From the Vicarage Study Priest in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

The lengthening of daylight hours is very welcome after what I'd call a murky undefined winter, a season which seems less and less each year to have defining weather patterns and temperatures. I don't think I'm looking back through rose tinted spectacles when I say that in my youth the seasons, despite the odd anomaly here and there were more clearly defined by their expected characteristics. These changes in what have been underlying foundations of life as we have known it can be quite unsettling. Not least because on the macro level they reflect the wider issue of worldwide climate change with all the catastrophic effects it brings. On the micro

level we are challenged to play our part towards slowing down, stopping, and then reversing the underlying causes of these changes. Such tectonic changes in our world and our own lives, have I suspect taken some time to sink into the psyche of nations, communities, and individuals, but once they do action, albeit debatable whether sufficient or not to meet the challenge, is being taken by governments, communities, and individuals alike.

The death, resurrection, and ascension of Jesus caused equally sized tectonic changes in the thinking of the apostles. The nature of Jesus death threw into confusion their understanding of a God who they believed all powerful for they were confronted with a God whose glory and power was seen in suffering and sacrifice. The unexpected resurrection of Jesus initially brought them joy, fear, confusion, and doubt about what on earth was going on. Their inherited view of the world, their God, and their lives was changing dramatically before their very eyes and it was unsettling.



My analogy might be a little clumsy but I offer it as way of trying to understand the magnitude of the change that the resurrection of Jesus meant for his followers. Eventually they understood that what they had witnessed meant not just for them but for all people everywhere. They believed that the raising from the dead of this one man was God

heralding in big neon lights his plan for all humankind, life beyond death. As the penny began to drop, a people steeped in the traditions and expectations of their inherited faith and culture began to call Sunday, the day Jesus rose from the dead, their new sabbath rather than Saturday. They began to speak of Jesus as God's fulfilment of all his promises they saw within the Hebrew Bible. They told their own people of this

in the face of great hostility from some, the mocking of others, and on occasions under fear of death. Their need of inspiration, power, and confidence to share this good news was given them when on the day of Pentecost they received the Spirit of God in a new dynamic way in order that they would have the inner conviction and power they needed.

We humans don't always recognise straight away when seismic changes that are taking place in our world, whether this be climate change or the raising from the dead of a man.



We no longer think it wise to ignore the reality of climate change because whether we like it or not it is changing the world in which we live. Can we ignore the possibility that the Jesus story might be true? Clearly we can, but is it wise to dismiss something which if true has surely to be a game changer for the world and ourselves?

I'm far from having all the answers to my questions about the world and I suffer from the same distress we all do in the face injustice, violence, suffering, and more. But I know I've found an anchor in my faith that the Jesus story is able to be believed and that the reality of its consequences can be known in this life by all.

From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers,

Isn't it lovely to break out into Spring once more? Tree blossom looks very promising, and flowers and vegetables are all raring to grow. For those involved with PUMPKIN seeds in the Village Pumpkin Competition: good luck and remember to whisper sweet nothings to them in the balmy evening hours, I'm sure it helps!

You may have attended or heard about the exhibition (not a consultation) from Pegasi, managing agents for Quendon Estates, regarding their large-scale rental-only development off Belchams Lane. The development of 110 properties on the land between the end of Ventnor Road and Belchams Lane has been sweetened with some infrastructure promises to the village, but, in the view of the Parish Council, over all this remains a planning development we are hostile to and need to voice objection to.

Pegasi are sure they can win agreement direct from the government for their outline plans, although I cannot see how they can be confident when all local opinion at resident, community and District Council level is so opposed to the project. We have written to Mrs Badenoch, our MP, about the proposal and local opposition, expecting that she will represent us at government level, as she should.

For your information the timeline appears to be that a planning application for the detail of the development would be made in September 2024, and if successful building to begin in 2025.

The Parish Council will inevitably have a role to play in both communicating progress on this matter, and potentially organising a community response to it. However it simply can't be effective without more councillors. Owing to ill-health we have another vacancy and will have three vacancies on a seven-strong council from May so please if you feel strongly about matters or are prepared to lend a hand then do get in touch with councillor. email Parish а the Clerk at quendonandrickling.clerk@hotmail.com or turn up to the next PC meeting - Village Hall, 10th April 7:30pm - to find out more.

On to less contentious matters.

Consultation on the refreshed Newport, Quendon and Rickling Neighbourhood Plan was undertaken in March. Much of the development focus has been on Newport, but the Plan has much more than development recommendations in it, and documents the sense of place here, attaching importance to green spaces, views and the character of the community, offering protection of its assets. Many thanks go out to Phil Sowter and Brandon Chapman for their tireless work on the refreshed plan. It's available at https://nqrplan.org/

We have written to Maces Farm reminding them of their responsibility to restore and repair any damage to the Green caused by movement of large vehicles. As the weather improves we hope to see the edges of the Green look a bit tidier. However the south end of the Green is still subject to casual parking - a reminder there are only two parking spaces there - which is eroding the green itself especially during wet weather. Please adhere to the rules!

