S o the new year will soon be upon us. 2019 is on its way. It'll be out with the old and in with the new. I wonder how many of you actually go about setting yourselves any new year resolutions. Personally I think that they are a lost cause. You shouldn't have to wait until the new year to start exercising or eating more healthily, they can be introduced at any time of the year. It just, somehow, seems more appropriate to think about doing it at the start of the new year. Why?

I believe it is about the word 'new'. 'New' means something exciting. 'New' means something that may be different. Minutes not hours

It is very gratifying to see several residents turning up for the monthly parish council meetings. Shows you care. Perhaps a word then about the minutes which the parish clerk produces after each meeting. One of the thoughts which is drummed into us clerks who sit for the Certificate of Local Council Administration (CiLCA) is brevity of minutes. Their mantra is "Minutes not Hours". When an item is on the agenda for a decision, it does not matter how long the discussion goes on for, or who said what. The only entry the clerk is required to make is the actual decision. So if you have sat in at meeting in which, for example, there is a new policy document up for adoption, it does not matter that the discussion went on for 20 minutes. All that the clerk records is whether the policy was adopted or not. A simple "Policy was adopted" or "Policy was not adopted" is all that is required. It may seem that the minutes do not seem to reflect the different opinions but the minutes are there just to record decisions, not what leads up to them.

Public Participation at Parish Council meetings

Quendon and Rickling PC takes a relaxed view on public participation. Some councils limit the time allocated but Q&R takes the view that that if a resident has made the effort to show up at a monthly meeting then there should be no restriction on time allotted for any contribution they wish to make, or when they wish to contribute. There is however a rule says that unless the item raised is already on the agenda, it should not be discussed by the council and no decisions can be made. In reality a Q&R councillor may wish to make a, hopefully, helpful comment but that is about it. So if you raise a non-agenda issue at a meeting please do not be offended if the council does not take the matter further at that time. It can of course be added to an agenda for a future meeting if requested.

Broadband

So, it wasn't the Quendon moles who have been leaving the roadworks mess around the village. Apparently it was Gigaclear's contractors who managed to contract themselves out of business before finishing the work. However the contract has now been taken over and I believe remedial work is well in evidence.

In other news from the Parish Council meeting.....

There is interest being shown in the football pitch from potential users outside the village. Very soon therefore you may be seeing 22 men (or women) kicking around a bag of wind. Or is that Parliament?

The email list has been resurrected and your Parish Clerk has been tasked with sending to subscribers details of issues affecting the village which it is felt would be useful. This will understandably be a bit subjective but I will do my best to sort the wheat from the chaff.

About 10 villagers have so far expressed interest in the wheelie bin speed stickers, henceforth to be called "sticky bins".

pumps that once served a small local community. Many are listed.

In Ugley Green, beside a large puddingstone, stands a village pump that dates from around 1800 AD.

Westmill village in Hertfordshire has a pump, dating from about 1900. It stands on the village green and

carries the inscription "Traverse the desert and then you can tell what treasure exists in the cool deep well." This is an extract from a poem, Water, by Eliza Cook. The communal village pump at Pump Green, High Easter has been sensitively renovated, having been in use until the 1930s. It stands in the shade of a lime tree planted to commemorate the coronation of King George V in 1910.


A 19th-century pump stands in the road in the centre of Hunsdon's conservation area in front of 16th-century Pump House.

To commemorate Queen Victoria's Jubilee in 1887 the village pump was erected in Little Dunmow. It is now listed and is a fine example of Victorian design.

Thaxted and Great Dunmow have similar, rather grand, 19th-century pumps in prominent positions.

I have mentioned just a few of the many and varied examples. There are plenty more to be 'spotted' around our beautiful area, some in obvious public locations and others in private gardens.

Angela Bunster

It is with sadness that we record the death of Angela Bunster.

Angela and Ivor came to Quendon in 1985 and soon involved themselves in in village life. Angela was the Parish Clerk for many years and when Brian Smith was Chairman started The Village Forum; this parish magazine ran from 1991 to autumn 1997. She produced many of the articles and coerced the rest of us for 'copy'. After four years Brian become district councillor and Angela become the editor. During this time we had some wonderful Fetes on the Green with Angela doing a very impressive tombola. She and Ivor started the village barbecue in the rectory gardens, which grew to large barbecue occasions in the school grounds, and was involved with the wonderful Art Shows and Auction of promises held at Rickling Hall.

As clerk she tackled many village issues, the speed limit, Fountain Appeal, low cost housing, fighting contentious developers and starting the neighbourhood watch scheme.

Angela is immortalised in our millennium wall hanging as she completed Yew Tree Cottage in 2000.

The last few years have been difficult for Angela since Ivor died and she moved to be near her younger son two years ago. She was a vibrant, social and colourful character and a great asset to our village.

Here is an example of her contributions to The Forum.

