The coronavirus situation affects everyone and the PC is updating the Emergency Plan to ensure it is fully relevant for any eventualities. A member of the public at the meeting suggested that arrangements should be made to check on the vulnerable and elderly during this trying time. I know that matters are well in hand and there are many volunteers offering their help.

Interesting question from the floor about why is the Men's Club Room so called. Sally has put an explanation in her The Link article about this.

There will be a Highways survey financed by a donation from developers Stonebound. Previous surveys by UDC have suggested that speeding on the B1383 through Quendon is not an issue. Perhaps there is a parallel universe where Quendon does not experience cars racing through the village. This new survey, I can assure you, will be in the reality Quendon!

Not much progress on the tree replacement issue. UDC are holding out for hornbeams. The matter has been referred right up to the CEO of ECC to see if this rigid attitude can be more flexible.

There is good news on the broadband front. Tom Duncan says that 95% of properties are now fully connected. If you do have any queries these need to be directed at the supplier, Gigaclear.

There is an ongoing review of council Statutory Documents and as each review is completed I will post the new version to the website.

Although I have shown the date of the next meeting as 8th April, if the coronavirus situation has not improved the PC may take the decision to cancel both the April and May meetings. Please keep any eye on the website and notice boards for further information.

From the Chairman of the Parish Council

Dear Fellow Villagers!

As I write, the world feels as though it is slightly off balance! Covid-19 is rampaging around the world, apparently unstoppable! No loo rolls, pasta or hand wash on the supermarket shelves and rationed tinned tomatoes! Hopefully by the time you read this, a slight aura of calm will have befallen us. On this note, a help sheet has been drawn up to support villagers who have to self-isolate or are in need of assistance. It details telephone numbers of people who are willing to help others, whether collecting food deliveries or medicine, a voice at the end of a phone, general advice and a list of surgeries, pharmacies and local facilities, if needed. At a time like this, community is very important! We must keep an eye on our neighbours and offer assistance wherever we can.

As you will all have seen, all 7 of the horse chestnuts on the Fountain verge have been felled! The contractor was given a detailed plan by the council of which 4 diseased trees to fell but, for whatever reason, they felled the wrong ones, consequently all 7 had to come down. Some of you will have seen the apology from the contractor on Facebook and UDC did admit that this was completely unacceptable. Despite the contractor initially offering to stump grind and replace all 7 with 15 foot trees of our choice, this has not happened. The only species we have been allowed by both UDC and ECC is the Common Hornbeam. We were hoping for a more spectacular species to replace the graceful horse chestnuts but I am afraid that Hornbeam has been planted regardless. I can assure you, the Parish Council have utilised every option and every avenue of influence to reach an agreeable solution with the contractor, UDC and ECC (at the time of writing we have over 150 emails on the subject alone). Discussions will continue...

The money from the Stonebond/Foxley 2 contribution has

now been received, so the Highways and Pavement survey has been instructed to go ahead. This is to identify key objectives of how to slow down the traffic on the B1383, to find a way to make crossing the road safer for residents and to improve parking at Waterbutt Row. The damaged VAS sign at the north end of the village coming south is going to be replaced in April. Let us hope that it will shine brightly and remind people to go slowly through the village! Also in April, there is a traffic speed survey planned for Brick Kiln Lane, Coney Acre and Belchams Lane as this seems to be the cut through race track at the moment. We are also in the process of trying to lower the speed limit by Bluebell Drive and Ventnor Road to a 30mph limit not the proposed 40mph limit. We have submitted an objection to Highways and are waiting to hear their decision. We will keep fighting on the speeding issue around the villages and hopefully one day we will be successful!

I would also like to make a mention of the reason the small room in the Village Hall is called the Men's Room. In the days before television, the Village Hall was one of the hubs for meeting and entertainment - a billiard tournament, a lantern lecture on Japan, a special meeting to decide what to do for the coronation of King George V and entertainment from the members - songs, violin solos and the well known farce, "Box and Cox". After the First World War, as so many of the men were killed, this all changed. The small hall was then built in memory of those who died and is the village "War Memorial". There is a plaque commemorating those villagers who lost their lives above the fireplace.