The project to refresh the Village Maps is progressing. The two maps are available at the Village Hall and at the Cricketers Arms, but are ten years out of date now, and need redrawing to include new and renamed properties.

The Village Hall is transforming itself inside over 2024. We are supporting the Village Hall in its project to refresh the two halls, make it weatherproof, more modern and warmer. Attempts to secure grants for the initiatives have not been successful, but the Village Hall is a very good use for some of the PC reserves whose purpose is to support the community and enhance its assets.

Well, that's all the news there is from the PC for this month.

Pegasi has submitted an Environmental Impact Request for a screening opinion. UDC will decide whether an Environment Impact Assessment will be required for this development proposal.

The document is a hefty 166 pages which gives an idea of the work that has already gone on by Pegasi regarding the proposed development and can be viewed via the QR code

The Parish Council will review and recommend next steps.

Letter to Mrs Badenoch regarding Pegasi Proposals

Dear Mrs Badenoch

I am a constituent and am writing to you today to bring to your notice a developing situation here in Quendon, CB11 3YG. As usual, it's planning related!

This week there has been an exhibition of plans for a large scale rental development for 110 properties by the principal landowner, Quendon Estates, on the south side of Quendon. Two years ago a minimally different version of the same plans met near universal opposition from residents in a very well-attended community meeting, with a straw poll indicating over 95% hostility to the plans, on reasons which still stand today and I outline below.

The managing agents are Pegasi, a firm whose normal activity involves managing client property portfolios for foreign-owned bodies in Mayfair. Their professed intention is to create a rural-urban community with Poundbury as its model, albeit on a smaller scale, and attach it to an existing linear village with its roots in agriculture.

Residents' hostility to the plans centre on three points:

1. The size of the development: the proposal would increase the number of properties in Quendon and Rickling by over 30%, and in Quendon by over 50%

2. The nature of the proposal: all properties will be for rental only. There is no requirement in the local community for that many rental properties.

3. The impact on the existing community. Quendon and Rickling is a small village and is lacking in infrastructure (no retail, limited drainage capacity, water pressure issues). Whilst there is a Priority-1 road through the village there is no train line, bus services are irregular with none offered on a Sunday, and the existing footways both north and south are in very poor condition. There is no village shop and given there are shops within 3 miles in 3 directions any new shop here is unlikely to be a going concern in the long run. Speeding along the B1383 is a continual problem and makes the road dangerous especially on the outskirts of the village.

You will be aware that Uttlesford DC is working on a new Local Plan and has made good progress such that the Draft has been issued and a consultation run with residents. The Local Plan comes down very firmly against developments such as this as attachments to smaller communities without sustainable transport solutions and infrastructure. However the Plan is not fully published yet and we have been informed that Pegasi are hoping to get permission before the Plan has full weight, nevertheless the UDC intention and its support from residents here is clear and against this development. It's worth adding that this precise site has been rejected on at least three occasions for development based on lack of sustainability.

I understand that Pegasi are confident they can obtain planning permission (I suppose planning-in-principle) direct from the government, given UDC being in Planning special measures, although no such permission has been sought yet, and certainly the PC here has not been informed.

As our representative I would ask you please to ensure that local views are respected in any government decision on this project. These residents' views are based upon a serious concern that the nature and sense of place of our community will be irrevocably affected by such an oversized development to the village.

Please help us to be heard.

District Councillors' Report

Intended sale of UDC share of Chesterford Research Park (CRP)



UDC is selling one of its seven commercial investments and I thought it would be useful to explain why and what the benefits are. There is a significant capital gain to be made and the government requires that such assets be sold. The rental income from it, compared against its selling price is less than half the return from some of our more recently purchased assets, so it is also a good time to sell. CRP is a magnificent facility and a new owner with different financial objectives, bigger resources, and without the government restrictions on councils, will find it an attractive buy. The total value of the commercial portfolio is about £20m more than was paid for it and every tenant has paid every rent on time. Further, its value is £269m but the external borrowings are only £209m. So the investments are worth about £60m more than the borrowings. This difference is made up of the £20m capital gain, internal borrowing from cash in hand, and paying down of the borrowings. The sale proceeds after tax, assuming a satisfactory price is obtained, will be used to pay off more shorter term loans. The resulting reduction in interest payments will be a benefit to the General Fund which pays for vital council services.

