From the Vicarage Study Rev. Neil McLeod, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

As I write this I am looking out of the study window to blue skies and sunshine. I don't see the sun, as that hits the back of the vicarage, and my study can still be quite cool. After the weather went very cold the weekend before last, with hailstones, I'm hoping that spring has finally arrived. Although I'm not going to hold my breath.

The weather has been, once again, extremely unpredictable again this year. Last year we endured the "Beast from the East" and whilst we didn't have a great deal of snow it was bitterly cold. This year our weather went briefly to the other extreme. In March I had friends visit me, and we went to London on the Saturday as one of them had never been there. It was sunny and very hot, and at the end of March I was clothed in shorts and t-shirt. Utter madness! Is the result of climate change? I cannot say that for certain as I'm not a scientist but it is clear that the weather just isn't following standard patterns or even seasons. Do we even have standard patterns or seasons any more? Flowers bloom very early, then suffer because we have frosts again. There were very few, if any, April showers but fortunately we have had much needed rainfall in May. The word 'subdue' is what we struggle with, because it sounds like we have dominion over the earth. But dominion can sometimes exist without responsibility, and subjugation can involve abuse. Humankind has abused the earth. The earth is God's gift for us. We need to use our resources wisely so they are there for generations to come.

Parish Council Elections over

We welcome two new councillors, Carrie Williams and Katherine Nuthall, plus re-election of four previous councillors. That leaves one space remaining and the Parish Council will be looking to co-opt another councillor within the next month or so. Look out for the notice. Full details of the new parish council and councillors' responsibilities will be posted to the website very shortly.

Community Special Constables

This is a repeat from last issue, but I think it is worth repeating. The co-ordinator of this scheme has been invited to address the June parish council meeting so if you want information from the horse's mouth it will be on the 12th June. District Council elections

Neil Hargreaves and Anthony Gerard have been reelected and their party, R4U, has by far the largest number of district councillors. They will therefore be forming the next administration.

Other news from the Parish Council meeting

As you may well know by now, Brandon Chapman and Tony Jones have stepped down as councillors after many years of loyal service. I would like to thank them both for all their efforts on behalf of Quendon and Rickling, and also their help in my early days as parish clerk. They have been great assets to the village.

The time for the annual audit is rapidly approaching and I have been preparing the necessary papers. I will shortly be forwarding the return to our internal auditor. We do not require an external audit this year as both our income and expenditure for the last financial year was below £25,000. However, as always, all the financial papers will be available for inspection by any resident and details of this will be on the website.

Potholes near the school remain a problem, but there are

moves afoot to remedy the situation.

I understand there is some serious interest in re-opening The Cricketers Arms. So keep your fingers crossed and your eyes on the pub.

From the Chairman of the Parish Council

Dear Villagers!

It is all change for the Parish Council in 2019! Two of our Parish Councillors have moved onto pastures new, the "old" (not that old!) Chairman, Brandon Chapman and Tony Jones, both of whom have devoted over 10 years of their lives to the ups and downs of village life in Quendon and Rickling! I would like to thank them both very much for their commitment, patience, wisdom and their sense of humour! They are still residing in the village though and Brandon is very involved in the Neighbourhood Plan.

I am taking on the mantle of Chairman, although in an acting capacity only at the moment, in the hope that one of the new councillors will take over when they have settled in! I have lived in the village of Rickling Green for 8 years, have a very patient husband, 2 children, both at university although rather a long way away, 2 dogs and I am passionate about our villages and that they remain great places in which to live.

We have three new councillors, which is remarkable considering a lot of villages around the country are struggling to fill their positions. Tony Dear, who lives in Snowdrop Road and Katherine Nutall and Carrie Williams, who both live on Cambridge Road in Quendon,

I will aim to update you every month in *The Link* with a summary of our meetings so you will all be aware of what is happening! Please also read our monthly minutes as this will keep you informed in far more detail.

