

# From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

B ack in 1964 Bob Dylan sung The Times They Are A-Changing. To be honest I've never even heard the song in its entirety, but it just so happens to be completely relevant to all of this month. Because the times are indeed changing. Service times that is.

From the 1st Sunday in May (6th) the service times across the whole of the benefice for which I am responsible change, and the full details of those service times can be found elsewhere within this edition of The Link. The result is that our main services in Quendon & Rickling churches that take place on the 2nd & 4th Sundays of each month – these services will now begin at 11.00am. Please do not turn up expecting a service at 9.30am, because I shall be in the Newport and it is unlikely that churchwardens will not be there that early either.

I know that when I first took on the parish of Quendon & Rickling back in 2013 the service times did start later, but at that time I took the decision to run them earlier. It may be that some people felt that they were not able to get to church that early. I am hoping that a later start time might make it easier for people to come to the services. Services should still be able to finish by 12 o'clock of just after, so that families' lunch is unaffected, although I'm aware that a lot of people have their main Sunday meal in the evening these days.

This is your church, and the change of service times is our way of making it easier for people to attend their church – their local church. I look forward to being able to welcome you into the church for the services at their new start time of 11.00am. God bless.

#### **Quendon Churchyard**

#### **Contact details for local Police**

Essex Police operate through Local Policing Hubs, and it is not possible to contact individual members of that team for day-to-day activities.

The recommended procedure is to contact the police using the 101 service (if 999 is not appropriate, i.e. for non-emergency situations). Calls to the 101 Centre will determine how to respond and, where appropriate, this will be passed to either Response Officers or members of the Local Policing Hub.



#### **Quendon & Rickling Parish Council News**

#### General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)

There's a phrase which trips off the tongue. What does it mean and why is it relevant to me, you may well ask? After all, data protection legislation has been around for years. Certainly since the 90's. In fact there is good reason for introducing new rules. First the technical bit. The legislation comes into force on 25th May this year, and all organisations which store personal data (and that includes parish councils) must have procedures in place to adhere to these new regulations. Your parish council has to appoint a Data Protection Officer (DPO) whose job it will be to ensure that the parish council follows the new procedures correctly.

OK, so what has changed and why do we need new rules? Remember those innocent early days of the internet and the recently-created World Wide Web? What a fantastic resource for finding out just about anything and from the comfort of your own home. And as for "electronic mail". Wow, what an innovation that was. But the thought of buying anything "on line". Well, I don't think so, thank you very much. A few brave souls may have risked it but for most of us sensible types, this was a step too far. Fast forward 20 years and everyone and their dog regularly buys products and services on line. And here's the rub. Every time you make an online purchase some very clever software is churning away in the background collecting your personal data and storing it on vast computer servers. Next thing you know you are inundated with offers for similar products or services. That data from your purchase is passed on, pretty well instantaneously, to marketing organisations around the world so they can target you with those offers. Data mining it's called, which is quite apt as "data" is apparently the new oil. We are talking billions of pounds here. 20- year old legislation just cannot cope with this explosion of online shopping. So, we arrive at the reason for GDPR. (Incidentally, although this is EU legislation, our leaving the EU will not nullify the regulations. The UK government is committed to introducing GDPR, Brexit or no Brexit).

From **24th May 2018** all organisations which have personal data will have to be sure that the data they hold is accurate and explain the lawful basis for processing that data. You will have the right to access any data being stored about you. If you ask for the data to be removed, it has to happen. No excuses. That website that you subscribed to, which is for ever sending you purchasing opportunities? They will have to make it as easy to unsubscribe as was to subscribe in the first place. And your data cannot be sold on without your permission. There are many other rights, too many to list here, but there is plenty of information available on line.

You have probably realised by now who this legislation is aimed at. Not really small village parish councils but social media, the big selling websites and similar. The bottom line is this. The new legislation will affect all of us who use the internet for buying, communicating or just plain browsing. I don't suppose for a moment that the barrage of marketing approaches will cease overnight but it has to be a move in the right direction. So GDPR is an acronym to be welcomed.

#### Litter Pick

What a caring village you have. I am reliably informed that about 20 villagers attended the recent litter picking, collecting a shed load of rubbish. Altogether a very successful operation.

#### Street lighting

If you notice any street lights not working, please contact the Parish Clerk who will be happy to make the necessary arrangements to get them repaired. Enquires are still ongoing with a view to replacing the existing lights with more modern led alternatives.

