From the Vicarage Study Rev. Peter Allen, Priest-in-Charge of Newport with Widdington, Quendon and Rickling.

Dear Friends,

As the longer days of spring moving towards summer stretch before us, there's a wonderful sense of possibility in the air — gardens flowers are beginning to bloom, the crops in the fields and gardens are showing off their growth, the winter clothing has for the most part been overtaken by a summer wardrobe, and even the church porch seems to smile a little wider along with the rest of the seasonal life on show.

District Councillors' Report

Neighbourhood Plan

This may seem to have gone quiet, but actually the Steering Group and our consultants have been busy. Although attention is on Newport, refreshing the Neighbourhood Plan, before it becomes 5 years old in June next year, is also important for Quendon & Rickling to have the protections of a full weight Plan.

The Uttlesford Local Plan requires 300 new dwellings in Newport. Previously 412 houses were proposed to the west of Newport, but UDC amended this following their traffic assessment showing gridlock at peak times. They cut the allocation to 300 houses and delegated the allocation work to the Neighbourhood Plan.

The current NhP was adopted in 2021 and carries full weight for planning applications and policies till June 2026. It has been most useful in supporting several major applications bringing in over £6m of benefits and has also been used to oppose inappropriate development, with 19 appeals having been dismissed including repeated attempts to build on the garden of the Coach & Horses.

The plan team working with consultants O'Neill Homer developed 5 scenarios initially for the 412 houses which were reviewed by residents and by AECOM (a planning consultancy firm). All 5 scenarios were found to lead to significant harm. Now it is whittled down to two possible options that could potentially accommodate 300 dwellings. The team, led by O'Neill Homer, has met with the developers associated with the land to the west and east of Newport and discussed what might be possible to deliver in those locations, highlighting the existing constraints.

In mid-May two developers presented their proposals for the 300 houses for Newport. The meeting at the primary school was very well attended and was hosted by the Parish Council's consultants. There are competing options for the West side and the East side. The West option would extend Newport out to the M11 and to the south along the B1383. The East option would mostly re-use the quarry and with some development up to the Debden Road.

The developer teams were appreciative of the well-informed views of the residents attending, and the general desire to have the best outcomes for current and future residents. A consultation is now open with a questionnaire and the developer presentations on the Neighbourhood Plan website https://www.nqrplan.org/ presentations-and-questionnaire, also via the Quendon & Rickling Facebook. Paper copies are also available at the parish office on Newport High Street, opposite Dorringtons. The questions cover the impact of traffic, access to village amenities without a car, benefit in terms of community facilities, open space and recreation opportunities, impact on the setting and identity of the village, and which option creates the best place to live.

From the responses so far, most people consider all these factors to be very important. Traffic is noted as the greatest issue. For the west side the developer's road access intentions were a little uncertain (unchanged from the early version submitted to the Local Plan}. For the East option, traffic from the quarry area would go to the south and for the north part onto Debden Road via a revised junction

Quendon & Rickling residents are welcome to read the developer presentations and submit their views into the consultation.

The West side option is shown below – a drone view looking south. Development would be the two fields in the foreground, including the woodland, extending behind the Recreation Ground onto the third field in the distance, and then through the woodland by the M11 round to the B1383.



This is the East side option looking northwest.

Development would be in the quarry, plus opening for public access the green triangle by the railway as a lowland wetland wildlife site. and building on the lower level of the field in the middle upper right, where it borders Chalk Farm Lane.

Stansted Mountfitchet U3A

The u3a offers a number of different types of exercise activities for fun and to learn how to keep body and mind as happy as possible. Pilates, for example, takes place in St John's Hall every Thursday. The absorbing museum, housing textiles used by royalty for Coronations and in Buckingham Palace, was a fascinating experience. A walk in Bocking Park and visit to the market completed a rewarding day out in good company. Clever minds are clearly at work finding such stimulating places to visit on bus routes.

The same is true for the Gardening Group who sought the special kind of beauty created by the plants found at Ulting Wick near Maldon, the home of Mr and Mrs Burrough, which proved to be delightful. Blessed with a beautiful Spring day when everything was bursting into life with a joyous exuberance, the group relished the exploration of eight acres of borders, kitchen garden, pond and wildflower meadows storing up lovely inward images to replay at will. We know that being outside is good for our wellbeing, both mental and physical. Besides the open countryside, we are fortunate in The Hundred

Parishes to have parks and gardens where we can walk, sit and enjoy nature. I will mention just a few.

Bridge End Gardens in Saffron Walden was created by a local businessman and Quaker, Francis Gibson, in the 1840s. It is now managed by Saffron Waldon Town Council. Delights to

explore include the hedge maze, rose Bridge End Gardens garden and Dutch garden.

