

This month's message from the Chairman of the Parish Council

I'm going to concentrate on a single issue this time, mostly because you're probably not going to like it.

I have been Chairman for nearly eight years now and as you know I intend to leave the PC in May. During this time I've been proud to be able to say that the PC has never increased the precept. That is, the amount of money we take from your council tax, which funds the 'running' of the village. We discussed the possible need to make a small increase last year but decided against it. However, this year, UDC have stated that they will no longer pay a grant to PCs in the district which for us, amounted to about £500. We will of course have a number of new households in the village when both The Pavillions (Foxley House) and Ventnor Lodge are completed and fully occupied, but the additional tax from those residents will barely offset the loss of the grant.

So we have decided that we will increase the precept this year by 4%. So for every £1000 we pay in council tax, an increase of £40 per year, or £3.33 per month. I hope you will understand that after eight years or more without an increase, and with costs consistently rising, we are now forced into a situation in order to maintain our work.

I'm sure my successor(s) will do their best not to make further increases for as long as they can.

Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

Stansted Airport expansion

The airport owner, Manchester Airport Group (MAG), is about to apply for permission to increase the cap on passengers from 35m per year to 43m. Current throughput is 26m. However, they are not applying for an increase in the number of flights, which are capped at 274,000 a year and currently running at 181,000. The application will come to the Planning Committee, on which Anthony is a substitute if one of the three R4U members cannot attend.

UDC councillors recently had a presentation from the airport management team, including the chief executive Ken O'Toole (who is ex Ryanair). They said that the single runway is not the limiting factor, but rather the terminal buildings. However, they already have permission to build a new arrivals terminal, which will be between the current one and the Radisson, and the current terminal will become departures only.

Although we might think that the airport is a major revenue source for the council and the district, its financial benefit mostly goes elsewhere. MAG is owned by the ten boroughs making up Greater Manchester Council, and an Australian investment fund (why doesn't Uttlesford own it?!) and the council gets no profit or rent from the airport or any of the businesses located in the airport zone. Although the business rates are very substantial and UDC should get 40% of them, the government decrees that we don't need the funding and takes most of it to itself.

The total business rates from the district are £43.6m, of which UDC should keep £16.7m. A major part of this is airport, or airport related. However, the council only receives £2.8m after the extra deduction, and this includes all the other business rates from the district.

UDC is responsible for collecting all business rates, for which it receives a fee, but if there is a collection problem, 100% of legal and enforcement cost falls on UDC despite only receiving 6.5% of the takings

MAG employs about 11,000 staff at Stansted of which only 2,000 live in Uttlesford.

Questions raised by councillors included (approximate answers in brackets):

- Large and irritating pick up and drop off charges (*people pay them whatever, and it keeps the cost charged to airlines down*)
- Airport parking in the surrounding area (*more car parks being built, but nothing they can do and even if charges were much reduced some people will do anything to avoid paying*)
- Poor transport to the rest of Uttlesford - concentration on London links, part of the reason so few of our residents work there (*Not much of an answer. They didn't know that our villages have no direct public transport to the airport, and that our train service was degraded to give more paths to the Stansted Express, and is slower than 20 years ago*)
- Water supplies – the Environment Agency say their application will be 'unsound' if they cannot show where the extra water will come from without further damage, also a big issue for the Local Plan (*they are preparing a plan!*)
- Flying over villages (*they use a system called Performance Based Navigation to reduce this, although I don't think residents of Thaxted would agree as Ryanair and Easyjet skim right over their grade 1 church in an endless line all day long*)

There were lots of positives, including quieter, more fuel-efficient aircraft, more flights to useful places, buildings

with lower power consumption, and using renewable energy, and the path of a potential railway extension (back to) Dunmow has been protected. And they say they will get rid of the cosmetics 'walkways' that we are forced to go through on arrival and departure!

Overall a very professional presentation.

Neighbourhood Plan

One of the objectives is to lobby for and if possible enforce the provision of services and infrastructure. To this end, members of the Steering Group met with one of the Newport surgery joint practice managers and one of the GP partners in July. At that point they said they were unaware of the major housing expansion going on in Newport and surrounding catchment, and had no plan. The good news is that after further discussion and reference to the West Essex Care Commissioning Group, we now have confirmation that they will restructure the existing building to create three more consulting rooms and can, if needed, extend the admin area.