#### Trees, hedges and power pylons

If you have a tree or hedge which needs trimming but is next to an electricity pylon you would have understandable concerns about taking your loppers or pruning shears anywhere near electricity cables. Particularly when you see those signs "Danger of Death"! You will be pleased to learn therefore that UK Power is responsible not only for the pylons but also for clearing any vegetation around them. So, don't take any chances. If you do have hedging or trees adjacent to said pylons, contact UK Power.

#### **Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves**

#### **Planning Applications**

For information, elsewhere in the Ward, Newport now has planning applications awaiting decision on a further 250 houses. These are 150 to the south of Wicken Rd, 74 to the north of Wicken Road, 24 by the Joyce Frankland Academy (JFA) cricket ground. There is also an application for 20 houses behind the Fleur pub in Widdington. Although this would have no direct impact on Quendon & Rickling it would add to the traffic. The air quality in Newport is monitored and the centre has the NO2 level, which is traffic pollution, is already at illegal levels even before most of the many houses already permitted have been built. To give you an idea what the village is up against, the Traffic Assessment for the largest application says there are currently no peak time traffic queues in Newport, and Essex Highways, despite overwhelming evidence to the contrary, have agreed with them.

JFA has started a year group expansion this school year, so it is possible that the current catchment area will not

shrink, although as Essex have invented the fantasy that the County High and Newport are the same school for the purpose of claiming there are enough places, it is very likely that overspill from the new housing in Walden will come to JFA.

#### <u>Neighbourhood Plan</u>

A draft of the Plan is with the parish councils for their comment, and we hope outline approval, which Newport PC has already given. It has been reviewed twice by a planning consultant and the Steering Group are working through various recommended changes. It is about 100 pages and contains quite a bit of planning speak. This is because every policy has to be evidenced, and it must show conformity with the draft Local Plan and the National Planning Policy Framework

The next stage is a consultation on the draft, referred to as 'regulation 14', so that residents, businesses, landowners, UDC and any other interested parties, can make comments. We intend to do this very shortly and the consultation will be open for 6 weeks. The Steering Group will then review all comments and make further adjustments as needed, after which it goes to 'regulation 15'. This includes a detailed inspection by the Planning Inspectorate. And following that it goes to a referendum of the voters in the villages Of particular note for Quendon is the Foxley House site allocation for up to 19 houses which you may have seen in the consultation for the UDC Local Plan. We have been strongly advised that Neighbourhood Plans with site allocations carry more weight than negative ones which seek to stop all development. This site is in the draft Local Plan so we are not allowed to exclude it. But having it in our plan as a site allocation loses nothing, but gains more strength for the Plan to resist other sites which may be unsuitable. The draft Neighbourhood Plan does however add significant conditions as to how it might be developed, and also has other general policies requiring, for example, footways to be provided and speed limits to be extended where relevant. To be done and paid for out of developments, as should have been added by UDC as conditions on the other Cala site permissions.

#### THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

The Church Monuments Society, a registered charity founded in 1979, encourages the study, care and conservation of funerary monuments.

Many of our own local churches have elaborate memorials, usually to the rich and famous, erected over the centuries to honour and remember the deceased. I will mention just a few of my own personal favourites.



St Mary the Virgin in Arkesden has an elaborate and colourful Elizabethan monument to Richard Cutte who died in 1592 and his wife Marye.

At Little Easton, the church

contains a great variety of interesting memorials including a charming 20th-century bust of the Countess



of Warwick and two windows dedicated to the American air crews who flew from Little Easton and lost their lives during WWII.

Little Dunmow church has a memorial that is not named but is believed to depict Matilda, the daughter of Robert FitzWalter, one of the Magna Carta barons. Legend has it that she inspired the character of Maid Marian in the stories of Robin Hood.

Great Waltham's Norman church houses a memorial to

Sir Anthony Everard and his wife who died early in the 17th century. They are depicted in elaborate costumes with gold braid.

The parish church of Great St Mary in Sawbridgeworth is Grade I listed and the listing narrative states it has "an outstanding collection of memorials of the highest artistic quality". One such is the painted alabaster tomb of Sir John





Leventhorpe and his wife Joan in black mourning dress.

If you can't get to these particular churches, photos of most of the monuments mentioned here will appear in the forthcoming book to be published by the Hundred Parishes Society. In the meantime, I encourage you to explore our many wonderful churches where more fascinating and varied monuments are waiting to be found.



#### **Afffinity Water Report**

#### Partial recovery of groundwater but risk of restrictions remain later this year

We have welcomed the rain in March, which has been significantly above the long term average.

We have continued to see a partial recovery in our groundwater sources and restrictions will not need to be introduced this spring.



However, our groundwater sources are still slightly below average due to the overall below average rainfall of the last two autumn and winter recharge periods.