The sale has not been included In the 24/25 the budget as it is not urgent. The commercial portfolio is showing a £1m profit after interest, rising in 25/26 to £2.8m

and £6.1m in 28/29. Unfortunately, the government requires that much of these profits be used to reduce borrowings to zero instead of the intended use on council services. This implies an odd belief that freehold land and buildings with top quality tenants, and upwards only rent reviews, may become worthless! Even with these mandatory debt repayments we are on track for a usable surplus of £3.1m, and if the asset sale goes ahead the surplus will be greater.

Another reason to sell this particular asset is that the arrangement with the co-owner Aviva is to build out the site, for which there is plenty of space. This has a high profit margin because there is no land purchase cost and indeed our most recent addition, not built yet, has the highest yield of any of our assets. However, UDC would need to borrow to do more of this, and borrowing from any source for commercial gain blocks councils from borrowing from the Public Works Loan Board (PWLB), under recent government rules. We have ambitious plans to build social housing but this needs PWLB funding and we would get an interest rate discount as well on borrowing, over possibly 50 years. This explains the comment about a new owner without government restrictions being able to go for maximum revenue and gain, whereas UDC has different priorities.

And if you are thinking why not use the sale proceeds to build the houses, councils are not allowed to use general fund capital proceeds for providing council services or investing in social housing. Feel free to raise that with our MP...

Neighbourhood Plan Refresh

An online consultation is running from 18 March to 14th April 2024 and is available via the NQR Plan website nqrplan.org and the village Facebook, and paper copies will be at the Newport Parish Council office at Waterloo House on the High St opposite Dorringtons.

As Quendon & Rickling is not required to take any scale of development in the Local Plan this consultation is primarily about site allocations for Newport.

However, the policy updates and proposed Green Space allocations apply throughout the Plan area. Some policies need to be clarified in the light of use, others updated for changes, and new policies and site allocations made. New policies include on river pollution, light pollution, Local Green Spaces, gated communities and housing mix and tenure. A Master Plan including improved medical provision, Newport primary school expansion and Early Years provision is being considered. Please do participate and if you have no views on Newport sites you can just put 'No comment' to allow you to move to the next section.

The current Neighbourhood Plan was 'made' in 2021 and has been very successful in supporting developments netting over £6m in benefits, and in the dismissal of 15 appeals for refusal of smaller inappropriate developments. It will carry full weight in planning decisions until 2026 or until the new one replaces it.

Ward Initiative Funds

This year we have allocated £1000 to Rickling School PTA, £1500 to the Quendon

Bowls Club, £1000 to Buffy Bus and £500 to a karate club which meets at Newport Village Hall. The bowls club and the karate club applied for UDC Major Sports Fund grants but out of about 30 applicants didn't make the cut. What the committee then does is ask if any might fit the government Levelling Up funds we bid for, and if that doesn't work then ward members are encouraged to use their funds.

We have maintained our grant fundings for 24/25, but the government funding is now mostly used, with no replacement on offer.

Stansted Mountfitchet U3A

For 300 years, the Royal Gunpowder Mills at Waltham Abbey developed and manufactured explosives for muskets, rockets and wartime munitions. Today, it is a museum. Richard Thomas, a site guide, spoke at our February meeting, looking back through the centuries to China, and the discovery of what we now call gunpowder. It was fascinating, and a trip to the Waltham Abbey Museum now looks on the cards.

In February our Gardening Group enjoyed a talk by Dave Willett on Great Gardens and Gardeners. This included the history of cultivated gardens such as the Hanging Gardens of Babylon, through the development of the medieval plot essential for food production, to renaissance gardens like Versailles, the landscape movement and Lancelot Brown, and the work of Arts and Crafts designers such as Gertrude Jekyll, much of which resulted in gardens we can still enjoy today.

As I write, we are looking forward to hearing from David Morson. Last year he talked about the historical relationship between Russia and Ukraine. At our first Saturday seminar in 2024, he will take on another of the world's most sensitive and tragic flashpoints – 'The Arab Israel Question : A History of Conflict'. David, with degrees in history, politics, sociology and religious studies, will provide the opportunity to discuss and understand the historical background, from biblical times onwards, showing the established facts, the complexities, the dilemmas and the difficulties that have created probably the most intractable and long lasting conflict in the world today.

And then on to something very different! Graham and Mary Brace spend their retirement travelling to photograph wild life and conservation. In April, at our General Meeting, they will share their experiences and the amazing photographs they took of 'Wildlife in Brazil'.

The Society's logo is a wood-cut by the late Eric Ravilious. Eric Ravilious and Edward Bawden were both Royal College of Art students when, on a cycling holiday, they happened upon Great Bardfield in Essex. There, they rented Brick House, starting a fascinating period for the village. Over the next two decades, numerous artists came to live there; they became known as The Bardfield Artists.



In 1932 Bawden married fellow student Charlotte Epton, a potter, and his father bought Brick House as a wedding present for them. In the same year Ravilious married Tirzah Garwood, an artist and engraver, and they lodged for a while with the Bawdens at Brick House.



