From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

Were you one of the people caught up in the euphoria of the England football team's march to the semi-finals of the World Cup? I must admit that I was, and I'm not really a football fan. The number of football matches that I have watched in their entirety is still less than 10. Yet I was transfixed by either how well they played, or maybe by how lucky they were – remember even the pundits thought that the draw opened up for us going into the knockout stages. Yet it was great to see images on our TV's of, what seemed to be, the whole nation coming together to get together behind the team. To be honest at a time when Brexit seems to be tearing us apart it was good to have something positive to cheer about. Then even when we lost to Croatia in the semi-final there was no angry backlash from fans. We still celebrated what the team had achieved in the competition.

One of the pundits on TV said that previously we'd had high expectations of the team only to see those expectations dashed, and I remember us crashing out previously without winning a single game. However this time round, we had either no or low expectations of the team and we were rewarded by reaching the semi-final. When you don't expect much you can receive so much!

What are your expectations of the church? Like the England football team prior to the start of the World Cup have you written off the church as not being able to provide anything positive? The World cup is approximately one month, and for one month the nation was on a high. Yes, it might last a little bit longer but experience says that it will fade at some point. I hope you are enjoying the summer and the events that have taken place around the village over the past few weeks. Good to see people out and about.

I am delighted to welcome Andrew Thomson to the PC and look forward to his contributions. I am glad to say that we did hold our last meeting on that 'night of football' for as a public meeting I felt we had to go ahead. However we only managed to miss about 20 minutes of the game in spite of a fairly long agenda.

Our Parish Clerk gives an excellent summary as to what is happening within the Parish Council and so I will not repeat the matters under consideration to any great length but just give an overview on a few topics.

You will have noticed a number of roadworks over the last few weeks, some of which we understand is partly due to Gigaclear laying their cable. The point I wish to raise is that the Parish Council is not informed in advance of any work being undertaken in the village. In future we are therefore going to ask for the relevant authority to let us know what they plan to do before they do it. Our next Parish Council is likely to be at the end of August which is different from that advertised but is due to individuals' availability and the need for us to keep in touch over the summer. Keep an eye and an ear out for that date where I hope to see as many of you as possible to hear what is happening in your village.

Call for local business support from Kemi Badenoch MP

Local Plan – how to submit your views

The latest version of the Draft Local Plan is at the final stage before the plan is submitted to the government for independent examination.

E.E.T.S.A. GREEN ENERGY WARNING

The East of England Trading Standards Association (EETSA) has seen an increase in the number of reports of "Green Energy" companies fraudulently targeting individuals, attempting to sell devices for their property, as well as maintenance contracts.

This has resulted in substantial financial losses to many consumers who have fallen victim to this fraud.

Examples

A resident is targeted by a solar energy company. The company may use one of the following tactics to engage with the resident:

- Advising that they have details of the consumer's solar panel system.
- Informing the resident that their solar panel supplier has ceased trading and the panels installed may be dangerous.
- Advising the resident that new legislation requires them to have a device installed, and failure to install it would mean the emergency services would not attend if the solar panels caused a fire.
- Implying that they have taken over from the original supplier and are offering a "free health check".
- Advising that the systems warranty may be expiring soon, including that for additional products such as their PIV device, or Inverters.

A sales visit is undertaken, and the resident is sold a device and / or maintenance contract for their system.

EETSA has seen a new trend of consumers being sold "positive input ventilation", or PIV device. This is a legitimate product, which extracts moisture from the loft space by pushing in dry air. These products are being sold at prices significantly above their list value, and may not be appropriate for all households.

Additionally, we have been alerted to potential misselling of Digital Solar Panel Inverters. Digital inverters are a legitimate product with the Solar Edge HD Wave being a leading brand. All solar panel installations need an inverter to transform DC energy from the solar panel into AC energy that can be used by the household.

It is believed the health check may be used as an attempt to mis-sell the consumer a digital inverter through false claims that their existing inverter is not functioning properly, is about to stop working, or that a new digital

inverter will save money. This is often accompanied by exaggerated claims of savings being made.

Another new method of operating for these companies is to offer maintenance contracts, possibly for as long as 20 years. These contracts are not insurance-backed, so are potentially of little value, and have no protection if the company ceases trading. In some instances, the trader is taking payment up-front for these contracts, rather than regular payments, with no service immediately provided.

Consumers with concerns about their solar panel system should contact the original installer. If the original installer has ceased to trade the system may still be covered under warranty provided by an insurance backed scheme. Consumers should check

the paperwork they have in connection to the installation.

