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

To my friends,

How can Church still be relevant in 2025? Just thought I'd jot a few points down. I moved to a village, I know, the cheeky little chappy not only becomes a vicar (curate/ deacon for those interested in official titles), but leaves the smog for pastures green. Well very green, green everywhere... and brown... more mud than a rugby club's changing room in Richmond on a Saturday afternoon. Not to mention the other brown stuff in a certain farm at the end of the road in said village (did you know some cows have blue eyes?) So, imagine meeting a whole village at a gathering (well not quite a whole village but quite a few, the whole village event comes later). Lasagne as good as anywhere I have eaten in Mayfair, and a proper portion may I say. People bringing their own bottles of Château Neuf du Pape and smiles everywhere (last two comments not related), as I make my way round the room introducing myself explaining I'm not the new vicar, I'm in training. Training. Don't worry we'll look after you. Welcome. I never knew that meant, wine, chocolate and cooked meals delivered to my house every day for the next six weeks. Needless to say the diet has started, the chocolate has disappeared and the wine, well I'm not sure where that is!

This quaint little church up a small little hill, appears to be the centre of everything. I know everyone in it and can park my car on their drives. Imagine that in London; blue lights I think. As I preached for the first time there's one person looking at me with more energy than a Duracell bunny on Christmas Eve. Not only are they bringing our family food, they're also inviting us around: I lived next door to two neighbours in London, never even got a hello for the first five years. Just can't quite explain these people; kind, welcoming, but it's something else, it's how they are with each other: Some 150 people turn up for a funeral for the lady who cleaned people's houses. These people have real relationships, tried and tested. Village folk coming to the baptism of children of the village, again 150 plus people coming to the church and knowing where they sit and who will be there.

I met one family that have never moved out, you have to come and see this place, except, I don't really want to tell you where it is, not that you would ruin it, but...

Then one cold Christmas Eve afternoon, the carol service begins, I walked in late, I know some things don't change, but it was the third service of the day. Now it's the whole village, their family, more Christmas jumpers than M&S, every chair, the upper

floor, the carol stools, the floor and every cushion is full, such a beautiful sight to see, yet still more are coming, this little Church up a hill with no parking brings the gravitas to the village. Singing starts, yet still more are coming, greetings to and from those who have not seen each other since the last special event in the church.

As I scan the room there's an energy I can't explain, some kind of spiritual happening and it's coming from the people, or is it? Could it be something really special that begins this night every year, could it be the saviour of the world's birth, this little Church on a hill is a key member of this little village. Could it be that I will see this happen again on Easter Sunday? Well that's up to you! I'm talking to the village now friends, I hope to see you, I hope that this little Church on a hill remains a key family member of your village, I hope to see you more and if it's only at baptisms, funerals, weddings, and special days, I think that's also ok.

Back to my friends, you have to come and see this place, if you're ever passing drop in. I'd tell you where it is, but, you know... Rev Gay.



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From the Parish Council Chair

You might not be feeling the springtime warmth just yet but according to the weather forecast it's on the way. That means days growing longer and the air filling with the scent of fresh spring blooms.

The start of the year has seen the PC, once again asking Essex County Council (ECC) what their plan is to clear up the B1383 pathway, especially now that the gas company has made even more of a mess. We have once again written to the MP who said she has contacted Highways to ask what's happening.

On the topic of the B1383, the damaged illuminated speed sign at the north end of the village has, once again, following a site visit, been brought to the attention of Highways via ECC. Projects for the spring include: protection of the village green with new posts being installed, a Defibrillator revamp, a village litter pick, we'll let you know when, volunteers for an hour or so would be welcome, traffic 'Speedwatch,' again volunteers are needed as teams of three are required. Last but not least, the PC has received regular messages about dog mess being left around the village. Apologies if you're reading this while you are eating. We have purchased a new bin to be placed at a reported location. As I sign off, the sun is shining and there's a blue sky. Spring? Fingers crossed. Gari Spearpoint

Budget

For 2025/26 the intended rise to council tax is £5.28 a year, which takes it to £182.02 for a band D property. There is an expected use of £854k of reserves to balance the budget. Our Blueprint project has made excellent progress in generating £2.5 million of continuing savings. However, the latest government cuts have wiped out all of those savings and more.

Local government reorganisation

We have this month recruited a manager to run the next phase of Blueprint, but with the funding for that switched onto local government reorganisation it looks like our new officer will be spending time and money on the government's reorganisation instead of addressing the intended next phase of council savings. To pay for the estimated cost of our part of the abolition of the council and its re-forming as part of a new one, £2.75 million will be switched in the council's reserves. It looks like the vesting date for the new councils may be April 2028, with elections for shadow councillors for the new authority in May 2027. If this turns out correct I think it very extended – the more years there are, the greater the uncertainty for staff, and the greater the scope for dispute over the many matters to be decided. This date would also mean that our council term, which should end with elections in May 2027, would be extended for a year.

Community Support Grants

The council has switched from annual grants to a three-year arrangement. This gives certainty to the recipients in place of having to re-apply every year. There has also been a change to a commissioning model instead of one which mostly reacts to incoming grant requests. The grants recently allocated are in these categories:

- Tackling rural isolation and loneliness (including rural transport) Budget £62,000
- Healthy, resilient and active communities Budget £70,000
- Youth Budget £50,000

Sixteen community bodies were funded and there is a full list and details on the agenda papers for Cabinet.

