From the Vicarage Study Rev. Peter Allen, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

I can remember when I was a child, and Easter meant numerous chocolate eggs coming my way from aunts, uncles, family friends and more. Restraint not being my strong point, it used to find me devouring as many as I could in one go, and getting to that point where the thought of facing another piece of chocolate wasn't a mouth-watering prospect but a stomach churning one! My sense is that it is no longer the case that children get so many eggs from such a wide group of people today, and it maybe that chocolate no longer seems to be the treat as it once was. Familiarity and being over faced to the point of being turned off is not only something we can experience in relation to food, it can happen in relation to our approach to Easter.

I remember attending a Roman Catholic church where I was quite impressed with a statement that the priest said when giving out the notices for up and coming events and services. He interjected his notices with, "You don't have to go to all these things you know, as you can have too much religion." I'm not sure everyone understood his statement in the same way, but my take on it was that he knew that it was possible to mistake religious-looking activity for faith, and equate this activity with acting as a good Christian. Easter and Christianity are not about religion so much as they are about fullness of life. Nowhere does it say in the New Testament that Christ rose from the dead to bring us more religion. However it does say Christ came that we may have life in all its fullness. That Christ came to set us free. That Christ came to show us the way. That Christ came to give us sight to see the things of God.

These are just a few of the things Christ and others said about him, and the reasons he came to earth, died the way he did, rose again from the dead and ascended into heaven. Not one of them speaks to me of what may popularly be known as religious ceremonies, and religious tradition, and religious rites are very important and uplifting, when they give us the vehicle to express something of the faith that burns within and which just has to be expressed. Sometimes when our light of our faith is burning low, they keep us on course and give a structure too, but on the whole they need to be approached with faith and a heart that carries the Spirit of Christ within.

If this Easter you find yourself taking for granted the retelling of the Easter story, or getting over-faced with religious activity, it may be worth considering whether you are a seeker of life before you are a seeker of religion. Or has religion begun to take precedence over the life of the one it is meant to direct you to. For a moment in the place Jesus



was buried, Mary mistook Jesus for someone who worked there as a gardener. It wasn't that Jesus wasn't there right in front of her, it was just that this reality had become blurred by other things, and having no expectation of seeing him there anyhow. We too can suffer a similar kind of inability to see that the risen Jesus is closer to us than we think, and that he wishes to lead us into greater life, greater freedoms, greater vision, greater wisdom, greater understanding and greater peace. Christ hasn't risen from the dead to bring us more religion, but to bring us life. May you know the reality of the risen Jesus this Easter.

From the Parish Council Chair

April!

Surely it's Spring by now! March had us fooled for a bit; here's hoping we get something more spring-like this month.

Just a few points I'd like to mention this month.

In March we have been involved with starting the refreshment of the **Neighbourhood Plan** (NhP). Just to remind you, this is the Newport and Quendon & Rickling Plan, and, in the absence of an approved Local Plan, holds significant weight in local Planning decisions, as well as laying out how we, the community, would like our village to be in the future. It was adopted two years ago and is due to be refreshed. Brandon Chapman and Phil Sowter from Q&R are tackling the subject.

One of the most important areas it covers is a list of recommended sites in the villages for housing development. Obviously this overlaps with the Uttlesford Call for Sites – delayed, but due for decision in the next few months – which will form an important part of the Local Plan. It's likely that whichever way the decision falls, we must accept that some housing development is inevitable, given the demand for housing hereabouts, and

the plethora of developers interested. Where the NhP comes in is that it is an opportunity for us to direct where development should go, rather than leaving it to speculative developers to choose the sites that suit them.

There will be more on this in the coming months, and watch out over the summer for the Call for Sites decision on Pegasi's development plans here.

On the Bank Holiday Monday, May 8th, from 1pm we will be organising a **Coronation Picnic on the Green**. The Cricketers Arms will be providing a barbeque to augment any picnic you want to bring along yourself; it might be a good idea to bring a gazebo, just in case the weather is "spring-like".

There will be a free Bouncy Castle (for youngsters only, I'm afraid), stalls from village societies and music for entertainment; it'll be a good opportunity to come together and see old faces once more, have some fun, as well as celebrate His Majesty's Coronation.

