Location, Location, Located

Some 65 years ago, on 11th October 1959, Britain began introducing postcodes. They started in Norwich, and by 1974 had been rolled out across the whole country.

A survey in 2016 revealed that people are now more likely to remember their postcode than their debit card PIN (92%, compared with 77%). And the information sticks: apparently 17% of people questioned could still remember the postcode of the house they lived in up to 30 years earlier.

The main point of a postcode is to ensure that a letter or parcel gets to the correct Royal Mail sorting office, where it can then be sorted into the correct round and subsequently you can be found and have delivered to you your letter or parcel.

What3words

More recently a system that aims to be even more accurate in locating people and places has emerged and it is called what3words; see link below for more information.

What3 words came about because street addresses aren't accurate enough to specify precise locations, such as building

entrances, and don't exist for parks and many rural areas. This makes it hard to find places and prevents people from describing exactly where help is needed in an emergency.

Such innovations are not the first to be able to work out our whereabouts. Back in the 5th century BCE, or before Christ, when the book of Psalms (as can be found in the Bible) was being compiled, amongst this rich volume of collected writings is Psalm 137. Below is an exert from Psalm 137.

This extends to Butch Wilmore and Suni Williams, the two astronauts currently stuck in space for another several months, and you and me in the place we live, the places we go, whether alone or with others. From the Parish Council Chair

It's been a real mixed bag weather wise, so, with Summer officially over, welcome to Autumn!?

As I commented last month, whilst the weather has been mixed, it has at least encouraged healthy flora and fauna growth which can only be good for 'Pumpkin growing.' On the downside, owing to the growth spurt, the footpath along much of the B1383 between Newport and Ugley has become impossible to walk along. This situation is nothing new and has been an ongoing issue for several years. The Parish Council has written to Essex County Council (Cllr Raymond Gooding) copying our local MP on numerous occasions without, in spite of it being identified by ECC as a health and safety issue, any actual plan to address it!

The topic of Public Right of Way (PROW) paths is something that gets raised on a regular basis. As an example; the local farm's land has a number of registered paths which are often overgrown, thereby preventing villagers the opportunity to comfortably access those routes. Please let us know if you encounter any problems so we can make contact with the appropriate folk. That said, it's also incumbent upon us

all to ensure clear passage past our own properties where hedges or overhanging trees prevail. If you find difficulty in addressing this, please let the PC know and we may be able to offer assistance.

Sadly, we will be losing one of our councillors next month, more of that in the next edition. This opens up an opportunity for a village resident to apply for a PC place. If you would like to be part of the group with a healthy and constructive interest in the village, please do contact the Parish Clerk or one of the Council members. We were hoping to welcome a new Parish Councillor at the September meeting but this will now be happening at the October meeting.

On the topic of village activity, congratulations to the team from the Cricketers Arms for a great Family Fun Day. And the sun also shone.

Finally, depending on when this edition is published/read, I hope the next Village activity; "Autumn Daze" has gone (goes) well and the biggest and heaviest pumpkin has been grown by a worthy winner. Sadly, my Pumpkin seeds are still in their little brown envelope!! Maybe next year!?

The Cam valley was in WW2 a key line of fortifications in case of invasion. This pill box is one of hundreds built in 1940 in a vast rapid engineering programme, together with other fortifications. The two circular hatches in the road surface of the 1764 Robert Adam bridge nearby are for explosives to destroy the bridge. The pill box is spotless and in good condition.

Just picking out a few:

The Voluntary sector "speed dating" information event for towns and parishes will be on 23 September (I am writing on 18th September so past tense by the time this is distributed). It was held at our Little Canfield Depot where UDC has offices and high quality meeting rooms as well as our bin lorry base.

'We have been looking at how we can work with the voluntary sector to achieve better outcomes for residents. At a recent meeting with voluntary organisations, there was discussion about how we could work with towns and parish councils to serve communities better. There was a real interest expressed in more collaborative working. This builds on a proud tradition of the joint working between parishes/towns and the voluntary and community sector, and we know there are plenty of examples of where this happening throughout the district.

We would like to invite your council to an information sharing event where you will hear from the voluntary sector about what it could potentially offer your communities. There will be an opportunity for you to present case studies of your own existing partnerships and how this is working in your area. Up to two spaces are available per town/parish.'



Resident satisfaction survey

During October a company called Yonder Data Solutions will carry out a residents' survey to find out how satisfied local people are with Uttlesford District Council services and also Essex County services. It will run in parallel with the national survey run by the Local Government Association. Our other surveys such as for the budget and the LCTS are self-selected responses and so not representative of the general population. The response levels are low and so it is not possible to 'normalise' the results, which readjusts the results to the age and sex balance of the population. This survey is different. It is not going to be sent out to everyone but the marketing company will be contacting a number of randomly-selected people in the district to ask for their views and the numbers will be large enough to create results with a high level of confidence as to accuracy across the population of the district.

I challenged why UDC should fund a survey including Essex functions. The answer was that many people have little concept of which functions are done by which council (why should they?!) and the survey is part of a national survey covering all councils. So, we look forward to finding out how UDCs bin collections rate compared with Essex Highways road maintenance.