PREVENTION ADVICE

- Never sign on the spot and check the identity of the caller.
- Be wary of special offers, maintenance contracts, and warnings about your home.
- Contact your original installer to confirm any information supplied about their current trading status and warrantees you already hold.
- Never pay up front, and don't pay by cash. Pay with a cheque (which can be traced if necessary) or if the service or goods cost more than £100 then use a credit card as this offers extra protection.
- You have 14 days to cancel the agreement. If you cancel, any monies that you have paid should be returned to you.
- The trader must give you a written notice of your cancellation rights when you agree the contract. If the trader doesn't provide you with this information, *they commit a criminal offence*.
- The trader can only carry out work within this cancellation period if you have given your agreement in writing. Do not feel pressured into signing a document allowing the installation to be undertaken immediately.
- If you have been contacted by a company that you have concerns about, contact Citizens Advice Consumer Service on **03454 040506**.

Chapter VI - conclusion

Work on the interior of the pavilion was begun (1979), with battening for panelling, plastering of dressing rooms etc, and was to continue well into 1980. Water and power being the next essentials, the electrical work being done by a member's son, thereby saving a sum of money. The Club benefitted from the will of an ex member (Mr G Baltrop) of £100.

The furnishing of the interior was now a subject under discussion. Carpet through one of the members (G King) through his Company, Lancashire Carpets, was purchased for the sum of £350 to cover the lounge. Further offers of carpet from the Chairman's (S How) Company (Nat-West) were made to the Club, and accepted. When it was delivered and laid (a splendid one as can be imagined, coming from the Bank's Headquarters) some three sections were left over. There is a story concerning these. Going into the Coach and Horses, a committee member remarked on the state of the carpets, and mentioned the availability of some excellent floor covering. The publican was duly impressed and bought the aforesaid carpet for £300, which found its way back into the Club's funds. When the publican moved to another hostelry, he took the carpet with him. Today if you visit the Chequers Inn, you will see that self same carpet adorning that floor.

The National Coaching scheme was also introduced into the Club. Gordon Dickson, Doug Alcock, Derek Rayment, taking and passing the instruction course.

Trumans in making their offer of £750 linked it with the proviso that the Club was to sell at least 45 barrels of beer a year, a figure unlikely to have been reached. To their credit the Brewers did not enforce it, but until repayment was completed, as stated previously, a lien on the furniture was obtained.

With the completion of the Pavilion and car park, the old one was dismantled, moved to another site and part rebuilt for the tools and machinery. Conifers were planted around the Park. With new tables, chairs the Pavilion was at last becoming alive. An entertainments committee was formed to use the Club through the winter months, and to keep the spirit alive.

A new rink was also being thought of, to bring a full six rinker into play, to be laid down on the west side, where the old pavilion was situated. This was to begin later in the year of '80, and indeed '81 opened with working parties preparing the ground. Despite the weather, clinker ash, top soil, drainage and levelling had been complete early, grass seed applied, and before June of that year germinated.

A formal opening of the Pavilion WAS now planned to coincide with the 50 years of the Club's existence, during I982. Dignitaries from the Bowling world were being asked to officiate, with the President of the English Bowling Assn. the principal guest. With the Brewers Truman involved in the financial support for the Building, it was felt that a special day in the Club's calendar should be allocated for competition, and it was hoped a trophy would be presented by them. As Doug Alcock had been the principal negotiator with them, he was given the task of organiser. This he did successfully, and today this event figures large as a red letter, involving as it does, invited members from selected clubs competing for the trophy.

In June of the year repayments of the loans made by members began, and it is to the Club's credit that all the money was returned in a very short period.

The green committee at this period was headed by H Rider (a specialist on greens) ably assisted by Jesse Wool]ard, and Brian Thorn carrying out the work requirements. New drains were being laid during the close season to afford quicker release of surface water, and to bring the square and surround up to a peak condition for what was to be a memorable season.

At the AGM it was disclosed that the EBA President was to officially open the Pavilion, with games arranged on the day, and further games with the Essex County Bowling Assn, also in celebration. The Ladies two-wood singles were also to be an attraction. Heady times indeed were coming, Jubilee pieces had been acquired for distribution. I record the composition of the Officers elected in that Golden Jubilee year of 1982.

The year I982 opened rather quietly, with bad weather limiting activities. The bank on the east side was lowered and railway sleepers used for restraint. The final touches to the new pavilion were completed with insulation to part of roof space. The attendance at the Annual Dinner was disappointing, only 69 places taken. For the official opening a plaque commemorating the event was to be placed, within the Pavilion, and the local Observer asked to cover the big day.

Both days taken for the Opening Ceremony turned out well, the games played successfully and everyone in high spirits. To mark this very special occasion in the Clubs history, and to honour the President Gordon Dickson, his photograph was placed alongside the Golden Jubilee plaque adorning the inside wall of the Pavilion. The remainder of that year must have been an anticlimax after many years of toil, but matches were played, greens looked after, events organised, and the business of the Quendon Bowling Club carried on by the elected officers.

