Tony has been a huge asset to the villages in so many ways, especially providing the village and villagers with numerous signs for all manner of events. He really is the Signage King! He will be sorely missed!

There are now vacancies for 2 councillors. Please come forward to help, your village really does need you. It is so important that we have people in the villages to stand up and have a voice! If we do not have a full contingent we are unable to help the villages as much as we would like to. Remember we are all volunteers and the majority of our current councillors all have full time employment as well, so we really do need more feet on the ground. Please do come and have a chat - you only need give as much time as you are able to give but you will be giving so much back!

It will be no surprise to you that Essex Highways are still missing in action! The traffic calming scheme is apparently still waiting for an engineer to appear so the dust continues to settle! Despite numerous emails, we are being completely ignored, we do not even receive an email of acknowledgement any more but we are very persistent, have a plan of action and are determined to make this happen. The speeding through Quendon is becoming more frightening by the day so please bear with us and we will get there by hook or by crook!

The footpath, or lack of it, running from Quendon south to Ugley has been reported to Essex Highways, again! #### **Report from District Councillors Judy Emanuel and Neil Hargreaves**

#### **Call for sites**

On the day of writing this report the first assessment of the 299 sites put forward by landowners across the district has been published for parish councils to review. I haven't been through in detail, but at this stage it is only a review for factual accuracy of a set of computer generated factors, mostly distances to things like schools and services. This work was outsourced to a consultancy called AECOM. There will be further stages of public consultation after editorial comment has been added including, I assume, discounting the clear non-runners. A glaring error to be corrected is that the football ground/ Belchams Lane proposal is shown as being inside development limits.

#### Stansted Airport

The council has been refused leave to take the Stansted Airport expansion decision to a judicial review. The review was requested because the Inspectors gave no weight to the extra CO2 emissions despite the large reduction requirement in the revised Climate Change Act, which now includes aviation. There was a seven day window to decide if this should be taken on to the High Court. At a full council meeting there was unanimous agreement that it should not be taken further. The council has already accounted for its own costs in last year's accounts, and has reserves for costs awarded against it, but to carry on further would have been difficult.

#### **Council offices**

Just a reminder that the Saffron Walden council office front desk is open from 9am to 12pm and 1pm to 4pm every Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. The building will remain closed to the public every Wednesday because the car park is used as an NHS drive through and walk-in PCR test centre.

#### **Council car parks**

Following theft of the cash boxes from most of the council car parks across the district, with the loss of several thousand pounds, new ticket machines have been installed which are card only. This was intended to be a trial run in a few car parks, but the criminal activity has forced an immediate implementation. The old machines would have cost £1,000 each to repair, and still be vulnerable.

#### <u>Archaeology</u>

Archaeological finds will be on every location in this region, and it is always a planning condition to do a survey. A recent survey commissioned by developer Trivselhus for the large London Road development in Newport beneath the primary school is very comprehensive and runs to 106 pages. Here is an extract summary, with date ranges added from Google.

The earliest finds were worked flints of Mesolithic to Early Bronze Age (which is about 10,000 BC to 1,200 BC) including a tranchet axe (a paring knife flint), leaf arrowhead and a quantity of blades.

The majority of features were of Middle/Late Bronze Age (1,500–900 BC) date, possibly representing the partial remains of a field system peripheral to (a) settlement. A north/south row of postholes (near the croquet) defined a fence line associated with an east/west boundary ditch. Contemporary large pits may have related to water storage and collection, whilst dispersed smaller pits provided further evidence for occupation and disposal activity. The predominately domestic nature of the pottery assemblage recovered is indicative of settlement activity in the vicinity, possibly located beyond the site's western boundary (the primary school site?). Early Anglo-Saxon (410 to 660 AD) settlement was represented

by a single Sunken-featured Building. Late postmedieval agricultural land-use was represented by the remains of a large possible quarry pit or pond, a dump of Ceramic Building Material in the subsoil and a ditch that contained a horse burial. There was little Roman material. There were lots of individual finds such as a clay pipe, a primitive quern (corn grinding stone), and two pieces of iron which they even x-rayed.

The remains are considered 'of moderate local to minor regional significance' and worthy of publication. Brief summary to the new residents: '*You are not the first people to live here!*'

#### **Our Member of Parliament**

I was delighted to be promoted and have now taken on the role of Minister of State at the new Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, working closely with Michael Gove MP as the new Secretary of State for the Department. I will also continue as Minister for Equalities, alongside the new Foreign Secretary Liz Truss MP.

#### Meeting with the East of England Ambulance Service

I met with Glenn Young, Head of Operations at the East of England Ambulance Service Trust recently for a tour of the Saffron Walden Ambulance Station and to hear more about the challenges the trust is facing, particularly as a result of the pandemic. One of the key concerns raised was the increase in calls to 111 due to residents being unable to book face to face appointments at their GP. Unfortunately this is resulting in ambulances being dispatched, in some cases unnecessarily.

