From the Vicarage Study

Rev. Neil McLeod,

As I write this article our churches are closed once more as we are in a second period of lockdown. I hope and pray that you are coping with it. If not, you may be struggling with the uncertainty of it all or simply lonely not able to get to see family and friends. The church does have a Community Care Team, members of which, would be happy to speak to you. We are here for you.

It is difficult to know or even forecast what may lie ahead from 2nd December which is the projected end of the lockdown period. Will the churches be able to re-open and hold services once again? I hope so, but even then Christmas in our churches is going to be radically different this year. Because of the social distancing guidelines we simply cannot accommodate the numbers in church that we usually get. At present I am exploring different ways of doing our Christmas services that will still make it feel like Christmas, and help as many people within the village to attend. I haven't got an exact plan as yet as I am waiting to see what happens after lockdown, so please keep an eye on the Facebook page and/or notice boards to see what services are planned and how they'll be taking place.

If possible I am aiming to conduct at least one service in each of the three parishes that I am responsible for as I think it is important to gather in the church, at least once, over Christmas. The services agreed by the churchwardens are:

- BCP Communion at 8.00pm on Christmas Eve in Quendon Church
- Midnight Communion at 11.30pm on Christmas Eve in Newport Church
- Holy Communion at 10.00am on Christmas Morning in Widdington

There will need to be a system whereby you can book into the service, and reserve seating. The team in the church have done a great job knowing how and where to seat people so you will be allocated a specific pew. If you are not booked in then I politely ask you not to attend as we may have to turn you away which will be heart-breaking.

A very odd Christmas indeed! Yet remember the words of the hymn featured in the picture above, 'Joy to the World, the Lord has come, let earth receive her king.' We celebrate the birth of our saviour Jesus Christ, he who is the Lord that has come to the earth. He is Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace. I believe that he can and will bring so much to our lives. My prayer this Christmas is that however we celebrate, you will open your hearts and receive your King.

Broadband update

Recently broadband coverage has become a hot topic in parts of our village so here's the state of play.

Gigaclear continue to connect people as they request a service, but they do not have any plans to extend their network to cover any more of the village, apart from in-fill of off-road houses they have skipped previously.

It's likely they will have more discounted offers towards the end of November (with Black Friday and so on) so if you're about to order just look out for their offers on facebook or their website.

Bluebell Drive/Oxlip Close have recently been covered by Openreach FTTP (that's the same technology as Gigaclear but I think connected by overhead wires rather than underground). You would need to contact your broadband provider if you want to be upgraded however – as usual, you won't be connected automatically.

That leaves Ventnor Road. There are no firm plans by commercial providers to provide coverage.

It looks as though residents there are covered by the Government's Universal Service Obligation (USO) to provide a service of at least 10Mbps download speed. Given the fact that Openreach FTTP is available a few yards away, it's very likely that FTTP will be the technology used, giving ultrafast speeds (over 100Mbps).

A wrinkle here is that the USO website states that Ventnor Road can already get a good broadband speed and are not eligible for USO – but that's not the case and the records are wrong.

Several residents on Ventnor Road have successfully registered with BT (who run the USO scheme) to start the process and I can put others in contact with them for advice on getting on-board.

I am hoping that you all saw the beautiful and haunting Village Hall Remembrance display this year. It really was quite special and made quite a few of the local papers so a big thank you to the team, led by Carrie Williams and a special thanks to Mike Stevens, who installed the lighting. He also set up the candle display in the Fountain over Halloween and we are keeping our fingers crossed that he will remain in the village for some time to come!!!! I believe he is doing a lighting display at Quendon Church for Christmas, so keep an eye open for another beautiful exhibit! Also a big thanks to everyone who donated hand made poppies for the display - knitted, lino cut, crocheted, felted, painted, made of clay, fashioned out of wire, watched over by a Tommy called Albert! It took a village effort to make this display work and it was definitely worth it! The proceeds from the sale of the clay poppies has raised around £100, with all the proceeds going to The Royal British Legion.

Waffle & Co's horsebox was by the Pavilion selling their delicious waffles on Bonfire Night! It was very popular so the Events Team is thinking about doing different takeaways in the village over the course of the next few months, pizza, Indian Street Food, Vietnamese to name but a few! Also remember that The Cricketers will be doing takeaways too, 7 days a week when lock down finishes.

