What Would We Lose If We Didn't Have Our Village Church?

It's a question worth asking from time to time: what would we lose if our village church were no longer here?

Some might say, "We'd lose a beautiful old building," and that's true. Many of our churches have stood for centuries, their stones holding the prayers and stories of generations. They are landmarks of faith and continuity, places where the people gather in moments of joy and of sorrow. To lose the church would be to lose a part of our shared history and identity.

But we'd lose more than a building. We'd lose a place of belonging — somewhere that welcomes everyone, whether they come regularly or only once in a while. The church holds communities together in subtle ways: at Christmas and Easter, at Harvest and Remembrance, when we celebrate baptisms, weddings, and say goodbye to loved ones. These are the moments that knit community life together, and the church stands quietly at their centre.

We'd also lose a source of care and compassion. Much of what the church does goes unseen — visiting the lonely, comforting the bereaved, supporting families, collecting for the food bank, opening its doors for a cup of tea and a chat. Without it, there would be fewer places where people can simply come as they are and find a listening ear or a word of hope.

And we'd lose a spiritual heart — a place to pray, to be still, to bring our worries and hopes before God. In a noisy and restless world, the church offers something precious: a space of peace, where anyone can step inside and know they are not alone.

Of course, the church is not just a building; it's people — living stones, as the Bible says — who seek to follow Christ and serve others. Yet the building stands as a sign of that faith, a reminder that God's love has a home in this community.

In no way am I suggesting that your local churches are in danger of disappearing but I just thought I'd pose the question by way of trying to highlight what the church offers us all by it presence and all that it stands for. Rickling and Quendon are your local churches and you can play a part in ensuring their presence remains long into the

future by attending when possible, and supporting as possible, whether that be an offering of time, a skill or financial support.

So as we look to the future, it's worth asking not only what would we lose without our church, but also what can we do to help it live and flourish? Because a living church enriches us all — in faith, in friendship, and in hope.

From the Parish Council Chair

This month has been about 'follow-ups!'

The continued saga of issues along the B1383 have been raised with ECC (Ray Gooding) and copying our MP. The following text is a response from ECC to the local MP who has shown interest in the problems.

"The clearance of the footpath (B1383) is generally not regarded by the Highway Authority as a priority because the estimated cost of the works is anticipated to be excessive. I continue to try to establish a means to fund this work but that is proving to be extremely difficult. (GS: This has been going on for years with no action).

The repair of the VAS Sign at the northern end of the village is now included in my Members scheme and is likely to be completed within the next five weeks.

The island in the road was installed as a part of a traffic calming scheme requested by the Parish. This island was installed as the second phase of that work. It has proved to be impractical and the fixed reflective bollards were knocked down four times in as many weeks. I have therefore requested that this installation be reviewed because it is proving to be an unacceptable maintenance requirement. That review will be completed shortly and it is likely that the island will be removed and replaced with a painted solution that will imply an island but will not be a hazard if it is driven over."

The statement about the traffic calming island is not strictly correct and will be followed up on. Also, there was no mention of the removed/replaced/removed again cat's eyes!

As mentioned in last month's Link, the Christmas tree lights are now planned for 28th of November. Full details of the activities will be posted on village Social media. We may have to be flexible with timings on the day as it is a long way for our special guest to get from the North Pole.

District Councillors' Report

Neighbourhood Plan 'Regulation 14' consultation

The start of this was delayed because a key document, the Sustainability Assessment, needed updating and was awaited from an external consultant. It is now in progress and will run until 26th November. Full details were in the last edition of the Link.

Non-statutory functions

Councils provide many statutory services, such as Licensing, social housing, planning

applications, refuse collection, running elections and a long list of others. But much work in supporting our communities is non-statutory. Things which need doing or supporting but are not compulsory. We seek best value and outcomes from limited funding by working with other agencies and external funding sources. Here are examples taken from a recent report to a full Council meeting (Newport Pharmacy gets a mention):

Youth projects

The second Youth Partnerships meeting took place on the 29th of September 2025. This multi-agency meeting brings statutory and voluntary organisations together to explore where they can collaborate on youth provisions, identify local needs and gaps, and opportunities.

School engagement

We are working closely with secondary schools from across the district at the ASB Forum (youth) and John and Cllr Sutton are speaking to schools about better engagement and working more closely with together.

Health and Wellbeing Board

The Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) is next meeting on the 30th of October and it will review the progress of the nine projects it has funded against the set objectives. The HWB has been engaging with staff this year, offering health checks, and looking to introduce wellbeing champions to support the workforce.