I have raised the issue directly in my regular engagements with local NHS leaders, and I know CCGs are doing their utmost to assist GPs in managing the increasing demand on their services which are adjusting to this and focussing on their phone operation/digital offering. I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone at EEAST for their continued hard work despite the challenges they are facing and for Mr Young for meeting with me.

#### Insulate Britain protests and the Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill

This country has a proud history of allowing free speech, but the right to peaceful protest does not extend to harassment or threatening behaviour. I have received a number of emails from residents who have been impacted by the Insulate Britain protests. Some of the scenes at these protests have been unacceptable, including those in our constituency which included blocking the M11 roundabout.

Their actions are dangerous and counterproductive. We all agree that climate change must be tackled, but this sort of behaviour achieves nothing, puts drivers at risk and increases pollution. This has been echoed by my ministerial colleagues the Home Secretary and the Transport Secretary.

I welcomed the Government's swift action alongside Highways England to seek an injunction against the protestors, which was subsequently granted. This means activists face being in contempt of court with possible imprisonment if they do not adhere to it.

I am also very supportive of the Government's Police, Crime, Sentencing and Courts Bill which will ensure that the police can better manage highly disruptive protests and maintain the balance between the rights of a protestor and the rights of individuals to go about their daily business.

#### Gas supply and the energy price cap

The Energy Price Cap is set by the energy regulator Ofgem, which reviews it every 6 months to reflect changes in the cost of supplying energy. I appreciate some residents are disappointed Ofgem raised the cap this month - this is due to an increase in prices on the

wholesale energy markets. This clearly has been a difficult time for households and I am assured that Ofgem have taken into account the challenging circumstances many people are facing during the pandemic.

The Government has been clear that protecting consumers, particularly vulnerable or low-income households, is their main priority. The Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy has reiterated that the energy price cap will remain in place. Alongside this, there is significant support available via the Warm Home Discount, Winter Fuel Payments and Cold Weather Payments which will continue assisting millions of households with their energy bills.

I urge anyone worried about paying their energy bills to contact their supplier and access the support available. If you have any concerns or queries, please get in touch with me directly and I will continue to correspond with local organisations to ensure residents are getting support if they require it.

#### **DVLA application delays**

I know some residents have been experiencing delays with the DVLA. We have seen this have an impact across government such as with the severe backlog of HGV licence applications.

I have written directly to the Department for Transport to raise my concerns and the impact of the delays. I have been assured the Department and the DVLA are doing everything they can to process applications as quickly as possible, however in light of these delays there has been a significant increase in correspondence and telephone calls recently which has impacted the time taken to respond. The Minister has assured me that the DVLA understands the impact that delays can have on people's everyday lives and additional resource is being utilised in the relevant teams, with every effort being made to direct resource to the most critical work to ensure that customers in the greatest need are dealt with as a priority - they are also looking at securing extra office space, additional staff and new online services to help reduce the backlog.

I will continue to monitor this situation closely and urge any residents to get in touch with me directly if they are having difficulties.

#### <u>The Government's consultation on outdoor measures</u> <u>for high streets</u>

Last month the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities launched a public consultation to make outdoor measures for high streets permanent. The government is aiming to make a number of these permanent so that people can continue to enjoy outdoor hospitality and local attractions – something I have seen across the constituency as businesses have innovated, and can continue to do so as we build back better from the pandemic.

I am urging residents and businesses to give their views

#### **Identification of Police**

There has been much recent discussion about Police activity and advice about verifying the genuine article. But how should we do that? Check their warrant? How do you know if it's genuine; *have you ever seen one*?

I approached the officers at their stand in Saffron Walden market recently to ask, "What does a real warrant card look like?"

One thing it doesn't look like is the silver badge in a black wallet that is so often flashed in TV dramas, though many officers (but not all) keep their warrant cards in such a holder. The card may be valid identification without the badge but not *vice versa*.

The warrant card is like a credit card with a hologram in one corner, the name, number and rank of the officer and a photograph of him or her. Bear in mind that they aren't necessarily renewed very frequently (typically on change of rank) and may be distorted by the effects of the passage of time (on the card as well as on the officer!). The genuine

card has on its reverse a note in braille of the officer's name. The Officer in the Market-place also had a number of other officially-identifying cards, for instance for parking at the Police Station. You might feel suspicious if shown what might be a warrant card, if it's on its own and doesn't bear signs of use.

We have been generally advised that, if in any doubt about the individual's *bona fides*, we should ask him or her to use their walkie-talkie radio to get their base station to confirm who and where they are, but as admitted by the Officer in the market-place, walkie-talkies are readily available in the Internet and could simply be used to contact a nearby accomplice.