Wildlife areas round the village will, as in previous years, be left unmown through the summer. This encourages pollinating insects especially. Maces Farm's Countryside Stewardship programmes should

show some results this year, so I hope we'll see a blast of biodiversity round the village. The Information Boards that Maces Farm have put up contain a link to a lot of information on crops and stewardship initiatives by the farm, and are definitely worth a read.

Councillors. We're very sorry to see Rob Ryder resigning from the council due to his work and family commitments; Rob you've done great work liaising with the School and organising Events – thank you from all of us.

We have two vacancies on the Council at present. If we drop below three councillors we cannot make decisions, and the day-to-day concerns of the village will not be acted upon: no footpath maintenance, no village events, no development scrutiny, no community link to the district and county councils. Even with two vacancies, the hard-working unpaid volunteer

councillors we have are stretched at times.

Given the imminent pressure on development that will come as the Local Plan is developed, a voice for the community in these decisions is more vital than ever, and without Councillors this will not happen. So please do get in touch with Keith the clerk to put yourself forward as a Councillor; it's interesting and friendly and the work is not too onerous! District Councillors' Report

Grant success

The UDC cabinet has in March approved £125k of funding for projects involving climate change actions, biodiversity and carbon reduction measures. Quendon & Rickling PC was awarded £5,425 in the Biodiversity Restoration and Enhancement category towards 'Clearance work on two Rickling Green ponds; one on the village green and one in Brick Kiln Lane.' We look forward to sparkling ponds, ducks, damsel flies and bull rushes! At the end of August the fund reopens for another round of applications. With about £175k available.

End of term

As there are district council elections in May, the March full council meeting is the last one for some time and a bit of an end of term event. Normally motions presented at Council are from the opposition as an administration doesn't need to raise instructions to tell itself to do things. However this time R4u councillors have raised three items. Here is a flavour.

Civic Amenity Site in Saffron Walden Booking System Motion:

'The Council believes that the Civic Amenity Site in Saffron Walden does not have queues. Council therefore calls on the Chief Executive to write to Essex County Council and request that plans for a booking system are abandoned and that the drop-in, no-appointment-necessary operating system is continued at the Saffron Walden site.

Proposer: Councillor Martin Foley.

John Lodge, well known to this parish, will be seconding the motion. Part of the reason for this intended action is that UDC is repeatedly blamed on social media for this piece of ineptitude which is entirely an Essex decision, on which none of us were consulted and it seems the staff at the Civic Amenity Site were not consulted either.

To consider the motion regarding Essex Devolution as proposed by Councillor Hargreaves.

"The council considers that 'Greater Essex' is too diverse for a mayor to effectively represent and support all parts equitably, and that the extra cost of the precept, to pay for a fifth layer of governance, would be unwelcome for the residents of Uttlesford. The council believes that the possible 'Devolution' option for 'Greater Essex' is not a substitute for setting local government finances on a sound basis, and may result in wasteful projects. The council therefore instructs the Chief Executive to write to government urging them to implement a programme to fully fund councils on a long term stable basis, that will enable them to deliver all of the high quality services needed, before further considering Devolution deals."

The government is offering cash handouts to higher tier councils but only if you have an elected mayor. This is another decision which neither residents nor elected councillors here have any vote on. The decision on adding this fifth layer of governance (parish, district, county, mayoralty and Westminster) is with Essex, Southend and Thurrock, which would be the fictional Greater Essex. Southend and Thurrock are independent unitary councils and not part of ECC. If handed out pro rata to population it could mean £2m a year to Uttlesford. But the distribution decision would be with the probably Conservative mayor in Chelmsford and there is no guarantee of an equitable arrangement. There is also the danger that extra cash is just deducted off the core financial settlements from government. I recently attended an online meeting with Minister Lee Rowley from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and

Communities on the final settlement of local authority funding for 23/24. There was a grand announcement of greater funding for the Rural Support Grant, which having lots of rural, UDC receives. After the meeting I checked with our deputy finance officer. Yes, we had got extra rural funding. But as the total settlement had already been capped, the extra amount was deducted off another line and we got nothing. Which must be the case for many other councils and the minister and officials must have known that when they made the statement.

What is needed is council core funding set out on a sound long term basis, not endless announcements of odd schemes from a department with an odd name, from short lived ministers.

