concern for Quendon parents with children at Joyce Frankland and the SW County High is that Essex County Council is removing all subsidy for school transport. So by 2017 parents will be paying about £1000 a year, roughly three times what they are paying now. ECC have not handled this well. Their response is that they 'consulted'. They also said they were 'pleased' to be able to reduce their costs by £500,000 for these two schools. However the consultation referred to was mostly on withdrawing bus services. Because Widdington's service was at risk I read it in detail and there was no indication that such large rises for school transport were being planned, which is why there were no comments made about it. The paper presented to the Conservative ECC Cabinet, which includes the ward member for our area Cllr Ray Gooding, was therefore able to note that there were no objections made. As the relevant parts of the consultation were obscure it had to have selected text relating to school transport highlighted in bold for the benefit of cabinet members. There was no reference to the impact on parents.

I wrote to Cllrs Finch (Essex council leader) and Gooding asking that they follow the lead of Cambridgeshire, also removing subsidy, who have protected those already on courses from large rises, but they have refused.

Also to cut costs ECC have reduced and reorganised the school bus routes. Some of this was not thought through or consulted upon. There were children deliberately left by the roadside to change buses, children unintentionally left behind because buses were full, and bizarre convoluted routes involving very early starts and late arrivals. The 322 from Harlow through Quendon to JFA and SWCH is overloaded, leaving students behind and sometimes missing out Widdington entirely. After intervention by parents and by R4U some routes have been improved and at the time of writing Essex are meeting with the operators and schools. The SW Citizens Advice Bureau have assembled many issues about school transport on their Facebook which has been copied to the officials in Chelmsford.

Report from District Councillors Neil Hargreaves and Joanna Parry (continued) Neighbourhood Plan

Jo and I recently attended a training session provided by the Rural Community Council of Essex about how to develop a Neighbourhood Plan (NP).

It covered the basics of what an NP is for, and what it can and cannot do. In Newport and Quendon we will not be able to change any existing planning approvals, or the number of houses allocated to us in the Local Plan. But we can change where the allocated houses will go (if there is a better alternative) and we can set limits on building heights and specify design quality. For both villages the current position on the Local Plan is that no more sites beyond what is already being built, or subject to planning applications, will be included. However there is nothing to stop developers making applications for any site, even when the Plan is in place. However, for those areas not allocated in the Local Plan the NP can specify whether development should be encouraged or not permitted, and for example it can earmark areas to be retained as open space. The NP can also mark areas for commercial development or other uses.

We also covered setting up a project plan and how to create and implement an effective questionnaire. This was extremely useful and the handouts we were given are excellent, and show a very clear way forward.

Jo has submitted to UDC the area to be covered, which is the parishes of Quendon and Newport, and has listed the next steps for consideration at the Parish Councils, with the object of having the NP management team set up by mid September.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY



Many settlements within the Hundred Parishes evolved alongside highways to serve passing traffic, initially farm carts, drovers with cattle and travellers on horseback, then passenger coaches and bigger farm wagons. Some vehicles were drawn by six or more horses or oxen. The busiest routes radiated out from London.

Bacon rolls provided.

Roads did not have the luxury of a firm surface until the introduction of tarmac at the beginning of the 20th century. Since the Middle Ages, parishes had maintained roads, but increasing traffic meant that some could no longer find the necessary resources. Roads were badly rutted, muddy in winter and dusty in summer, often only passable by encroaching more and more onto adjoining land. Increasing vehicle size and volume of traffic, especially taking farm produce into the expanding capital, caused much damage.

Parliament authorised the overseeing of key routes by surveyors, and later by boards of trustees, who were responsible for maintaining a given length of road from the proceeds of tolls. These roads were known as "turnpikes" after an old word meaning toll gate. The first turnpike road in England was established in 1663 on the Old North Road, known more recently as the A10, running from Wadesmill in the parish of Thundridge north to Huntingdonshire. The country's first toll gate was set up in Wadesmill. More turnpike roads and toll gates followed in the 18th century.

The arrival of the railways in the mid 1800's took much traffic off the roads and spelt the end of economic viability for turnpikes. Main routes became the responsibility of county or district authorities and they were given road numbers in the 1920s. Much still survives of how things used to be if you take time to look – more next month.