The advice was that in serious doubt (obviously only then), call **999**. Where an Officer is on duty, his/her location is monitored, presumably by GPS. If in doubt, use the "tag" number as well as the claimed name to check!

"Please to remember the Fifth of November, gunpowder, treason and plot.

We know of no reason why gunpowder treason should ever be forgot."

This traditional rhyme appeared soon after the failed plot to ignite barrels of gunpowder beneath the House of Lords on the occasion of the state opening of Parliament



**The Conspirators** 

by King James I on 5th November 1605.

The man found with the gunpowder was Guy Fawkes, one of a group of English Catholics whose intention was to assassinate the Protestant King James so that one of his young Catholic children could assume the throne, thereby restoring a Catholic monarchy. Some 400 years later, the preservation of the monarchy and parliament is still celebrated by many with a bonfire and the burning of a Guy.

Like other major events in British history, there is a link with The Hundred Parishes. In this case, the primary link is Sir William Waad (pronounced Wade) of 17th-century Battles Hall in the parish of Manuden.

Waad, who lived from 1546 to 1623, had pursued a distinguished career in the service of the Crown and in 1605 held the position of Lieutenant of the Tower of London, responsible for those held prisoner there and

specifically for the interrogation of prisoners. The king gave permission for the use of torture, including the rack, to assist in this questioning. It was not long before most of the plotters were rounded up, interrogated, tried and

executed by being publicly hung, drawn and quartered for their involvement in the Gunpowder Plot.

Manuden's most famous former resident is remembered on a tablet inside the parish church.

There is a second local link to the Gunpowder Plot. It is believed that Tiptofts, a 14th-century house in Wimbish, may have been used as a meeting place by the conspirators.

#### Rickling Invitational 2 – 1 Dell Boys Athletic: Experience Triumphs Over Youth at the Battle of Quickling

"It was never going to be easy," they said. Those famously regretful words have been uttered by many sporting stalwarts over the centuries. Sadly, the eleven Dell Boys Athletic players who fought Rickling Invitational on October 9th, were to utter those melancholy words too. The wandering multi-disciplinary sports team, playing in their first ever football match, also proved they were certainly not sporting stalwarts - and nor had they ever been.

The honour of triumphing over the exuberance of youth fell to Brick Kiln Lane's Tony Gavin – a man and captain who demonstrated the heart and wisdom of a true sporting stalwart. He assembled a team that used their near-centuries of footballing know-how to dismantle the Dell Boys' defence and attack with poise and patience. However, the contest didn't begin that way.

In fact, the match began at a rapid pace – one that was destined to slow after just a few short minutes. As it turns out, a long cricket season, new football boots and a lack of substitutes will not make up for the fitness levels that come when your team's combined age equals that of Rickling's starting goalkeeper. A shrewd passing game at high intensity, with a range of through balls only possible with feet like De Bruyne, kept Rickling on their toes.

With just 5 minutes left in the half, an attack that began from a right flank throw-in at the midway line press forward. Dell Boys' quick-witted and remarkably handsome right back (who shall not be named) curled the ball over Rickling's left back into the path of Jamie Williams, whose giraffe-like legs controlled the ball, swung it in towards Ben Miller at the back post, who deftly headed into the bottom left corner. Dell Boys had scored their first goal as a club, and excitedly stormed into the lead. It was in the second half - after a precautionary midmatch break - that Rickling Invitational really roared. Maybe it was thanks to the cheers of Andy McNaughton, a Spurs supporter so excited by the prospect of seeing his team actually win for once, that fuelled on the Rickling eleven. More likely, it was the commandeering performances from Benjamin John in central defence and Biff Green in midfield that allowed Rickling to dominate possession thanks to precise distribution to the flanks.

The first goal came less than ten minutes in. A fast-paced move from the wings left the ball at the twinkling right foot of Simon Manchett, who volleyed into the bottom left corner from outside the box. I hate to say it, but it really was delicious.

Then after 25 minutes of back-and-forth struggle, the Dell Boys would witness their demise with another Manchett masterpiece. The midfielder found himself with space almost 25 yards out, and without hesitation (and admittedly anything that resembled the much-needed defensive practice of closing down) curled the ball over the goalkeeper's flailing hands to hit the top right corner of the net.

And that, with the unwelcome addition of weariness and the 22 blistered feet of the Dell Boys, concluded the match.

Enormous praise and thanks must go to grass expert and future-Wembley groundsman, Ted Crow, for creating a dreamlike surface; and to John Joannou, the Howard Webb of Southeast Essex, for officiating the battle with the firm and fair grace of a swan.

But, to end this report, I must recycle a sentiment made infamous by the great Arnold Schwarzenegger. Rickling Invitational – we'll be back!