We plan to put up a Christmas tree again this year - we are not sure whether it will be by the Pavilion or by the village hall, maybe both again, but with all the restrictions at the moment and uncertainty, we are playing it a little by ear! There will certainly not be the Christmas Fayre in the Village Hall but perhaps we could do a social distanced lighting of the Christmas Tree! We certainly need a bit of sparkle in our lives at the moment!

As you will have seen, the Pavilion's restoration has begun and, hopefully, will be nearly complete by the time

you read this. The seasoned boards are not due to be painted until the spring so the sight of bright white clapboard will just have to wait a little longer, I'm afraid! It will be worth the wait though, we have been assured! Let us hope that a full season will be allowed next year, Rickling Ramblers are certainly hoping so!

The signs at either end of Quendon have proved to be somewhat challenging, to say the least!! You would have thought that they would have been relatively easy to rectify but the hoops one has to go through to do this is, frankly, quite unbelievable!! The recently re-installed VAS sign at the north end has now decided to join in with the lock down and has ceased to flash at speeding cars and, believe me, the councillors have tried their best to make it work and the 30mph sign at the south end is, for some reason, half the height of its opposite number! One of our residents has suggested the idea of a "Walking Buddy" system in the village. You should have received a leaflet by now from UDC regarding the new Local Plan. As part of this Local Plan-making process, an independent forum has been set up to debate a series of different topics which are relevant to the eventual drafting of the new Plan. Their thoughts will then form the basis for a wider community involvement. They are encouraging everyone to get involved with this process and will be seeking responses to their various questions. The leaflet gives you all the relevant forums on which you can respond. We will put all the information, when it comes to us, on the website, social media and in The Link to keep you up to date. The first forum was on the 9 November but they are running over a period of 6 months. This will be very important to our area so please do keep an eye on developments.

Finally, lets hope Lock Down 2 will finish on the 2nd, as promised, and we will be able to celebrate the festivities in at least some sort of style!!

Report from District Councillor Neil Hargreaves

UDC grants to voluntary bodies

Cllr Petrina Lees from Elsenham, and Cllr John Lodge, late of this parish, and myself form a working group which allocates UDC funds to voluntary bodies. (The council has lots of working groups for all sorts of things, which most people never hear about. For five years I was credited on the UDC website with being on an Over Sixties group which didn't exist but no-one told the UDC admins. Until a new broom from R4U went through the list). The total for this year is £330,000, and the total giving by the council including this and the various community grants and the Members Ward Initiative is £610,750

Here is the Voluntary Bodies allocation:

Last month we reviewed, with officers, half-year reports from the recipients. The groups had worked hard to modify their support channels for covid. Some had not suffered much financially as mostly grant funded and not charging anything to those they help. Other such as Community Travel have funded PPE and vehicle modifications, and at the same time lost revenue from reduced riders. Others will have lost fund raising events.

The original intention was the funding allocations should be for two years, but we decided as circumstances, including financial, have changed, new applications and a reassessment will be invited for next year. The two year model also excludes new applicants which we considered unreasonable.

Just to feature one group; Action for Family Carers, which supports young people who care for their parents or other relatives. Here is a cut from their website:

'Our Young Carer Lead Tracey has been keeping in touch with Young Carers in Uttlesford by telephone and Facebook. Some of them are confused about their future plans – whether they will still be going to college, etc., and we are helping by explaining the latest government advice and guidelines.

They have been talking about how lockdown has affected them and their families. Many of them have said that they miss seeing their friends and being able to go out and about. They are all looking forward to starting club again, which we have discussed with them. They know that we are working to find ways in which we can do this that will work for them too.

Tracey will continue to stay in touch with the young people and they know they are more than welcome to call her anytime they want to talk or have support. Call Tracey on 07702 858650 or email her at tracey.hartley@affc.org.uk.

Thanks to Uttlesford District Council for enabling the support for Young Carers in their district.'

A comment in their report was that some young carers during lock-down had been doing home schooling for their younger siblings.