In May's meeting, the following main points were raised:

Foxley 2, as we will call it, will be putting in a planning application shortly to build 9 houses. This site has been identified in the Neighbourhood Plan for some time as suitable for development so we will keep a very close eye on this. The developers have offered to come and talk to us about their application so please let us know if you would be interested.

A resident in Ventnor Road has raised serious concerns regarding the speed limit of 50 mph outside the two new developments on the B1383. The Parish Council can't understand why this speed limit was not reduced to 30 mph at the time of build and we have been nagging Essex Highways ever since. It has now been agreed that it will be reduced to 40 mph not 30 but we will continue the fight! Apparently it takes so long because there has to be an investigation phase, involving a 7 day speed and volume traffic survey, a design, a site investigation to

check what is under the ground, cables etc and then a legal process requiring a consultation. We have been told this will be done in this financial year! We will also continue the fight for a footpath along the main road.

The road leading up to Rickling School and The Cricketers is badly potholed, as I am sure everyone is very aware and we have been working on a way to improve it for over a year now, without much success because of the huge expense involved. Some of the parents have kindly taken it upon themselves to mend these potholes at half term, 27 - 31 May. Please make a note in your diary if you use this road. We have put in for funding to the County Councillor so fingers crossed we will be successful as this is an expensive exercise but very necessary.

We have had several viewings of taxis and delivery vans attempting to drive up the bridleway alongside Bluebell Wood to Quendon Hall. Everyone concerned is now aware of this problem and hopefully signs will be going up soon to divert traffic back along the main road.

One of our councillors, Ted Crow, has been doing a sterling job with the village football pitch. Many of you will have noticed a lot of care and attention is going in to the preparation of an amazing "new" pitch, with refurbished posts going up soon. There is considerable interest in this pitch from local teams so it will be lovely to hear teams playing in the village again so after long. Ted is very keen for everyone in the villages to use the pitch, so grab a football and a picnic and wander along!!

Finally, the cricket season has started and spectators are always very welcome. Unfortunately Rickling England Cricket Day has had to be cancelled due to the temporary closure of The Cricketers Arms, which is a real shame as the day is always a big attraction for the village.

The Cricketers itself is in the process of being sold and I have been told by the marketing representative that there is considerable interest so hopefully we will see the pub up and running over the course of the summer!

I can assure you that all 7 of us, plus our long suffering clerk, are here to do our best for the villages. If you have any questions/queries, just give us a ring or come along to the meetings! You can also follow us on Facebook or just email the Parish Clerk and we will respond as quickly as possible and to the best of our knowledge.

THE HUNDRED PARISHES SOCIETY

ne of the aims of The Hundred Parishes Society is to raise awareness of our rich and diverse local heritage. It is exceptionally preserved in the rural and town landscapes handed down by past generations and there is also a rich vein of local history, culture, customs



and legends. Amongst the legends are a couple concerning dragons.

Henham's dragon is commemorated on the village sign and in the name of its parish magazine, The Henham

The appearance of this "flying serpent" was reported in a pamphlet published in 1669. The creature was described as eight or nine feet long, having been seen by several men. In recent times, the legend has been dismissed as a 17th-century hoax, while local Saffron Brewery produces a Flying Serpent beer to celebrate the story.

Where there were dragons there were also dragon slayers. We all know St George, whose slaying of the beast has been painted and sculpted many times. I can think of only one such image within the Hundred Parishes: in Bartlow church where conservation of a

15th-century wall painting revealed the dragon but not St George. I would be interested to learn of other images of dragons or St George within the Hundred Parishes.



A local dragon slayer, Piers

Shonks, died in 1086 AD and lies at peace in an ancient tomb within the wall of Brent Pelham parish church. There is a brief account of his story, and why he is buried



in the wall, in the Hundred Parishes book and www.hundredparishes.org.uk within the parish page for Brent Pelham and Meesden. There you will also find a link to a Hertfordshire

Archives account and audio recording of the legend of Piers Shonks.

