Dear Friends

As we move into October, the signs of autumn are all around us—the shortening days, the colour of the leaves, the harvest gathered in. It is a season of change, and perhaps this year more than most, many of us are feeling the weight of change in the wider world too.

We see it in the rising cost of living, which places real strain on families and individuals. We hear it in the news

From the Parish Council Chair

Dear Villagers, we hope you all had a good summer? It does seem that the switch has been thrown on for Autumn with heavy rain, strong winds and according to the weather forecast, more to follow.

There are further details in this edition of the Link regarding the Village Pumpkin competition which is now scheduled for 12th October. Good luck to all those who have managed to grow one this summer given the exceptionally dry weather we've enjoyed. My personal thanks to Katherine Nuthall for all her efforts in making this happen.

Talking of dates, and apologies for mentioning it so early, we have provisionally flagged 28th November as the annual Christmas Tree lighting (with all the trimmings). More details will be provided as they evolve.

We have previously mentioned a number of projects the PC has been focused on. These have included posts to protect the green, which we hope will be installed now that the ground is a little softer. We have recently taken delivery of ground repair material which we can use to repair small potholes and damaged paths around the village. Whilst we are aware of suitable and obvious targets, please let us know if you have spotted any more that could benefit from this repair material. That said, we are hoping for some able-bodied volunteers to help us with the repairs.

We are also looking for helpers to get involved in some other village projects, including Litter Picking, (bags and pickers available) and Speed Watch. An hour every now and then would be really valuable for the benefit of our village. If you think you could be part of a community activity group, please contact the Parish Clerk whose details are in the Link.

Finally, The PC has been advised that a development of the scale envisaged by Pegasi is not supported by the current Local Plan, the new Local Plan, the current full weight Neighbourhood Plan, or the new Neighbourhood Plan.

The new Local Plan will be in force in 2026 and has just moved to the next stage of implementation, which is publication of some modifications required by the Inspectors, none of which alter the 'zero' requirement for Quendon.

The new Neighbourhood Plan has just moved to a six week consultation and in its spatial policy states 'Quendon and Rickling Green is a small settlement with little in the way of local services or facilities and is not suited to major development schemes.

Therefore what has been proposed by Pegasi is in conflict with 4 Development Plans, one of which carries full weight, and the new Local Plan, being at an advanced stage now carries significant weight.

All for now.

District Councillors' Report

Neighbourhood Plan at 'Regulation 14' consultation



The Neighbourhood Plan refresh has now moved to a six week public consultation ending on 5th November. The Plan and supporting maps, appendices and independent reports are on the steering group website https://www.nqrplan.org/. A paper copy is also available at the Newport Parish Council office at Waterloo House, High Street, Newport, CB11 3PG.

Responses are welcomed from residents, businesses and all interested parties, and can be by email to steering.group@nqrplan.org or by post to the Newport Parish Council office

The representations, including those from 'statutory consultees' such as Essex County Council, UDC, the water and sewage companies, and the NHS will be considered for modifications to the Plan. This will in turn go to an independent examination. We are looking to have it in place by mid 2026 and under current rules it will carry full weight in planning decisions.

The Neighbourhood Plan is aligned with the new Local Plan and which is progressing smoothly through its processes and should also be adopted in 2026. It requires 300 dwellings in Newport, to be allocated by the Neighbourhood Plan, but no scale of development for Quendon & Rickling.

To allocate the 300 houses the Steering Group reviewed, and consulted on, five site scenarios and obtained an independent Sustainability Assessment. After more work, supported by consultants ONH Planning for Good, this was reduced to two scenarios - 'east' and 'west'. Following developer presentations further and community consultation the Steering Group and Parish Councils have selected the east option as having the best balance between benefits and site challenges. The details are on the consultation documents on the plan website.

Some policies have been clarified in the light of use, others updated for changes, and new policies made. Policies drafted include on river pollution from sewage works, light pollution, designation of Local Green Spaces, and on gated communities. Also how traffic assessments for major



developments are carried out - the pinch points in the centre of Newport are, on longer term forecasts, going to seize up at peak times, but on the short five year horizon currently accepted by Highways, they still classify as acceptable for major development are certain to make it worse.

A Master Plan is included aiming to provide upgrades and improvements for the villages, and provision for the extra services needed resulting from new development.

And if you would like to see the citations for the four designated Local Wildlife Sites around Quendon, they are also on the website, and oddly not published anywhere else. So please do look and have your say!

Recently, I was privileged to watch two bats flying around my garden. They were so quick and acrobatic it was difficult to keep them in view. Bats and their roosts are legally protected so must not be disturbed. Bats are mammals, giving birth to live young. It reminded me of how lucky we are in The Hundred Parishes to have so many wild mammals in our mainly rural area.



There are several kinds of deer locally, mostly Fallow,



Roe or Muntjac. Larger herds are usually Fallow deer which have "palmate" antlers, shaped like the palm of a hand. The smaller Roe deer may be seen

in smaller groups — they have a white rump and no visible tail. Muntjac are smaller still and tend to be solitary; they have horns and



"tusks" - downward-pointing canine teeth.

Out enjoying our latest walk, number 188, my wife and

I surprised two hares who disappeared at great speed when they spotted us. They can run up to 45mph over short distances.



We regularly see foxes in our garden, usually courtesy of our inexpensive night vision camera. In the spring, we enjoyed watching the young cubs

playing. Foxes seem to be a more common sight now, even during daylight, and regularly venture into



built up areas. The camera occasionally spots a badger; he is usually looking for peanuts.

Anyone lucky enough to see hedgehogs in their garden should look after them as their numbers are in decline.