Groundwater is only replenished from rainfall during autumn and winter, when there is less plant growth and evaporation. October to March is the critical recharge period when rainfall is expected to reach the aquifers (porous rock where groundwater is stored), which are used for 60% of supplies.

The possibility of restrictions later on in the year remain in place and this will be dependent on the demand for water, particularly if demand is higher than usual over the spring and summer.

Even though the recent rainfall has been water wisely. If we all save a little, we all

good for our groundwater sources, it's important that we all continue to use water wisely. If we all save a little, we all save a lot.

While we continue to undertake significant investment in infrastructure and drive down leakage in our network, we also need our customers to change how they view, and use water to help manage the situation, and as a key stakeholder you also have an important role to play.

#### Draft Water Resources Management Plan

We have recently published our Draft Water Resources Management Plan, which describes how much water is going to be needed by our customers and how we will meet this need in the years ahead between 2020 and 2080.

Our plan considers both current and future customers' demand for water and looks at the amount of water that is available, whilst considering the impact of factors such as climate change and drought.

With a rising population and some of the highest water use in the country, we are addressing the challenges of serving customers in an area the Government has designated as being under serious water stress.

Our public consultation is open to customers and stakeholders until the 23 May 2018.

Improvements were being carried out by the members to the surrounds, an earth moving machine lent by H Clayden was kept busy on clearing the shrubs and levelling the ground. The road being made good with rejected material from the Highways Dept, with hoggin. It transpired however that the road now private the Council could give no further help. Meanwhile fencing on the roadside and the woodside is completed. The employment of a groundsman is solved by Hubby Salmon who took over the job for the fee of £5 per month.

In adopting the motion for the Pavilion to remain in its present position, plans were drawn up by Mr. Emerson to be submitted to the R.D.C. planning committee for approval. A new drainage system, plus work by Mr Bradford in new flooring and roofing, locker rooms was completed. The Ladies Section again were able to purchase tables, chairs, crockery, and other utensils for the further improvement of the Club. Extensions to the Pavilion, electric lights, new plumbing were all to be completed. A fruit machine was installed to help in the drive for finance.

Under the drive of Chairman Gordon Dickson, a new rink (now 6) was being dug out, drainage prepared on the best advice, clinker, top soil all supplied free by associates and friends of the Club. The work as always under the command of our Col. and carried out in great enthusiasm by our co-opted members.

With all this activity around, Quendon Bowling Club was breaking out from its slumber and its faltering steps, turned into a purposeful stride.

#### CHAPTER IV.

#### Consolidation.

With the guidance of the Chairman Gordon D, and his strong committee, plans were formulated for projects to commence in the years 1965/67. This was an exciting

time for the members, with all the activity surrounding them. As was usual the plans for the extensions, and improvements needing R.D.C. approval were very slow. In the meantime grants from various bodies were being applied for. The Essex County Education Authority being one. By the years end, planning permission had been granted and an estimate by the builder of £423-10-0 was accepted.

Work meanwhile was progressing on the new rink, with working parties set up by the Col. Simpson with a schedule that was to be carried out over the winter months.

The newly installed fruit machine was like a new toy, and in its first month produced a large amount of £19-10-0, 60% being retained in the Club.

Of interest is the fact, that the Club was always represented on the Village Hall Committee, and visaversa if someone of either village was a Club member, preserving the interest of Rickling and Quendon.

The new rink was beginning to take shape with the completion of drainage, clinker, topsoil and levelling. Seeding was to take place in Sept. This had been a tremendous achievement, and a back breaking task by those members involved, who were justly proud. It was known by all as the Gordon Dickson rink, a pointer to his fore-sightedness.

The grant was now in further delay due to the formulation of new plans, mainly sanitation requirements from the Authority, and a shock that a tax of £75 was imposed by the Inland Revenue on the fruit machine installation, which the said machine being promptly returned. However the Bar accounts now showed a healthy impressive surplus under the care of the Rayments.

With the death of Sir Arthur Ellis a new era was beginning with the election to the Presidency of the redoubtable Col Simpson, who by all accounts gave the Club his time and advice on many occasions, working principally on the green, and presenting any items when needed. It should be remembered that the original green was in the gift of Sir Arthur.

On the bowling side the Quendon club was not yet in the top flight, the latest seasons results being 10 won and 19 lost. The Captain's report of that year spoke of an increase in the standard of play, and hoped for more entries into County competitions to improve ones game, and the status of the Club.

The surrounds of the green were being improved with the introduction of two dozen rose bushes (Frensham floribundas) a gift from the membership, showing the spirit within the Club.