Retiring from office at the year's end, Gordon Dickson, along with Stuart Ennals, and Harold Clayden, were made Honorary Life Members as a mark of respect for the devotion shown in the Club's interest over many years.

It should also be recorded the work of the small force of volunteers who gave three years of their lives in the building of the Pavilion and attendant works, and sacrifices in their home lives. I refer to: Gordon Dickson, Harold Norgett, R Wright, Doug Alcock, Derek Rayment, W Ratcliffe, Len Weare, Grace Peasly, Gladys Weare, the last two names for the supply of sustenance daily.

In closing the History, it is the people gone before, that make a Club by their example and it is to those that follow that the Club must trust to emulate and if possible surpass in endeavour.

We'll be running a village apple pressing day later in the year (in early October) but if you want to press some juice before that please get in touch.



Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

New Homes Bonus

The best thing about being a district councillor is that we have cash to give away to good causes in the Ward, this year £2000 per councillor. Last financial year contributions were made to youth and sports groups and facilities throughout the ward, and to both primary schools. We helped fund repairs to Widdington children's playground, Quendon Village Hall, and to support the Winstanley Celebrations. (If you missed this one, Winstanley is credited with saving Christmas by keeping festivities going when Cromwell banned everything that might possibly be fun). We are now open to requests for this year's spend

<u>Neighbourhood Plan</u>

The consultation on the draft 'regulation 14' Plan finished in June. We had 11 responses from residents and local business owners, 15 responses from statutory bodies, and 9 responses from landowners and developers. The list of 'statutory bodies', and landowners known to have an interest in the plan area, was supplied largely from UDC and was about 75 contacts. It includes all local parish councils, utility providers, Historic England, Sport England, the Environment Agency and local organisations such as schools, youth groups, and churches. The two key consultees are UDC and Essex County Council.

The Steering group has been going through the responses and we are meeting first with UDC this month (July) to go through with them our responses to their responses. On consultations, for example on the Local Plan, it is typically residents' comments being 'noted' by UDC. It is quite interesting to be in the opposite situation!

All the consultation responses received will be published, as will the steering group's consideration of them and resulting adjustments. The documentation will all be seen by the Inspector who will review the final version of the Plan

Not surprisingly a developer with a major application recently refused, but still within time for appeal, and another one with a large application awaiting determination (both Newport), are critical of any aspect which might make their applications less acceptable.

These will nevertheless be fully responded to, and it is very useful to have the arguments presented as it allows us to fine tune policies to make them clearer. We have found from attending a Planning Appeal for a Newport site that wording which is obvious to those who wrote it, can be 'interpreted' by a barrister, who has only to create uncertainty to get an Inspector to put little weight on the policy.

Speed limits

Anthony put in a full application to Essex Highways at the end of last year to extend the speed limit south of Quendon (and also north of Newport where the new, and very successful, affordable houses are, opposite Shortgrove). This has been chased at various times but it has been most useful to receive the recent emails from concerned residents of the Cala developments. Anthony has compiled these into a further chase to the Essex Highways projects officer. Extending the Quendon limit should have been a condition of the planning permissions and paid for by Cala. In order to make sure this doesn't happen again we included a policy in the Neighbourhood Plan:

'Policy TR1 Extension of speed limits and footways


Further ribbon development along the B1383, and outside into the Cam valley is not supported. However, should applications still be considered, the following requirements will apply for the safety and amenity of residents of, and visitors to, new developments:

- 1. Developments are to provide, or fund, safe footways connecting into the settlements. These may be alongside roads, or preferably on the inside of developments, connecting to existing footways
- Extensions of speed limits are to be funded by developments where their vehicle access is near to, or outside of, the 30 mph boundary, as agreed with Essex Highways. Footways along roads outside of the 30 mph limits will also be a reason for extending speed limits'

A recurring theme in the Neighbourhood Plan is policies seeking to fix weaknesses that residents have seen in how things are currently done, or in this case not done.

Water supplies

Maybe by the time this is published we will have some rain. But the good news is that although our aquifer water supplies are normally a matter of concern, as the aquifers are not filled during the summer the drought doesn't make much difference to our supplies. For info here is the latest chart of rainfall from Affinity Water



June hasn't been missed out – there just wasn't any rain. What is of concern is that the Local Plan, just moved to the next stage, is 'supported' by a voluminous Water Cycle Study which says, without further explanation, that the extra 2.5m tonnes a year which will be needed may come from 'the West'! We are not informed as to whether The West has been consulted, or indeed may be building thousands of houses itself and not in any mood to pass on its precious resources.

Councillors Surgeries

We are available every Thursday morning from 10.30 to 11.30 in Dorrington's in Newport and we take turns to attend the parish council meetings in the Village Hall. We are also active on the two main village Facebook groups.