Ukraine and Refugee/Asylum seekers update

Ukrainian update Lead Officer (SH)

Projects are going well. The group is meeting every month to review current projects and identify challenges in delivery. We are in regular contact with the service providers and those eligible for the scheme and our overseas arrivals residents to ensure that we are supporting them.

The Community Safety Partnership – Lead Officer AG

The CSP booklet was recently sent to over 9,000 properties across the district offering crime prevention, advice, safety advice and advice on scams. This booklet is also available on our website, in reception and in accessible formats upon request.

The new SOS meetings are going well when combined with the Community Supermarket. This space enables residents to conduct face to face meetings with a variety of agencies for support with mental health, housing needs, substance dependence and cost of living.

In September the CSP is attending Scrutiny to discharge its duties from the year.

The Cllr drop-ins were not utilised, and we are looking at alternative methods and venues to engage with Cllr's.

Safeguarding update – Lead Officer FB

Safeguarding training attendance KPI data has been submitted to the relevant department and is being monitored by SMT.

Recent themes emerging from safeguarding concerns raised include dementia and mental health issues. We continue to support tenants alongside the housing team.

Fleur and Carla Claydon have been visiting all the team meetings across the Council to talk to teams about the safeguarding procedure and answer any questions.

Domestic Abuse

We obtained DA Navigator funding from Essex, circa £22,000 which has been provided to the Housing Options Team for dedicated domestic abuse officer who will support homeless applicants.

The j9 training is continuing across the district. It is being delivered by Alfa Vesta and facilitated by the Police and Council. We recently saw Newport Pharmacy obtain accreditation, and they are the first Pharmacy to do this in Essex.

Anti-social behaviour – Lead Officer TD

Tanveer has implemented the new ASB Forums (Youth and Adult) and he is working closely with John to set up the Youth Partnerships Group and the Youth Voice Group. He has a busy caseload, having dealt with over 80 new cases since he started in April.

On a fine September day, I caught an early train to Ware before tackling the longest walk on the Society's website. Station Walk number 18 covers 17 miles (28 kilometres) between Ware Station and Stansted Mountfitchet Station. Although I walk regularly, it was some years since I last covered that distance in a day so I carried a mobile phone just in case.

An advantage of this route is that it heads north for several miles and then turns east, so for much of the way the sun is behind to give the best views.

After leaving Ware, the route is all in lovely countryside, passing through eight of our hundred parishes: Wareside, Standon,

Thundridge, Braughing and Albury in Hertfordshire and then Farnham, Manuden and Stansted Mountfitchet in Essex. Through these parishes, only Standon and Stansted contributed much more than the occasional farmhouse. They, along with Gravesend in Albury, also offered opportunities for refreshment.

The route follows a series of good paths and tracks, rising and falling between river valleys. It passes over

the River Lea just after the start, spends several miles along the Rib valley, and crosses the Ash and the Stort. The journey crosses the Greenwich Meridian, the original route of Roman Stane Street and the former Buntingford railway line. It passes beside Barwick Ford, Standon Lordship, Patmore Heath and Stansted Windmill and there are sightings of distant churches,

water towers and much more. But the best views are of unspoilt, rolling countryside and occasional wildlife.

I completed the walk, accompanied for the last 6 miles by my wife Janice after lunch in Gravesend. Altogether, a most enjoyable day – and the legs only ached a bit for the next few days! Having completed this challenge, I can return to the many shorter routes on our website.

Maces Farms - November Update

Although the year isn't quite over, it's already shaping up to be one of the driest I can remember—and likely one of the driest for many years before that too, judging by conversations with my father about seasons past. It seems we are regularly breaking records, whether for the wettest or the driest conditions. As an arable food producer, one thing has become clear: being prepared for the unexpected



and building resilience into everything we do is more important than ever.

We completed our autumn drilling in mid-October, and the conditions were excellent. The surface was dry, but there was just enough moisture to ensure excellent seed-to-soil contact, leading to rapid emergence. Thanks to the firm ground from such a dry year, compaction wasn't a concern. If you think of soil like a sponge, it needs to absorb water until it reaches saturation—the point at which it can't hold any more. This year, the ground never came close to that point.

Our sugar beet was successfully lifted. Aside from a few factory intake issues due to excessive green tops, both the lifting and the subsequent wheat planting went



smoothly. The sugar content came in at 18%, a direct reflection of the amount of sunshine we've had. To put that in perspective, 18% of our 2,874 tonnes is pure sugar

—about 517 tonnes in total, which is quite something! Most of this is stored in liquid form and sold to companies like Nestlé here in the UK.