As you may remember my having mentioned before, collecting copy for Forum is a difficult task. I never know how much I am going to be able to glean, or when. This is why issues of Forum tend to be thin on the ground and my initial good intentions of producing 3 editions annually have gone to the wall.

It is likely to be late September early October before this edition is delivered, when the Summer will be at an end, and the record-breaking temperatures just a memory. For many parents it will also mean that they will be returning their student sons/daughters to college. As a parent of a student son I now feel I could write a book on the art of student transportation. The collection of said son from university has provided his family with much retrospective hilarity - I say retrospective because nobody laughed at the time! I relate this tale in the hope that it may give a shred of comfort to others - you are not alone!

Angela Bunster continued

I never thought I would sink to bribing my son with money in order that he be in a state of readiness at the end of the semester. In spite of his penury we did not achieve this. We arrived - with the trailer - myself foolishly full of hope, my husband with an air of resignation (he is older and wiser than I and has been through this many, many times with his own four children!).

Most student accommodation is "basic", although it does start off relatively hygienic. Carpets tend to be elderly or very cheap as do the vacuum cleaners. This is not a good combination. It means that by the end of the year the vacuum cleaner sucks but gently and the carpet (which has been reduced to the consistency of a flannelette sheet, and has been impregnated with a variety of noxious substances) is highly resistant to being sucked, gently or otherwise.

Showers are for standing in and allowing warm water to trickle over your body until the hot-water tank is empty, they are most definitely not to be cleaned. Question to son: "*Why is the inside of the shower streaked grey and pink?*" Answer - patiently: "*When fungi dies that's the colour it goes for heaven's sake Mother*". My husband is heard to mutter that not even for money would he step inside the shower.

The bedroom is in an "interesting" state - only slightly more chaotic than usual. Student necessities, like the wax lamp (I can remember those in the late sixties and they are once again high fashion), the television, the PC, the stereo system, posters of ladies wearing very little but wet(!) T-shirts, a tangle of wires - probably a fire hazard - clothing (most of his entire wardrobe), bedding, nuts and bolts, empty coke tins, rucksacks, oilskins, boots, a mountain bike, scuba diving equipment and an oxygen cylinder are dotted about.

We set to work. Question: "Do you need to keep these 45 empty boxes of Benson & Hedges Gold dear?" Answer (indignantlyj: "They're not mine they belong to *Rob*". (Thinks - Why does Rob, who lives in the room next door, keep his empty cigarette boxes in my son's cupboard? Wisely I say nothing).

The icing on the cake as far as we are concerned is of course the transportation of the tropical fish tank. Needless to say it is full of water (about 12 gallons), various plants and several fish! A shark, some tiny, tiny uncatchable tetra, loach that hide under the gravel and some other rather frenetic fish that the shark chases constantly with evil intent! These all have to be fished out with the aid of a cup (what else?), put into polythene bags, the water removed with a (small) bucket and disposed of down the loo, and the gravel removed before we can lift the tank out to the car. This process takes us about three hours.

The usual last-minute boxes of cutlery, saucepans and food are presented to the husband who having received an affirmative to his question "*Is this it?*" has just closed the boot and tied the cover over the trailer.

Faced with a hot six-hour journey transporting traumatised fish in numerous little plastic bags, an emotionally drained wife and exhausted step-son the husband stays remarkably sane. At the first break for tea he does say however that it is like transporting a dormitory.

Arriving home our first priority was of course the fish. The whole process goes into reverse. Twelve gallons of water is this time fed up a hose pipe through the bedroom window, and gravel, plants and fish are installed. The shark resumes his never ending chase of the fish who had, until then, thought it was Christmas. Since then (and in spite of large doses of classical music played to calm it) I fear the shark has eaten some more of the fish, but not enough to make the return trip unnecessary! In spite of threats to the contrary, by the time you receive this newsletter we shall have gone through the entire process again and the son and what remain of the fish will be safely back in Plymouth.

Community Defibrillation Equipment

Our community Automated External Defibrillator or AED is located in a secure yellow box in the central porch of the village hall. This automated device, which is designed to be operated by any member of the public, will supply an electrical stimulant to someone who has suffered a cardiac arrest.

Should anyone suffer a cardiac arrest or show symptoms of an heart attack, e.g. pains in the chest, then the first action should always be to phone the ambulance service on 999. They are aware of the availability of our defibrillator and will inform the caller of the code to open the box to access the unit. The unit 'speaks' instructions to the operator, tells them where to place the pads and will diagnose whether the patient will benefit from the unit's electrical charge.

When a cardiac arrest occurs, time is of the essence and after 5 minutes following arrest the chances of survival are significantly reduced. However this period can be significantly extended by the application of chest compressions. Once the ambulance has been called stay with the patient to give compressions and call for help from either an AED operative or passer-by etc to get the AED.

The unit is designed for general public use; however Quendon and Rickling has a team of trained volunteer operatives

ready to help either in the application of chest compressions or use of the AED. Their names and telephone numbers appear in $\mathcal{T}he \ Link$ every month and a copy is retained in the defibrillator box. Should the patient be some distance from the unit then phone one of the helpers located at the southern end of Cambridge Road to collect the unit and bring it to the scene of an incident.