Speed limit and highways matters

We have a long list of Highways projects matters which we chase, and sometimes resolve. These include Anthony's application to have the Quendon 30 limit extended further south. The latest response on this is 'This is currently going through the validation process so at this stage I do not have a definitive answer as to if this will meet the Essex Speed Management Strategy to be able to proceed.'

And the on the white dot proposal for Waterbutt Row, as at 15th January the Highways officer has the outcome of the validation but hasn't looked at it yet, but says she will do so shortly. Will keep you posted! These have been

successful in Thaxted and we have asked for the same in various parts of Newport, in particular where commuter parking blocks the pavements. They have no legal status, but drivers generally respect them, and it gives for example the Parish Council a stronger right to put polite notes on windscreens. The intention is if successful the dots are replaced by metal studs.

QUENDON BOWLING CLUB a History - continued

CHAPTER IIa. A Faint Stirring.

After the successful "Opening Ceremony", and for the rest of the limited season, bowling carried on with friendly matches against local sides anxious to test the new green and the strength of the Club. Work however continued on the surrounds, and the entrance to the green. Two meetings were held later that year of '37, at which tournaments were fixed for the following season, exclusive to the membership. A beaker (on display in the clubhouse) was provided by Mr Fere, being the first cup ever played for, to be competed for on a knockout basis, the winner's name being inscribed on the vessel.

Of interest is that a sum of £2 was provided so that one of the members should roll and cut the green during the season. The Club's accounts would be put on display on the village notice boards for all to see. Any further financial help would be forthcoming from the more

prosperous members of the committee.

A blow to the Club during 1938 was the departure of Mr Frere, most certainly the guiding light to the club's existence and fortune. His place as Chairman being taken by Mr Baer, whilst not a bowler, a man of considerable standing in the village.

Games were successfully arranged during this first full year, and the standard of bowling much improved. Transport to the away matches was provided for by Messrs Mumford, Walters and Wilson in, I suspect, trades-men's vans.

Funds were still being raised by the odd concert usually by Mr. Walters, but not enough capital, for the much needed huts for changing and storage. Appeals were made for an increase in membership, as not all rinks were in use, and sadly the ladies of the villages had not taken

up the invitation to play on the rinks at this time. However enough money was found to purchase the local Scouts' hut from the Rev. Milne at an agreed price of £5.10/-, but difficulties in transporting the hut to the green became a problem. However a contract was entered into with a Mr Lewis-Smith to remove and re-erect the hut at the entrance (as was then) to the green, now north end of rink 1. The time was July 1939, and with the war imminent, the transfer was not completed until early 1940. The outbreak of hostilities was causing the fortunes of the Club to diminish, the membership in decline, and the work on the green being neglected. The small committee responded however (Mr Tinney and Mr Middleton retiring) and more concerts were set up, all the work on the green re-allocated, the surrounds planted and weeded, and life restored. It says much for them, of their love of the Club and bowling, and for the trust placed, on them by the members.

Because of the war, over a year was to lapse before another meeting was called in January 1941 to solve yet another crisis. Only three members were present at what must have been the very nadir of the Clubs fortunes. They were broke and in debt to the Income Tax Dept. The intrepid fund raiser Mr. Walters arranged two social events, and organised the talent available, to yet again solve a cash crisis. This in time of war, when evacuees and the bombing of London was not too far away. The determination of that gallant committee showed itself when an application was made for a petrol ration to enable the mower to be used, someone travelling to Cambridge to obtain the documents. Sand for the green being paid for by the few members still serving the Club.

Throughout all this, much discussion centred on the needs of nature, and the erection of a toilet adjacent to the hut. A minute of a meeting held at the time recorded the fact that when some of the members ladies were present, the disappearing into the woods at regular intervals, by the men present led to some embarrassment. Galvanised sheeting was in the end erected at the end of the hut. The green was also causing concern, in that the cutting was not to the standard required, and some tools were beginning to be lost. The moss rake and its disappearance almost brought the local constabulary in to solve it. However our Chairman Mr. Mumford defused the situation by buying a new one. Mystery however deepened when the Clubs chairs acquired strangely from the church, were lost after being lent to a children's treat. From this time an annual inventory of all the Club's equipment was made. Also taken out was an insurance protecting the Club against a claim for anyone injured on the land and premises.

