From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers,

Looking back from October I always feel that a busy late spring makes the summer season feel so much longer and brighter. I'm glad to say a busy few weeks recently promises the same effect this year.

The Jubilee picnic party on The Green attracted well over two hundred people. Many remarked this was the first time they could properly get out and meet fellow villagers since lockdown - just what the Events team on the PC was trying to achieve. An abiding memory will remain of a line of waving arms Glasto-style (albeit small-scale!) while singing along to "Sweet Caroline" so ably encouraged and led by The Voice Box, who provided such fine entertainment.

A huge thank you therefore goes out to Carrie Williams and Katherine Nuthall for putting in so much effort to get the event going. The new PC Events sub-committee of Rob and Phil also deserve praise for their energy and dedication in running the show.

You may have also spotted our contribution to the Jubilee canopy - a newly planted Tulip Tree on the Green at the turn-off to the school and pub. This one will take a good few years to get going but promises to be a lovely landmark for the future. If you want to see what a mature specimen looks like, check them out in Audley End gardens.

The Jubilee celebration also caused the Jubilee Fountain to sprout a new look. You will have seen the marvellous flowers, bunting, flag and crown adorning it during the day - but did you also experience it elegantly lit up after dark - a triumph! So many thanks go to Katherine Nuthall, Sue and Chris Phillips and Liz Spearpoint.

On the subject of after-dark lighting for Cambridge Road Chris, has left the solar-powered spotlights in place on the fountain, and we can see how well they work both in lighting up the feature and casting a bit more light to passers-by on the roadside footpath.

There is a glimmer of hope for improvement of the state of the footpath along the B1383. Our footpath supremo, Gari, has escalated the issue to our MP who herself has put pressure on ECC to come up with a solution. The sorry state of the footpaths is not limited to our neck of the woods, but stretches all the way down to the edge of Bishop's Stortford. The problem is funding. Since footpath maintenance work was devolved to the Rangers it's proved too much for them to cover in stretches outside villages, and a reappraisal of how to maintain these footpaths between villages is under way.

Continuing down Cambridge Road to Waterbutt Row parking: the minor snag resolution is in progress, and proposals for improving the look of the parking delineation in the Conservation Area are in preparation. It won't be resolved in the flash of an eye but we have a promise that residents' preferences will be respected.

Lastly on the subject of Highways, we are starting up Community Speedwatch again - provided we have enough volunteers. The Speedwatch effort previously was to provide evidence backing the traffic calming submission, and once that project was initiated the Speedwatch stopped. This time though the Police have asked us to resume the Speedwatch and they'd welcome evidence to determine when they undertake their very effective speed traps. Speedwatch now has more sanction behind it than previously – after warning letters,

a third infringement will result in official police action. See elsewhere for an article on this, but contact Ljiljana or any PC member if you'd like to volunteer.

After an interregnum we have a new vicar for the churches, Rev. Pete Allen. He was installed in May and held his first service here in June. Firmly of the belief that the church community exists principally outside the church buildings themselves, he's keen to meet people and is friendly - and very keen on sports. You may see him and his wife Sharon walking or running locally ... or bump into him at the pub. Do please introduce yourself and make him welcome.

Maces Farm is progressing with an idea aired last year to be more integrated with the village. They are setting up information boards on popular walking paths around the villages. These signs will give passers-by some indication of what crops are growing, what they are used for and where the footpaths lead to. Much of this information will be found through a QR code leading onto their website, which will be maintained by the Farm. The signs will also include a reminder to clean up after your dog and to keep off the crops (that's their benefit to the Farm!!)

Also regarding farm matters, we have more information

on the wildflower edges to some of the fields around the village. These are planted with a government-supplied flower mix. They are designed to complement local wildlife and insects, and won't flower in the first year. I'm afraid we'll have to wait till 2023 to see how flowery our wildflower patches become!

And sorry – no news yet on Call for Sites (i.e. the large-scale development proposal from Pegasi - more information on the website): we wait and wait but I expect there will be some more information soon. Watch. This. Space.