Finally, the Parish Council would like you all to know that none of you are alone and that the community is here for all of you! Please stay safe!

Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves

Coronavirus

I'm not going to say much about this as things are changing quickly at the time of writing (18th March).

I have been most impressed with the way our council has responded in order to secure all essential council services. In the absence of the council leader John Lodge (marooned in Portugal), and the chief executive also being away, it was the UDC head of finance as second in command, and the deputy council leader Petrina Lees (whose ward is Henham & Elsenham) who have been the key organisers. Teams have been split and segregated, with many working at home, to avoid the risk that a whole department or function is stopped by all having to isolate because of contact with an ill person. A large number of software licenses have been bought to enable full remote functionality for staff at home. There is a budget reserve for emergencies. When reviewing the list of reserves for all sorts of things I sometimes wondered what eventuality would need the Emergency Reserve. Now we know!

What is not surprising is the way in which our communities and organisations are pulling together. It is

what we do. And then there is the small percentage of people who put themselves first. That is not what we should do.

Non coronavirus matters.... UDCs commercial investments

The Council last month approved an increase in our commercial fund to £300m. This will generate income to protect council services and Uttlesford residents from further cuts from governments. Without this we would have a £3.6m a year shortage of income – to put the scale on this, the council's external funding requirement is about £14m pa.

Interviews have taken place for external independent members to complement the cross-party team of councillors on the new Investments Board, which goes through the details of potential investments. Appointments will be announced shortly. This will further strengthen the governance over our portfolio, which is not just about the initial purchases, but monitoring performance and risk, and in time assessing sales and readjustments to the portfolio. The council's

investment in Chesterford Research Park (CRP) is currently £54m, with a further £20m allocated. In order to diversify from the concentration in CRP, three new investments totalling £60m have been agreed by full Council. Each is in a different type of property and business sector, one is in Uttlesford and the others are elsewhere in the UK. This totals £134m out of the target of £300m, and further investments are being considered, all in different sectors to those already agreed. The not so good news is that the government have announced a consultation into stopping councils borrowing from the government for income generation investments. Their questionnaire fails to ask why councils have been forced to become commercial investors, or what they might have to do to fill the financial gap. Anyway, in the mean time we are pressing on, and as the Public Works Loan Board had already increased its rates, other reasonable sources of finance are currently available.

Local Plan and our Neighbourhood Plan

The examiner for the Neighbourhood Plan has asked the steering Group for comment on the UDC Local Plan inspectors' letter. Their letter casts doubt on the viability of the new settlements. It suggests we go back to building on our existing settlements, the opposite of what the previous Plan inspector told us to do.

Our response to the examiner is that the inspectors have made suggestions with no consideration of their consequence, and amazingly no reference to the previous inspector's decision.

In our response we challenge the 'key' and 'A' village development designations which were from between 15 and 10 years ago. The very large scale of development (55% growth for Newport in 5 years) with negligible infrastructure or service improvements, continuing loss of employment sites, and no plan to improve any infrastructure, either to make up the deficit or to support

new building, makes the designations out of date. Developers want it everyway – minimal contributions to infrastructure, no weight to be put on the development limits in out of date Local Plan, but seek to rely automatically on the village 'suitable for development' designations from that same Plan.

The good news is that the decent available sites have long gone and more recent unsuitable ones are being refused by UDC, and then refused again at appeal. Recent appeal refusals have been two major applications in Newport, and ones in Clavering, Takeley and Felsted. Developer Gladman, which is the most aggressive operator, took the Secretary of State to a judicial review over the Felsted refusal on grounds of giving too much weight to the adopted Local Policy S7, which gives protection to the countryside. All out of development limits refusals are likely to rely on S7.