Mould and Right to Buy Motion:

"The Council believes that this and other councils are tackling the health issue of mould in houses, accruing substantial investigation and remediation costs in the process, which are required by statute to be paid for out of rents from council tenants. The viability of the Housing Revenue Account is degraded by the loss of houses, and their rental income, through Right to Buy (RTB), from which this council loses on average 12 properties a year. A significant burden of rules and restrictions surrounds RTB which means that the Council cannot replace houses sold without adding in additional funds. The resulting loss is not only rental income, but a shortage of homes and a lengthened wait for housing applicants who need to move. This leads to overcrowding which in itself heightens the likelihood of homes suffering from damp and mould. Therefore, in order to support the financial viability of providing quality homes for tenants in the district, this Council instructs the Chief Executive to write to Government to request that they either:

i. fully reimburse councils' Housing Revenue
 Accounts for losses arising from Right to Buy, or

ii. follow the leads of the Scottish Government and Welsh Assembly and abolish Right to Buy entirely"

Council house budgets are required to do everything - fix long term inherited problems, new problems, upgrades and fund new building. But since 1980 about £75 billion has been lost to council house budgets as a result of Right to Buy and about 2 million sales have taken place. Added to this is the strong disincentive for councils to build homes, only to have sell typically the best ones at a discount, lose income from future rental payments and not receive the full sale receipt. Mass building of council houses was destroyed at a stroke by Margaret Thatcher and Michael Heseltine and it is way beyond the powers of this council to repair that damage, but we do our best. Obtaining the full sale proceeds, and without a host of rules and restrictions, would help.

On a lovely day in February the Garden Group made the first of their visits for 2023 by visiting Grove Lodge, Saffron

Walden. The owner, Chris Shennan, introduced them to his half-acre, semi-woodland garden where hellebores, aconites, snowdrops, crocus and winter-flowering shrubs have been allowed free rein to create a beautiful, natural scene, high in biodiversity yet close to the town centre. There was plenty more to see with two ponds, topiary, an orchard and fruit and vegetable garden. They went the day after the garden opened under the National Garden Scheme and so delicious cake and cups of tea and coffee were available following their tour. A great start to the year.

Nearly 80 people attended the February Saturday Seminar at which David Morson talked about the conflict between Ukraine and Russia. They were taken back to the 9th century to discover the founding of Kievan Rus by Swedish Varangians, the forerunner of modern day Ukraine. They learnt



about the frequently moving borders and the famines imposed on Ukraine by Stalin, bringing them up to the fall of the USSR in the 90's. Russia signed a treaty guaranteeing the borders of the countries formed out of that collapse. They were left with a much clearer idea of the history leading to this terrible war, helping them to see through current Russian propaganda.

Quendon Estate & Maces Farms

Spring is certainly showing signs of arrival as we



welcome injections of colour around the Estate.

Following our last article, we are proud to have successfully completed planting 2,500 trees in various woodland compartments across the Estate

to restock areas that were previously thinned or clear felled for management reasons. The planting completes the first phase of restocking trees on the Estate and we plan to continue again in the autumn.

On the farm, spring operations are starting to commence

and we have completed our first pass of applying fertiliser to our autumn sown cereal crops, which have responded well and have benefitted from a healthy dose of rain.



Towards the end of February,

we completed the installation of our new information



boards which are located in various positions across the public rights of way network which crosses through parts of the farm. Each information board has a QR code which can be scanned to find out more

about the respective areas of the farm, what operations have been carried out, plus what environmental initiatives we are undertaking. Keep your eyes peeled and give them a go. We welcome your feedback.

Whilst we wait for a clear weather window to drill our Spring Barley, other operations on the horizon include identifying and re-establishing stewardship areas which unfortunately have struggled following the extreme heatwave last year. We will also soon be back out in the



fields to continue tending to our autumn crops to mitigate weeds and pests as temperatures start to rise.

A number of people have also asked us about the appearance of the 'oversized mole hills' that are in certain fields. These are formed of treated biosolids from Anglian Water which will remain in situ until after harvest, when the heaps

will be spread on to the fields and incorporated before an autumn crop is drilled. The reason for utilising biosolids is to reduce dependence on artificial inputs and to add nutrients back into the soils.

