Action for Family Carers Supporting Carers Across Essex

Dementia Activity Group in Dunmow

People living with dementia can benefit from a hugely popular weekly Activity Group in Dunmow run by Essexbased charity Action for Family Carers.

More than a dozen people attend the Dunmow group and a further 50 in West Essex attend similar groups mixing with others and participating in a variety of mentally and physically stimulating activities ranging from seated exercise, indoor bowling, reminiscence discussions and games often including music.

The Groups are led by a small team of professional and caring staff and a large number of dedicated local volunteers. Morning sessions, called Keeping Active, focus on physical activity and afternoon sessions, called Active Minds, focus on activities to stimulate the mind.

The Activity Group takes place in the Dourdan Pavilion in Dunmow on Mondays 10-12.30 pm and 1-3.30 pm and new members are welcome.

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From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Fellow Villagers!

Hard to believe that we are approaching Christmas! How quickly 2021 has gone, despite the fact that a lot of it was in lock down and under Covid restrictions! Let us hope that we will be able to celebrate Christmas this year in style with lots of family and friends!

Hopefully a tiny piece of good news, we believe we may be moving on, very slightly, on the traffic calming scheme on the B1383! There were 3 Highways men spotted in high-vis jackets wielding a road measuring wheel, which is very exciting, especially as we thought Highways had gone into hibernation early! They were very shy though and not really open to any discussion about what they were doing but word has it they were measuring for a scheme - let us hope it is the same scheme as we are working on! We have been assured though by our County Councillor, Ray Gooding, that the money which has been set aside for this scheme is still available but they are just being a little reticent about when this work will commence.

We have requested two speed surveys, one along the B1383 in Quendon and one along Brick Kiln Lane. Highways have responded and confirmed that these will be arranged as soon as possible but as there is a backlog of requests, they cannot confirm when these will take place.

As requested in the October edition, Speedwatch volunteers are still very much needed. If you feel strongly about the current speeding the village is experiencing, please contact our Parish Clerk (see p4). We are looking for a Community Speedwatch Coordinator, as well as volunteers to help make a difference. Half an hour to an hour is all that is required to help monitor motorist speeds and raise awareness. The more helpers we have, the better, so the less time has to be committed by each person. The Police are only able to assist on a very limited basis so it really is the villagers who count!

As you will be aware, the VAS sign outside the village hall has only been working on an intermittent basis for the last few months. It had been reported to Highways a few times but with no response so we were very surprised a couple of weeks ago to see that the sign had disappeared completely! We have now discovered that Solargen, the manufacturers, have removed it for a little bit of TLC. Apparently the engineer (there are some around then!) has taken the equipment away for a full assessment, new optics and internal wires and a replacement battery. Let us hope that it will reappear again soon and will not languish in some Solargen cupboard for weeks!

We are in the process of writing up the response to the technical data assessment for the Call for Sites which has

been forwarded to Parish Councils for them to check for factual accuracy. We will definitely be pointing out that the two sites, the football pitch and Brick Kiln Lane are outside the development limits not within!

As many of you will have noticed, the verges around the village green are being slowly destroyed by impatient and uncaring drivers. This year seems to be particularly bad already and we are only at the beginning of the winter season, so if anyone sees any incompetent driving please take photographic evidence and send to the Parish Clerk so we can follow up.

We understand that a deer cull took place in Quendon Woods in mid November, we had no idea that this was due to happen so apologies for anyone and anyone's animals who were upset by the guns, we will ask for dates in advance so we can warn everyone when they are due to take place.

On this note, for your information, Strutt & Parker are no longer managing Maces Farm and the estate, this has now been taken on directly by Pegasi, who manage the estate on behalf of their client. Robert Timmins, the resident agent and company surveyor, who used to work for Strutt & Parker has now moved across to Pegasi and is a contact for any queries for the estate.