The judge was most unimpressed and refused Gladman's submission, and awarded costs against them. This means that decisions may still give weight to out of date policies, and S7 in particular. Gladman are seeking leave to go to the Court of Appeal, so the saga may continue

One of the delights of a woodland walk on a sunny April day is the sweet scent wafting from the massed flowers of the English bluebell. One of our best-loved wildflowers, with



half of the world's population found in the UK, it is typically associated with ancient woodlands but can also occur at the base of long-established hedgerows.

The narrow glossy leaves and flower spikes are produced from deeply rooted bulbs supported by specialised symbiotic fungi. The flowers are a deep violet-blue, but sometimes white or pink spikes occur. The flowers are narrow, tubular-bell shaped, with tips that curl backwards, and the pollen is cream-coloured. They are arranged on one side of a drooping stem. After pollination by honeybees and other insects many green capsules form which will hold large numbers of ripe black seeds. The seeds are shaken from the capsules by breezes or by animals running through the woods.

The introduced and invasive Spanish bluebell has broader leaves. Its pale blue, unscented flowers are arranged all around the upright stem and are more open revealing blue

pollen. Encouragingly, recent research has found that the



native species has a genetic advantage due to the sheer weight of numbers and greater fertility and so should continue to thrive.

Locations where it is possible to see carpets of bluebells

include the Hertfordshire Way as it passes through Sidehill Wood and Mill Wood in Much Hadham and Howe Wood in Littlebury beside Strethall Road as it crosses over the M11 motorway.





Several walks described on our website pass through woodlands. Walk number 4 goes through a fine bluebell wood at Rickling whilst the longer walk 20 visits Mill Wood. Details of woods or nature reserves to visit can be

Weddings & funerals can still take place but because of the advice on social distancing it is recommended that there by no more than 10 people in the congregation. Sometimes that will work but in many cases, certainly in the case of a funeral, it will not be possible. They cannot simply be stopped.

Quendon & Rickling - Hedgehog Villages?

Hedgehogs hibernate from October/November through to March/April so as the temperature gets warmer and the days get longer hopefully we might start to see one soon. But as they are primarily nocturnal, sleeping during the day and active at night you may not even know that one is visiting your garden. But a good way to check is by looking for their tracks.

Use a footprint tunnel. These can be bought or made. Using hedgehog food to entice them in to a tube the hedgehog walks over a black charcoal substance and then on paper.

Both the front and back feet have five toes, though often only four toes show up on track prints. Their front feet are wider and look like tiny hands.

Hedgehog droppings are easy to recognise and a sure sign that one is visiting.

One of the easiest things we can all do to help is to leave an area of long grass in our gardens. Small invertebrates, like beetles and small flies, can't live in short grass where there's no protection. These tiny insects are vital not just for hedgehogs but for the whole of the natural environment.

Relaunched Activity Group in Dunmow

People living with dementia can now benefit from a weekly Activity Group in Dunmow run by Essex charity Action for Family Carers.

Over 50 people in the area already attend similar groups mixing with others and participating in a variety of mentally and physically stimulating activities ranging from seated exercise, indoor bowling, reminiscence discussions and games often including music.

Action for Family Carers has taken over management of the groups which were previously run by the Alzheimer's Society. The Groups are led by a small team of professional and caring staff and a large number of dedicated local volunteers. Morning sessions, called Keeping Active, focus on physical activity and afternoon sessions, called Active Minds, focus on activities to stimulate the mind.

Physical activity is an important part of a healthy lifestyle and can help overall wellbeing. It can give opportunities to spend time with others, reducing isolation and loneliness and support people to continue being independent.

Cognitive stimulation involves activities and exercises that stimulate thinking, concentration, communication and memory in the person with dementia. It involves talking about day-to-day interests, reminiscence and information relating to the current time and place.

Speaking about the Activity Groups, Action for Family Carers' CEO, James Clarke said "We are delighted to be supporting people living with dementia in West Essex. We have been pleased to work with the Alzheimer's Society to ensure the continuation of these highly valued groups and we look forward to supporting many more people in the future."