Remember that you are helping to save a life by taking action and doing nothing will not help anyone. By releasing the code, the ambulance service are authorising you to use the defibrillator and the unit's diagnosis tool takes the decision to apply the treatment.

Some of the Defibrillation Team attended a brief meeting on Sunday the 25th of November to refresh memories of how it is used (it really is very simple!) and to welcome five new members.

Protect your new Christmas gifts

Over Christmas you may have been lucky enough to have received some rather nice gifts.

What did you do with the packaging? Left it by the roadside for the recycling collection? What better advert to the thief of where to find some new things to steal. Where possible fold the boxes inside out, or tear the box up, or package it in something else, or take it to the recycling centre yourself.

How many of us have thought about recording the serial numbers or property marking it? Be it a cycle, electrical goods, garden equipment or mobile phone it may have a serial number. You can record your serial numbers free or charge at https://www.immobilise.com and there are a number of property marking products available like indelible pens, SelectaDNA, SmartWater, CRE mark by CRE products to name but a few.


With jewellery and antiques don't forget to take photographs of it, include an "Object ID card" or ruler in a photograph to give it a scale. Some of these property marking products may also be suitable and you can now upload photographs of your property to Immobilise too.

Mobile phone and personal music devices: Don't forget to make a note of the IME number of a mobile phone, to find it key in *#06#, with this if it's stolen you can block it. Many TV's, mobile phones, computers and other electronics come pre-loaded with security and/or tracking software, make sure that it is activated. If you are storing valuable college work or other on that nice new laptop don't forget to back up your work elsewhere just in case you lose the laptop. You can download an "App" on mobile phones to find your phone and more importantly wipe that data stored on it, check your "App store" or mobile phone provider.

When texting or talking on phones, or listening to music remain "in touch" with your surroundings, a number of road accidents, thefts and assaults occur when we fail to note what's going on around us, don't forget to pass this advice on to children.



Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

Water supplies

Here is an update from Affinity Water on the levels in the aquifer from which our water is extracted. It can be summarised as 'a wet winter would be good'!



Affinity say 'We are beginning to see a recharge of our aquifers following the rainfall in October and November. Our water resources remain below average, but at an improved position to this time last year.

November rainfall was 94% of the long-term average and this has resulted in more moisture in the soil, which means more rainfall is beginning to soak through to the aquifers below.

The important recharge season, when we typically see recharge of our aquifers if there is sufficient winter rainfall, runs from October to March. We are dependent on significant winter rainfall to ensure that our water resources are in a good position for next year, and we are continuing to plan to ensure we are prepared for a range of different rainfall scenarios over this winter.'

Affinity may be continuing to plan, but residents of the new developments in Newport are unimpressed by their performance. Despite being a statutory consultee on permissions given 5 years ago they have failed to provide adequate supplies to the new houses. They will now be installing an emergency pipeline coming in from the north, and other residents in the area have had their water supplies cut for a day while work is carried out. This is an example of the consequences of building in unsuitable locations and burdening old infrastructure. I'm told the sewer pipe the developments are being connect to was put in by Italian prisoners of war, but I don't have any documentary proof of that. In 2013 Anglian Water said major pipeline work was needed but instead a tanked holding system has been installed. Although provision of adequate water, sewerage, healthcare and school places should be built into a Local Plan, at an individual application level they are not considered, and lack of them is not a valid reason for refusal as the statutory providers are required to provide. Even if they don't or can't. Encouraging new housing needed for the country would be easier if this issue, which the whole development world is fully aware of, was resolved.

Local Plan

In an email to councillors, the UDC chief executive says they have received from their consultant AECOM a draft Sustainability Appraisal (SA) report. 'The report has been received in chapters and officers are currently going through it for final checking but, in short, the AECOM work endorses the Local Plan in saying that we have the most appropriate strategy when compared against the reasonable alternatives. This is good news as it shows that we remain on course and can still submit the plan as scheduled before 24 January 2019; the new SA will be submitted (to the Planning Inspector) alongside the plan.'

This seems contrary to AECOM's recent assessment saying that more work is needed. The AECOM papers have not yet been published, but are going to be discussed by the Planning Policy Working Group on 10th January.

The significance of the 24th January is this is the cut-off date after which new housing number calculations may be imposed by the government. However, UDC's figures are already similar to the government's ones so this should not be a problem.

As the Local Plan moves through each stage towards adoption it acquires greater weight in determining planning applications. For Quendon & Rickling only one site, between Bluebell Drive and Hallfield is earmarked for development in the new Plan.

Councillors Surgeries

We are available every Thursday morning from 10.30 to 11.30 in Dorrington's in Newport and we take turns to attend the parish council meetings in the Village Hall. We are also active on the two main village Facebook groups.