ESSEX POLICE ACTIVE CITIZEN SCHEME

Across the UK there are numerous examples where members of the public are volunteering in roles to support local policing activity. It should be clearly understood, that this is not a scheme designed to override or under value the existing voluntary organisations, who are already doing a fantastic job within the community, but one to supplement and indeed enhance, the good work that already takes place.

Essex Police are excited to be creating their own 'Active Citizen' programme, expanding an existing volunteer framework which will enable to be able to become involved in supporting their local community, through volunteering with their local police.

The Active Citizen scheme will incorporate a number of existing Volunteer programmes, such as: Volunteer Police Cadets, Home Guard, Dog Watch, Active Citizens Horse Watch etc., but the overall scheme will go much further.

Opportunities will be tailored according to availability, capacity and capability of the volunteers, the only limit of the use of the Active Citizen scheme within the policing framework, is imagination.

An existing example of good work is that of the 'Home Guard' in Colchester, where volunteers patrol the streets to assist the police in keeping people safe. Other examples might be setting up crime prevention stands in town centres (possibly alongside, or in conjunction with Essex Watch and Neighbourhood Watch), who already carry out valuable work in this field, also distributing crime prevention leaflets, and, alongside a police officer or PCSO, giving crime prevention advice where there may have been recent opportunist burglaries. There could also be opportunities for assisting with some back office functions. As the scheme comes to fruition, it is planned to appoint Active Citizen leaders, who will co-ordinate the work of other Active Citizen volunteers.

Opportunities will be provided to volunteers from the age of 18 plus. It will be a fantastic opportunity for those looking for work experience, or for adding skills to the CV, and to gain invaluable experience in customer service and problem solving, setting our Active Citizens apart from other candidates, when applying for employment.

It will enable people to truly get involved in structured activities, and to support their local community, as well as a great opportunity to make new friends.

This new initiative is indeed, a chance for caring members of our communities to make a difference.

HOUSE BURGLARY: Three steps to reduce the risk

Beat the burglar!! Three steps to take that will reduce the risk of you being a burglary victim.

Is there clear unobstructed access to the rear?

Burglars will prefer to gain access out of sight at the rear. Where possible fence and gate access to rear gardens with 1.8m close boarded wooden fencing, top this with some trellis and/or spiky toppings (spiky toppings require a warning notice). Ensure the gate is securely locked. How about some defensive planting, what's this you ask.....something like Berberus, Pyracantha or Hawthorn around perimeter fencing and in trellis.

Doors: - With wooden doors, in addition to the "Rim Lock" fit and use a five lever mortice lock. Most UPVC doors as with windows use a multi locking system, make sure you know how to use it, when inside pulling the handle up will engage all the locks but in some cases will only lock the centre lock, to lock all the mechanism in place you must use the key (if in doubt try it before the burglar does).

Become an illusionist make your home appears occupied even when you are out, a burglar is more than likely to only see your home in one moment in time. Simple things like lights on timers and "Fake TV" for the evenings, you can now even get a timer that fits over your light switches (search on the internet for light switch timer). During the day leave a radio on, boots outside the back door, vacuum cleaner out with the lead going out of sight (not plugged in though), newspaper over the arm of the chair with a drink on the table and a pair of spectacles, the list goes on.

Naturally these are but a few measures you can take that will reduce your risk and depending on the property there may be others that also reduce the risk of being a burglary victim.

Residents along the Cambridge Road are only too well aware of occasional problems with the main drainage system in the village. Although the local water authority have assured us that their infrastructure will support further development in the village, many of us are doubtful that this will be the case and it would seem prudent to monitor the situation and record any incidents that are reported to Affinity Water or Anglian Water.

It would also be helpful if anybody who has had to report an incident in the past two years could let us have as much detail as possible of this. With the new development of 19 homes at The Pavilions and planning permission for a further 12 homes at Ventnor Lodge, this information would let us monitor the effect that the increase in usage has on the existing system, and would support our objection to any further development within this parish.

The information we need is:

- Name of authority and date reported
- Location of incident
- The nature of the complaint
- Their response
- Date resolved