Bawden's work can be seen today on three Victoria Line stations - Victoria, Tottenham Hale and Highbury & Islington - for which he designed the logos.



Another artist, John Aldridge, bought

Place House in Great Bardfield in 1933 and soon became friends with Bawden. They produced Bardfield Wallpaper together for the company Cole & Sons to distribute.



In 1952, painter Stanley Clifford-Smith moved into Bucks House and later to the Old Bakehouse. He was very involved in Open House exhibitions that were held in the 1950s when the public could view and buy art in the studios and homes where it had been created.



Marianne Straub, a textile designer, moved to Great Bardfield in 1953, buying Trinity Cottage. She was the senior designer for Warner & Sons of Braintree.

Other Bardfield Artists included Kenneth Rowntree, Michael Rothenstein and Walter Hoyle.

A good selection of the Barfield Artists' work can be seen at Fry Art Gallery in Saffron Walden – it reopens on April 7th – see https://fryartgallery.org/ for opening hours. In Great Bardfield, books and other information about the artists can be purchased at the new premises of Between The Lines bookshop.

Let's Talk, Stansted! - 10 things to know about us!

1. We are a local voluntary organisation, formed just over 3 years ago, at the height of the Covid pandemic, following the tragic deaths of two local men by suicide.

2. Our mission is to support the mental health of our community and ensure that people don't need to struggle on their own. Our vision is that together we can normalise conversations about mental health in the community and take the strain off the already stretched NHS resources.

3. Even though we go by the name "Let's Talk, Stansted!" our remit also encompasses the villages around Stansted, including Henham Elsenham, Quendon and Rickling and others.

4. To date we have funded the training of over 30 Mental Health First Aiders. In the same way as a first aider can potentially save the life of someone having a heart attack, a Mental Health First Aider can do the same for a person having a mental health crisis.

5. Anyone needing a listening ear, or some other kind of help or support, can contact us by emailing info@letstalkstansted.org and someone from the team will get in touch as soon as possible.

6. We work together with other local organisations and charities and can signpost people to various sources of help.

7. We organise and run a variety of regular and ad hoc activities that are known to support mental wellbeing, including a walking group, open water swimming, men's veg shed, yoga, talks and social events.

8. Over the next few months, we will be organising activities and events for Time to Talk Day, National Debt Awareness Week, Stress Awareness Month and others.

Funding for local charity Touchpoint Stansted

Backed by up to £645 million of Government money, the Pharmacy First approach builds on the other measures outlined in the Primary Care Recovery Plan last spring, including tackling the 8am rush by giving GPs new digital tools and providing more GP staff and more appointments.

Maces Farms April Update 2024

Now sounding like a broken record but the wet weather has continued and is playing havoc with the running of the farm. The job 100% relies on having enough weather windows to put the seed into the ground, to care for it and to eventually harvest it.

Without enough windows will inevitably influence the amount of food we will produce.

To keep positive, we have managed to get some fertiliser on, and the crops have responded well despite being under stress at times. Its always a nice feeling when the countryside greens up, the birds get louder, and flowers come out and the sign of new life awaits us all in the spring.

Spring drilling of Oats and Sugar Beet should be under away by now so I think the key is not to push and be patient to achieve the best possible

seed bed. On the back of the weather delays please be understanding that if the footpaths around the Farm are not marked out very well, we will get round to marking out when it starts to dry up. I know a few are very wet so maybe try a different route at times. Its also peak ground nesting bird season so please always stick to the footpaths and if you have dogs then please keep them under control.

I think I ended the same last month but hopefully the weather improves, and everyone can enjoy some sunshine and we can start farming again.

From APOPO - March Update

On International Women's Day, 8 March, APOPO highlighted the exceptional women at our tuberculosis (TB) research project in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia. The program is conducted in collaboration with the Armauer Hansen Research Institute (AHRI) and integrates our HeroRATs for TB detection. Leveraging the rats' remarkable sense of smell, this project is an efficient second-line method for identifying TB.

The process begins with our HeroRATs, who detect TB's distinctive odour in human sputum samples from patients who initially tested negative for TB at our partner clinics. This odour is made up of a unique combination of volatile organic compounds that the rats have been trained to recognize. When samples are flagged by our HeroRATs, APOPO's lab staff confirm the results before alerting the clinics, ensuring prompt treatment for the patients.

At the heart of APOPO's TB detection initiative in Ethiopia are the women who bring their dedication and expertise to various roles within the project, from rat handlers to lab technicians and researchers. Their contributions both advance public health efforts and the fight against TB in Ethiopia. APOPO is committed to creating a diverse and inclusive workplace and actively encourages women to apply for positions across all levels of our organization.