Crop protection work will continue throughout November. The longer the mild weather lasts, the more care we need to take with our growing crops.

This month, we also say goodbye to Ryan, who has been a great help on the farm since May. We wish him all the best for the future. At the same time, we're pleased to welcome Ollie, who has joined the farm and estate team full-time



November is also when we tidy up and clearly mark public rights of way (PROW) before winter sets in. We want to ensure all footpaths are as clear and accessible as possible, helping everyone stay on the correct route.

From The ICO

Energy firms fined half a million pounds for unlawful marketing calls

We are warning the public to be on their guard against unlawful robo calls.


It comes as we have fined two energy companies a total of £550,000 for making automated marketing calls.

Both firms used an avatar software, which gave the call recipients the impression they were talking to 'Jo, Helen or Ian' from the UK - but were in fact scripted lines recorded by voice actors and played by call agents abroad.

We've heard disturbing reports of how unscrupulous companies are using robo technology to fool elderly and vulnerable people. We understand how distressing these calls can be and urge the public to take note of our tips to spot these robo calls so they can tell us when they've received one. This will help us investigate and take enforcement action."

To stop live and automated marketing calls you can:

Register your landline or mobile number with the Telephone Preference Service (TPS)



free of charge. The TPS is a register of people who have said they don't want to receive marketing calls;

Report any nuisance calls that you continue to receive to us using our online reporting tool; and

Refer complaints about fraud and scams to Action Fraud or Police Scotland, complaints about a business's practices to Trading Standards through Citizens Advice and complaints about silent or abandoned calls to Ofcom.

Other news

You may have seen reports about Meta's upcoming changes to its advertising model – here's what you need to know.

Teams at the ICO have been speaking with Meta about how they use personal information to target ads. Following this work, Meta have agreed to make a change. Instead of assuming consent through the terms and conditions, it will now ask users directly. This matters because UK law requires people to have real transparency and choice over how organisations use their data.

What does this mean in practice?

Meta is introducing a "consent or pay" model. You'll be able to choose between personalised ads or paying a monthly subscription for an ad-free service. Importantly, Meta lowered its subscription price for UK users to make this a fair choice, which is roughly half the cost offered in the EU.

The ICO will be monitoring how this and other consent or pay models roll out. Our goal is simple: to ensure you're empowered to make choices and are able to give consent freely and to ensure businesses operate in a way that respects UK law.

Visiting the Museum


Our standard opening hours are:

We have been venturing further afield, collecting items for our upcoming exhibition 'Pooch', which opens on 25 October. Our Collections Assistant and Learning and Outreach Officer drove a large van to Bungay in Suffolk to gather a special little dog. The Black Shuck puppet, featured every year at the Black Shuck Festival, will be one of the centrepieces of this fascinating exhibition. 'Pooch' will explore the relationship between humans and their dogs, the evolution and breeding of modern breeds, and celebrate the wonderful bond across species. From Gundogs to Guide Dogs, from speedy Greyhounds to mythological beasts, 'Pooch' promises a fun factfilled journey into the world of our four-legged friends.

Object of the Month

The Object of the month for October was a wax model of a beffsteak fungus. This wax model of the beefsteak or ox tongue fungus illustrates how it occurs naturally, with several bracket-shaped fruiting bodies growing close together on a tree trunk. In life, the fungus has a glossy red top surface and a creamy white underside. The colours in the original wax have faded since it was made, some time between 1880 and 1904.




The beefsteak fungus is an edible fungus and is named after its similarity when sliced to a cut of raw meat. It is also described as a good substitute for a cut of beef in a meal, when prepared in the right way. The historic label shown with the model describes the best way of cooking the fungus to replace steak.

"... cut it into slices about an inch thick, then scald them by placing them in a pan of boiling water for

a few seconds, dry them with a cloth. Smear each steak with oil or butter and sprinkle each with pepper salt. Dust them with flour then give ten minutes grilling. Garnish with fried onion."

The scientific name for the fungus, Fistulina hepatica, also alludes to its resemblance to meat – hepatica is a Latin word meaning liver. This botanical illustration depicts the beefsteak fungus from the side when sliced (top) and when whole (bottom), emphasising its similarity to fibrous or veined meat. The drawing originates from an Italian manuscript from 1835 titled "Description of the most common edible mushrooms in Italy and the poisonous ones that can be confused with them", featuring 44 coloured images.



This model is part of a collection of over 30 wax models of fungi created by George Nathan Maynard during his tenure as curator of Saffron Walden Museum between 1880 and 1904.