Thank you to everyone who registered for the community surgery on the 15th March. We hope you found it interesting. If you would like to meet with us to ask a question or learn more about the Quendon Estate and Maces Farms, our next community surgery will be held on Wednesday 19th April 2023, starting at 10am and finishing at 6pm at Maces Farm office. Meteorites land at the Museum

A special display of meteorites comes to Saffron Walden Museum from Sunday 12 March to Friday 14 April. These rocks from space include meteorites that landed in Africa, Greenland, North America and Russia. Rocks can also be ejected from the surface of planetary bodies when they are hit by a comet or

giant meteorite. You will be able to see pieces of rock ejected from Mars and the Moon which landed on Earth as meteorites.

Its unveiling accompanied the Museum's Object of the

Month for March - the cast of the meteorite that landed in Ashdon a hundred years ago on 9 March 1923. The fall was witnessed by a thatcher called Frederick Pratt who was working in a wheat field at Ashdon Hall Farm. He heard a

'sissing' sound and looked up to see "..the earth fly up like water". Later he dug up the stone from a depth of two feet with another farm worker called Curven. Frederick took it to the police station in Saffron Walden, then to his vicar in the village of Wendens Ambo. Reverend Francis W. Berry purchased the meteorite and donated it to the Natural History Museum, where it was investigated by the Keeper of Minerals, George T. Prior. He classified it as a stony chondrite meteorite. It contains minerals feldspar, pyroxene and olivine, white specks of nickel-iron and other minerals from which the solar system formed 4.5 billion years ago.

Chondrites are by far the most abundant class of meteorites, but they are also the most interesting, as they are thought to have been formed at the same time, and from the same stuff, as the inner rocky planets of our Solar System. They contain a mixture of fine-grained crystalline and glassy materials, and there are several different types, but they are all characterised by the presence of 'chondrules' - tiny, near-spherical beadlike objects about a millimetre in size. Chondrules are named after the Greek word chondrus, meaning grain, and are

only found in meteorites. There is no scientific consensus on how chondrules were formed, but they are thought to have once been molten droplets in space, formed at very high temperatures, which solidified and aggregated into asteroids. The Ashdon meteorite is 12cm x 9cm x 6cm in size and weighs 1.27kg. The smooth face of the meteorite was melted by the heat generated as it travelled through the Earth's atmosphere from space. To celebrate the centenary of the fall, the Museum's cast, made in 1926 using a mould of the original meteorite, was on display during March.

More information about the meteorite fall in Ashdon is provided thanks to information from Ashdon Village Museum, the Essex Rock and Mineral Society and the Geologists' Association.

World Cultures Gallery

In recent weeks we have been doing preventative conservation work behind the scenes in our world cultures gallery, to reduce the chance of moth infestation over the Spring.

We've been removing organic items for freezing, as well vacuuming the floor of the big walk-in Oceania and Melanesia case to remove debris which pests can feed on. We surprised a few visitors when they spotted us inside the display case!

Documenting the Archæology Collections

Work continues to create digital records for a large collection of metal-detected finds donated by a local enthusiast. The most recent work has been on coins collected at Stagden Cross near High Easter from the



Late Iron Age and Roman periods. This Late Iron Age coin has a horse rider on the reverse, and the front (obverse) has the head of 'Jupiter Ammon'. This is the

Roman god Jupiter shown with curled ram's horns, a tradition taken from the important Egyptian god Ammon who was usually shown with horns. Ammon's curled horns are also the inspiration for the name of fossil ammonites.

<u>Upcoming Exhibition - Feeding the Family Sat 1 April</u> - Sun 2 July 2023

The history of food preparation and food serving from Roman times to present day.

In recent weeks we've been researching the history of food for our upcoming exhibition.

Jenny visited The Gibson Library, in town to look through 18th century cookbooks, one associated with Elizabeth Lindsay from 1766 and a later 18th century cookbook, associated with Lofts Hall.

Meanwhile Charlotte's been busy creating replica food for the exhibition using dental alginate to take casts of real food to get the right shapes and sizes and then painting the cast versions up to look realistic for the displays.

New Wildlife Habitat

We are pleased to welcome a new log pile in the area behind the castle, adding to the stag beetle loggery that was already there. The wood for this latest log pile comes from several trees that were made safe after storms last year. Hopefully this new habitat will provide shelter for bugs, small mammals and even reptiles or amphibians, and we are looking forward to seeing what fungi emerge.