Finally, we say goodbye and thank you to Katherine Nuthall as she makes way in her busy life for managing her massive building project at home while still working. Katherine has been dedicated in her pursuit of Highways and inspirational with her events leadership, organisation and contributions, from pumpkins to dragons – good luck Katherine!

Well, that's all for now. Let's raise a glass to summer — may it be long and relaxing! The long-term farmers' weather forecast states it'll definitely be hot (famous last words...)

District Councillors' Report

Local Council Tax Support scheme


UDC has a council tax discount scheme for people on low incomes. This covers people of working age, pensioners and vulnerable and disabled people and their carers. At a meeting on June 9, the Cabinet voted to freeze the scheme's contribution rate at 12.5 per cent, which is the lowest in Essex. This means claimants would only have to pay 12.5 per cent of their council tax bill, and would be the ninth time this rate has been frozen by the council.

The number of working age claimants has dropped for the first time in as many years, from 1,051 to 924 people, which is expected as a post-covid trend, because people

have been returning to work.

943 people classed as vulnerable or disabled were claiming the scheme between April 2021-April 2022, up from 851 the previous year.

This decision will to go to a public consultation before final approval. In the consultation last year I noted that a number of people commented that they were just the wrong side of the cut off point, but still struggling. Those who were not eligible for the scheme but are still in need financially can claim from the council's emergency hardship fund, which is open to all Uttlesford residents. The council's budget for the emergency hardship fund is

£17k. In addition, UDC received £325k from the government to provide emergency support during the pandemic for claimants of local council tax support. However, £10k of this fund has not yet been spent and has been carried over into the emergency hardship fund.

The estimated cost of the scheme for 22/23 will be £467k for UDC, which compares with an overall £17m council turnover. The same discount applies to all the other preceptors – Essex, Fire, Police and parish councils.

Climate change progress

The latest annual report shows that the council's greenhouse gas emissions have been cut by more than half since 2019. This is outstanding progress on our goal for UDC to be net-zero by 2030.

In 2019, the council generated the equivalent of more than 60kg of greenhouse gas emissions per district household – and had done so for years. As a result of the work R4U has undertaken with the Council's senior officer team, that figure has consistently dropped each year and last year was 26kg per household. The largest reductions to date have been achieved by switching to green energy tariffs, changes to UDC's vehicle fleet, and more flexible staff working practices.

UDC has replaced boilers with heat pumps in 90 council houses – which aren't cheap, fitted solar panels to 300, and wall insulation to 230. Elsewhere, solar panel arrays have been fitted to many of the Council's own facilities. A £450k grey/water recycling plant has been installed to wash bin lorries. Over £100k has been spent providing 43 electric vehicle charging points across the district,

along with £25k on tree and hedge planting. The council's Chesterford Research Park buildings are mostly modern and 'carbon efficient' and the solar scheme now in progress there will make its electricity supply carbon free. However, our other buildings are a mix and will now be subject to a professional assessment to work out how we can make them also carbon neutral.

We can all take our own actions to reduce our carbon footprint. That includes reducing energy usage, especially as prices continue to increase. Essex Police ride along

It was good to join Essex Police - Uttlesford District for a meeting and on a ride along with our new local commander, Chief Superintendent Claire Talbot around Uttlesford. Ridealongs are a great way to see first-hand what our officers are responding to day to day.

I joined officers conducting a speed watch in Stansted – we monitored vehicles travelling along Church Road. I was surprised to see so many cars going above the speed limit.

Speeding is an issue across the constituency, particularly along our more 'rural' country roads. Essex Police have assured me they conduct regular speed watches in our towns and villages – you can help by joining your local community speed watch, reporting anti-social driving or working with your local councillor to request traffic calming measures.

SEND review

It is essential that we have an education system that works for all children and young people, including those with special educational needs.

I have supported many parents with children in our constituency who have SEND and whilst there has been notable progress in the support and education infrastructure, there is still more to do.