The second litter picking session took place at the beginning of November but unfortunately was not that well attended although quite a few bags were filled by the few who did turn up. There is going to be one every month now, the next one is on Saturday, 4 December.

We have had our first inquiry for hiring the village marquee, so we are hoping that it will be the first of many! If anyone is interested, the costs are £75 (for a weekend hire) plus a £100 refundable deposit. Advice for erecting it will be available! A section has been put onto the PC website (www.quendonandrickling.co.uk), under Local Information, so you can see when there is availability.

All 500 of the bluebell bulbs have now been planted under the new trees by the fountain so a big thank you to Paul Wilsher for all his help in purchasing and planting! They are planted behind and to the north of the fountain, under the newly planted trees. It has been suggested that the trees south of the fountain be allowed to grow a little and then we can plant some more bulbs in the shade that they cast. Bluebells planted from bulbs tend not to flower in the first year, so don't be surprised if there is no hue of blue in April/May next year but hopefully the following year, it will be a sea of blue!

The Green pond has become somewhat overgrown this year so our Wildlife Correspondent has approached the Essex Wildlife Trust for a quote for them to undertake a survey in the spring in the hope that it can be managed more ecologically in the future.

Approval has been given for the tulip tree, to commemorate the Queens Platinum Jubilee, to be planted on The Green and the dying elder, at the entrance to the school/pub lane, to be cut back to a high stump, remaining a home for many "wee beasties". The tree will be planted slightly within the boundary of The Green so its roots will not damage the lane in the years to come. A tree protector will be placed around the tree to provide it with a level of security from cricketers, cricket balls and footballs! A plaque will be placed on it so the generations to come will know the reason for its planting.

There are plans afoot for a pop up florist to be positioned outside The Cricketers on a Friday afternoon between 2 and 4. Karen Atwood is in the process of converting a vintage VW campervan into a mobile florist and will be selling a mixture of pick your own and pre-made bouquets. The campervan is nearly finished so Karen is hoping to be able to make one visit before Christmas. Please keep an eye on the village Facebook page for when that will be.

The lighting of the Village Green Christmas tree, which has been supplied by Tom's Trees, will be positioned by the Pavilion again and will take place on Saturday, 11 December at 5.30pm. There will be mulled wine, hot chocolate, mince pies and sausage rolls on sale. Please bring your own lanterns and your best singing voice for the carols! There will also be a Christmas display at the Village Hall, so do keep a look out!

Finally, the Parish Council would like to wish you all a very Happy Christmas!

Report from District Councillors Judy Emanuel and Neil Hargreaves


Local Plan and Call for Sites

As previously reported, the Call for Sites brought forward 299 sites across the district, with a capacity much greater than needed. So many of the sites will not be needed. The first fact checking review of each site by parish councils finishes on 28th November. This is of fairly mechanical non-subjective evidence such as how far to a shop selling fruit and vegetables, and proximity to say an SSSI, or Conservation Area. Then there will be a review by council officers factoring in more subjective matters such as landscape impact and accessibility. Early in 2022 there will be a second consultation for all to participate in and where tentative conclusions will be published. For sites that have previously been dismissed at appeal it is difficult to see how they could now be selected, but nothing is guaranteed.

Local Council Tax Support Scheme (LCTS)

This scheme reduces council tax for people on low incomes. A recommendation has been made by Cabinet, to the next full council meeting in December, to retain the contribution level at 12.5% of the full amount. This is the most generous discount scheme in Essex. In recent years the number of people claiming on the scheme has been falling, which is good news assuming this reflects a reduction in need. But the impact of Covid is seen in the increases in the last two years as shown in the table (overleaf). There are different categories of people who can claim and for example the 'Vulnerable/Disabled' in the table is disabled people, carers and blind people on a low income.

There is also an Exceptional Hardship Fund, which has greater flexibility as it does not relate to whether you are



a council tax payer. This currently has £37k in the budget, including an unspent amount of £20k remaining from £325k of hardship funding from Government, to provide additional support to those on the lowest income during the Covid Pandemic.