Saxon Hair Care



The latest batch archaeological 'small finds' to be checked and moved to a storage location objects from the mid-Saxon manorial site at Wicken Bonhunt, excavated 1971-4 by the Department the Environment. The items shown hint at hair care routines. The two delicate pins, no more than 5cms long, would

have been for securing women's hair or possibly light items of clothing; the pin with the curly head is made of bronze and the other is of bone. There were also many fragments of



double-sided bone combs, the teeth all cut by hand using a very fine miniature saw. Everyone needed a fine comb to get rid of nits (headlice)! More finds from Wicken Bonhunt are displayed in the Museum's Early History gallery.

Is this Mary Queen of Scots's Glove?

One of the "star" objects in our human history collections

is this 16th century glove which is thought to have been worn by Mary Queen of Scots.

It is a gauntlet style glove, which would have been worn on the left hand. It is made from kid leather, which has



been decorated with coloured silk and elaborately embroidered with silver wire with gold lace additions. The design, which is repeated on both sides of the gauntlet, includes roses, foliage and trees as well as a bird with a long tail which is pictured in flight.

The glove is lined with bright crimson satin, a narrow band of which is turned outwards, and forms a binding on to which is sewn gold lace and there are small silver spangle pendants fastened on to it. The opening at the side of the gauntlet is connected by two broad bands of crimson silk, now much faded, each decorated at the edges with silver lace.

It has been commented that the glove has been altered and that the pieces hanging from the wrist were a later insert in keeping with 17th century fashions, which we hope to explore further with experts

This glove is thought to have been given by Mary on the day of her execution (8th February 1587) to Marmaduke Dayrell who was Master of the Household, Clerk of the Avery at Fotheringay Castle as a token for his "faithful devotion to her Highness's service." The glove remained for a long time in the possession of the Dayrell family. It was initially loaned to the Museum in 1837 by Frances Dayrell of Shudy Camps Park, Cambridgeshire which is close to Haverhill, before it was later donated to the museum.

forward to an abundance of flowers offering food for bees, hoverflies and butterflies. A report by the Essex Wildlife Trust indicates that such sightings may be much reduced. During 2022, members of the Trust participated in the UK citizen science Bugs Matter Survey, recording 'bug

splats' on vehicle number plates to monitor flying insect abundance. The numbers of insects recorded on 277 journeys across Essex suggested that insect numbers have declined by 60% since 2004.

This is a worrying trend as it has implications for the survival of many other organisms. The majority of plants rely on insect pollinators to set seed including wild and garden

flowers and three quarters of our food Many song-birds feed on insects, and seed eaters such as skylarks and house sparrows nourish their young on insects.

The reasons for this decline are complex, but as most arable crops are grown without any weeds this reduces the variety of food supplies for caterpillars, aphids and bugs. Green grasshopper



Fewer flowers mean less food for bees, adult butterflies and moths.

Fortunately, many insect species are resilient, and we can help with the survival of some. I encourage you to plant up your gardens with native hedgerow shrubs, a tree or two and install a bug hotel as these provide many habitats where insects can over-winter. Accepting flowery lawns and planting a wide selection of flowers is not only attractive to us

but provides nourishment for an abundance of insects

A Sense of Place: The People, Place and Landscape of Uttlesford

Calling all artists, makers and creatives! An exciting opportunity to submit artwork to Saffron Walden Museums first open call art exhibition.

The Uttlesford Open 2023, Saffron Walden Museum's first open call art exhibition, will open to the public on Saturday 22nd of July. The exhibition aims to showcase artistic talent from across Uttlesford. Open to anyone, from complete beginners to seasoned professional, the exhibition will give local artists the chance to have their work exhibited in the historic museum building.

Artists, aged over 18 who are living, working, or studying in Uttlesford or within 20miles of Saffron Walden Museum are invited to submit artworks on the theme of "A Sense of Place: People, Places and Landscape of Uttlesford".

Entries will open on the 3rd of April and close on 11.59 on 20th of May 2023.

After the closing date, a panel of judges will select work to go on display in July at Saffron Walden Museum. The artworks will be judged on both their artistic merit and their response to the theme.