The Activity Group takes place in the Dourdan Pavilion, Dunmow on Mondays 10-12.30pm and 1-3.30pm and new members are welcome. The sessions are £18 each with a free taster session available call Clare Savva on **07851 249707** or email clare.savva@affc.org.uk

It's particularly true when matters of health and wellbeing are at stake. Say, for instance, you're a carer looking for some form of support, or you have a loved one with dementia. Where can you turn to find information that is trustworthy, reliable and up-to-date?

This is where **Frontline** comes in. A digital service pioneered by Citizens Advice and supported by Essex County Council and the West Essex Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS) it enables anyone - the public or professionals - to find sources of help and advice in their local community.

Frontline is a veritable treasure is trove of information. It's simple-to-use and invaluable when it comes to finding out what's available locally and who can provide genuine assistance. For example, you may want to find out what support there is for someone who's housebound, suffering from depression, needs to exercise or is disabled simply enter what sort of help you're looking for or search under the following categories: Advice; Family; Older People; Mental Health; Disability; Addiction;

Transport and Wellbeing.

Often surprising, it's well worth browsing through the entire **Frontline** library to discover just how many services are listed and the range of help that is available locally (there are **196** services currently!) Each includes a full description, contact details and details on how it is delivered. What's more, it's often possible to self-refer rather than having to go through a GP.

Frontline also offers access to detailed fact sheets such as Local Transport Options, How to Complain if you're not happy with a local health provider, Planning Ahead for Later Life, to name just three.

Not everyone has internet access, of course. So if help is needed to find a local service, **Healthwatch Essex** is available from 9am to 5pm Monday to Friday (0300 500 1895 - calls charged at local rate).

Frontline is continuously expanding as both the public and professionals discover the many advantages of this easy, one-stop access to support and advice in the local community.

Coronavirus scam costs victims over £800k in one month

Since February 2020, the National Fraud Intelligence Bureau (NFIS) has identified 21 reports of fraud when Coronavirus was mentioned, with victim losses totalling over £900k. Ten of these reports were made by victims that attempted to purchase protective face masks from fraudulent sellers. One victim reported losing over £15k when they purchased face masks that were never delivered. Reporting numbers are expected to rise as the virus continues to spread across the world. We have also received multiple reports about coronavirus themed phishing emails attempting to trick people into opening malicious attachments or revealing sensitive personal and financial information.

Watch out for scam messages:

Don't click on the links or attachments in suspicious emails, and never respond to unsoficited messages and calls that ask for your personal or financial details.

Shopping ordine: If you're making a purchase from a company or person you don't know and trust, carry out some research first, and ask a friend or family member for advice before completing the purchase. Where possible, use a credit card to make the payment, as most major credit card providers insure online purchases.

Protect your devices from the latest threats:

Always install the latest software and app updates to protect your devices from the latest threats.

You receive a message from someone who seems really interested in getting to know you. They say all the right things, and over time you find yourself forming a strong bond with them. All of a sudden they re in need of some money, and they ask you for help. They promise to pay you back. By now, you trust them, so you offer to help. Before long, they'll need money again, and again... And soon enough you'll have given them every penny you own. That's how dating fraud works. Criminals will feign romantic feelings for you, gain your trust, and then use your goodwill to commit fraud against you. As online dating becomes more and more popular, criminals are increasingly using them to commit fraud, and anyone can be a victim.

Revealing too much personal information, such as your home address, or your full date of birth.

Revealing any financial details. or responding to requests to send Clicking on links, or opening attachments in emails from someone you've just met on a dating site.

HOW TO DATE ONLINE SAFELY...



Avoid posting details such as your full name, date of birth, or your home and work addresses on online profiles. Criminals can use these types of personal information to steat your identity.

Never respond to any requests to send money, or have money transferred into your account by someone you don't know and trust. These types of requests should always raise a red flag.

Never reveal any of your financial details. If a user asks you for them, stop communicating with them immediately and report it to the dating site.

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