Neighbourhood Plan

This will go to the UDC Cabinet on 24th November. If ratified it immediately acquires weight in planning applications even though the referendum cannot be held yet. There is an issue over one of the policies which the plan examiner re-wrote. Part of it is unclear and the wording does not make sense. It needs just three words deleted, but in order to get this corrected this bit of text must go to a six week consultation which will be done after the cabinet meeting.

I'll do a full report on the Neighbourhood Plan next time.

ROBOSCAMMERS

With more people now working from home than ever before, you may have recently become more aware of the number of nuisance calls to your landline or mobile phone. Robocallers are likely to have increased during lockdown, as they do not rely on human call centres. Many of these calls are computer generated making them cheap and difficult to trace. The pre-recorded messages are often designed to scare people into handing over money or personal details—this includes the Amazon Prime scam and HMRC scams. These calls will often ask you to “Press 1 to speak to someone”.



HOW TO STOP UNWANTED CALLS

- **BT:** The free BT Call Protect service monitors nuisance calls and sends them straight to junk voicemail. BT says it blocks 99 per cent of pest calls.
- **Sky:** Free service Talk Shield stops fraudsters by insisting all callers provide a name.
- **TalkTalk:** CallSafe screens and blocks unwanted calls for free.
- **Plusnet:** Call Protect is free and blocks unwanted calls from a list that you can add to.
- **EE:** Landline customers can block up to ten numbers at a time using the free Choose to Refuse option, which bars the last call answered. Dial 14258 and press ** when asked to confirm.
- **Virgin:** You may be able to blacklist, silence or block calls, depending on your phone.
- **Mobile phones:** Download free apps such as Truecaller, Whoscall and Hiya to block dodgy calls and alert firms to possible scammers.
- **Complain:** By making a complaint about a robocall, you can help to stop them. Experts recommend directing complaints to three bodies: the ICO, by calling 0303 123 1113, visiting ico.org.uk/make-a-complaint, or writing to ICO, Wycliffe House, Water Lane, Wilmslow, Cheshire SK9 5AF; the Telephone Preference Service, by calling 0345 070 0707 or visiting tpsonline.org.uk/complaint; or Ofcom, by calling 0300 123 3333 or visiting ofcom.org.uk/complaints

HMRC Issue Scam Alerts

HMRC have issued a fraud alert after being made aware of increasing numbers of people receiving text messages impersonating HMRC and stating that they have a COVID-19 tax rebate pending. They are being directed to click on a link in order to ascertain the level of their rebate.

Students are also regularly targeted with fraudulent messaging regarding tax rebates and there are concerns that this trend will continue or increase with the new lockdown restrictions. During the previous lockdown, we saw an enormous increase in scams relating to COVID-19, where residents were encouraged to click links in unexpected and unsolicited emails.

If you receive an email/text message offering a tax rebate that you are not expecting, please do not click any links. You can find information on identifying genuine HMRC communications, and report any suspicious messages at www.gov.uk/government/organisations/hm-revenue-customs/contact/reporting-fraudulent-emails

Village Hall

Hopefully, you all managed to catch sight of the Remembrance display outside the Village Hall. What an amazing community effort and a massive thanks to all those who organised it and contributed the wonderful homemade poppies. Many might not know that the small room within the Village Hall was built as the memorial to all those who lost their lives in both World I and World War II. We have noted an increasing number of vehicles parking at the Village Hall. Please remember this is a private carpark for users of the Village Hall (there are signs indicating this). The carpark should not be used by anyone for overnight parking, or even parking during the day, unless they are attending an event at the Village Hall.

However, as a community facility, if a village resident wishes to use it as a short term measure, such as building work, family event etc. then we will oblige where possible, but they should contact the Booking Secretary on the above number. At times the whole carpark is needed for an event at the Village Hall, so please check first. In these instances we would request that a donation is offered towards the upkeep of the carpark; the more it is used the more it deteriorates and as a non profit making charity we do have to consider its upkeep. We would like to say thank you to those who do contact us and donate.

Unfortunately, the Village Hall, as a community facility, is required to remain closed during this second lockdown period; we wait to see what guidance is issued after 2 December. Let's hope we will be open to all before too long.