How to enter step by step

Art works in any medium will be accepted with the exclusion of film or audio

pieces. 2D art works can be no larger than 50cm on their longest side. 3D pieces must not exceed 25Kg and be no larger than 50cm wide and 50cm deep at the base.

The charge for entry is as follows:

1 artwork: £10.00; 2 artworks: £15.00

Concession rates are available to students holding a valid student or Over-60s holding ID. They are:

1 artwork: £5.00; 2 artworks: £7.50

Please note that this is a judged exhibition, and your work may not be selected for physical exhibition at the Museum. The entry fee is non-refundable. All fees must be paid as part of the online submission process. Those artworks which are not selected for the physical exhibition will be shown digitally. If the entry fee is not paid, none of the submitted works will be considered for selection.

Entries to The Uttlesford Open 2023 must be made via email. You must be able to include digital images of artworks for the selection process. You will need access to a computer and the internet, a valid email address and clear digital image(s) of your artwork(s) for the submission process. If you need help to apply or have access needs, please contact museum@uttlesford.gov.uk

Submissions can be made from 3rd of April 2023 and applications will close at 11.59pm on 20th of May.

The number of applications is limited to 500, so early entry is recommended.

To enter you must pay an entry fee for one or two art works via our art tickets page (see below), ensuring to read the full T&C's beforehand. You will be asked to include your digital receipt from art tickets when emailing your entry to us.

The purpose of the Uttlesford Open exhibition is to support artists and to allow the public to purchase artwork. As a result, all work submitted for the Open must be available for sale.

Work sold during the exhibition is subject a museum commission at 25% and VAT on the commission.

We anticipate that works priced up to £200 will sell more frequently than artworks valued higher than £200.

Wellbeing Hub – Hospice brings specialist services to the heart of Saffron Walden

West Essex and East Hertfordshire charity, St Clare Hospice, is expanding its services into the heart of Saffron Walden with a new 'Wellbeing Hub'.

St Clare Wellbeing Hub – Saffron Walden, delivers a range of specialist services directly to the people of Saffron Walden and surrounding villages. Meaning those living locally with life-limiting conditions can be helped to live well, with the weekly drop-in hub taking place every Thursday from 10am - 3pm in the Salvation Army Hall.

The Wellbeing Hub runs a rolling schedule of sessions, bringing the current wide range of specialist support offered at the Hospice site in Hastingwood, to the town. This will include therapies support, social work support, and specialist nurse specialist input. People with diagnoses including (but not limited to) cancer, heart, lung and kidney conditions, and neurological conditions, will benefit.

Support includes: information on finances, benefits and future planning; emotional and spiritual support; fatigue and breathlessness management; mindfulness and relaxation; a drop-in café and dedicated fortnightly Bereavement Café.

Tracey Hall, Head of Community Engagement, is running the project and said, "We're delighted to be bringing our specialist Hospice services straight to the people of Saffron Walden. We know that the distance to the main Hospice site is a challenge for many local people. We hope that the new weekly Wellbeing Hub will mean more people with life-limiting

"If you have been recently diagnosed with a life-limiting condition, for example cancer, heart failure, COPD, or Parkinson's, we are here to support you and help you to live well. The Wellbeing Hub's aim is to be there for more people, from an earlier point in their diagnosis. We want more local people to get the advice and support they need, as early as possible."

conditions can get the support they need and deserve.

Tracey continued, "Being told that you have something that cannot be cured comes with so many questions and fears for people. From how to get benefits and financial support, to having conversations with their family, and planning their future care. Our expert professionals can also give advice and run sessions to help people to stay well for longer, and to keep doing the things they love. This can include tips for fatigue management,

breathlessness workshops, and advice on managing nutrition and medication."

A St Clare Community Hub was first launched in Saffron Walden at the Salvation Army in 2021 with social work and counselling support on offer. The success of this pilot project has led to the expansion of services on offer at the new Wellbeing Hub. It means that a wider range of Hospice services will be available to people in the town, and on a more regular basis.

As well as a schedule of specialist sessions, the Wellbeing Hub also includes a fortnightly Bereavement Café for local people looking to connect and find support from others experiencing grief and loss.

There is also the chance for anyone to drop-in, every single Thursday, during the Café Clare session from 1pm

− 3pm. You don't need to pre-book, and it is open to all people wishing to find out more about St Clare Hospice.