As part of the Blueprint savings projects, the councillors Ward Initiative grants of £2000 per councillor are ending this year. As the football pitches in Quendon have now moved to a new independent arrangement we will be supporting this with some of the last of this funding.

The increased provision of comfortable seating was necessary for the first General Meeting to be held at St Theresa's Centre, when a record audience of 107 gathered to hear a personal account of one of the RAF's most daring World War II missions: the raid on Amiens Prison, often referred to as "Operation Jericho".

The following Saturday the first Seminar of 2025 took place in the same venue.

Our next Saturday Seminar on 8th March is entitled "Rockets and Spaceflight". The speaker, Professor Tony White is an Emeritus Professor of Systems Engineering, Middlesex University and is a member of Stansted Mountfitchet u3a. The seminar will start with the history of rockets from their invention by the Chinese to the rocket pioneers in the 20th century. It will move on to the rise of amateur rocket groups in the 1930s to the massive expansion during WW2. It will cover post-war delivery systems, the moon shots and manned spaceflights along with a comprehensive explanation of rocket propulsion.

A wonderful collection of short stories has been published by the Stansted Mountfitchet u3a Creative Writing Group. Entitled "After the Twa Corbies and Other Stories" it contains a fascinating pot-pourri of styles and genres; from surreal to the ridiculous. Loss, love, mystery, nostalgia and humour; it's all there. The limited edition of 100 copies was so popular that it sold out by Christmas 2024. However, the book will be available in the local library for those who were unable to purchase a copy.

Having negotiated any difficulties in producing their first book, the group, which meets monthly and has been running for 5 years, is intending to publish a second in time for Christmas 2025. With even more stories, it promises to be just as sought after. Will there be a third? That remains to be seen!

One of the main crops of the rich agricultural area covered by The Hundred Parishes is



barley, the main ingredient of traditional ales and beer. In the past, much of the barley was malted locally before being taken to a nearby brewery to be combined with water, hops and yeast for fermenting into beer.

Furneux Pelham former brewerv

Brewing was initially a domestic activity in the home for family consumption, on farms and estates for the landowner's family and workers,

and in various institutions such as religious communities for those who lived in and visited them. As the demand for beer grew (safer to drink than 'fresh' water at the time) so did the brewing industry: public houses



having their own brewhouses, commercial brewers working out of stand-alone breweries, and then the development of industrial scale brewery complexes.

Evidence of all these different types

Little Hadham Nags Head

Little Hadham; Little Brewers, a cottage in Matching Green; Brewery Cottage in Sewards End; and Brewers

There are also surviving examples of the breweries from each of the various phases of the development of the industry. At Audley End House the estate's brewhouse survives although the internal features have been lost. An example of a public house

brewery survives as The Old Brewery in Radwinter, now a private house. In Hatfield Heath the former stand-alone

brewhouse was converted to a corn mill before becoming commercial offices. Three examples of brewhouses which were a part of industrial brewery complexes survive in Furneux Pelham, Wethersfield and Hartford End in Felsted. All three have been renovated and converted to private residential use.

DONOT BUY AIR FREIGHTED PLASTIC-PACKED OUT OF SEASON IMPORTS "PEREECT" PALM OIL **February's Object of the Month** was a protest placard from a supporter of the Strike for Solutions organised and attended by high school students from across Uttlesford. On 14th February 2020, students and other activists and supporters gathered in the market square in protest against slow and insufficient local government action on climate change, then marched to Uttlesford District Council's offices. This placard was donated by an adult supporter who was also at the march. It has a list of simple actions to do at home to help reduce waste and greenhouse gas emissions. The placard itself was made with reused and recyclable materials.

This object can be seen at the Museum in the new Climate and Ecology Hub display where visitors can explore the causes and evidence for climate change, find local action groups and generate electricity to charge your phone.

To coincide with the museum's pop-up exhibition "Letters from the Global South" they will be screening 'The Ants and the Grasshopper' directed by Raj Patel and Zak Piper.

"Travelling from Malawi to California to the White House, Anita Chitaya meets climate sceptics and despairing farmers. Her journey takes her across all the divisions shaping the US, from the rural-urban divide, to schisms of race, class and gender, to the thinking that allows Americans to believe they live on a different planet from everyone else."

It will take all her skill and experience to help Americans recognise, and free themselves from, a logic that is already destroying the Earth. Tickets will be available to book via the museum website.



Recycling... let's get it right!

If recycling bins containing non-recyclable items – such as black plastic sacks, nappies, food waste, polystyrene or garden waste – are not spotted by the crews before they are picked up, this can cause a whole lorry load of recycling to be spoiled.

A very small percentage of non-recyclable items in the bin can result in tonnes of otherwise reusable waste being diverted away from recycling and sent to landfill.

We must stop this from happening.

If refuse crews identify a recycling bin which contains non-recyclable items, a bin hanger (like the one in the picture) will be attached to the bin highlighting which items need to be removed. Once these offending items have been removed by the householder the bin will be emptied on the next scheduled collection – we will not return to empty the recycling bin before this.