The Fountain

Like many people during the first few weeks of first lockdown, Chris and I spent some time tidying up our files and looking at old photographs. We came across these pictures of the fountain and could not believe that it is 10 years since the accident happened. I still remember quite clearly that cold, snowy winter morning, a few days before Christmas, when I was Parish Clerk and received a call very early on asking if I was aware that the fountain had been hit by a car and was in pieces. I was not. What should I do first? As I was getting my winter coat and boots on, someone from UDC called to say they had been informed and were going to assess it as it would likely be deemed to be a dangerous structure. Chris and I met the people there and, indeed, we had to arrange for the pieces to be gathered up from around the green, put together with the remaining structure, with a secure fence around.

I found out that the accident had happened when an uninsured driver had come into the village at speed, skidded on the ice, mounted the pavement, and came to a halt after hitting the fountain. Fortunately I knew that it was insured so contacted the insurers immediately.

The fountain, together with the trough, had originally been donated to the people of Quendon in 1887 by Henry Tufnell in memory of Col. Cranmer-Byng of Quendon Hall. It had later been restored in memory of George Beaumont Beeman who lived at Manor Farm (opposite the fountain) from 1922-1954. As well as being loved by the villagers, the fountain is the one thing that people driving through Quendon remember, albeit many refer to it as a "bandstand". It was obviously important that it should

be restored to its original glory as sympathetically as possible. However, because of the unusual structure of the building, its oak beams and carving, and wooden roof, it was difficult to find a builder who was able/willing to undertake the work. After a couple of months Tusk Carpentry & Building Co. took on the challenge.

After some painstaking work and various discussions as to whether the restored structure should incorporate a gap at the front, as it had had before the accident, or be totally enclosed as seen in original photographs, and comments that the new parts of the wooden roof and replacement uprights were not the same colour as the old, the restoration was completed in late summer of 2011 at a cost of c£20,000 (fully covered by the PC's insurance).

As it was such an important event for the village, it was decided that an official re-opening ceremony should be held. This took place on 2nd October 2011, with local press in attendance, and a small party was held around the fountain with Maureen Hawkins kindly agreeing to cut the ribbon whilst a champagne toast was raised. Maureen has lived in the village for many years and her late husband, Roger, had served as Chairman of the Parish Council and had also undertaken some work on the fountain in the past.

10 years later, I think we can agree that the restoration work was well done, the new timber has weathered well, and the fountain remains an iconic part of the village.

Here are some pictures of the frightening displays in our scary village!





With the nights drawing in you may be thinking about topping up your heating oil for the coming winter months. With the value of fuel at a premium, have you considered whether your fuel is as secure as it could be?

It's not only domestic properties at risk from fuel thieves. Farms and other similar businesses are at risk too.

Fortunately there are a number of security devices available that will protect your fuel supplies. You can find details of these via your fuel supplier or local plumber's merchant. Consider systems such as **GPRS Fuel-Oil Alarm** from www.compoundsecurity.co.uk and **Tank Commander** from www.commandersecurity.co.uk which have "Secured by Design" accreditation; these detect a dramatic drop in fuel and alerts you with a telephone call. There are also other systems that will add on to an existing intruder alarm system, whilst others protect the filler cap, and there are of course the conventional locks.

Read these helpful tips to make your fuel more secure.