The Saffron Walden Wellbeing Hub takes place every Thursday, 10am – 3pm, at the Salvation Army Hall (Abbey Lane, CB10 1AG). Parking at Swan Meadow Car Park.

The Wellbeing Hub officially opens on a weekly basis from Thursday 2nd March 2023.

How safe is your money with you?

"I don't carry much cash around with me so I'm ok!" NO!!

If you use a contactless card you are equally vulnerable.

Mobile payment devices like the above can make your

Mobile payment devices like the above can make your bank account or credit card vulnerable.

Most banks and credit card companies provide you with a contactless payment card that allows you to tap and go. In some cases this is all the criminal wants. If they set the amount onto their machine, all they need do is get close to you and your card, and that's it! £100 put straight into their bank account...or perhaps £200..£300...or more if they tap again. This can be done by getting close to your purse or wallet in your bag or

pocket, often in crowded locations, even perhaps by bumping into you, and without the need to actually take your card!

This method of money theft also appears to be increasingly used (nationally) by traditional pick pockets and distraction thieves who no longer have to acquire your PIN to use the card at an ATM to withdraw cash or use the stolen cards to buy goods in shops instead. They simply use their skills to steal your card and then using their own mobile payment devices, tap the card multiple times and transfer the money, before the bank becomes aware of what is happening.

So what can you do to help avoid this?

Get yourself a card defender pouch that holds your cards and blocks the Radio Frequency Identification wireless connection between your card and the machine. You may be able to get one of these free of charge from your local Police at public engagement events or via your Neighbourhood Watch scheme. For example the Card Defender Diamond is a RFID blocking solution that will protect contactless cards within a 10cm radius of it. It eliminates the need for multiple individual card holders/pouches. Various options available on the internet

You could get yourself a new purse/wallet/card case with RFID blocking measures incorporated into the design. (Again various options are available but make sure you buy one from a trusted source).

Reduce the thieves pay-out by asking your bank or credit card to reduce the maximum amount, (currently £100) that you can spend contactlessly... after all you can still use the card for larger amounts if you use your PIN. You may be able to do this yourself via a banking app.

If you are not sure whether your card has been mislaid or stolen, if you have an app and are able to do, so put a temporary block on the card until such time you find it or decide it is definitely lost or stolen and then cancel the card completely.

RFID signal blockers (e.g. Faraday pouches) are also recommended for keyless cars. Please be aware that all flexible RFID blocking devices may lose their efficiency if they wear out and may need replacing after a time.

Stay alert when using ATMs!

Action Fraud has reported an increase in distraction tactics being used at ATM's.

In part due to the increase of chip & pin cards, fraudsters are 'shoulder surfing' to watch as you type your PIN into the machine, before using distraction tactics to clone or even steal your bank card. Remember to always shield your PIN when typing it in and check no one is standing too close behind you.

Clare's Law

If you're worried your current partner or ex-partner might

have an abusive past and believe they may pose a risk to you in the future, you have The Right To Know. Using Clare's Law, you can make an application to request information about any previous history of violence or abuse a person might have. What is the Amazon refund scam?

You receive an automated phone call, asking you to press a button to talk to a person. This person is the scammer who tells you money has been taken from your account for an Amazon Prime subscription by mistake. They apologise and ask if you would like it refunded.

Once you have agreed to this and followed their steps. The scammer will then claim they sent too much money to you by mistake, asking you to send it back. This will be a large sum.

Amazon would never contact you like this.

If you think you might have been a victim of this scam or any other call your bank immediately and report it online.

Preventing stolen doorstep deliveries

Here are some things you could do to reduce the risk of doorstep theft:

- · track your parcel to ensure you or someone else is at home for the delivery
- · install a video doorbell; this can be connected to your mobile so you are notified immediately of any delivery, and is easier to install than a full CCTV system
- · install a security light
- arrange for your parcel to be delivered to a trusted neighbour, or other family members who will be at home; if you live in a flat, is there a concierge who could accept the parcel for you?
- use an off-site locker service for frequent deliveries, or for expensive items; these parcel boxes are more likely to be in busy, safer locations - such as supermarkets - rather than secluded areas which could be targeted by thieves.