The LCTS scheme was the subject of a statutory consultation. Despite lots of publicity the response rate is always poor, with 28 responses this time, which is one more than last year! The comments are however quite interesting, some a bit critical but most not, and some expressing huge thanks, which is nice to read, and some saying the scheme should carry on at the current rate.

One I particularly liked was a comment, which I paraphrase, as not particularly wanting to pay more tax to pay for a more generous scheme, but was frustrated by central government's attitude to local discretion. We agree!

Water supplies

Lots more houses but no upgrade to water, sewerage and all other infrastructure is a recurring theme. In Newport the whole large north west quadrant of new building has been the subject of two years of complaints and various emergency and now permanent works to provide water supplies. This should all have been implemented before any house occupation, but it wasn't and supplies were low pressure, such that equipment would not work, or failed entirely. Affinity Water have now largely, and no doubt very expensively, retro-fitted new pipe lines and equipment and made goodwill gesture payments. But it has been difficult for our new residents.

Development of a similar scale will now be going ahead just south of Gt Chesterford. In order to help our neighbours, Wicken Lea resident Nina Clark has documented the whole saga, and working with Judy this has been passed to the councillors for Chesterford. The intention is to invite the water company to review it with us and the councillors to ensure it doesn't happen again.

As 2021 enters its final month, we anticipate seasonal celebrations to

brighten the shortest days of the year. The ancient tradition of decking our houses with garlands of fresh green holly branches reminds us of the continuity of life, bringing us cheer when the days are short.

On reaching the age of 20, female holly trees bear red berries on branches covered with prickly shiny green leaves which can be cut to make decorative wreaths.

Such wreaths featured in midwinter Celtic and Roman celebrations as symbols of good fortune, a tradition that continues thanks to the intervention of a local man, William Winstanley (1628 – 1698).

During the Commonwealth which lasted from 1649 to 1660, the Puritans under Oliver Cromwell proclaimed that it was illegal to celebrate Christmas, banning frivolities and feasting on mince pies. Winstanley, who lived in Quendon, believed in celebrating Christmas as a time for sharing joy, fun and good fortune with others. After restoration of the monarchy in 1660, using his influence as a writer, he encouraged a return to the

seasonal merrymaking which we still enjoy today.

Holly trees were frequently planted near houses to ward off a lightning strike; interestingly scientific research has revealed its spiky leaves can act as miniature lightning conductors! Holly also grows



in hedges or as a shrub in woods where its berries provide nourishment for blackbirds, thrushes and wood mice. Its dense branches provide secure nesting sites. Deer and rabbits will eat its nutritious leaves.

Today, many homeowners plant variegated forms of holly to provide interest in their gardens and they can select a

mixture of foliage to make seasonal decorations.

Yew is another evergreen with red coloured fruits (loved by birds and squirrels), but as its leaves are poisonous it is less suitable for indoor decorations.

Lost Language of Nature Project

The project is progressing with conservation work on the little bittern, which is found across Europe, western Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa including Madagascar. It is the smallest member of the heron family in



Europe, only about 30cm/12" long, though our specimen is smaller than that. It's currently on a temporary foam base, waiting for work to conserve and rebuild some of the skin that has been lost from its feet. A blackbird has also had its head reattached and a wing strengthened. Work feels slow but we've started on some challenging pieces, so slow and steady is the order of the day! We want to make lasting changes and improvements to the information the museum holds on these items, including folk names, stories and histories of the birds. There's good progress with the volunteer project working with this photographic collection. With around 70,000 photographic

slides, transcribing Barry's original hand-written reference

lists is no mean feat.

About a third of the boxes have original lists and the

transcription of these is nearly complete, creating a list on the computer of nearly 15,500 images, which is very easy to search through. Other volunteer-led tasks in this project will include creating lists from scratch for boxes without original lists, and eventually checking through the slides to cross reference with the computer records created.