- Ensure the oil gauge is secured correctly to the tank. It is worth spending a little more on good quality locks. Close shackle padlocks are the best as they offer most resistance to thieves. Close shackle padlocks have very little of the metal hoop exposed and bolt croppers cannot get a good grip.
- If your tank has a lid design, consider fitting suitable locks and/or lockable valves.
- Always check when you have had a delivery so you have a starting point of the level of oil in the tank.
- Monitor your oil tank on a regular basis for any signs of tampering and also alert you quickly to any problems you may have. As mentioned above, remote electronic oil level gauges are available which will set off an audible alarm if the oil level in the tank suddenly drops or falls.
- If your tank is on view consider concealing it and using defensive planting/shrubs around the tank as a natural defence, out of sight if visible from the road side. This would prevent the opportunists and provide a decorative disguise. Restrict access to your tank by gates and/or fencing - don't overlook the importance of ventilation if enclosing the tank.
- Consider building an outer metal skirt to box in plastic oil tanks. This makes it difficult for thieves to puncture the tank, and minimises the risk of leaving fuel pouring out of the bottom of the tank.
- If your tank is overlooked by a window or close to occupied property and is also located under security lighting, it is not always necessary to floodlight the area with high power beams. A more subtle level of lighting may be all that is needed. Low energy 'dusk till dawn' lights positioned close to the tank should, in most cases, provide sufficient light to illuminate any suspicious activity. Thieves may not take the risk of being seen.
- If you need to replace your tank, consider where you position the tank, and ensure that you make it more secure. To deter thieves from entering your property install fencing/gates and locks on access gates.
- Consider access to your tank when it comes to delivery of oil. Make arrangements with the driver, consider using a combination padlock or arrange deliveries when you will be at home.
- Ensure all outbuildings that contain tanks are kept locked at all times and remove any empty oil drums/canisters from plain view to avoid drawing attention to an oil tank being on the premises.
- Consider investing in technology such as alarms, CCTV or security lighting. High powered lights can be used but care should be taken not to cause any nuisance to neighbours or road users.
- Make a note of any unfamiliar vehicles looking suspicious or out of place. Report any suspicious activity to the police.

Romance Fraud

How can you spot the signs?

You've struck up a relationship with someone online and they declare their love for you quite quickly.

They constantly make up excuses why they can't video chat or meet in person and they try and move your conversation off the platform that you met on.

They claim to be overseas, working in the military or medical profession. They might say they are abroad, carrying out vital work, including charity work. This helps them paint a picture of themselves as being heroic, trustworthy and reliable, and also gives them an excuse for the use of international dialling codes or poor internet connection.

When they ask for your help, it will be -for a time critical emergency. The reason will be something emotive, which pulls at your heartstrings. They'll open up to you about a problem, or something that is worrying them to appear vulnerable and make you feel sorry for them. They may get defensive if you decline to help.

They tell you to keep your relationship private and insist that you don't discuss anything you talk about with your friends and family. This also includes the crisis they find themselves in that requires money. They will convince you this is part of the normal privacy that forms a healthy relationship.



How can you protect yourself

Avoid giving away too many personal details when speaking online to someone you've never met in person, as it can lead to your identity being stolen. This includes revealing your full name, date of birth and home address - even if you're doing it for what seems to be harmless reasons, such as your partner wants to send you flowers or a gift.

Stay on the site's messaging service until you meet in person. Criminals want to quickly switch to other platforms that are less regulated and have better encryption, so there's no evidence of them asking you for money.

On social media, only accept friend requests from people you know and trust.

Most online platforms have a reporting tool which you can use if you suspect someone online is using pictures that don't belong to them, you are suspicious of their behaviour, or they have asked you for money. Reporting their user profile means it can be blocked which helps protect others.

If their pictures seem too perfect or doesn't match up with what they tell you about themselves, you can perform a reverse image search on Google to see if the photos have been taken from somewhere, or someone, else.

With Christmas just around the corner we are thinking of calling friends and family but not, I suspect, from a red telephone box.

In 1924 the Royal Fine Art Commission invited three architects to submit designs for new telephone kiosks. The winner was Sir Giles Gilbert Scott who also designed Liverpool Cathedral where he is buried. Scott was at the time a trustee of Sir John Soane's Museum and he topped his kiosk with a dome similar to that on the mausoleum Soane had designed for himself. It was produced in cast iron as GPO model K2, replacing the K1 concrete kiosk.

Later designs had a similar appearance. The most common, the somewhat smaller K6, was introduced for King George V's silver jubilee in 1935.

The colour red was chosen to make them easy to spot, although Scott had suggested silver. These robust and iconic survivors of the 20th century, found in almost every town and village, are worth preserving. At the last count, 51 within the Hundred Parishes had been listed.

Most red phone boxes have now been decommissioned although a few, like the one in Anstey, still operate as a pay phone. Many villages have used the box to house a defibrillator; others have inventively turned them into informal book exchanges and information points.

Some villages have been even more imaginative: the box in Standon has been transformed into a greenhouse full of colourful plants.