The number on the committee at this time was increased

to ten by the co-option of the Rev. Fletcher. Fixtures were still being honoured, but hospitality in the serving of the usual bread, tea and biscuits was a headache owing to rationing. Meetings were usually in the home of Mr Mumford, but becoming rare. Sadly only seven members were available to play for the Frere Trophy that year of 1942. Having so few members to attend the ground, signs of deterioration were becoming apparent. Fencing, posts falling apart and a general air of dilapidation. Mr. Mumford during this time became a tower of strength, as well as a source of extra revenue for the Club's needs. From this, the Hut became firmly established, and was being used for small gatherings. Attendance was poor, seldom reaching half a dozen. Games were only possible amongst these few, but even so, competitions were held, for 6d entry fee. Due to our stalwart few, who held a concert or whist drive, the finances were improving, and 1943 showed a sum of £2.5/4d, in the account, not an inconsiderable amount in the circumstances. Mr Mumford's offer of a loan to the Club if the need arose tells much of his affection and pride in his Chairmanship. A rise in the subscription was proposed to 7/6d, to enable the Club to employ a person to cut and roll the green. Our few members finding it hard work after a days toil. Proper facilities were still unresolved. Another of the Club's founders left during this year, Mr Cook being presented with a small cheque subscribed by our gallant band.

For the next year or so, whilst the war dragged on, no major problems arose, the upkeep of the ground and tending the green being uppermost. The "Kings Head" could have told some yarns about this period, with the war nearing its end. The erection at last of a men's urinal by our Mr Bradford, must have raised a cheer, but finances were again at a low ebb, being but 15/2d, and not enough to engrave the name of Mr. Levy on the Frere beaker. Fixtures however were being renewed against our local sides during '45/46. The fortunes were now beginning to improve with the return of the members, and reached a staggering balance of £10.2/10d, with the Hut now at last being fitted out. Our bowling vastly improved with Stansted being the only side to defeat us. The war being over and the membership at last rising, a more positive outlook was beginning to develop. Mr. Mumford however took a less active part in the Club's running, and stood down from the Committee. A tribute should be made at this point in the History to acknowledge the debt due to him for his efforts and generosity in keeping the Club alive during those difficult times. From January 1947 Mr Mullinder took over the Chairmanship, still under the Presidency of Sir William Foot-Mitchell.

The overall population of the Hundred Parishes increased by around 1% a year between the last two censuses, 2001 and 2011. As district councils finalise Local Plans for the next 15 years, generally catering for even faster population growth, there is concern that our familiar landscapes will undergo significant change.

We may be able to take comfort from the European Landscape Convention, to which the UK is a signatory. This encourages local authorities to introduce exemplary, long-lasting policies or measures to protect, manage and plan landscapes. The overall aim is to achieve sustainable landscapes that are as visually biodiverse and as culturally rich as possible, thus meeting society's social, economic and environmental needs.

The character of our villages and small towns and their setting within the wider landscape are fundamental aspects of what gives the Hundred Parishes its sense of

place. Responsibility for keeping it special is vested in our elected representatives.

I encourage you to observe, enjoy and perhaps photograph the seasonal changes within your surrounding countryside. Sown crops germinate, flourish and are harvested. Trees mature or are felled. Fresh leaves soften bare twigs in spring and fall again in autumn. This cyclical rhythm has inspired many local, notable artists and examples of their work can be viewed in the Fry Art Gallery in Saffron Walden.

The Gallery traditionally closes for the winter months, but this year there is an exhibition at Fry Art Gallery Too, located next to the main entrance gates of Saffron Walden Museum, in Museum Street, Saffron Walden. Gallery Too is open until 25th March 2018 on Saturdays from 11am to 5pm and Sundays from 2.15pm to 5pm. The Museum is always worth another visit. Winter opening times are 10am to 4:30pm Tuesdays to Saturdays and 2pm to 4:30pm on Sundays. **Tricia Moxey, Trustee**