Do enjoy our local area – and keep an eye open for dragons.

Report from District Councillors Anthony Gerard and Neil Hargreaves

This year it was District Council elections on 2nd May. The pre-election makeup of the council was Conservatives 24 seats, Residents for Uttlesford 11 seats

and Libdems 4 seats. The new council is R4U 26 seats, Libdems 7 seats, Conservatives 4 seats and Independents 2 seats. R4U didn't stand in all wards, but where it did stand candidates R4U captured 56% of the vote with the Conservatives 25% and Liberal 13%.

At the first new Council meeting in May R4U announced a new Cabinet structure, and the committee memberships and

their chairs, and the Council Chair and council Leader were agreed. The cabinet system is not our preferred option as it concentrates decision making with a handful of councillors, previously just five out of the 39 councillors, albeit with checks and balances such as having a Scrutiny committee and a call-in procedure where decisions can be challenged. To change it back to a system where more decisions are taken in committees requires consideration of the different ways to run the council, and a referendum. Councils which have changed to a committee model see the advantages as being that it is inherently more democratic, with more councillors directly involved in decision-making. Opposition members have more say and their voice is more strongly heard.

For the moment R4U has increased the number of Cabinet members to ten, each with their portfolio but still involved in all the key decisions. This means we now have cabinet members with new specific responsibility for green issues and equalities, for infrastructure, transport and Stansted Airport, for investment strategy, and for education, libraries, culture heritage and tourism. Planning was previously included with Environmental Services (bins and street cleaning etc.) but is now given its full weight along with the Local Plan under the responsibility of John Lodge, the Council Leader. I am cabinet member for Finance and Budgets, and Anthony for Residents & Community Partnerships, Police & Emergency Services.

And on the five committees (Planning, Licensing and Environmental Health, Scrutiny, Governance Audit & Performance, and Standards) members from the other parties, and the Independent members from Chesterford, were offered some key roles. So, Conservative Mark Lemon is deputy chair of Planning, Independent Neil Gregory chairs Scrutiny, and Conservative Edward Oliver from Clavering is continuing as chair of Governance Audit & Performance. In order to be inclusive and seek

to make use of everyone's skills and experience regardless of their political affiliation, positions were offered to the Libdems, but they have taken the view that

> their job is to be an opposition not to be part of the administration, so they declined the offer.

> The big challenges facing the new administration are to seek a better deal from the Stansted Airport expansion, to bring the Local Plan to fruition and to deal with the long-term issue of reduced government finance.

At present, with the adopted Local Plan 8 years out of date,

and without the required five-year supply of housing permissions, national planning policy switches the balance towards accepting whatever planning applications come forward. This leaves our villages and towns vulnerable to unplanned and inappropriate development. The tensions of course remain. Many of those who voted for R4U across the district may be expecting development to be moved away from wherever they are.

The Local Plan has been with the Inspectors since February and a key factor is what they have to say about it and whether they think it largely viable, or needing a major rework, or unviable.

The new administration will be dealing with all these

matters, and others, over the The new coming months. Council Chair is Richard Freeman, who has previously been Saffron Walden mayor and so we have an experienced hand in charge of the meetings. At the first meeting it was good to see many residents present and Richard did а charming welcome to new councillors and returning ones. But he did make clear that the agenda item for



'Questions' was to mean that and was not for councillors to make statements, and that time limits on us speaking will be enforced. There is much to do, so best to set out the rules on the first day!

Saffron Walden MP welcomes scheme to improve village halls

Kemi Badenoch, the Member of Parliament for Saffron Walden, has welcomed a £3 million Government fund to improve village halls and better connect rural communities.

"I received representations from constituents in Wicken Bonhunt and Great Canfield, among others, about the issue

of village hall restoration. I lobbied the Government on their behalf to protect these community assets. Village halls across our constituency provide vital hubs for communities to connect, collaborate and celebrate.", Mrs Badenoch said.