Heidi Sharp joined us during the school summer holidays as our artist in residence. She explored women's histories and untold stories, inspired by the Museum's collections. Cycle Security – New bike for Christmas?

Cycle security is always an issue with many being stolen from locations including the town centre, residential areas, and educational establishments. Commonly cycles are not secured properly; don't make it easy for thieves: -

- 1. Double lock it using two locks slows thieves down and makes your bike less of a target. Use two quality locks, at least one of which is a D-lock. Thieves are less likely to carry multiple tools, so use two different types of lock if possible.
- 2. Lock the lot lock the frame and both wheels to a secure cycle stand.
- 3. Secure it secure your bike as close to the stand as possible to give any thieves little or no room to manoeuvre.
- 4. Take removable parts with you take parts that are easy to remove with you, such as wheels, lights, baskets, or the saddle. Or use locking skewers or nuts which can increase security by securing the bike's components to the frame permanently.
- 5. Park securely lock your bike at recognised secure cycle parking. It should be well lit, overlooked and covered by CCTV.

Where do they go? Number of places: - locally, in a container abroad, to another part of the country, stored in premises for later sale or sold as either a cycle or cycle parts via the internet, or third parties.

By taking some appropriate precautions and using good quality security products, and using them well, should help you to keep your property safe. Use the best security you can afford. Don't secure a £2,000 bicycle with a £10-£20 lock! As a guide look to spend 10-15% of

the value of the item on its security. Look for a "Sold Secure" certified chain and padlock or "D – Lock" preferably gold rated but certainly not below silver.

Make a note of the frame number, security mark the cycle, there are a number of different methods available such as www.datatag.co.uk, www.bikeregister.com, (others are available and can be found on the Secured by Design website below) and you can register property including cycles free of charge at www.immobilise.com. Take a photograph of the cycle and any areas of damage or marks of identification - some insurance companies may require one with the owner in the picture with it.

Don't forget at home:

- 1) don't leave garage doors open for long periods showing your expensive cycle and other property,
- 2) consider a "Ground anchor" or "Shed shackle" within your shed or garage to secure your cycle to,
- 3) look at your shed or garages security and ensure you have good locks and that the hinges are protected,
- 4) consider a shed alarm.

Check with your insurance company to see what security standards they require for your insurance cover to be valid.

CRIME PREVENTION from Neighbourhood Watch

PICKPOCKETS AND DISTRACTION THEFT.

Look out for observers - these include people loitering in public places checking out passers-by, paying particular interest to their handbags, shopping bags and where they might place their wallet or purse. This may be used near cashpoints, or your car when loading your shopping, where one person will stand close and distract you while another is watching you input your PIN or placing your handbag or wallet into your car.

Pickpockets also operate in shops and department stores,

where people may be distracted and so paying less attention to their belongings. Be more aware of your surroundings in busy shops and shopping centres because they're ideal places for pickpockets; it's easier for them to brush past people, take items and blend into the crowd.

Pickpockets may work in teams to distract the target while someone unseen removes the items and blends back into the crowd. Another member might step in as an enforcer in the event of an altercation.

Thieves vary their tactics based on the location and the density of the crowd. A group of them may push up against a victim in a crowded shop or street then quickly reach into the victim's pocket and steal their wallet, phone or purse.

Pickpockets are very skilled, know all the tricks and are

extremely light-fingered; most of their thefts only take a second or two. A thief may appear to be over-friendly for no particular reason and hug you while pickpocketing you. The thief may stumble into you and place their hands on you to steady themselves, whilst removing your wallet or phone!

Pickpocket teams are adept at creating distractions. This could be anything from a game to a loud shout, all designed to avert your attention while an unseen accomplice steals your valuables. So do try not to be easily distracted. Waving a sheet of paper in your face while asking directions means they can use the other hand to steal your stuff.

Thieves have been known to walk behind victims while slowly unzipping bags. Yes, they can be that bold. Never underestimate a pickpocket.