They are nocturnal, so at dusk we should put out a shallow bowl of fresh water (not milk as it is bad for their digestion) and perhaps some dog or cat food. They may repay

you by eating slugs and insects although our experience has been that they prefer commercial hedgehog food like Spike's Dinner.

Enjoy them all.

Maces Farms October update



Although cereal harvest wrapped up back in mid-August, the sugar beet harvest is only just beginning. Our beet is scheduled to be lifted in late September/early October, and the timely late rains have likely saved the crop from disaster. The beet struggled through prolonged dry spells, so while we aren't expecting exceptional yields, we are hopeful they will be lifted in good

conditions. The plan is to turn

fields around quickly for drilling winter wheat for harvest 2026.

The shift in weather has been noticeable, with cooler nights and shorter days marking the start of planting





and legumes to establish between late September and October. After a dry late spring and summer, widespread rain across the UK has now created favourable conditions for autumn drilling.

September rainfall also helped flush out grass weeds such as blackgrass and brome. Encouraging these weeds to germinate early is beneficial, as they can then be controlled before drilling. Left unchecked, they compete with cash

crops for nutrients and water while also hosting pests and diseases.



Where possible, we also use companion cropping alongside our cash crops. For example, buckwheat and berseem clover are sown with oilseed rape. Buckwheat flowers early, attracting beneficial insects, and its roots help release phosphorus into the soil. Berseem clover fixes nitrogen through its root nodules, providing a natural nutrient boost when it dies back. In previous years we've also trialled fenugreek, which deters flea beetle with its distinctive scent.

Here's to a smooth drilling campaign and a strong start for the autumn crops.

Stansted Assets

Have you noticed the white Touchpoint vans going busily about their errands in Stansted? The estimable Paul Chambers, founder of Touchpoint, has galvanised an energetic band of 'assets' aka local volunteers to supply many different services to Stansted. At the u3a monthly meeting, he reminded, thanked, and impressed everyone with the project's truly dynamic work. Touchpoint was initiated by Paul after he carried out a number of street surveys and identified different needs in our community alongside a wealth of untapped expertise and willingness to help. With astute and creative planning Touchpoint now has 190 active volunteers, 9 Food Share points

across the neighbourhood, a community radio station, kids' teatimes, Sunday afternoon movies, bereavement counselling, a memory cafe. It counters isolation and other serious issues through compassion. Unsurprisingly, the u3a audience was highly attentive, some departing the meeting intending to join in Touchpoint, all thankful such altruism is at work in our neighbourhood.

The next Monthly Meeting talk on Thursday, 16th October, will be "Make Do and Mend" given by Amanda Sutherland whose experience of Costume Design and working in Theatre and TV promises to inspire creativity in the re-use of those out-of-date clothes clogging up the wardrobe! Saffron Walden Museum

Visiting the Museum

Object of the Month

September's Object of the Month is a Nocturnal, or night dial. Imagine navigating vast open seas in the 17th century, how would you know the time without access to today's technology?



Nocturnals would have been used to measure time, based on the position of a reference star, such as Ursa Minor (the Little Dipper), in relation to Polaris, the North Star. The outer edge of the lower disc shows the months and days, while the inner disc shows the hours. The inner disc would have been set to indicate the date, and Polaris sighted through the opening at the top of the instrument.

The "pointer" would then be rotated to the chosen "reference star", which would have then given an indication of the time. It wouldn't have worked that well in bad weather and cloudy skies though! This example of a Nocturnal was presented to the museum in 1909 by Stebbing Leverett. It is inscribed "for both bears", in reference to the 2 constellations, Big Dipper and Little Dipper, or Great Bear and Little Bear. It consists of 3 wooden disks of boxwood, one with carved wooden heart, pivoted together with brass dials. Stebbing Leverett (1836-1909) was an alderman of Saffron Walden for 37 years. He owned Stebbing Leverett



& Sons Outfitters, a drapers and grocers shop on Market Hill in Saffron Walden, which he took over from his father John Leverett. John Leverett was the Mayor of Saffron Walden in 1851 and an alderman. Stebbing Leverett donated items to the museum in the mid-1850s and there are invoices and bills from Stebbing Leverett & Sons Outfitters in the museum's document archive

From the Village Forum of September 1995

The Summer of 1995 has been the Summer of everyone's childhood memory - long hot days and warm balmy, starlit nights - the hottest and driest Summer for 260 years. How much easier life becomes in warm weather - minimal clothing, less slaving over a hot stove and of course there is no mud to tread into the house. It's cheaper too of course in terms of heating and lighting.

An interesting phenomenon of this particular Summer has been the enormous resurgence of insect life, due in part to "greener" less persistent pesticides and milder winters. I have seen more butterflies this year than I have seen in a long time - among them my particular favourite the Peacock. Clouds of Ladybirds have almost wiped out the aphid population, and dragonflies and damsel flies have strengthened their numbers. The down side is that bugs of the large, dark, whizzing variety invade the bedroom just as you settle down for a good read, e.g. Cockchafers and worse.

We found an enormous caterpillar in our garden, identified as the Elephant Hawk moth which turns into a truly beautiful, delicate pink-winged creature.

Emergency Life-saving

Should someone suffer a cardiac arrest or show symptoms of a heart attack e.g. pains in the chest, then your first action should always be to phone the ambulance service on 999. The service will refer you to our Automated External Defibrillator which is at the front entrance to Quendon & Rickling Village Hall. Another is sited outside Reception at the front of Rickling



School. Anyone can save a life by using one of them until an ambulance arrives. In addition you can seek help from any of the volunteers listed below.