"This fund will not only help to enhance and improve the facilities and make a big difference for a large number of communities but also mean that village halls can remain as important meeting places for many years to come.

"Village hall committees are now able to apply for grants of up to £75,000 towards refurbishment and alteration of



their buildings, from improvement works on existing facilities through to new meeting rooms. I strongly encourage villages across our constituency to apply and make use of this scheme."

Q&R Community Updates

A Neighbourhood Watch WhatsApp group ("Q&R Community Updates") has being set up to provide LIVE updates to villagers in a secure manner. This is not a "chat" or advertising forum, rather will be strictly limited (and Admin-enforced) to communications where real-time alerts are useful - for instance: emergencies / road closures / police incidents or possible criminal activities / missing pets, etc. in and around our area. This has been a successful forum to share information in other villages around us.

If you have a smart phone and the "Whatsapp" app, and would like to be added to this group, villagers should

contact Carrie Williams on **07908 844056** who will verify that you are part of the Q&R community, provide a code of conduct and add you to the group. Accepted outsiders will be agreed as an exception, for example the police, but essentially only villagers will have access.

If villagers are concerned by anything they see or hear in and around our community, they are encouraged to either put a comment out through the WhatsApp group (if you have already joined) or report it to Carrie who will post it on your behalf to ensure the rest of the village is aware. Let's look out for one another.

CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE

Any additional crime prevention device can act as a deterrent to an opportunist theft, however, unfortunately not all criminals are easily put off. If you are going to fit an additional security devices, it is advisable to do so with the intention of preventing the crime (or at least slowing the criminal down), and as an aid to the perpetrator's identification and capture, not just as a visible deterrent.

Before making any purchases, please consider the following:

· What do you intend to achieve? For example: a pad lock for a gate to secure your perimeter is a waste of time if you can easily climb over it, climb the adjacent fence or get through gaps in the perimeter hedge. Take a wider look at the problem and do not

focus on one thing.

- Will it do what you actually want it to do? For example: an audible only alarm will not usually be attended by Police unless there is further corroboration to show that a break-in is occurring there are too many false alarms...
- Have you seen the device working? For example: despite what the salesmen may say, not all CCTV cameras produce good enough images at night!
- Have you done your homework? For your own piece of mind, make sure that it is an approved device or approved provider. For alarms and CCTV get some quotes and see some demonstrations.
- Will it fit? For example: not all vehicle steering wheel locking devices fit all vehicles

CRIME PREVENTION ADVICE (cont.)

- Has it been located correctly? Camera vision can be impaired by overgrown trees, or being too close to some light sources, and can also be a target to damage or even theft if positioned too low or easily accessible.
- Has it been attached correctly? For example: some video-enabled bell pushes have been stolen after being fixed to door frames by only sticky pads and not the screws they came with!
- · Consider what the thieves might steal, and what they are going to do with the stolen items. Making your property identifiable (and letting the thief know) will make it difficult for the thief to keep hold of, and will make it difficult to sell on. By marking, recording and photographing your property, you also stand a better chance of getting it back if it is stolen and help the Police obtain a conviction. (Frequently, if we can't prove it is stolen we can't prosecute...)
- · Finally, not all crime prevention measures are worthwhile if you don't carry out the basics! What's the point of additional locks or alarms if you don't lock your doors in the first place! A lot can be achieved at no extra cost simply by making a few changes such as locking doors and windows, placing items out of sight, using garages for cars, etc.

Recording and marking your property

Any markings on property that links and/or identifies it to its rightful owner may be a deterrent to the thief or burglar with the added potential of the return of the property to its owner.

Marked property unlawfully possessed may lead to a conviction and as such marked property is harder for the criminal to dispose of, therefore the reward or motivation to the thief is diminished.

Our county's second-hand dealers also work with Essex Police effectively making stolen property **"Too Hot to Handle"!**

Property marking can take many forms:

Overt marking that is visible to all, like 'Cesar Data Tag' on commercial plant to engraving, stencil painting of organisation logo to visibly endorsing the property with a post code using an indelible pen or other.