This month the Government announced a Green paper that will consult on a stronger national system for children with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), boosting parent confidence.

The ambitious green paper is the result of the SEND Review, commissioned to improve an inconsistent, process-heavy and increasingly adversarial system that too often leaves parents facing difficulties and delays accessing the right support for their child – something I have seen when supporting constituents, particularly with ECHPs.

The Government's plans have been opened to public consultation, and I would encourage you to make your views known at https://consult.education.gov.uk/send-review-division/send-review-2022/, by the 22nd of July.

HELP STOP SPEEDING THROUGH OUR VILLAGE BECOME A COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH VOLUNTEER

Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where members of local communities join with the support and supervision of their local police to record details of speeding vehicles using approved detection devices. Pre lockdown we had an active Community Speedwatch Team and the data the team collected played a vital role in galvanising a positive response from Essex Highways to address the speeding on the B1383. After a two-year enforced Covid absence, we hope to reinstate the 'Watch' in order to keep the momentum going. We will be focusing on the B1383.

We need to gather a team of 10–12 members to ensure that each person's commitment is limited to no more than 60 minutes once a fortnight, or less. All members of the team will be trained (at the moment the training is online).

Object of the Month

The Museum's 'Object of the Month' provides an opportunity to explore interesting and unusual objects from our stores.



During June we celebrated the Lost Language of Nature project, with repair work to this hen harrier. Saffron Walden Museum wants to hear your stories about wildlife and nature in your life, or that you know from parents or grandparents. Pick up a form in the Museum or head to their website for more information. Some old names for hen harriers are Blue sleeves, Vuzz kitt, Grey gled; or Ringtail for females, like this fragile mounted skin. The photo was taken during work to stabilise and preserve the bird, which came from Saffron Walden in the 1800s. Today, hen harriers are one of Britain's most threatened birds of prey. The name comes from their hunting of wildfowl, but today they are seen as a threat to managed grouse shooting in parts of England and Scotland.

Project Update: Lost Language of Nature

We are very pleased to share the launch of an artistic **commission** for the Lost Language of Nature project! Essex Cultural Diversity Project and Saffron Walden Museum invite proposals from creative practitioners for a new commission that will respond to the global taxidermy collections at the Museum, exploring with communities and visitors the everyday language used to describe animals and the natural world. responses should aim to illuminate traditional and modern relationships of people with nature and the environment, celebrating diversity, folk and informal knowledge and engage with new communities who may not visit the Museum currently. There are thousands of village halls in England, owned and run by local

councils, churches or independent trustees for the benefit of local communities. The Hundred Parishes has its share, with a great variety of buildings and history.



Hunsdon

Probably the oldest is in Hunsdon: it dates from the 15th century and was once a school. Barley's 16th-century building - once a guildhall - still looks ancient, while Westmill has a converted 17th-century barn. Ashdon claims to have the only

local thatched village hall: that element of the building, once a house, dates from the 17th century. Radwinter's

hall is part of village redevelopment in the artsand-crafts style after a disastrous fire in 1874.

Many purpose-built village halls appeared after the First World War, funded either by public subscription or a generous benefactor and

often built as a lasting memorial to those who died in the conflict. Ugley's hall was built in 1920, funded largely by the local Tennant family, while Blackmore End in

Hempstead and Stocking Pelham have found new life for their old schools, while Chrishall and Stebbing repurposed former churches. Hildersham's village hall started life as a First World War army surgical ward and was brought from Cambridge.

Our village halls are greatly valued and used by all manner of community groups for meetings, sport and exercise, pre-school activities, cultural performances, quizzes, exhibitions, farmers

Wethersfield benefited from the generosity of Samuel Courtauld.

Several halls have been converted from their original use: Wethersfield has a second village hall, part of what was once a brewery. Little Chesterford,

markets and so on. We see new village halls appearing quite regularly, for example at Great Hormead in 2015 and Duxford in 2020. Some are now referred to as "community centres" but we all know what they mean!