The Gardens of Easton Lodge in Little Easton have limited opening hours which can be found on our website www.hundredparishes.org.uk. They were designed by Harold

Peto in 1902 for the Countess of Warwick who lived at Easton Lodge.

In Sawbridgeworth, Pishiobury Park was

redesigned by Capability Brown in the

18th century as an enclosed park. It is a registered historic park and includes wet woodland, grazed fields, an oak walk, meadows and part of the River Stort.



Birchanger Wood

Birchanger Wood comprises 69 acres of ancient coppiced woodland, managed and

owned by the Birchanger Wood Trust. Three miles of all-weather, wheelchair-friendly paths make it easy to explore.

In Stansted Mountfitchet, the Aubrev Buxton Nature Reserve is a

25 acre woodland with six man-made ponds. It was originally part of the park and garden of Aubrey Buxton's house. He

was a co-founder of the World Wildlife Trust and donated the land to Essex Wildlife Trust. Today you can enjoy circular walks passing the ponds through the wood.

June is the month when many private gardens open to the public, even groups of gardens in Duxford and Ickleton – details appear on the What's On section of our website.

Maces Farms June update 2025

I always seem to start off with talking about the weather, but it has such a big factor on

an arable farm as any keen gardener would also know, you can't grow anything without water.

The weather has been very settled with no significant rain fall in the last 3 months, which is great for getting jobs done as it's so dry and nothing gets wet and horrible, but



we are now at a point that yield loss is inevitable due to plant drought stress. But the

dry does come with some benefits, meaning that disease is less likely to develop and spread so crops are cleaner, and we can lower the input spend to accommodate this.

Looking through a crystal ball is often referred to in farming, as crop protection strategies could differ so

much, if we just knew the weather that was coming round the corner. You must be cautious as we all know the weather can quickly turn around and suddenly, you're chasing your tail with workload.

When plants are under stress, especially cereals, they will think their life is short lived so will put out the seed quicker and earlier than normal, which is what we are seeing on the farm.







The farm may look lovely and green still, but plants are maturing about 4-10 days earlier, meaning that the weight and quality of the end use will be lessened. The absolute ideal growing year would just enough water until end of May/Early June, then plenty of sunshine as the seed matures and ripens. You wouldn't mind a

dryish spell in March or April as it encourages good root depth to access more nutrients but unfortunately not from March through to May.

Our recruitment of a 3rd full time member of staff was unsuccessful, but I have manged to secure a seasonal harvest member of staff who has already started with us and will be with us until the end of October. Ryan will be living on site, and I welcome him to the farm and village for the next 5 months or so.



The farm will be providing car parking for the school Runfest on the 14th of June which we are looking forward to; last year we had over 100 cars we had to park.

June is often event season for farming where we visit shows and other farms to plan for next season, so the team will be out and about looking at ways to improve for next season. Big question now is cost saving, as the margin is so low in farming and homing down on the detail to make every penny count.

Birthday Bash

As the month progressed, we all worked hard toward our big birthday bash and new exhibition, organising stallholders, food vendors, musicians, and craftspeople. Our Learning and Outreach officer Charlotte visited schools throughout the district, speaking with over 1,500 children, sharing our collection, and asking what their favourite wonder might be.

Our wonderful visitors also had the opportunity to express what they loved about the museum, and with over 600 votes, there was plenty for our exhibition staff to

incorporate into our wonderful Walden Wunderkammer. The big day arrived, and thankfully the sun shone; the entire day was a resounding success. We even received a letter from the King congratulating the museum on reaching such a milestone.

If you haven't had a chance to see the new exhibition yet, it's open until the end of the summer holidays, and entry is included with the regular entrance fee. You can still make your mark on the "Wonders: 190 years of Saffron Walden Exhibition"; as we have extended our art competition till the end of summer. Simply draw your favourite object from the museum's collection to have a chance to see your design turned into a tote bag and to win a VIP printing experience on our 1836 (almost as old as us) printing press.

May's object of the month

May's Object of the Month is the bed displayed in the museum's furniture gallery. The bed was donated to the museum by William Murray Tuke in 1882, an antiquarian collector whose house, The Vineyard, was located on Windmill Hill in the town. The Regional Furniture Society's recent research paper confirmed that the bed we have on display is a complete specimen, not an enigmatic oak Tudor bed, which might have been a "Victorian assemblage of disparate parts." Radiocarbon research has confirmed that it is an even earlier Plantagenet bed, most probably made in England around 1450-1480 AD.



APOPO

HeroRAT Ronin was awarded a Guinness World Records title for detecting the most landmines by a rat. APOPO has been overwhelmed by the incredible global response to his story. Ronin's achievement has been reported by hundreds of media outlets worldwide. In the UK, major outlets like the BBC celebrated his success.

This level of global attention is a proud moment for APOPO that has also provided a significant boost for our mission. It raises awareness of the life-saving work of our HeroRATs.