An example is 'CREmark' – www.creproducts.co.uk/shop/default.asp

Covert marking such as UV pens and Forensic Markers require a UV light source for the marking to fluoresce and become visible. Forensic Markers contain a trace marker that is unique to that registered owner and may in addition contain a microdot with a unique number. Reading of the post code or analysis of that unique marker and/or reading the microdot can identify its owner. As these are invisible until scanned with a UV light source to benefit from its deterrent value it is important that stickers are displayed within windows of the premises and on the marked products, additionally where a community uses these with council permission street signage may be considered.

Examples are:

<u>UV Pens and Sticker</u> – widely available in stores or on the internet.

Asset Recording is another method where you record the details of your property either on your own recording sheet or database (but not kept with the relevant property) or on an 'ISO' accredited database. Your records should include a description of the article and where applicable model, serial and IMEI numbers. To benefit from its deterrent value of this system it is important that stickers are displayed within windows of the premises and on the marked products. Photographs some with a scale can also help in identifying property and can also be uploaded to some databases, for advice on photographing property see "Recording Property" at the bottom of the Essex Police Heritage Watch webpage www.essex.police.uk/advice/essex-watch/heritage-watch/

An example of a property recording database is: Immobilise - https://www.immobilise.com/

Immobilise can be used by members of the public and businesses to register their valued possessions or company assets, and exclusive to Immobilise all registered items and ownership details are viewable on the secure Police national property database the NMPR. This database also links to the publically accessible and second-hand dealer database 'Checkmend' www.checkmend.com/uk/ for restricted searches to establish if an item of property is stolen.

BEWARE: WHO'S KNOCKING AT YOUR DOOR?

We have reports of the "Nottingham Knockers" being seen in the village again.

The term comes from a scam which originated in the East Midland town; they are usually young people travelling across the country and targeting a town or district at a time. They knock on doors with a large duffle bag, produce a seemingly legitimate ID card and claim to be ex-convicts trying to mend their ways by selling everyday household products which are often of poor quality and sold at inflated prices. They may also hand over a card saying they are deaf or dumb. Kind-hearted householders often feel obliged to buy from them, believing they are helping the young people to turn their lives around.

However, the sellers are not involved in any officially recognised offender rehabilitation programme and most do not have a Pedlar's Certificate, which is needed for salespeople to legally sell door-to-door. According to the police, the "Knocker" is supplied with a full bag of household products and charged a minimal sum for the contents by an "employer"— it used to be £35 - they can keep whatever they make above this amount. Usually they are deposited in an area from a transit van and given a list of streets to work. An hour or so later they are picked up and dropped off in another location. They frequently operate from 9am to 9pm. These are often known criminals - police advise that in almost every case

of a stop-check the "Knockers" have long strings of convictions for burglary and violence. They use the skills learnt during their criminal activity to identify possible targets and the addresses may then be sold in prisons and pubs. If there is a later break-in, the "employer" expects a further cut of the proceeds.

Consequently, if a "Nottingham Knocker" visits you, police advice is:

DO NOT ANSWER YOUR DOOR in the first instance, keeping in mind that if cold callers don't get any sales in your area, they are less likely to return.

If you do open your door to any salesperson, the police and Trading Standards always advise residents to ask to see their Pedlar's Certificate - these are only issued to individuals under very strict conditions and are not the same as an ID card. You can contact the police station it was issued at in order to check that it's genuine. Then, POLITELY REFUSE TO PURCHASE ITEMS and not to buckle to pressure from salespeople to do so.

Finally, the police are keeping track of where the "Knockers" are operating, therefore REPORT THEM BY DIALING **101** and ask for the Incident Room.

Let's spread the word so that Quendon & Rickling are not a targeted area for this activity; please share this information with your neighbours, friends and family.