With alterations to the original plan, the cost had risen to

some £300 above estimate, but hopefully with the expected grant, work should commence in March of '67. Some problems were being experienced with the Grant, and the local MP Mr Peter Kirk was approached to lobby the appropriate Dept. This was successfully achieved, for the grant of £343 was confirmed by D.O.E. The question of raising the £687 was overcome by the Bank making a loan of some £500, being given a forecast of the Clubs income for the year, and G Dickson, W Barham, and S Ennals acting as guarantors, with Col Simpson guarantor to a further £200 by the Playing Fields Assn, the finances for the extensions were assured. Building work by Mr Dix began in early April. Toilets were once again difficult with sharing by Ladies and Gents. A voice at a subsequent meeting was heard to declare the suitability of Quendon Wood.

Throughout the summer, work on the new extensions, and groundwork continued, with the pleasing thought by the men that the Bar was to be built adjacent to the Gents changing rooms. Mr Dix completing the work in early August.

During the building work, the beer, wines and spirits were stored in the establishment of Mr Ray Collard, he and others having to wheelbarrow the necessities on match days. It must have been great fun.

The indomitable Mrs Peasly again with the Ladies committee raised further funds to help with the heavy expenditure demanded by the building programme. Extra funding from various bodies was being asked for, with Col Simpson again acting as guarantor.

Bringing to a condition for play the new rink was being carefully tended by Hubby Salmon weeding by hand.

Sadly, however, with all the traffic of building work, the green had been declared unfit for County matches. It was then decided to move the marks by 4'6", doing away with rink 4 for the time being. This was done and towards the end of the season the green had returned to its excellent condition, which warranted a remark from those experts Fisons, that the green was now one of the best in the Group.

With the completion of the Pavilion the A.G.M. took place after the cutting of the ribbon and presentations of bouquets to the wives of the E.B.A. officials who attended the ceremony. Many gifts were received to mark the event, including 40 dinner plates, electric cooker, shelf lights optics, by the Chairman, and other sundry items. So ended another major project by this fine committee.

The roadway into the green had suffered rather badly, and was in a state of mud and slush, despite the attention given it by the club. It was decided to write to the Farm Manager, Mr Mott, at Quendon Hall Estate, and to the owners of Woodmans Cottage, to share in the cost of work and material to improve the entrances. This was forthcoming, and a donation of £5 and £2-10-0 was made respectively, with the remaining cost of IO/- being made by the club. Further problems arose in the shape of moles, and two were eventually caught by the greenkeeper. Expert advice from Mr Hyatt, a professional greenkeeper to improve the green was sought, and his eradication of the bare patches did much to make for better bowling. The playing side were now beginning to show their worth, entering for the Widdop Cup, and nominating members for Ashford Cup trials, our Chairman being selected for the Vice-presidents Assn game. Entries for the Mackeson and Gold Cups were also made. Mr G K King the Captain was selected for the County trials.

A minute of a meeting is worth recording, in that, the entrance to the green was "more in keeping with a hen run than to one of the most enterprising clubs in N.W. Essex". A wooden paled gate was immediately erected by the members.

The President Col Simpson, on a proposal by the Chairman Gordon Dickson, was to be honoured by a photograph of himself, being placed in a prominent position within the Club. The Colonel himself provided the photograph, which to this day adorns the Club wall.

Another interesting feature was the introduction of a club flag in the clubs colours. It was made by H.M. Transport cable ship "Monarch", the hand of Gordon D almost certainly behind this, with his contacts.

A new fruit machine made an appearance, and was showing some profit, with the Company-supplying the machine paying the tax.

Sadly this was the year, 1969, of the tragic death of the President Col Simpson, run down in thick fog whilst walking home from the club late in the evening. This history shows the tremendous amount of effort, monies, gifts, he gave the Club, which to-day owes much of its existence to him personally. A tribute to him was made at the next A.G.M. by the Chairman, who in deference, since that tragic day, and in accordance with the wishes of the committee, had not elected a new President.

The Club's finances were coming under the scrutiny of Bob How whose expert advice and professionalism was sought. Previously all monies were either in a current bank account, some cash, and a small balance in the Post Office. Surplus money was now to placed on deposit thereby gaining interest. We must bear in mind, however, that the drive forward was being propelled most vigorously by the Chairman and his committee, along with the Ladies Section prominent in drawing money into the club, thereby creating a sub-stantial surplus. A healthy state that exists to this day. When you consider also that over £1000 was passing through the Bar account, the Club was intent for success.

cold drinks and catch up on the stories of the day, golf never disappoints on this front with trees, hazards and deep rough waiting for those who cannot stay on the fairways.