Event invitation: Feasibility study for village heat network

Wednesday 25 September, 7pm to 8.30pm at Littlebury Village Hall

'The Littlebury Energy Project was successful in receiving a grant from the Community Energy Fund (CEF) for a feasibility study on delivering a heat network for the village.

Consultants Bioregional and EQUANs will be presenting the findings of the study at this information event. After completing the study, the village project hopes to be in a position to apply for the CEF stage 2 development grant.

This event is open to all'

We will shortly launch Round 3 of the Zero Carbon Communities Grant Fund which supports community groups in Uttlesford take action on climate change.

Non-profit groups or organisations, including town or parish councils, can apply for funding for new projects that are focussed on carbon emission reduction, community engagement in climate change action, or ecological restoration and enhancement in the community.

This round of funding is open until early December. Grants of between £1,000 and £20,000 are available. The application portal will be live on 30 September.

Many of the walks on our website provide opportunities to pause and enjoy a panoramic view from a vantage point. The layout of roads, settlements, woods and

fields is a visual record of many centuries of human activity.

Checking with an Ordnance Survey map, it is possible to pinpoint significant landmarks and features such as hedged field boundaries. From the 16th century, assorted records of land ownership have survived, but the most complete

set of records was gathered by surveyors for the mid-19th century



Prepared between 1837 and the 1850's, these documents were the result of painstaking work by surveyors whose task was to map and list the details of land ownership, occupiers, size of plot and land use. Buildings, gardens and names of fields were recorded. Subsequent research by

local historians has revealed that some field Saffron Walden names can be traced back centuries, an indication of the close

association of communities with the land that provided their food and opportunities for employment.

Field names are varied, some give just the size in acres while others mention specific persons such as Old Harry's Field. Some are more descriptive such as Hop Ground,

Twelve Acre Pasture, Thistley Field, The Rookery, Mill Hill Field, Further Pasture, Ozier Ground and Crab Tree Field.

Comparing these old parish maps with recent maps highlights the significant loss of hedgerows with the creation of much larger fields to allow agricultural machines to work the land.



Maces Farms October 2024 Update



And just like that Harvest has been and gone and now rushing around in preparation making sure we have a Harvest 2025. The saying no two years are the same certainly proved itself this year. Last season was very gloomy and struggled to bring in crops dry but this year we had a settled August and got most of the crops in dry. With the price of electricity now we will make a huge saving on drying costs which can lead into the tens of thousands.

It was no surprise that cereal yields were going to be down due to the miserable weather all winter and spring, but some held their own just about making budget. Some stand out crops were the Winter Beans surpassing farm averages by more than 30%



beans now is at a 3-year low. Spring oats also performed well and again due to the nation growing more this year demand and price is down.

Farming never lets up as expressed in the August update, but I

am pleased to say that we did establish our Oil Seed Rape crop.

Now in the ground for over 8 weeks hopefully will make a half decent crop providing we can keep the pigeons off. Pigeon activity has already been noticed which is never a good sign this early into the season. Part of a government scheme we also planted 60 ha's of clover and vetch which will be in all season, and should make a healthy entry into Winter Wheat the following year.

We are also looking at changing our big 400hp tractor as it has done 8 years now and technology and efficiency have come a long way in that time so take a look at the pictures of all the different ones we tested out on farm.

The sugar beet harvest will start in the next few weeks which I always enjoy as we stand back and watch contractors do the work. It wouldn't be cost beneficial to have our own equipment to harvest the Sugar beet so all we worry about is getting a wheat crop in straight behind the harvester.

Happy autumn everyone. Fingers crossed the month of October is a kind one to all farmers.

September's Object of the Month was a traditional Quaker bonnet.



The Religious Society of Friends, whose members were known as Quakers, was founded in 1652

by George Fox.

Quakers have been meeting in Saffron Walden on the same site, since 1676. Originally in a single back room behind 3 cottages on Cucking Stool End Street



(now known as the High Street). The cottages were later combined, a grander entrance created, and a much bigger meeting hall created. The Meeting House was extended in 1791 and extensively rebuilt in 1879 to accommodate pupils from the Friends' School.

Magistrates had initially persecuted the Quakers, heavily fining them for meeting openly. On at least 2 occasions Magistrates ordered the Saffron Walden Meeting House doors to be nailed shut.

Prominent 18th and 19th century Quaker families in Saffron Walden included the Gibsons, the Frys, the Tukes, the Wyatts, and the Day Green family. They shaped much of the town's major development. This includes the Corn Exchange, the former

Friends School, the Saffron Walden Museum, the old Saffron Walden Hospital (now the Council Offices), and Bridge End Gardens.

Emergency Life-saving

Should someone suffer a cardiac arrest or show symptoms of a heart attack e.g. pains in the chest, then your first action should always be to phone the ambulance service on 999. The service will refer you to our Automated External Defibrillator which is at the front entrance to Quendon & Rickling Village Hall. Another is sited outside Reception at the front of Rickling School. Anyone can save a life by using one of them until an ambulance arrives. In addition you can seek help from any of the volunteers listed below.
